Drowning Victim Buried Monday

Funeral services for Nancy Carol Hurst, 12, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alan J. Hurst of Baird, were held Monday, May 6, in Lewisville.

Nancy was drowned at 3 p.m. Saturday, May 4, in the T&P Lake at Baird. She reportedly stepped off the bank into a deep part of the lake while attempting to rescue a younger brother. Her mother and five other children were at the lake fishing.

Her body was recovered at 4:20 p.m. after an extensive search by members of the Baird Volunteer Fire Dept. and other individuals. Justice of the Peace Garvin Jones pronounced her death due to accidental drowning.

Born January 8, 1956 in Lewisville, she and her family had lived in Baird since August of 1967. They had lived a number of years at Headley and Silverton before moving here. She was a student at Baird Elementary School, where she was a 4th grade student.

Survivors include her parents; two brothers, Allen Daniel and Donald Lee; three sisters, Loretta Lynn, Annette and Barbara Gale all of the home; paternal grandmother, Mrs. Jewel Hurst of Aubrey; maternal grandfather, Hawley Judkins of Lewisville.

Clyde-Baird Raiders Split Double Header Saturday

The Clyde-Baird area will have a semi-pro baseball team in the semi-pro league in Abilene this summer. The team will be known as the Raiders and will be made up largely of boys from Clyde and Baird. Team members from Baird are Tally Windham, Maxie Gordon and Richie Crow. Members from Clyde are Winford Hogan, Kenneth Rogers, Jim Paylor, Ed Dunn, Butch Waggoner, Tony Spagnol, Jack Powers and Rick Dennis. Abilene members are Don Franklin, Sam Harris and Teddy Tedford. Manager is Winford Hogan and assistant manager is Knox Waggoner.

The Raiders played a double-header against the Abilene Jets Saturday night, and split 2-0, 2-0 to break even for the night's work. This was the first outing for the team and they did a creditable job.

In the first game, Jim Paylor held the Jets to one single and walked only one batter, and striking out 10. He retired the side on strikeouts in the last inning. Only three men reached base all night against Paylor. Stanley Allen, borrowed from the Hawks, was the game hitting star as he doubled in the only runs of the game to score Tedford and Paylor, with a ringing shot to centerfield. Jim Mauldin, also from the Hawks, Tedford and Franklin were credited with the only other hits for the Raiders.

Rogers was just as effective as his running mate, allowing only 2 hits while striking out 12 batters. The Jets managed to score an unearned run in the bottom of the 1st and 8th innings and made them stand up for a 2-0 win.

Hitting for the Raiders was limited to a leadoff single by Waggoner in the 1st and a 5th inning single by Allen.

Bright spot for the Raiders was the pitching of Paylor and Rogers who combined 12 innings, gave only 4 hits, walked 3 and struck out 22 batters.

The Raiders hope to schedule a game at 8 p.m. Saturday night at Clyde Bradford Field in the Clyde Community Park. The team plans to schedule games at both Clyde and Baird during the season in order that local fans may have an opportunity to see them play.

The Eisens auto was traveling west on Texas 36. Two Godfrey Funeral Home ambulances were called to the accident scene and transferred the injured to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene.

Highway Patrolman Harold Hambrick of Baird and Dee Welch of Cross Plains investigated the accident, assisted by Deputy Sheriff Howard Cox of Cross Plains and Hoot McGowen of Baird.

In the Sheriff's race, Grayson Miller received 1137 votes to Homer Price, 875, and J. W. Patton 535. In the seven-man race for Commissioner Precinct 1, C. Lee Smith had 598, and Irvin Corn polled 353, and Constable Precinct 1, Glen Curtis had 328 to Glen Boyd's 243.



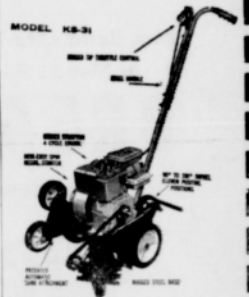

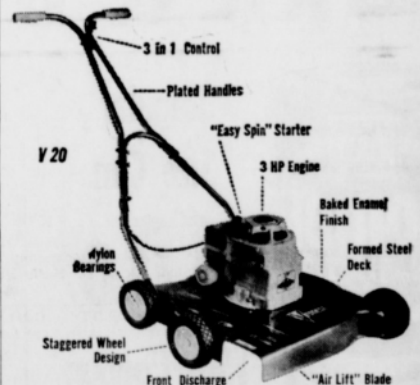
