## MOTORCYCLIST KILLED HERE WEDNESDAY

Donald Nail, 26-year-old resident of Lubbock, was killed here Wednesday when the motorcycle he was riding collided on the highway U. S. 87 with a pickup driven by Willie Joe Swearingen, 15, of O'Donnell route 3. Nail succumbed from his injuries shortly after the accident in a local clinic to which he had been taken. A Harris funeral home ambulance of Tahoka was called shortly afterward by relatives and the body was taken to Lubbock. M. J. Mitchell, 21, also of Lubbock, who was also riding a motorcycle and accompanying Nail, was injured when he skidded trying to get out of the way of the two vehicles. Nail suffered head fracture, internal injuries and several broken bones, while Mitchell's leg was dislocated. The accident occurred, so investigating highway patrolmen said, when the vehicles met where the Pride road crosses the highway southwest of town.

He was born and reared in Wythe, Collin County Texas, where I received my education. I am married and have two children. In April 1917 I volunteered for service in the Navy and remained on active duty until sickness forced me from active service. In March 1919, I received an honorable medical discharge. In 1925, I moved to Tahoka to make my home and started working for Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Co. In 1932, I was elected County Clerk of this county. There I served you to the best of my ability for six years. When making my last year, I promised the people of Lynn County that I would retire at the end of the term, rather than try to perpetuate myself in office. I kept that promise by retiring voluntarily at the end of my term in 1938. I consider the office I now seek an advancement over the one you have heretofore given me. It is my belief that a man should seek a higher office only upon the faithful service he has rendered his people in one to which he was intrusted. I do not want the people to give me anything except an opportunity to work, thereby enabling me to honorably serve, and provide for my family at the same time. If you believe that ambition and service should be rewarded by promotion when one has qualified himself for the job; that I will make you an honest efficient officer; and that five consecutive terms (10 years) for the present incumbent is a reasonable tenure for this office, then I believe you will vote for me on election day in July. ## SUDDEN BLIZZARD HERE TAKES LIVES OF TWO FARMERS

A sudden blizzard which claimed two lives near O'Donnell struck the South Plains country Friday morning. Highways and the countryside was heaped with a snowfall variously estimated from seven to 12 inches.

John Walker, 39, and J. L. Martin, 22, Harmony community farmers, froze to death late Friday afternoon when they were making a return trip to their homes from Lamesa. They, with Hubert Walker, brother, and Ernest Samsberry went together on the trip from Lamesa, and the party came via Indian canyon and over the astrack. After their car had stalled, all four men followed in an attempt to get the auto started again. Finding no friends any, they abandoned their auto and struck out over the ranch pasture, and eventually reached a small but living distance apart. Walker and Martin struck out in a different direction from the other two. As soon as the survivors learned that their companions were missing, search was started and the bodies of both were found by Finis Childern and Jack Smith lying face down about one half mile from the safety of a ranch house. High snow drifts made the search extremely difficult. Tragedy stalked in the wake of the blizzard, but humorous tales were told to mingle with stories of rescue.

Cars had to be abandoned by many travelers, yet in some cases other travelers just stayed where they were to await help. Farmers were caught in town trading and were unable to get home. A hurry-up call for rooms rang over O'Donnell Friday night. The hotels were packed tight with people sleeping in the lobbies, while private homes were thrown open to many travelers. Many of those unable to find a place to sleep stayed up all night in the bowling alley and Sherry Wright's cafe. Unlike many schools over the South Plains which permitted buses to leave with children, the O'Donnell buses were kept from the highways and many children proceeded to turn the schoolhouse into a place to sleep as well as learn.
