BOY SCOUTS MEET IN LUBBOCK FRIDAY

Lubbock.—Boy Scouts and Cubs, 1,900 of which, began a push this week which will sell 25-cent tickets to the third Boy Scout Circus, to be

Pierce Brooks In Race For Rail Commissioner



PIERCE BROOKS

Dallas, Texas.—April 18th.—Pierce Brooks, for several years prominent in Texas politics, today announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for Railroad Commissioner. Brooks for months has said that he had no intention this year of becoming a candidate for any office. He stressed the importance of remaining in private life, attending to his real estate business and "making a living for my wife and son." Two years ago Brooks polled more than 400,000 votes in a runoff campaign against one of the most popular men in Texas, Coke Stevenson, who only defeated him by a narrow margin. Brooks was in bed as the result of an accident for most of the runoff campaign.

Brooks announcement for the place now held by the veteran Lon A. Smith ends speculation which has been rife for months as to whether or not he would be a candidate for this office.

His office in Dallas states that in recent weeks, thousands of Texans have petitioned him to run for Railroad Commissioner, basing their plea upon the proposition that he was the best informed man in Texas and his needs that was available, and upon the record he made in the service of the people.

Brooks was born on a farm and made his way in life the hard way. He has a wife and one son. All his leisure, which is little, is spent at his suburban home, surrounded by flowers, a well-kept garden, a good milk cow and the inevitable family dog. He is a constant church at-

tendant; and although liberal, is himself a total abstainer from intoxicating liquors.

"I have consented to make this race, fully realizing the enormous physical and financial sacrifice involved," Brooks said. "I shall make it upon my record in Texas and as a plain business man candidate." He has opposed Federal control of our natural resources, favoring their strict conservation and protection for the school children, the aged, and the owners of the property on which these resources are located. Eight years ago he formed the Texas Safety Council and has been its head since. He stumped Texas in behalf of the Constitutional amendment for social security and has been a strong advocate of payment. He announced that his platform in full will be given the public within a short time.

Those who know Brooks—and they are numbered by the hundreds of thousands—know him as a smiling, red-headed vigorous personality. He is known as a tireless and an enthusiastic worker for any cause he may champion.

His wide-open manner makes friends readily. He is always accessible to the highest or lowest. In 1933 he organized the Texas Safety Council. He has headed that organization since. He has travelled thousands of miles in the promotion of safety. When the Constitutional amendment calling for old age pensions, aid for the needy blind, the destitute children and participation in the teacher's retirement fund was

submitted in 1934, he stumped the State in its behalf at his own expense. He has since been a staunch advocate of meeting this bill. Two years ago he made the most remarkable race for State office in the recent history of Texas. Although ill from an automobile accident in the runoff campaign, he increased his vote 100,000 while other candidates were losing.

In his work in behalf of social security, the Safety Council, and as a Betty Rhea Caldwell.

candidate, he has visited every county in Texas. He is familiar with their problems and their resources. It appears possible the next legislature will levy additional taxes on natural resources to care for special security. Brooks' friends feel his information on these will be invaluable.
