BRACEROS WAGE DISPUTE ENDS

Farm wages which the U. S. Sec. retary of Labos finds to be preyailing wages must be paid by em-ployers of braceros when the prevailing wages are higher than the

contract rate.
That is the essence of a February 25th decision by the U.S. Court of Appends for the Fifth Circuit. It reversed a district court judgement involving J. M. Morris, a congrower in Fisher County, Texas

Mr. Morris employed eight braceros during the cotton harvesing season of 1955. His contract with then was to pay the workers at the rate of \$1.55 cwt or the prevail-ing rate, which ever was higher. Midway of the season, the Secretary of Labor determined that the pre-vailing wage for area was \$1.75.

The case had wide-spread significance because a large number of farmers refused to pay the establish ed prevailing wage rate when it was higher than the rate mentioned in their contracts


