## Harvest Near High Gear

A bale count of the five local gins as of 8 a. m. Tuesday showed 4568 bales being ginned. This is an increase of over 3500 bales from last week at the same time. Areas gins are estimated to have ginned another 2500 bales. On the basis of an estimated 23,000 bale crop here the harvest is roughly 1-5th over. Many fields will not have a second pulling.

Last week end was very good with all businesses reporting good sales. This week end should be even better and the peak will be early next month. Some 2,000 Mexican Nationals are in the fields locally as well as many native harvest workers. A peak of 3500 Nationals will be here, it has been estimated. Pulling is going at \$1.55 per hundred.

Cotton is running shorter staple this year due to drought and grades are showing more light spots.

Residents are reminded that shopping will be easier on Fridays and early Saturday morning than the traditional late Saturday shopping.

Dry, open weather is seeing one of the earliest and most rapid harvests in recent years. If the weather continues open, the bulk of the crop will be in by early November.

The fall weather is perfect. Flower lovers are reporting their mums are beginning to bloom.

### A GINNERS' DREAM GIN

(1st in a series on local industry) A ginner's dream gin is the new \$400,000 Farmers Co-op Electric gin here that was built last spring. The gin is really two full size gins under one roof and one master control. It is rated 400 bales in production per 24 hour period.

There are two rows each of 4-120 saw stands equipped with Continental lint cleaners, Moss Lint Cleaners, Automatic bale sampler for each gin, steamer for static and dryers for wet cotton.

The most remarkable thing are the consols of electric drive which like an electric organ, that cut on and off the various attachments of each gin. A master switch is at each bale press where the ginner can "kill" the plant instantly. There is also a device to cut off the seed cotton suction feeder automatically.

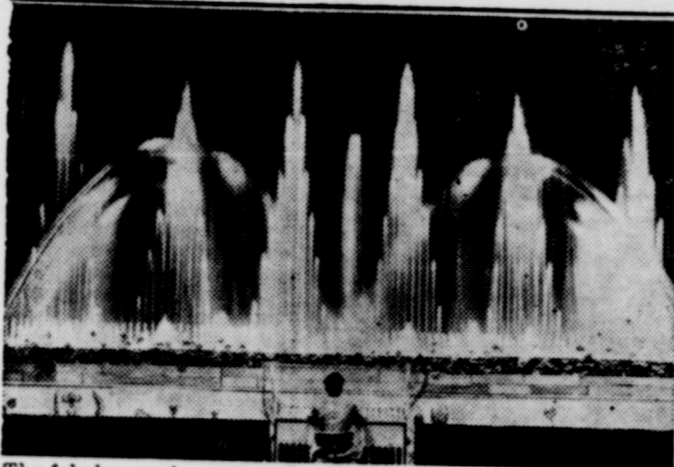
30 men staff the 24 hour crew with a weekly payroll of \$3,000.00 J. L. Wheat is day ginner and Wesley Duckett is night ginner.

### Rats Cost Money To Have

People who know say a single rat can waste through \$2 worth of dry corn without any trouble whatever, and despoil another \$20 worth in the process.

They're mighty expensive critters to tolerate in town or country, both by virtue of the food they eat and the some 27 diseases-including typhus and bubonic plague--they are known to spread.

This time of year rats will be in field burrows. Soon though, with rural harvest will get underway and cooler weather coming, they'll move into grain bins and feed stacks and buildings where food is stored.

If you're interested in keeping them out of your place, now's the time to formulate a plan to deprive them of food and shelter this winter and avoid a repetition of last year's record-breaking infestation.

Start by burning or piling scrap lumber at least two feet off the ground. Scatter feed stack chaff and manure piles over fields. And keep the inevitable weeds and grass around outbuildings cut so as not to attract rats.

Rats breed so rapidly that mere killing campaigns without accompanying sanitation are worthless. On the other hand, striking reductions in rat populations have been made by rat proofing without killing procedures.

Farm buildings in good repair are seldom infested with rats, so it follows that's the way to keep them. Check to make sure walls are tight and that floors and foundations are crack-less. A strip of galvanized metal three feet or so high, placed around the base of a building will keep rats out - provided they can't get through the floors.

### SUMMER IS A TIME FOR FOOD POISONING

During summer days, anxious to enjoy picnics and outings, mothers prepare food in advance so they may have more free time at the outing.

Too often this early preparation of food leads to food poisoning.

Summer is just about over and there are not too many outdoor picnics scheduled, but the season of church suppers, group suppers and the like is still with us. Food poisoning is an inconclusive term which in its broadest sense refers to disease conditions resulting from eating or drinking material in some way poisonous.

A major form is bacterial contamination of foods - cases in which the food has become contaminated with one of four types of bacteria.

With reasonable care in food handling the growth of these bacteria (germs) can be held to a safe minimum. There are always some bacteria present and they thrive if given the proper temperature range to multiply. If food must be kept for a long time before consumption, refrigeration is an absolute necessity. Especially vulnerable are bulk dishes as potato salads, ham salads may spread, custards and other similar foods.

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in Lynn County, Texas, on the 17th day of October, 1959, on the proposition and at the places more particularly set forth in the election order passed by the Commissioners' Court on the 14th day of September, 1959, which is as follows:

**"AN ORDER**

CALLING AN ELECTION ON THE PROPOSITION OF THE ISSUANCE OF \$190,000.00 ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVY OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF.

WHEREAS, there has been presented for the consideration of the Court a petition signed by the

quisite number of persons praying that an election be held in Lynn County, Texas, on the proposition of the issuance of Road Bonds of said County in the amount of \$190,000.00, and the levy of a tax in payment thereof; and

WHEREAS, the Court has found that said petition is signed by more than fifty (50) of the resident, qualified property taxing electors of Lynn County owning taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation; and

WHEREAS, the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Lynn County;

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF LYNN COUNTY, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held in said County on the 17th day of October, 1959, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of this order, to determine:

Whether or not the bonds of said Lynn County shall be issued in the amount of \$190,000.00, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Four (4) percent per annum, and maturing at such time as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, in not to exceed Twenty (20) years from the date thereof, for the purpose of the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof, through out Lynn County, Texas; and whether or not ad valorem taxes shall be levied annually on all taxable property in said County sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient to pay the bonds at their maturity.

2. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 3 Title 22, Revised Statutes of 1925 as amended by Chapter 16, Acts of the First Called Session of the 39th Legislature.

3. All persons who are legally qualified electors of this State and of this County, and who are resident, qualified property taxing elect-

ors of this County, owing taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence.

4. The ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF AN AD VALOREM TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF ROAD BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF AN AD VALOREM TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

Each voter shall draw a line through one of the above expressions thus leaving the other as indicating his vote.

5. The said election shall be held at the several polling places in Lynn County, Texas, and the following named persons are hereby appointed as Presiding Judges of said election. Said Presiding Judges are hereby authorized to select such assistants as may be required to assist them in holding said election at the several voting precincts as follows:

Voting Precinct No. 1 at the Home Demonstration Agents Office Courthouse, Tahoka, Texas, with John F. Thomas as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 2 at the High School Building, Wilson, Texas, with C. E. Campbell as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 3 at the High School Building, O'Donnell, Texas, with Ralph Beach as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 4 at the Community Center, New Home, Texas, with Tom Russell as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 5 at the Methodist Church, Draw Community, with Graham Hensley as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 6 at the County Courthouse, Courthouse, Tahoka, Texas, with E. R. Edwards as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 7 at the Schoolhouse, Grassland Community, with H. W. Edwards, Jr., as

Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 8 at the Office, Gordon Community, with O. Reed as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 9 at the H. School Building, Tahoka, Texas, with Maurice Huffaker as Presiding Judge.

Voting Precinct No. 10 at Community Center, New Moore Community, with N. S. Parker as Presiding Judge.

In addition thereto, there shall be posted other copies of this order at the public places in the County, one of which shall be at the Courthouse door for three weeks (3) week prior to said election.

9. The County Clerk is hereby directed to have published and post the same as hereinabove directed, and further orders are reserved until the returns of said election are made by the duly authorized election officers and received by the Court.

**Safety Is Important**

Parents, especially mothers are as a rule extremely careful with their young children; careful in what they eat, careful that they have their shots, careful in their play.

Uppermost in the parent's mind is safety.

While the child is home, the mother has a direct control over the safety of her child.

When a child leaves home, for school or other activities, the responsibility becomes more complex.

It becomes necessary for the parents to do their part to see that the community is doing its best to safeguard children from preventable accidents.

What parents can do about this is well worth looking into. The school, police, fire, recreation and health departments all have a part continued on back page — in planning for child safety.

A child is fortunate if he has attended a well-conducted nursery or kindergarten before school. Here the youngster learns very early to play safely and happily with other children, and he begins to learn the rules of safety.

If he walks to nursery school with his mother, or even if he goes to school in a bus or the family car, the rules of safety can still be taught.

The wise parent finds what safety rules the school is teaching and then sees to it that the same rules apply at home.

He makes doubly sure that nothing he says or does runs counter to what is being taught in school, because such conflict only confuse and undermines the child's confidence in both his teachers and parents.
