The parade floats were very beautiful and had the theme of titles of western songs. There were not quite as many float entries as in past years but floats entered were above the average in beauty and reflected much thought, planning and work.

Winners of visiting sheriff posse were — Gaines Co., 1st, Lubbock Co., 2nd and Dawson County, 3rd. Due to the unsettled weather, not all of the guest possees were able to attend, especially Friday, when a small twister hit Tahoka and the Wilson area.

The rodeo enjoyed fine crowds on all but Friday night when the twister alert during the afternoon cut the crowd that nite to about 600. The crowd Thursday nite and Saturday nite was as large as any in past rodeo shows. It was thought the rodeo would be a financial success although C. R. Burleson, Jr. had not completed the figures by Monday.

Miss Sherry Middleton, the beautiful daughter of Mr and Mrs. J. T. Middleton, Jr., was crowned queen of the rodeo Thursday nite in an impressive ceremony by last year's queen, Miss Helen Hoffman. The winning queen was sponsored by the Fire Department. Princesses were Miss Lott, sponsored by the local Legion post, Miss Singleton, sponsored by Lynn Co. Posse and Miss Vestal, sponsored by the local Rotary Club.

TAKE IT EASY WITH "HAPPY PILLS" SAYS HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Austin — The big three in America today are reserpine, chlorpromazine and meprobamate. They are tranquilizing drugs — so called "happy pills." And as more and more people take them for real and imagined tensions, they are fast becoming household words. Americans last year spent well over \$150 million for various types. A single drug company reported the sale of 30 billion tablets during the first ten months of 1956 and indicated that sales were expected to double in 1957.

Scientific studies indicate that the drugs have great value in the treatment of some types of mental illness but when people, for no other reason than that they had a bad day at the office or that the children have been unusually noisy, begin eating them like popcorn, an insidious danger is in the making.

Like other valuable drugs, tranquilizers can be harmful physically and mentally. In some cases there is a tendency toward habit formation. In a few cases unpleasant side reactions have occurred. Some users have been depressed rather than calmed. Calm users have become excited. Only time can tell whether prolonged use will permanently damage the nervous system.

All of us would do well to remember that a certain amount of tension and anxiety is a part of normal life. Peace of mind and zestful living do not yet come in pills. It comes from facing our problems and working to solve them.

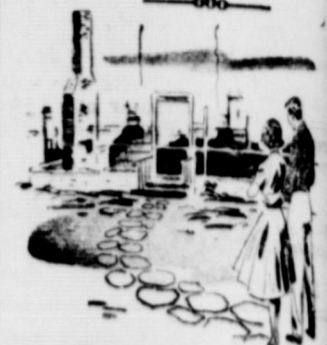

THE GIRL HE LEFT BEHIND

This Week In Austin

 Practically every discussion concerning honesty in state government usually ends with a remark something like this—

"Well, if the people would pay more attention to what goes on in Austin there'd be fewer dishonest officials."

That statement, true as it is, does not reveal exactly how such attention can be created, but it certainly does bring up a question that leads the way to better state government.

How CAN we get the voters more interested in state government?

If a successful answer to that question is found, Texas will be well on its way toward more efficient, honest government.

House Speaker Carr hit the nail on the head the other day when he said state government was "on its way back to real confidence and integrity." But there is a lot to be done before state officials can regain ground lost earlier this season when new tales of bribery and scandal made front page news.

Most state officials are hard-working conscientious people who do their jobs well. They are dependable, honest employees and representatives who command the respect of even the most demanding employer. But they don't make front page news. The dishonest ones, with their explosive schemes are the ones most likely to create widespread comment.

As for how to get more people interested in state government, there are many people thinking and working toward possible solutions.

This column was begun to furnish more information to the people of this senatorial district. There are similar programs by lawmakers in other parts of the state. All these things help explain state government. But if we do the job we need to do, some one is going to have to come up with more ideas.

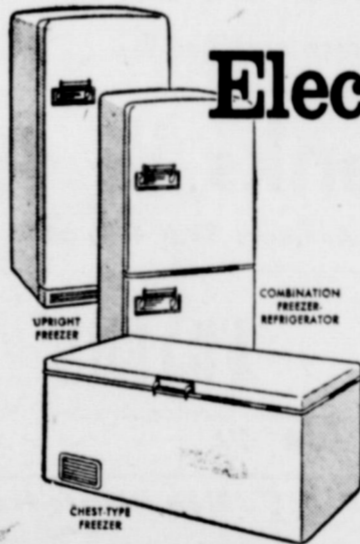
