Narrowly Escaped Death When He Slipped And Nearly Fell Down Ice Covered Canyon

## Caught A Small Tree And

 Checked Fall Near Bottom (From the Dawson County Journal) (Continued from last week) Before going very far I thought maybe I had better take a good look at the place where I had come over the ridge so in case I ran into a bluff in the canyon I could not godown then I could back track and down then I could back track and
find my way easily over the top ind my way easily over the top;
track myself back. So I took track myself back. So I took a
good look around taking notes of good look around taking notes of
certain kinds and shapes of trees and certain kinds and shapes of trees and come in from the right and left to the main canyon. I would also notice how dead trees would be laying, killed by the forest fire many years ago. How the main deer trails would some times go over these logs and then when a tree with a great many limbs on it would fall how the deer would go around it. All of these things flashed through my mind and I looked careful while I was at the same time hunting for game.
I had gone down the canyon a
long way, first taking the sides when long way, first taking the sides when I could, then going down the bed of
the canyon, when I began to wonder the canyon, when I began to wonder
why it did not become steep and why it did not become steep and
rough, as I thought is should. As I
thought more about this I began stayght more about this 1 began to
sta the bottom of the can yon. Then pretty soon the walls of
the canyon or rather the sides bethe canyon or rather the sides be
eame steep and high. When I came on such a place as that, with the
dense fog and snowing, quite natur-
ally it became somewhat darker.
Thinking evening was coming to a Thinking evening was coming to a close, I quickened my steps and forgetting about deer I walked pretty fast down the canyon. Tere were more and larger deer tracks in the deep snow and try to imagine my in the snow that I in my limited knowledge of the woods and hunting I took this track to be a large bear just knew I was going to kill my first bear pretty soon because thought the tracks were fresh. But I never saw the "bear," and I learned later from some "Old Timers" of the mountains that the old boy that made these tracks was not a bear but was a mountain lion.
After trailing these tracks for quite a ways all of a sudden the canyon bed became rough. Large boulders were there and had to be climbed over and as these were covered with snow and ice I knew 1 must be careful not to slip and break my leg. But the roughness did not last long and the bed of the canyon became fairly smooth again. The valls of cach side were high and very ing this canyon was not Pine Canyon ng this canyon was not Pine Canyon fairly flew down it walking as fast as I possibly could, and going down hill a person can walk pretty fast, walked headl caution to the wind Then after
trudging in the snow in the bed of dense fog and freezing weather the canyon became rough again, even rougher than before. Thinking darkness would pretty soon be there I jumped over big boulders, ducked and dived under growing trees and crawling and climbing over fallen and dead trees. All of these were zovered in either snow or ice and some times both So when I would climb over a fallen tree or boulder my hands must needs be put in the frozen snow my trousers legs must scoop up some and my coat must drag through it. Then again when I would go under a growing ree I would strike a limb and some nice cold snow and ice would geutly
but firmly fall down wy collar. say I had a cool head, $L$ guess this was the reason and I'll guess this was the reason and "cool." My feet were cold of course but enough of physical discomforts. I must take physical discomforts. I

Small bluffs began to appear and each of these had to be descended At the bottom of these the snow being quite deep I got a nice snow bath each time I went over one of these Then all of a sudden I ran upon a higher bluff, possibly forty or fifty feet high. The walls almost straight up and smooth making it impossible to go around. Luckily for me there was a dead pine tree leaning up against the bluff, afforded me a getting down place. The tree being covered in snow and ice and my feet wet and cold, and my hands in the same shape I knew I must be careful not to slip because I knew what a slip meant. Then making it more hazardous 1 had of course my rifle and it being big and heavy and
wanting to be careful with it wanting to be careful with it, all that tree very dangerous. But after two or three dead stubs breaking with a load ctack I arrived safe and unhurt down the tree. I lost no time in looking back to see what a
