Irrigation Is Gaining Here

Future Looks Very Good

Operation "Water Well" in this three county area is still the one big news story after three years. The total of irrigation wells in this area is surprising when in the crop year of 1953 only about 400 acres were irrigated.

Using a base of 25 acres irrigated per well there is roughly 2600 acres under irrigation . . . probably 3,000 as we feel sure there are more wells than listed above. An estimate would be that irrigation has increased 700 percent since the fall of 1953.

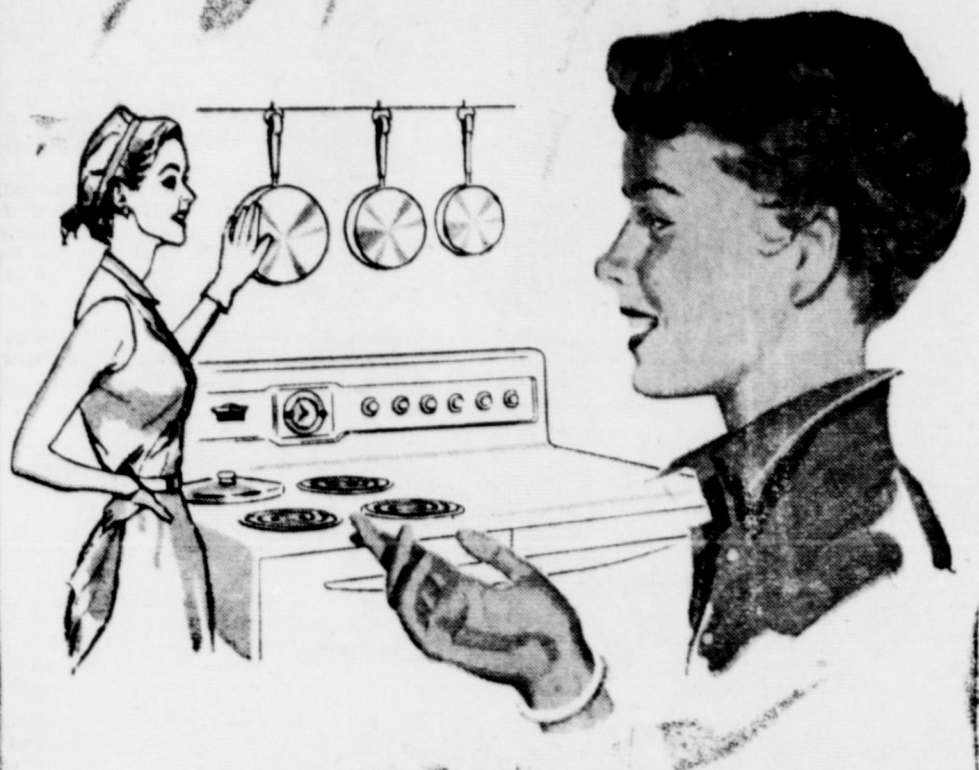

Army Adopts Formula To Stop Fungus Pest

BALBOA, Canal Zone—The army will defeat a costly tropic disease due to its civilian-military cooperation program in the Caribbean command.

It is estimated that adoption and perfection of a new-type fungus control compound ultimately will save thousands of dollars worth of army instruments. The compound's formula was submitted to the United States army in the Caribbean's suggestion committee by a civilian.

Donald F. Scott, chief of the instrument repair branch of the Inter-American geodetic survey, Balboa, Canal Zone, and a veteran of 20 years experience with precision instruments, developed the formula after a long series of experimentation.

The formula, consisting of seven parts beeswax, two parts vaseline and one part mercury (poison), prevented fungus growth on instruments during nine months of testing during the rainy season in the Panama jungles. Instruments not treated with the compound showed signs of fungus within 90 days.

Cotton Babies Throng In Goldsmith, Ind.

GOLDSMITH, Ind.—Dr. S. M. Cotton was given a big day recently in this town of 300 population. He celebrated his 50th year as a "country doctor" with the aid of more than 3,000 persons.

Fifteen hundred of the celebrators wore cards on their lapels proudly proclaiming "I Am a Cotton Baby."

The slender, blue-eyed doctor thought he must have delivered "between four and five thousand" babies. Tipton county records show Cotton's name on 4,467 birth certificates.

Cotton was honored at a big dinner in the Methodist Church. Afterwards, the Jefferson Township band led a parade down Main St. to the Old Settlers' Grounds, where the doctor, his sandy hair shot with gray, presided over a picnic.

Kitchenettes Make Music For Town Park

BIGLERVILLE, Pa.—There's a Mardi Gras air today in this thriving little community, not far from historic Gettysburg. And it's the women of the town who are responsible.

The girls have banded together to form the novel Biglerville Kitchenettes, members of which use all manner of kitchen utensils to produce music.

Community Betterment

The 40 members of the band have one sole aim—community betterment. Right now, the town needs a new playground or a public park.

While the serenade is going on, non-playing girls pass bread-baskets and tureens among the audience, wheeling and cajoling contributions from the delighted audience. This money, quite logically, is transferred into a tremendous kitchen pot. To date, the Kitchenettes have raised the level of the pot to a hefty \$3,000—more than enough, they figure, to purchase the land for Biglerville's newest play area.

Unique Auctions

Unique auction sales also further the Kitchenette cause.

Famed writers, painters and other civic-minded persons, intrigued by the Biglerville project, have contributed valuable items.

Last Spring, the Kitchenettes undertook to present a musical performance based on the various seasons of the year and the seasons' effect on apple-growing, one of Adams County's principal sources of income.

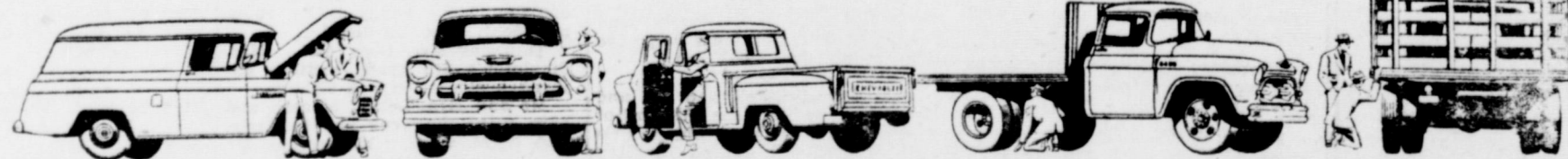

Pickle Queen

Lives Near N. Y. Town
PALANTINE BRIDGE, N.Y.—The pickle queen of the Mohawk valley is Mrs. Ada Nellis.

The 13-room house, 100 years old, where Mrs. Nellis lives, has been her home since she was a bride of a farmer, 20 years ago. Then the Nellis place was a 100-acre dairy farm. At the death of her husband, she had been sold and Mrs. Nellis has turned her house into a boarding home for elderly people.

Still she makes pickles as in the old days, to serve on her own table, to donate to the church bazaars and to donation drives, to give as presents at Christmas, to help stock the shelves of her four married children. Not one of her three daughters, and they would tell you so themselves, can make pickles half as good as their mother can. It's Bonnie Lee, 10, who lives with Great Grandma. She's going to be a pickle-maker of the old school. Each summer she helps with the pickling.

Planetarium Shows Complex Universe

PHILADELPHIA — The Fels Planetarium show, "Hunting for Space", shows just how complex the universe of the earth really are.

There are many excellent and scientific ways to prove the rotation of the earth. There is the Foucault pendulum. There is the centrifugal force of the earth's rotation. There is the account for the uphill flow of the Mississippi River, and there is the apparent rotation of the stars.

The first proof of the earth's rotation was furnished in 1679 when the English physicist Hooke verified a prediction made by Sir Isaac Newton. Newton held that the earth rotates, a body on its surface will not be traveling as fast as a body in the top of a high tower. For the latter body will be farther from the axis of rotation.

It was computed that at the equator a ball dropped from a 400-foot tower would land more than 1 1/2 inches from the point where it would have fallen if the earth were not rotating.

The rotation of the earth produces other effects as well. The earth is not spherical but has an equatorial bulge. Just like peaches, that equatorial bulge makes the axis of the Earth wobble, so the north pole is not always pointed to the same part of the sky. Because of this slow change, about 14,000 years the bright star Vega will be the pole star instead of the present Polaris.

Chicago Cubs Make Alltown Fan Happy

RIVER FOREST, Ill.—Under the age of 10-year-old "Half Pint" Pickett, who has a weak right arm, is the proudest kid in town. He is the mascot and bat boy of the State Bank Nine, one of the Little League baseball teams in this Illinois township. Dave is listening these days about going up to Chicago as the guest of the Chicago Cubs, the big league team which is his idol in the sports world.

He had a strong yearning to play baseball, a life's ambition that he inherited from his father, Larry Pickett, employee of a local hardware company.

Half Pint's ambition is to grow up and be a player for the Cubs. But Dave isn't physically built for baseball. He has a congenital condition which has slowed his growth and makes him tire easily. The best he could do when playing Little League teams were here was to hold down a position as bat boy. He sadly put the "1/2" numeral, denoting that he was not an active player.

One day he wrote to Cubs Manager Phil Cavaretta for an autograph. With the autograph from Cavaretta came an invitation to the Cubs and his mother to be guests in the box seats near the field.

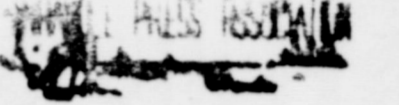

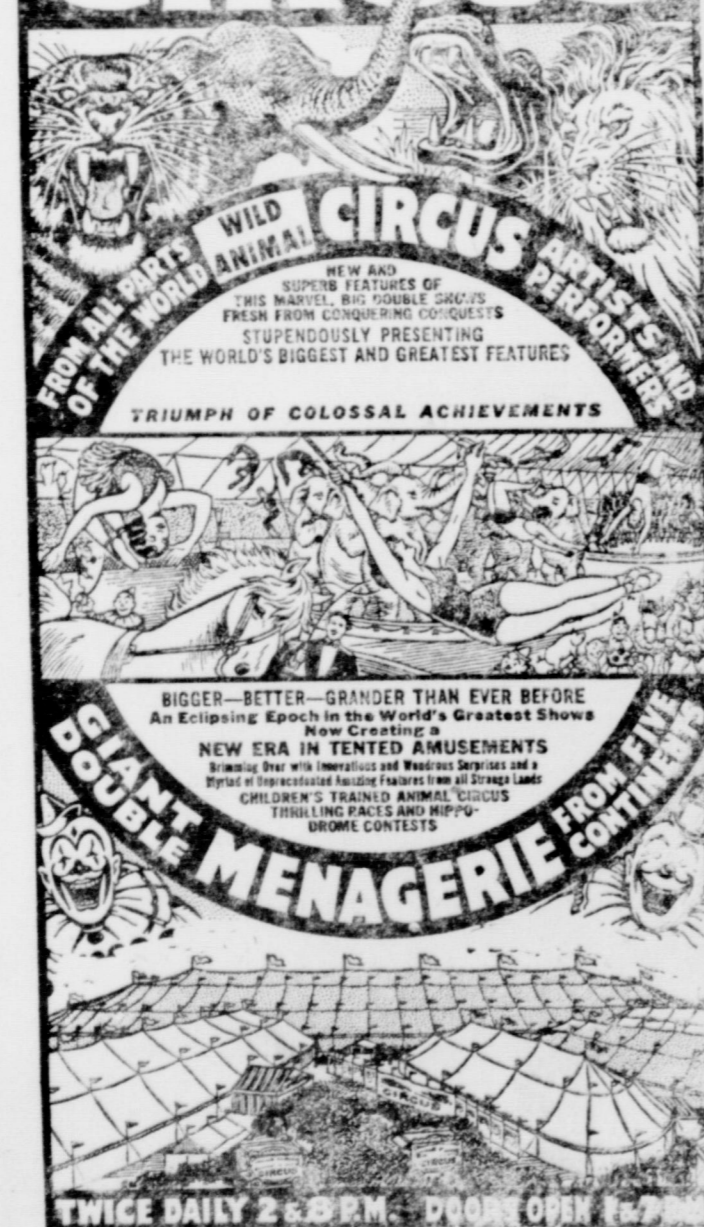
