Mahon expressed the hope that he could spend most of his time out among the people of the 25 county district explaining, however, that both his Lubbock and Washington offices would remain open.

In commenting on the general situation Mahon made the follow ing statement:

The present picture is dark in some respects. For this I do not blame the Democrats or the Rep that ublicans. We are thankful an agreement has been reached to stop the shooting in Korea but there is every indication that there is no good way to deal with the Russian Communist and that the Korean truce will prove to be as frustrating as the Korean War.

Except for the undiminished threat to our security posed by the Communist, now apparently in ession of both the A bomb and the H bomb, Congress could have worked wonders in dealing with taxes and the budget."

Mahon pointed out that the fiscal picture was not altogether dark. He said that a downward downward trend in spending could definitely be expected unless there should be worsening of the international situation. He said that there was no reason for a spirit of defeatism, that in his opinion we should keep up our guard on the domestic and foreign fronts. He feels that we can successfully work our way thru this difficult period. Mahon emphasized the fact that our country s essentially sound to the and tremendously powerful and that we should not lose faith in each other or faith in our President As to the new Republican Admin istration he had the following to

say:
"The first session of the 83rd Congress was notable for the fine spirit of cooperation which existed between the President and Con-gress. I am not critical of the esident. I think he is doing the best he can under the difficult domestic and international situation and I have given him my best co-operation. I have voted with him on all issues except in rare instances where I have had deep convictions to the contrary. Likewise, I am critical of the first session of the 83rd Congress. I think it did about all that could have been expected of it under the circumstaces. Of course no miracles have been performed and a very big job yet remains to be done. The second session of the 83rd Congress will have to deal with a wide variety of difficult and controversial subjects involving such matters. jects involving such matters as the extension of the farm program and many other important issues."

fectious ailment can be found in any age group at any time of the year. But children are unusually susceptible and most cases occur during summer. It isn't too ser-

ious, except on new born babies,

but it can cause days of itching mis ery to afflicted youngsters

It's caused by a pus forming bac-

teria called staphyloccoccus, the same sort of germ found in boils and sores where pus is present.

Usually it forms an unsightly crust over wide areas of the body and the

material underneath is very infectious if allowed to get on other body parts. It can easily be transmitted to anyone who used the twoel of an infected person since towel moist-ure permits the germ to survive. Children living in the most hy-gienic homes frequently get im-

gienic homes frequently get im-petigo, althou it probably is more common in homes where personal sanitation isn't considered too im

portant. The best way to minimize the ill effects of impetgo is to keep

the infection localized by preventing the serium under crusts from exuding into "clean" skin surfac-

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

#### **Nutrition Expert Sees** No More 'Three Meals'

AUBURN, Ala.-The usual American custom of three meals a day is not necessarily the best eating schedule.

Mary Hulsey, API extension nutritionist, explains that some people, often the elderly, feel better if they eat more frequently, but less at a time. They may prefer to divide their daily fare into four or five meals instead of three. Or some food may be saved out for snacks between meals or at bed-

"However." warns Miss Hulsey. 'older people who eat frequently need to guard against two hazards. First, don't spoil the appetite for milk, fruit, vegetables, and other needed food by filling up on toast and tea or cake and coffee. Second, don't overest and become overweight."

The specialist adds that growing children, active workers, and underweights also may benefit by between-meal snacks. Non-appetite speilers that give children nourishment for active play are a glass of milk, a sandwich, fruit, or a hardcooked egg.
