TO THE HONORABLE MAYORS OF THE CITIES OF AMARILLO, LUBBOCK, BORGER, LAMESA, LEVELLELAND, PAMPA, PLAINVIEW, O'DONNELL, SLATON, BROWNFIELD, AND TAHOKA, TEXAS, AND TO ALL QUALIFIED VOTERS WHO RESIDE IN THE CANADIAN RIVER MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY THEREIN AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, in accordance with the provisions of law pertaining thereto, that on the 8th day of August, 1955, the Board of Directors of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority will pass a resolution calling an election to be held throughout said Authority for the authorization of the \$76,000,000 revenue supported bonds of the Authority, to be issued for the purpose of financing the construction of the water supply and distribution facilities which have now been determined upon by the Board of Directors, and which have been found feasible by its engineers, and for the purpose of paying all necessary expenses incidental thereto which may lawfully be paid from the proceeds of said bonds. The Authority now contemplates that \$2,000,000 of the said \$76,000,000 bond authorization will be first issued and sold for the purpose of defraying the Authority's administrative expenses and to finalize engineering details, etc., as hereafter mentioned. This will afford the Authority accurate cost estimates of the construction as a basis upon which to determine the price which the Authority must charge for water to be delivered by it to its constituent cities, and to others who may contract with it in that respect, prior to the issuance and sale of any portion of the remainder of the \$76,000,000 authorization. The issuance and sale of such remainder will depend upon favorable indications in the foregoing respect.

A summary of the work and improvements necessary to deliver water to each of the constituent or member cities of the Authority is as follows:  
1. The finalizing of engineering details preliminary to construction of the Authority's Project, procurement of land options, easements and right-of-way, determination of relocations for existing roads and other facilities, the estimated cost of which is approximately \$2,000,000.

2. The construction of a dam or reservoir on the Canadian River near Sanford, Texas, having approximately 500,000 acre feet of conservation storage, approximately 450,000 acre feet of sediment storage, approximately 11,500 acre feet of dead storage, and a dependable yield of approximately 144,000 acre feet of water per annum.

3. The construction of a water purification plant.

4. The construction of an aqueduct or pipe line system from the reservoir and purification plant to the constituent cities, and to others who may contract with the Authority for water.

5. The construction of pumping stations.

6. The purchase of all other materials, machinery, property and property rights and the construction of all other facilities, as are incidental and necessary to the accomplishment of the purposes of the Authority's project.

FOR MORE DETAILED INFORMATION regarding such improvements, all persons interested are referred to the engineers report to be made available for that purpose at the office of the City Secretary of the respective constituent cities. In the event the aforementioned bonds are approved at an election called for the purpose, and if issued and sold, they will specifically provide that the holders thereof shall never have the right to enforce payment thereof from funds raised or to be raised by taxation, and only such portion of said bonds as is ultimately required to complete the Authority's project in accordance with the final contract plans and specifications will be issued and sold.

The 40 members of the Kitchenettes have one sole aim—community betterment. Right now, the group needs a new playground for a public park.

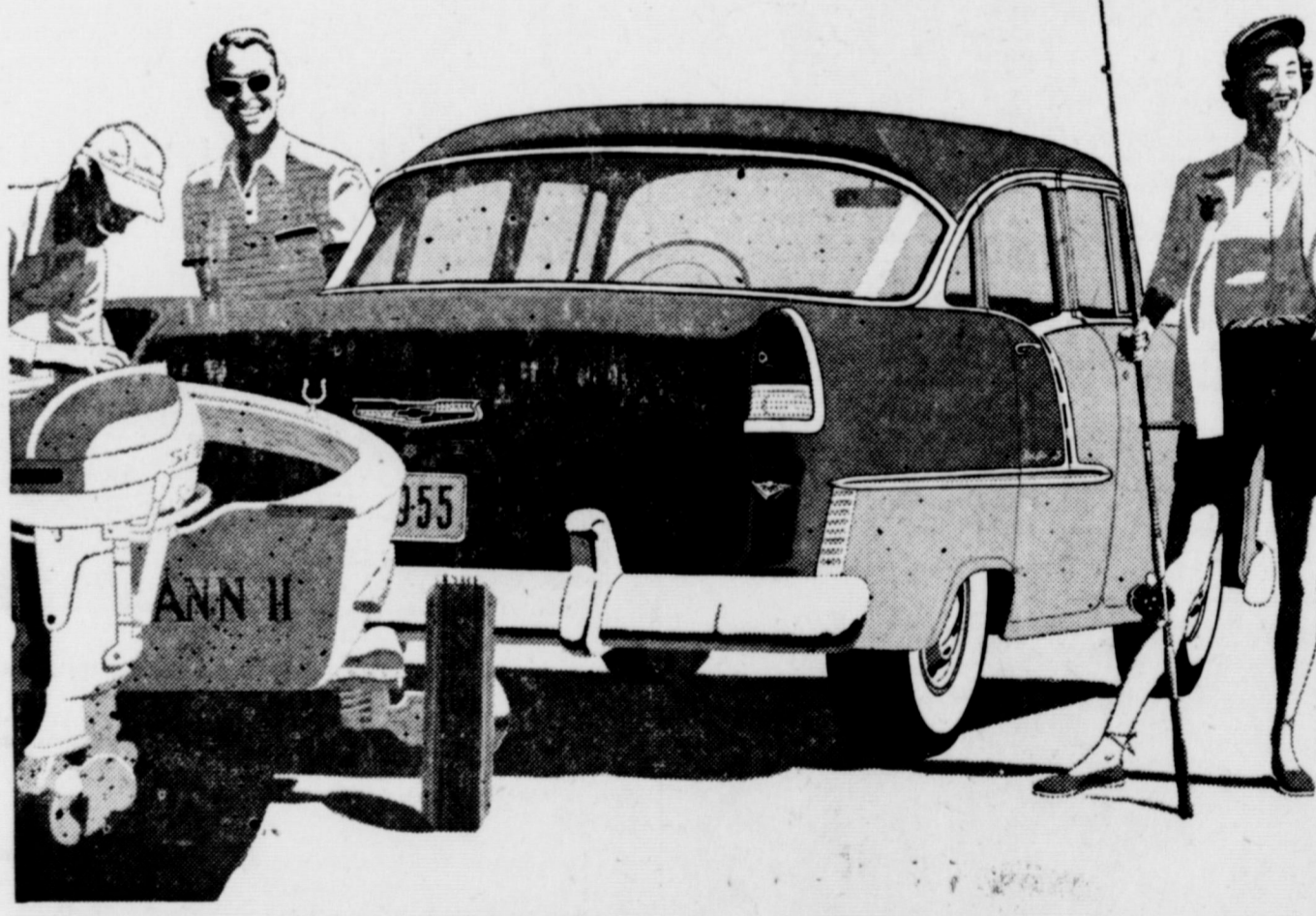

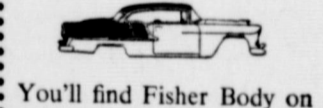

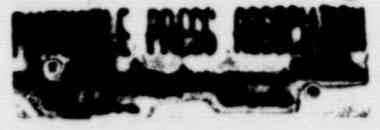

### Sulphur a Favorite With These Orphans

MIDWAY, Ky.—Students of the Kentucky Female Orphan School in this little town like sulphur—and with good reason.

The school, believed to be the oldest of its kind in the U. S., is a "silent partner" in a new sulphur development of Freeport Sulphur Company at Nash dome in Fort Bend county, Texas.

Here's how it came about: Back in 1945 Mrs. Belle Wisdom, a native of Paducah, Ky., bequeathed the school 15,000 acres of Texas land which included Nash dome. The discovery of sulphur there came later, and Freeport leased the sulphur rights from the estate's trustee.

For every ton of sulphur that is mined the Kentucky school will receive a royalty. Freeport is developing Nash dome as part of an over-all program to increase the nation's supply of the mineral that is needed to make fertilizers, chemicals, petroleum products, steel, rubber, explosives and hundreds of other items.

Mrs. Wisdom, who died in Houston, Tex., in 1945, was one of the school's principal benefactors. During her lifetime, she gave \$50,000 to the school which now has 225 students from 21 states and two foreign countries and a 55-acre campus. A high school and a junior college prepares the girls either for business careers or for senior college.

### Glaucoma Is Hazard To People Over 40

NEW YORK—Glaucoma is a word which carries very little meaning to most people, "yet that word will one day sound bitter overtones to one out of every 50 Americans over 40 years of age. These men and women—800,000 of them—are slowly losing sight from the eye disease glaucoma because of ignorance and neglect. Unfortunately, most of them do not realize that they face blindness."

To tell people over 40 the facts about glaucoma, the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness has published a pamphlet on the eye disease. Copies are available without charge.

The pamphlet points out that the best defense against glaucoma is a thorough eye examination at least once every two years after you reach 40.

It emphasizes that the three main points to remember about glaucoma are:

Strikes after 40 in most cases. It is difficult to detect in the early stages; as a result, many have the disease and don't know it.

### Come to California And Try Burro Meat

LOS ANGELES, Calif.—Something different in the way of big game hunting is claimed by California, according to a recent news release from that state's department of fish and game.

Stray burros, left or lost by grizzled prospectors since the middle of the last century, have developed a unique race of wily, speedy beasts, and several thousand of these dust-cake jackasses now lord it over the barren desert hills.

These descendants of the '49ers will sometimes dress out to 500 pounds of sweet, gamey meat. (That's what the release said.) Consumption of burro meat is limited to humans by California law. The flesh is said to rank with that of the better game animals.

The burros take over and ruin precious desert springs, destroy forage for game and stock, and sometimes kill the young of other species.

### Jako, the Parrot, Identifies Self

BERLIN—Jako, a 40-year-old parrot that disappeared when his master was arrested by the Russians in 1945, has returned to the restaurant of the Kaiser Wilhelm tower.

Jako picked up phrases that it should not have listened to. Among those were the regular scoldings that Rita, the master's dog, received. Jako would sometimes add to its morning greetings, "Pfu, Rita, aren't you ashamed of yourself?"

Max Mueller was released by the Russians in 1946 and reopened his restaurant. He missed Jako and decided to get another parrot, but did not like the birds that were offered.

Recently an American woman advertised a parrot that spoke 90 words. Mrs. Mueller went to look at the bird. It was in a bad mood and refused to speak. Mrs. Mueller did not recognize the parrot as Jako. She said, "No, I think I don't want him." Suddenly the parrot turned around and shouted at her, "Pfu, Rita, aren't you ashamed of yourself?"

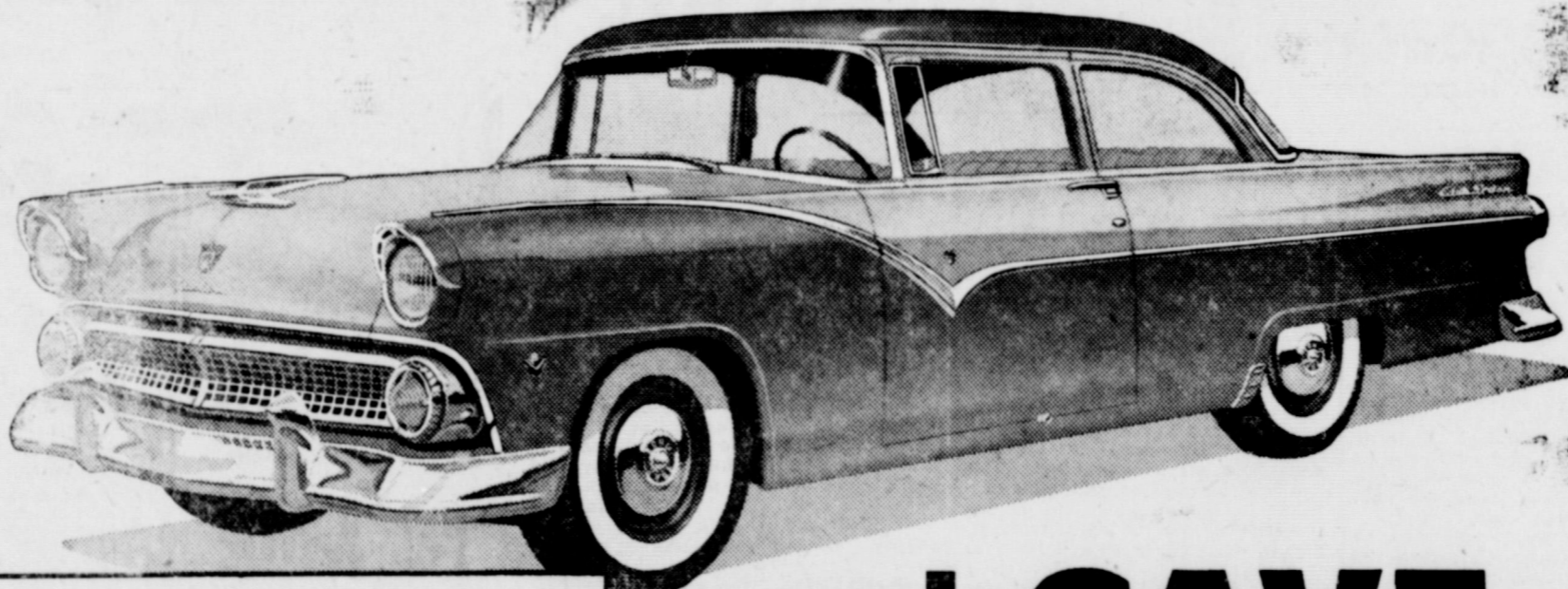
