## 2 In. Rain Hits Area

Wednesday night of last week a slower winter rain netted O'Donnell 1.96 inches of much needed moisture for the best general rain in February in more than 20 years. There has been a larger total of moisture here for February in more recent years but not in ONE storm. The rain fell slowly most of the night but for a short time the fall had the activity of a summer thunder storm. The heaviest rain was bounded to west by Seminole, Tahoka to north, Patricia to the south, and Fisher county to east. Area fall ranged from over 3 inches near the rock crusher to 1 inch at New Moore and over 3 inches at Mesquite.

Total moisture for year to date here is 2.20 inches. Farmers are extremely hopeful for a crop this year with this unusual "head start" and some thought they could plant with no more than a fog later on. This winter has been very mild with last week setting a heat record for February. The winter-kill of insects has been slight — flies are still around.

### Free Polio Shots To Be Given At School

The O'Donnell School program for FREE POLIO SHOTS for all persons 6 months to 20 years of age is expected to get rolling next week IF the measles outbreak dies down. The injections are not advised when the patient has fever.

Supl. Skinner said there were 414 signed for all three injections and 44 were signed for 2nd and 3rd injections. Of the 414 there are 70 under school age. The total to date is 458 with applications still coming in. The colored school is cooperating 100 percent, Mr. Skinner said.

Dr. Lehman and Dr. Rumbo will be the team of administering physicians who are donating their time and members of the 1946 Study Club will assist the doctors.

### SALVATION ARMY DRIVE OPENS THURSDAY

Thursday afternoon a group of business and civic leaders met and agreed that O'Donnell should have a Salvation Army operation here. A local Service Unit Committee of the Salvation Army was formed consisting of Homer Hardberger, chairman, Mrs. C. A. Lacy, vice chairman, John Saleh, treasurer, John Ellis, Dr. Noble Rumbo, S. M. Clayton, Jr., and O. G. Smith, Jr.

Under this new setup there will be one Salvation Army drive each year. All tambourine solicitations by the Army have already been stopped. The committee has set February 14th as date for the kickoff of this first Salvation Army Drive with a campaign goal of \$750.00.

The local committee will carry on a local welfare program, giving emergency relief to those in need. It will provide such items as food and clothing and will help needy children to remain in school by providing the necessities they need. All cases will be handled on a local level by the local committee with out any "red tape."

In addition the committee may use the state services of The Army when needed without charge. These include — home for unwed mothers at San Antonio, emergency disaster service, summer camp for underprivileged boys, men's social service centers, prison parole system, home for working girls, and the general help and counsel of trained Salvation Army officers and personnel.

**Polio Shots For All Here**

An all out effort of nation-wide scope is being made to stamp out the killing and crippling disease known as polio. This objective can only be reached when 100 percent of the population is protected by use of the Salk vaccine. There is no need to deny children this protection since the vaccine is available from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Certainly no one would hesitate to secure the vaccine for reasons of safety since it has been proved beyond doubt to be generally effective in the prevention of polio — especially of the paralytic type.

The medical doctors of O'Donnell cooperating with the 1946 Study Club and the Public Schools are making it possible for every child between 6 months and 20 years of age to obtain Polio Vaccine without charge.

The School hopes to administer the vaccine to all within the above age group however consent of the parents or guardians must be given. Additional information may be obtained from Supt. Weldon Skinner.

**A BASIS OF UNITY**

Several years ago there was a wide-spread movement in one small city the preachers of the various denominations together for the purpose of working out a basis upon which unity might be achieved. The one whose creed was said he would, but the others said they would not, and eliminated number two. So he took each creed, one by one, and eliminated them all. Each preacher would accept his own creed, but the others would not. Then he took up the Bible and held it before them, and said, "Will you all accept this book as the right standard of authority?" You know what occurred. The preachers made a motion to adjourn, and it carried!

Christ prayed for the unity of believers (John 17:20,21) ignorant and willful men have destroyed this unity by clinging dogmatically to their man-made creeds, disciplines, confessions of faith, etc. When all men become willing to lay aside their inventions of the devil: when all men become willing to accept the Bible as the only rule of faith and practice, then, and only then, will there be a common standard of authority that all will accept. Then, and then only, can the unity for which Christ prayed be achieved.
