



Infantile paralysis has hit 26
Texas Counties, with 47 cases reported according to the National
Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. All of the Foundation's chapters in the state are prepared as never before to cope with the disease by furnishing every possible aid to the polio victims the statement said.

"If polio breaks out in your com munity," the Foundation advises, observe the following rules: Avoid new contacts; watch for symptoms such as headache, unexplained fev-er, a cold or even an upset stom-ach. Phone your doctor immediately if these symptoms occur. The chances are you may not have polio, but if it should strike, prompt action is the first step toward recov егу.

Additional precautions include: Don't get overtired; avoid chills: observe strict personal and commun observe strict personal and community cleanliness; avoid removal of tonsils or adenoids prior to and during the polio epidemic season; don't swim in polluted water; see that waste and garbage are covered.
