

FLIES AND DYSENTERY ARE CLOSELY LINKED

Fly densities in Texas will reach their peak within six weeks, state health authorities cautioned this week.

Temperature and moisture will be ideal for fly growth and propag-ation by May and coinciding with the increase in the number of flies will be a marked rise in the num-ber of cases of dysentery diseases, State Health Commissioner Henry A. Holle predicted.

Last year in Laredo. sanitarians were able to accurately chart on a

graph a rise in dysentery diseases side by side with a rise in fly densities. They found that by starting intense fly killing campaigns at the right time, knocking off the peaks in fly densities as shown on the graph, a parallel drop occured in the incidence of dysentery dis-

Dr. Holle said that there is an object lesson in Laredo's experience for the rest of the state, Right now s the most important time of the year to begin really a serious fly control program.

More than 1100 deaths were attributed to dysentery diseases last year. Most of the victims were

Included among the major flyborne diseases are tuberculosis, typhoid fever, baiillary dysentery. infant diarrhea and the eggs of tapeworms and round worms.







#### FIRST AID

## Mining Town Is 'Safety-Wise' All the Year

ROCK SPRINGS. Wyo.-Three boys are walking down the main street. School is out and the prospect of the long summer recess makes spirits soar. Playfully, one youngster shoves another. He stumbles, falls against the large plate glass window of a department store and crashes through it.

An instant later, a red fountain spurts from his right arm where a razor-edged piece of glass has slashed through the artery. For a second he stares dumbly at the fast-flowing blood, then runs down the street, crying hysterically.

#### Springs Into Action

One of his two companions springs into action. He chases his panicked friend, catches him and knocks , him to the pavement. Skilled fingers probe the armpit above the wound and the flow of blood stops.

With his finger on the pressure point, the quick-witted youth orders the third boy to summon an ambulance. Had the youngster been ignorant of first aid, his friend could have bled to death in a minute and a half.

This is just one of several examples showing how knowledge of first aid has paid off in Rock Springs, a coal mining town in southwestern Wyoming.

The coal company has the nation's top mine safety record. Recognizing that first aid training is an essential part of any safety program, Union Pacific coal sponsors an annual first aid rally and contest.

This Year's Contest

This year's contest was held in the coal company's Old Timers' association building. The competing teams worked in ten-foot squares, laid out in a circle in the middle of the auditorium floor. At a given signal, each team captain was handed a first aid problem in a sealed envelope.

Interest in the contest is keen and the awards ceremony late in the afternoon is attended by squeals from the girls and loud cheers from the boys. Wrist watches went to the winning junior girls. matched luggage to the senior girls, portable radios to the boys and \$40 to each member of the winning men's team. Lesser prizes went to all other competitors.

#### Cancer Killer That Spares Life Sought

BERKELEY, Calif.-What would be the ideal chemical to kill cancer cells and at the same time leave normal tissues of the body unharmed?

A new approach to this difficult question will be undertaken by a team of scientists in the University of California School of Medicine San Francisco, with the aid of a \$10,000 grant from the Damon

At the present time the trial and error method usually guides the search for cancer-fighting chemi cals. Chemicals are made in the laboratory, then tried on canceros mice. If they have some effect or cancer, they are then tried or human patients.

There are at present two chief classes of cancer-fighting chemi-

In each case the chemicals that inhibit cancer growth so far tre have not been able to make a sharp enough distinction between cancer cells and normal cells.

The scientists will study the basic chemical reactions that take place between the chemicals and both cancer and normal tissue.

Their goal is to learn enough about the reactions to be able to write specifications for chemicals that would carry out the desired inhibiting reactions with cancer cells but not with normal cells.

#### Presence of Molecules Explains Expansion

does heat make things expand?

Matter is made of molecu which are in constant motion, an the higher the temperature, the faster they move If you have a volume of gas in a rubber balloon the pressure of these molecules against the rubber is balanced by its pull. Warming the gas makes the molecules move faster, so they push harder against the rubber It yields a little, and the gas expands

With cooling, their motion is slowed, they exert less pressure, and the volume of gas gets small er. Something similar occurs in a liquid, and also in a solid, although the molecules are held more tight ly together. The amount which a solid expands for the same rise in temperature is considerably less han with a gas or liquid.
