O'Donnell fell far short of high mark at the Lynn County Scholastic League and Track at Tahoka last week, some were won, and the local school had a total of 85 points, which at all had as compared to the other schools in the meet.

Edell Foster, a grammar school tied for second high point and proved that the "Run" part name is absolutely correct. First places were marked up to edit, one in 100-yard and in the 50-yard dash. Volley ball playground ball teams from O'Donnell were easy winners, and a number of other events added to the list of points.

### V. A. BOYS WIN FIRST PLACE IN TECH CONTEST

The vocational agriculture class of the O'Donnell High School made a splendid showing at the judging contest held Monday of this week at Texas Tech. The class sent teams of three in the plant production, dairy and poultry judging contests. More than ninety teams competed.

In the contest O'Donnell won first as a team in exhibition of poultry and fourth as a team in plant propagation.

Exceptional interest was shown in the contests this year, and the efforts of the boys from O'Donnell are to be commended. Although they won no first places, several second places were won individually. Gray Cook in particular made a wonderful showing, winning second place in judging Holsteins. Several of the boys placed high in dairy cattle and poultry judging.

Those taking part in the contests were M. L. Webb, Benny Moore and E. E. Barnett, plant production; Warren Smith, Harvey Barnett and Jake Burkett, poultry; Woodrow Ables, Gray Cook and Olin Yandell, dairy cattle.

The contests began at 8 o'clock and lasted until about 5:00. They were followed by a "feed" and announcement of honors in the stock judging pavilion.

The boys are now contesting for a trip to the dairy show at Plainsville. The three best in dairy cattle judging will represent O'Donnell. After this contest the high scoring student will be selected to go to the state contest at A. & M. It is hoped that four teams in plant production, poultry, dairy cattle and entomology can be taken to the state contest. This can be made possible only through the interest and help of the people of O'Donnell.

#### BABE RUTH'S SALARY

The news of Babe Ruth's signing a new contract with the Yankees for two years at \$80,000 a year is one of the most interesting items of the season in sport circles. Thus the famous slugger is granted a salary larger than that of the President of the United States.

His former contract was for three years at \$70,000 a year, a record figure for a baseball player until now. At various times there have been predictions that the Babe was slipping, but evidently the Yankee management does not think so.

Purely as a business proposition Ruth is no doubt worth the big salary he is receiving, for he is a tremendous drawing card for his team. But comparing his pay with that of the President it seems rather ridiculous.

However, maybe it's all right. There are quite a number of men in the United States who might hold down the President's job satisfactorily, while there is only one Babe Ruth.

#### CROP SURPLUS

An explanation for the reason for the farmer's inability to market his most important crops at a satisfactory price is given by the Secretary of Agriculture in a recent address. He attributes the trouble to over-expansion of farming during the war and says:

"During the war production increased outside Europe to compensate for reduced production in Europe. When Europe largely restored its agriculture, the other countries did not correspondingly decrease theirs. As a result the world's output ran ahead of market requirements. Prices inevitably fell."

There is no doubt much truth in this, and until farmers either make up their minds to reduce production or population growth causes increased demands for products of the farm, the present situation will not be entirely relieved.

But the Secretary did not explain why the government is spending many millions of dollars on irrigation and other schemes for bringing when too much is being cultivated now.

#### AMOS 'N' ANDY

Gosden and Correl, known to radio fans as Amos 'n' Andy recently were received by President Hoover. But no racial question was raised, as was the case when Mrs. DePriest, wife of the Negro Congressman, attended a White House Tea.

Although Freeman Gosden and Charles J. Correl have the negro dialect down so pat that thousands of their listeners think they are colored men, they are not. They are both white, the former a Virginian and the latter a native of Illinois.

In their radio broadcasts only these two are present in the studio. Gosden, 31, takes his star role as Amos, and also those of the King Fish, Lightning and others by suitably changing his voice. Correl, 40, is the deep-voiced Andy.

Beginning as radio amateurs in 1925, after several years of theatrical experiences, these two comedians have risen to be the highest-paid entertainers on the air. Millions of listeners follow the varying fortunes of Amos, Andy, the King Fish, Madam Queen, Ruby Taylor and the rest with keen interest.

In fact, it is speculated that their doings are of more popular interest than the antics of some of the star performers in the United States Senate.

The Baptist people of O'Donnell are going to put on a play at New Moore school house Thursday night.

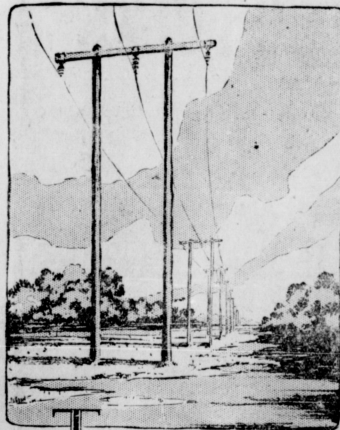

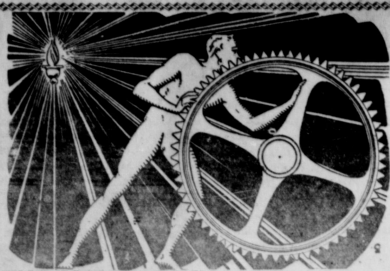

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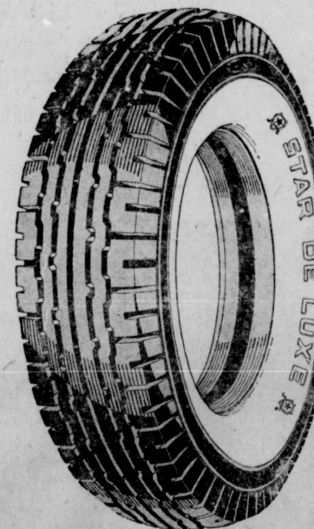
