Friday evening, August 19th, following a light shower at the beautiful farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Shanks, three and one half miles southwest of Clyde, it was still, quiet and peaceful as the sun set on a happy gathering of "Fogotten Warriors" as some 85 people gathered to celebrate the 2nd Annual Reunion of the Callahan County World War One Veterans. When people plan occasions of this kind they want to go some place and have a picnic. That's what happened Friday the 19th. All brought bountiful supplies of food in paper sacks or covered dishes, they bring it in by the tub loads, in an era of frozen TV dinners it's hard to visualize food in quantities, varieties and quality as was spread for this gathering. Regular classes will begin in Baird Public Schools on September 1, according to Floyd Warren, superintendent. Mr. Warren encourages all parents and students to clip the following information from the paper and keep it in a convenient position as a reference concerning school events.

Students should not report to school August 29th and 30th, as both days are set aside for teacher workshops. On August 31st the following students will report to complete their registration forms. Seniors report from 9 a. m. - 10:30 a. m.; juniors report from 10:30 a. m. to 11:30 a. m.; sophomores report from 1:00 p. m. to 2:30 p. m.; freshmen report from 2:30 p. m. to 4:00 p. m. To assure each student of receiving the best schedule possible, it is very important to report at the designated time.

The Baird Bears will begin the 1960 football race with the Cross Plains Buffaloes, Friday, Sept. 2, at the Bears Den. Game time will be 8:00 p. m.

The Jim Ned Indians, with 15 letterman returning, are favored in the District 7-B race.

Coach Vernon Townsend, the Bears new coach, has the job of molding several youngsters into starters. Baird lost eight lettermen by graduation, but returns two of the districts outstanding players - guard Johnny Rodriguez, 170 lbs., and fullback Don Hargrove, 180 lbs., who was ineligible last year.

Baird will have plenty of speed in the backfield in Hargrove, Mike Odom, 140 and Calvin Barnes, 145, and strong linemen like Rodriguez, Taber Bearden, 175 lbs., and Ross Odell, 160 lbs. But after that, Coach Townsend must depend on youngsters for starting duty.

Sarah Hatchett, Callahan county Farm Bureau Queen for this year will attend this district contest.

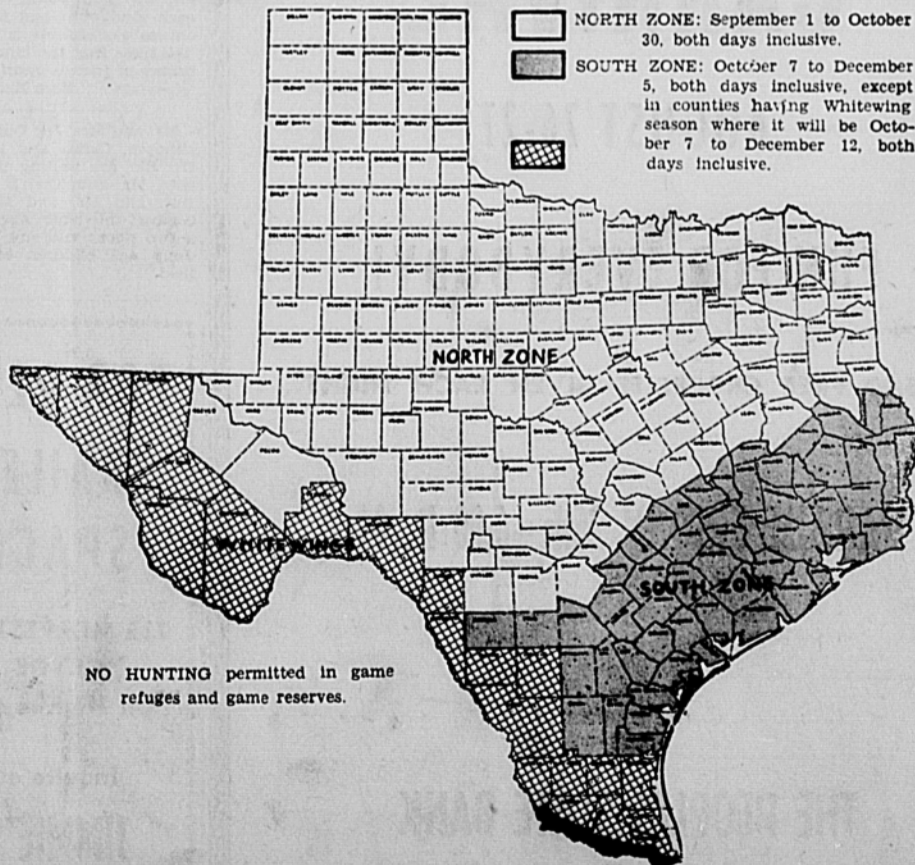

MOURNING DOVE - WHITE-WING DOVE OPEN SEASON 1960

MOURNING DOVES: Daily bag limit-15. Possession limit-not to exceed 30.
WHITE-WING DOVES: Daily bag limit-10. Possession limit-10.

NOTE: When both mourning doves and white-wing doves are possessed-- Possession limit-30, in the aggregate, and not more than 10 may be white-winged doves.



SHOTGUNS: Must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity, may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.
SHOOTING HOURS: Mourning doves, 12 noon to sunset.

The following resolution was adopted by the Board of Directors of the American Cancer Society on November 1, 1957, and was adopted and affirmed by the Board of Directors of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division, Inc., on Dec. 5, 1959.

BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. There can be no new participation by Divisions or Units of The American Cancer Society in federated appeals or Community Chests.

2. Units now in United Funds and Community Chests under approved arrangements may remain for the years 1958 and 1959, but shall conduct their own independent Crusade in 1960 and thereafter.

3. Funds raised by United Funds for the cause of cancer may not in the absence of an arrangement such as is outlined in paragraph 2 above, be accepted by Local Units or Divisions of the Society.

4. The Society continues to approve joint-in-plant solicitation in industry and government in which individuals may designate the American Cancer Society to receive their contributions.

This action was taken by the National and State organizations because:

1. In most such United Fund supported units of the American Cancer Society, there was an apparent lag in interest in cancer control programs.

2. In most such United Fund communities the support of the program of cancer control thru education, service, and research was not sufficient to permit necessary expansion.

3. As a result, the nationally coordinated research program and the local service and education programs had to be limited or delayed.

4. The Board of Directors of the national organization and of the State organization feel that in our free country there is need for both United Fund and for independent national health agencies to build programs and raise funds, each in its own field and each enriching the community.

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SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



The winter cover crop planting season is about here again. Soil improving legumes may be planted as soon as considered safe from insects, such as grasshoppers. Vetch and Austrian winter peas are the legumes which have been most successful here in the winter season.

Many landowners can testify to the value of legumes for soil improving. These plants add nitrogen (a very expensive element) to the soil in addition to improving the physical condition. The following crop will tell the difference. These cover crops can be used in rotation with cash crops or to improve such grass plants as K. R. bluestem or Blue panic.

Legume seed should be inoculated and drilled deep enough to protect the inoculant from the sun. 100 pounds of 13-39-0 fertilizer gives good results on most land. 10-40-10 may be used on coarse sands.

Vetch works well on many soils. It may be used with Abruzzi rye on sand; 10 pounds vetch and 25 pounds rye. Winter peas are better adapted to heavy soils; 15 pounds in rows or 30 pounds drilled.

Best results will be obtained from cover crops if they are protected from heavy grazing and left on the land as long as possible.

IT'S THE LAW
In Texas...
NO WILL? WHO INHERITS PROPERTY?

What will happen if you should die without executing a legal and proper will? Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, your wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your rightful beneficiaries and dispose of your property in accordance with your wishes.

When a deceased has no will, or dies "intestate" as the law calls it, the property of that person is distributed according to a detailed formula fixed by law. In some cases this may be the way you yourself would divide it - but in many cases it is not. The provisions of the law concerning the distribution of the property of a person who dies without a will are rather complicated, and all of the possibilities cannot be covered by a general statement.

There are different rules for real estate and for personal property, for community property and for separate property, for homestead property, and for all of the many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of the property.

For example, here is a general idea of how the community property which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property.

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide on-half of the property while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit

is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants.

An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this share where there are children surviving.
When there are only children and their descendants surviving,

they divide the entire estate between them.

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Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1949.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature on the maximum compensation for Members of the Legislature; limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days; and prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:
"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session and for thirty (30) days of each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days."
"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage to and from returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two

Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra mileage that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of a Regular or Called Session."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment allowing an annual salary of not to exceed Four Thousand, Eight Hundred Dollars (\$4,800) per year and a per diem allowance of not to exceed Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day for the first one hundred and twenty (120) days only of each Regular Session of the Legislature and limiting the Regular Session to one hundred and forty (140) days."
Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1949.

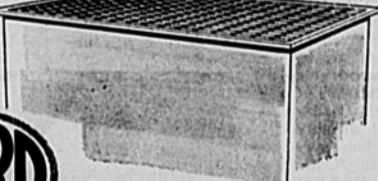
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to give the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and regulate rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; providing that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent (6%) per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; providing for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event any regulatory agency exceeds or grants any permit; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:
"Section 11. The Legislature shall have authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and regulate rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of not to exceed six per cent (6%) per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; providing, further, that in contracts where no rate of in-

terest is agreed upon, the rate shall not exceed six per centum (6%) per annum. Should any regulatory agency, acting under the provisions of this Section, exceed or refuse to grant any permit under any law passed by the Legislature; or should any applicant or holder shall have the right of appeal to the courts and granted a trial de novo as that term is used in appealing from the justice of peace court to the county court."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment giving the Legislature authority to classify loans and lenders, license and regulate lenders, define interest and fix maximum rates of interest; and providing for a maximum rate of interest of ten per centum (10%) per annum in the absence of legislation fixing maximum rates of interest."
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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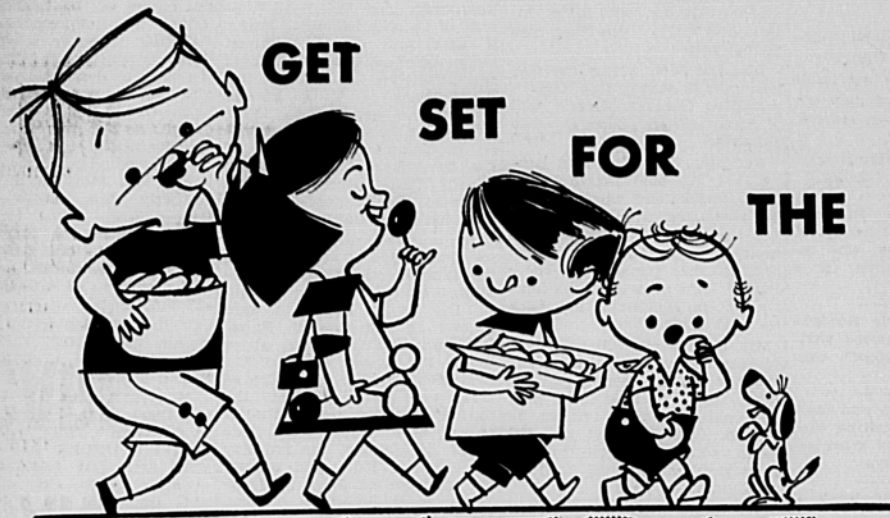
