## About 100 County Residents Hear Highway Engineers Explain Routing of Interstate 20

More than 100 Callahan County residents attended the public hearing at the courthouse in Baird Tuesday.

The hearing, required by both state and federal law, brought out an interested group, with a good sprinkling of women included. Attitude was one of intelligent, friendly interest with most people wanting to know just where the highway is to be routed through the county, and just how the routing would affect them.

Judge Lester Farmer introduced J. C. Roberts, district highway engineer, who told about the plans and specifications of the highway and explained the pattern of traffic that will be effective after the highway is built.

Generally, he said, the highway will travel the same route as it presently does through the edge of Putnam, and just north of Clyde, but will go to the north

of Baird by about five blocks from the present U.S. 80 route.

Roberts spent a great deal of time telling about the interchanges. He explained there will be one right in the middle of Putnam, similar to the one at Coahoma. The highway will necessitate the tearing down of the old hotel and the Shackelford store in Putnam.

Roberts is hopeful that all the right of way can be purchased by July 1, 1962. He believes the land should be purchased as soon as possible so that construction on the road can begin just as soon as the construction money is available.

It is likely, Roberts said, that the route across Callahan will be built in stages once the construction money becomes available. Likely, the first stage would be between Abilene and Baird because there is a great deal more traffic west of Baird than to the east.

Preparations are complete for the buffalo rodeo to be staged Saturday night in the Sheriff's Poses Arena, according to Hugh (Hackberry) Johnson, producer. A rodeo office will be opened Saturday, from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m., in the Farm Bureau building for those who wish to enter. At least 50 entries are expected in the different events.

Bucking horses will be an added attraction, and five buffalo riders have signed up in the Junior Riding.

Contestants wishing to try their luck at roping the bison, will first have to prove their roping ability on calves.

"We are not going to let just anyone rope on the buffalo," Johnson said. "Only the best ropers will be permitted to enter. We will double mug in roping the buffalo."

Johnson promises lots of excitement to rodeo fans, and he invites the whole family to see the buffalo in action.

## Easements Secured For Six Structures

Easements have been secured for six flood prevention structures of 12 planned on Turkey Creek watershed, according to officials of the Turkey Creek Conservation District.

On the remaining six structures, 14 easements must be cleared. The district is currently in the process of making preparations for assurance that the easements can be secured.

They have asked the Soil Conservation Service to go ahead with the project. Next step will be core drilling on the sites now clear, according to D. C. Cox, work unit conservationist with the SCS office in Baird.

Officials are hopeful that construction can begin next spring. The watershed comprises 59,200 acres of 92.5 square miles. Its flood plain area is 5,188 acres. Soil Conservation Districts involved include the Brown-Mills and the Central Colorado.

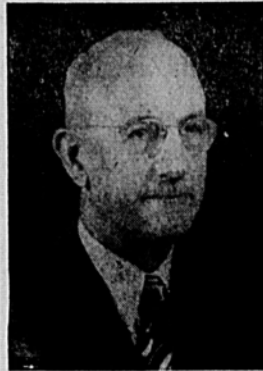

## Reunion Speaker Has Varied Career

Judge Meade F. Griffin, members of the Texas Supreme Court and principal speaker at Callahan Co. Pioneer's Reunion Aug. 11, has had a varied career as a lawyer, soldier and statesman.

Following is a biographical sketch of Judge Griffin:

Born March 17, 1894 at Cottonwood. Moved to Tulla in 1914. Received BA degree from University of Texas in 1914 and law degree in 1917. Worked his way through college waiting on tables, mowing lawns and other jobs. Graduated from the First Officers' Training Camp at Leon Springs in August 1917, as Captain of Infantry; assigned to Camp Travis and served until Oct. 1, 1918; promoted to Major Sept. 13, 1918; transferred to Camp Sheridan, Montgomery, Ala., and served until discharge on Dec. 8, 1918.

Returned to Tulla and served as County Attorney, Swisher County, 1919-1920. Served as Mayor of the City of Tulla in 1919.

Moved to Plainview in 1920, and practiced law with Kinder and Russell until 1923. Served two terms as County Judge, Hale County, 1923-1926. Served as District Attorney, 64th Judicial District of Texas, 1927-1934. Returned to private practice of law in 1935 with the firm of Griffin and Morehead, Plainview, with which firm he was associated at the time of his appointment as Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas on April 1, 1949, except for time spent in service in World War II.

Entered the service in World War II on July 27, 1942, as Lt. Colonel of Infantry; served as Chief of the Training Division, Camp Shanks, N. Y., a staging area for the New York Port of Embarkation. In May, 1945, he was detailed to the Judge Advocate General's Department and helped establish the Trial Section of War Crimes Branch, U.S. Army, and became Chief of the Prosecution Subsection thereof at Wiesbaden, Germany. He was discharged as Colonel of Infantry Dec. 9, 1945; holds Reserve commission in Judge Advocate General's Department.

Served as member of Board of Directors of Texas Bar Association from 1939 to 1942. Has been chairman of various committees since that time.

Served as member of the Advisory Hospital Council of the State of Texas from July 1947 to April 1, 1949.

Member of American Legion. Helped organize the Tulla Post and was charter member thereof before moving to Plainview. Charter member of the Plainview American Legion Post and was its first Post Commander.

Episcopalian. Member of the Plainview Rotary Club. Married and has two children.

Was appointed to the Supreme Court by the late Governor Jester in March, 1949, and took seat on the Court April 1, 1949. He was elected to a first full term in 1950, and is now serving on that court. Re-elected in 1956.

## Abilene Firm To Build Clyde School

Rose Construction Co., of Abilene, was awarded a contract for construction of an eight-classroom building, an 800-seat auditorium and an addition to the Clyde High School, by the Clyde School Board July 13th.

The firm's bid of \$186,550 was the lowest of 10 bids.

School Superintendent Ferrell Newton said that construction is to begin immediately, with the high school addition to be completed in 55 calendar days, the classrooms building to be finishing in about 90 days and the remainder of construction in 150 days.

The board also awarded a contract to the American Desk Mfg. Co. of Temple for science equipment to be used in the new high school addition. The firm's bid was \$8,677.

The remainder of the 30-year \$300,000 bonds, okayed by school district voters this spring, will be used to remodel the present elementary school building, furnish the new buildings, construct covered walkways connecting all buildings, and paving around the school.

## Mothers Frantic Preparing for School

This time of year mothers begin to get slightly frantic with all the details of getting children ready for school. Especially frantic are mothers who have small children who will begin school for the first time.

There is more to be done than meets the eye. There are shots to be administered, clothes to buy, teeth to be checked, health examinations, and birth certificate copies to be arranged for.

Most school districts require proof of age for children beginning school. The most convenient proof for most parents is a copy of the child's birth certificate. Such copies are available from local registrars, county clerks, or from the Texas State Department of Health's Records and Statistics Section.

Certified birth certificate copies may be obtained by sending \$1.00 to the Texas State Department of Health at 410 E. Fifth Street in Austin.

Along with the dollar, the child's name, place and date of birth, and the parents' names should be included to speed the records search.

Thousands of birth certificate requests are processed each week in the Austin facility. However, during the late summer months, the load increases substantially because of the many extra requests from parents with children beginning school.

The work load has been extra-heavy this summer because of the pending raise in birth certificate copy rates from \$1.00 to \$1.50, effective Sept. 1, 1961. Many Texans are trying to beat the deadline.

For this reason, authorities recommend that parents make their requests early enough to insure delivery in time for school. Ordinarily, about a week is required including mailing time.

So mother should take a hint, and get those certificate requests mailed off early. In addition to the million and one other details she must attend to before school starts.

Nearly 300,000 children will be entering Texas schools for the first time this year.

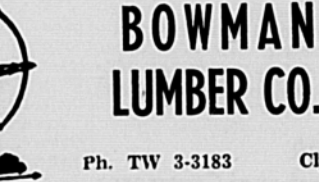

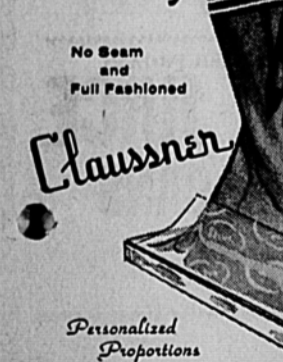

**Baird Receives Workable Program**

According to notification from Congressman Omar Burleson, Baird has received from Housing Administrator Robert C. Weaver approval of its Workable Program for Community Improvement.

Formal approval of a Workable Program is necessary before a community is eligible to receive Federal aids in the form of loans and grants for urban renewal programs and for low-rent public housing, and more liberal FHA mortgage insurance to assist in the private redevelopment of project areas and for rehousing displaced families.

This approval does not constitute approval of any specific Federal aid. The Workable Program is a showing by the community of how it intends to use its own public and private resources to eliminate and prevent slums and blight. Once its program is approved it can apply for the Federal aids to supplement local resources, as needed. The community must show reasonable progress each year under its Workable Program in order to obtain recertification and to remain eligible for the Federal aids.

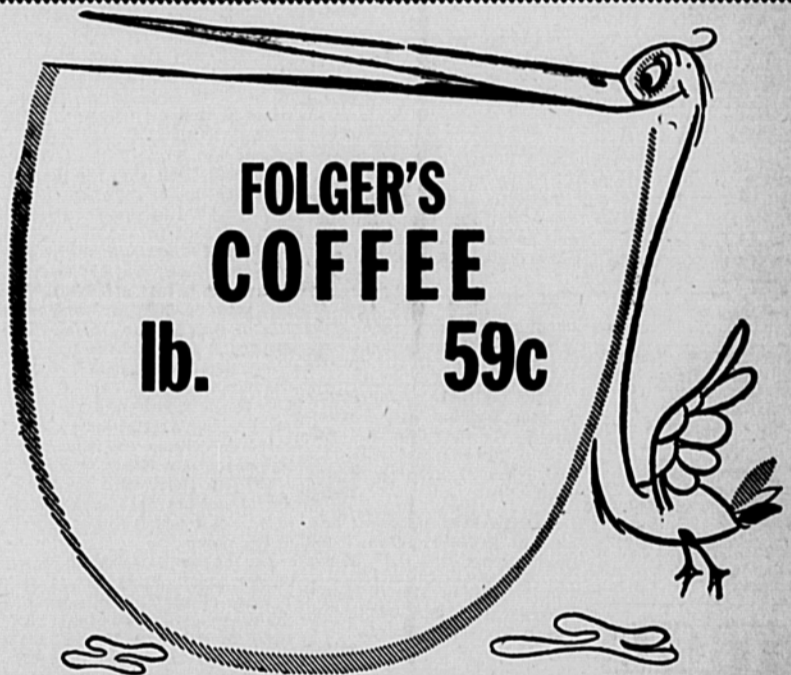

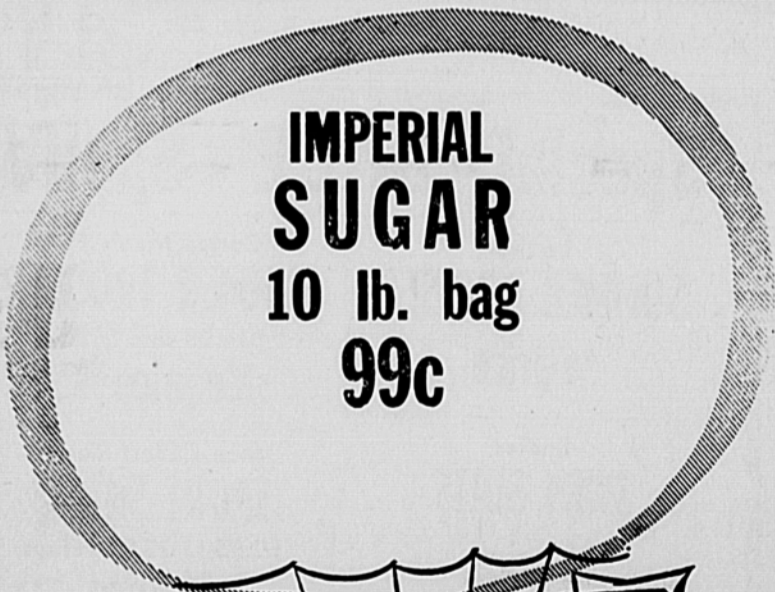
