Roy Lee Archer of 3848 North 11th, Abilene, was charged with felony hit and run in the death of a Negro man inside the Baird city limits, early Wednesday night.

Archer was charged before Peace Justice Garvin Jones of Baird and placed in Callahan County jail in lieu of \$2,500 bond set by Taylor County Justice of the Peace H. F. Long, where he was first taken.

The dead man was identified by Patrolmen Jerry Mathews and Bob Favor as Forest Osborne of Coffeerville, Alabama, according to papers found in his pockets, among which was a traffic ticket issued in Arizona earlier this year. Identification was later confirmed by Jimmy Godfrey, of Godfrey Funeral Home, by a call to the man's uncle in Alabama.

The incident occurred shortly before 7:30 p. m. on Interstate 20, almost directly under the Albany highway overpass. The body was found in the middle of the divided highway's two westbound lanes by a passing motorist, who notified Callahan County Deputy Sheriff N. L. Long.

The suspect was arrested 19 minutes after Long's call was relayed to the Abilene DPS dispatcher, by Abilene Officers Nickie Hale and Jerry Tate at a roadblock at Highway 36 and FM 18, near Abilene Municipal Airport.

The suspect, accompanied by his wife, was driving without lights on his 1965 model pickup. The two left headlights and parking lights were broken and the vehicle's left front fender was dented, Patrolman Mathews of Baird said.

Patrolman Bob Favor, who joined Mathews in the investigation, said clothing fragments found on the front of the pickup apparently matched the heavy tweed jacket worn by the victim.

The victim had been knocked more than 100 feet by the impact, and one shoe and some glass were found nearly 150 feet from the body, according to Callahan County Sheriff Homer Price.

Clear Addresses Helpful

One of the biggest problems postal employees face is illegible handwriting. At Christmas time, when mail volume skyrockets, this can become a major problem. Postmaster John Towler said today.

"The use of ZIP Codes by mailer does help speed up the process because often if the city and state are unreadable the ZIP Code will direct the mail to the post office from which it will be delivered. Clerks in that post office, being more familiar with local residents, may be able to figure out the person to whom the mail should be delivered."

Another significant problem is the number of parcels delayed or actually undelivered because of poor wrapping or packing. Postmasters urge that special care be taken to see that each package is tightly stuffed and that nothing rattles around inside.

Parcels are generally shipped in bags and often heavier items rest on top of smaller, lighter packages. The Postmaster encouraged mailers to be a bit cautious and insure all packages.

All parcels should be addressed on one side and should have the address written somewhere on the inside of the package in case the exterior wrapping should come off. It is a good idea to also enclose a list of the contents.

Poor packaging and illegible or incorrect addressing accounts for about half a million undelivered parcels each year.

Junior Livestock Show Set For January 14-15

The Callahan County Junior Livestock Show will be held on Friday and Saturday, January 14 and 15. Sheep, poultry, rabbits will be judged on Friday. Horses, swine, beef and dairy cattle will be judged on Saturday.

Jim Gray, Extension Animal Husbandman, with headquarters at San Angelo, will judge the sheep and goat classes. Mr. Gray is a well known judge in sheep and goat circles and has

judged both fat lamb and breeding sheep classes at every major show in the state.

Sterling Lindsey, County Agricultural Agent in Coke County, will judge the beef cattle classes. Mr. Lindsey as another well known judge and did an excellent job of judging last years show.

Swine and horse judges, as well as rabbit and poultry judges have not been secured at this date.

A new method of financing the show will be used this year. Instead of asking for advertisements for a catalogue, donations will be requested. A list of donors and the amount they contributed will be published in local papers prior to the show. By using this method of financing, it is felt that all funds collected can go directly to the boys and girls for prize money.

The Bible - The Book of Books

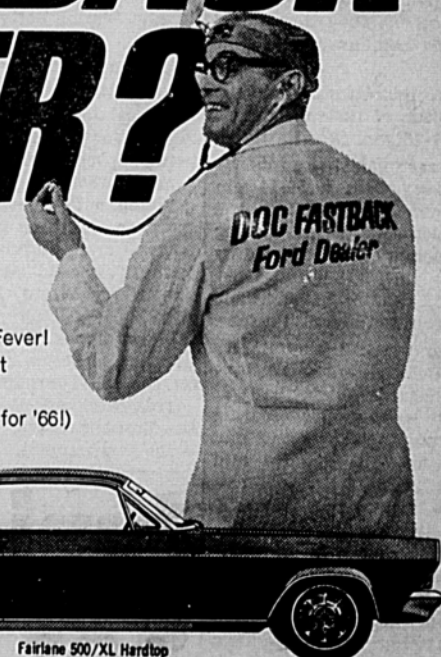


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CITY ORDINANCE

An Ordinance creating a Municipal Defense and Disaster Relief Committee and providing the powers of that Committee; creating the office of Municipal Defense Coordinator and providing the duties and responsibilities of that office; creating an operational organization; granting necessary powers to cope with emergencies threatening life and property in the City of Baird, Texas; authorizing cooperative aid mutual aid agreements for relief work between this and other Cities or Counties; and for related purposes; prohibiting unauthorized lights and warning and all-clear signals and making violations a misdemeanor punishable by fine not exceeding \$200.00.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BAIRD:

Section 1. There is hereby created the Municipal Civil Defense and Disaster Relief Committee of the City of Baird which shall consist of the following:

(a) The Mayor of the City of Baird, who shall serve as Chairman of the Committee, and who shall also be known as Municipal Defense Coordinator of the City of Baird.

(b) The Assistant Defense Coordinator of the City of Baird, who shall be charged with the preparation of a civil defense plan for the City of Baird, together with such other duties as the Coordinator may prescribe. The Assistant Coordinator shall be appointed by and hold his position at the pleasure of the Municipal Defense Coordinator. The Assistant Coordinator shall serve as Vice-Chairman of the Municipal Civil Defense and Disaster Relief Committee of the City of Baird.

(c) The Directors of Divisions and Chiefs of Service of such Divisions as may be provided for by resolution by the City Council or by directive of the Municipal Defense Coordinator.

(d) Representatives not to exceed twelve in number from civic, business, industry, labor, veterans, professional, or other groups, to be selected and appointed by the Mayor.

Section 2. The powers and duties of the Municipal Civil Defense and Disaster Relief Committee shall include the recommendation for adoption by the City Council of a civil defense plan for the City of Baird, and the recommendation for

adoption by the City Council of any and all mutual aid plans and agreements which are deemed essential for the implementation of such civil defense plan. The duties of such Civil Defense and Disaster Relief Committee shall also include the making of a survey of the availability of existing personnel, equipment, supplies and services which could be used during emergency, as provided for herein, as well as a continuing study of the need for amendments and improvements in the civil defense plan adopted by the City Council. The Civil Defense and Disaster Relief Committee of the City of Baird, shall meet upon the call of either the Chairman or Vice-Chairman.

Section 3. The Mayor of the City of Baird, is hereby authorized to join with the County Judge of the County of Callahan and the Mayors of the other cities in said county in the formation of a Civil Defense and disaster Relief Council for the County of Callahan and shall have the authority to cooperate in the formation of a civil defense plan for the County of Callahan and in the appointment of a Civil Defense Director for the County of Callahan, as well as all other powers necessary to participate in a county-wide program of civil defense and disaster relief insofar as said program may affect the City of Baird.

Section 4. The office of Municipal Defense Coordinator is hereby created. The Municipal Defense Coordinator shall have the authority to request the declaration of the existence of an emergency by the City Council or by higher authority. In the event it is deemed necessary to declare the existence of an emergency without delay, the Coordinator may, if the City Council is not in session, do so, but such action shall be subject to confirmation by the City Council at its next meeting.

The duties and responsibilities of the Municipal Defense Coordinator shall include the following:

(1) The Control and direction of the actual operation or training efforts of the civil defense and disaster relief organization of the City of Baird;

(2) The determination of all questions of authority and responsibility that may arise within the civil defense and disaster relief organization of the City of Baird;

(3) The maintenance of necessary liaison with other municipal, district, State, County, regional, federal, or other civil defense organizations;

(4) The marshaling, after declaration of an emergency as provided for above, of all necessary personnel, equipment or supplies from any department of the City of Baird to aid in the carrying out of the civil defense plan;

(5) The issuance of all necessary proclamations as to the existence of an emergency and the immediate operational effectiveness of the civil defense plan;

(6) The issuance of reasonable rules, regulations or directives which are necessary for the protection of life and property in the City of Baird, such rules and regulations shall be filed in the office of the City Clerk and shall receive widespread publicity unless publicity will be of aid and comfort to the enemy;

(7) The supervision of the

drafting and execution of mutual aid agreements, in connection with the representatives of the State and of other local political subdivisions of the State, and the drafting and execution, if deemed desirable, of an agreement with the county in which said city is located and with other municipalities within the county, for the county-wide coordination of efforts in defense and disaster relief.

(8) The supervision of and final authorization for the procurement of all necessary supplies and equipment, including acceptance of private contributions;

(9) The authorization of agreements, after approval of the City Attorney, for the use of private property for air raid shelter and other purposes.

Section 5. The operational civil defense and disaster relief organization of the City of Baird shall consist of the officers and employees of the City of Baird, designated by the Municipal Defense Coordinator as well as all volunteer municipal defense. The functions and duties of this organization shall be distributed among such divisions, services and special staff as the City Council shall prescribe by resolution or the Municipal Defense Coordinator shall provide by directive. Any such resolution or directive shall set forth the form of organization, establish and designate divisions and services, assign functions, duties and powers, and designate officers and employees to carry out the provisions of this ordinance. Insofar as possible, the form of organization, titles and terminology shall conform to the recommendations of the State Defense and Disaster Relief Council of the State of Texas and of the Federal Government.

Section 6. Each person serving as a member of the Municipal Civil Defense and Disaster Relief Committee, or as an officer, employee or volunteer in any capacity in the Municipal Civil Defense and Disaster Relief Organization created by resolution or directive pursuant to the authority herein conferred, shall prior to assuming their duties, take an oath which shall be substantially as follows:

"I, do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will support and defend the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of Texas, against all enemies, foreign and domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same; that I take this obligation freely, without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion; and that I will well and faithfully discharge the duties upon which I am about to enter. And I do further swear (or affirm) that I do not advocate, nor am I a member or an affiliate of any political party or organization, group or combination of persons that advocates the overthrow of the Government of the United States or of this State by force or violence; and that during such time as I am a member of the Municipal Civil Defense and Disaster Relief Committee of the City of Baird, I will not advocate nor become a member or an affiliate of any organization, group, or combination of persons or of any political party that advocates the overthrow of the Government of the United States or of this State by force or violence."

Section 7. Any light displayed contrary to any order, rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance constitutes a public nuisance and when deemed necessary or in order to protect life or property during blackouts or air raids, the police are authorized and directed to enter upon any premises within the City of Baird, using reasonable force, and extinguish lights or take other necessary action to make effective any order, rule

or regulation promulgated under the authority conferred by this ordinance.

Section 8. Any unauthorized person who shall operate a siren or other device so as to simulate a blackout signal or air raid, or the termination of a blackout or air raid, shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this ordinance and shall be subject to the penalties imposed by this ordinance.

Section 9. At all times when the orders, rules and regulations made and promulgated pursuant to this ordinance shall be in effect, they shall supersede all existing ordinances, orders, rules and regulations insofar as the latter may be inconsistent therewith.

Section 10. This ordinance shall not be construed so as to conflict with any State or Federal statute or with any Military or Naval order, rule or regulation.

Section 11. This ordinance is an exercise by the City of its governmental functions for the protection of the public peace, health and safety and neither the City of Baird, the agent and representatives of said City, or any individual, receiver, firm, partnership, corporation, association, or trustee, or any of the agents thereof, in good faith carrying out, complying with or attempting to comply with, any order, rule or regulation promulgated pursuant to the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable for any damage sustained to persons or property as the result of said activity. Any person owning or controlling real estate or other premises who voluntarily or without compensation grants to the City of Baird, a license or privilege, or otherwise permits the City to inspect, designate and use the whole or any part or parts of such real estate or premises for the purpose of sheltering persons during an actual, impending or practice enemy attack shall, together with his successors in interest, if any, not be civilly lia-

ble for the death of, or injury to, any person on or about such real estate or premises under such license, privilege or other permission or for loss of, or damage to, the property of such person.

Section 12. No person shall have the right to expend any public funds of any City in carrying out any civil defense activity authorized by this ordinance without prior approval by the City Council, nor shall any person have any right to bind the City by contract, agreement or otherwise without prior and specific approval of the City Council.

Section 13. It shall be unlawful for any person willfully to obstruct, hinder, or delay any member of the civil defense organization in the enforcement of any rule or regulation issued pursuant to this ordinance, or

to do any act forbidden by any rule or regulation issued pursuant to the authority contained in this ordinance.

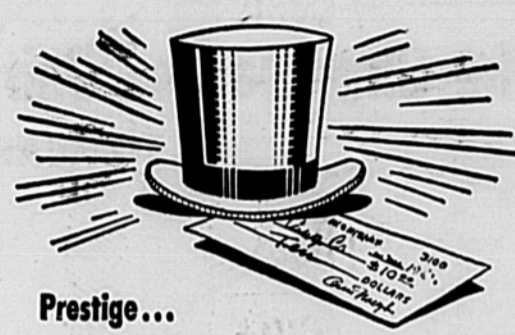
It shall likewise be unlawful for any person to wear, carry or display any emblem, insignia or any other means of identification as a member of the civil defense organization of the City of Baird, unless authority so to do has been granted such person by the proper officials. Convictions for violations of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punishable by fine not exceeding \$200.00.

Section 14. If any portion of this ordinance shall, for any reason, be declared invalid, such invalidity, shall not affect the remaining provisions hereof.

Section 15. The immediate passage of this ordinance is deemed essential to public health, safety and welfare and it shall take immediate effect. PASSED AND APPROVED this 26th day of October, 1965.
