Principal speaker for the observance was Sam Braswell, business manager of Texas Wesleyan college at Fort Worth, past district governor and past international director of Lions clubs. He praised achievements of the Iowa Park club and challenged members to renew for another 25 years of service to community, humanity and God.

Special awards were presented by Frank Cripiver of Wichita Falls. Dr. Clark was recognized as the only charter member still living in Iowa Park. We have been unable to get a list of charter members.

Through these 25 years the Iowa Park Lions club has sponsored and aided many civic projects: They have helped Clyde McDonald secure two Seeing-eye dogs and secured glasses for many school children.

They have sponsored the Boy Scout troop, contributed to the school band for suits and trips, helped secure and maintain street markers, furnished community Christmas trees, swept and painted the downtown streets, and performed many other large and small services for the community.

As a club they have been of tremendous influence for good in this area. As individuals, members of the club have been leading spirits in almost every project attempted by Iowa Park in the past 25 years.

Student Panel Talks At Final PTA Meeting

Installation of officers for the year 1953-54 was the highlight of the last meeting of the Iowa Park PTA on Wednesday afternoon.

Some of the boys discovered all sorts of things there—but Clyde found his P.S. He had to come back to our room to show us. Barbara's fellow went with us, Berniece's brother and friend, and Naomi's friends whose name she didn't know—and last but not longer least—Mr. Davis went! Golly he's got muscles—all in his stomach!

By the time all the girls finally got the boys out of their rooms everyone was ready for bed. The night watchman kept getting those silly complaints on NOISE! Isn't that foolish? As if we'd ever do anything to disturb anyone!

We had church on the bus Sunday morning and stopped at White Sands to bury some kids. We shoved off (I really mean it this time! That sand is deeper than you think) again and ate dinner in Alamogordo. Some Eskimos swam a few icy minutes then trotted back to the bus. We stopped a while in Roswell to eat, and again in Clovis.

The poor people in Clovis! You know the little dears had never seen girls before! They nearly mauled us—but those brutes of Srs took care of them!

Those who were lucky enough to be deaf slept on the way home. Those who weren't heard "Seven Lonely Days." About 4:30, 50 weary travelers drew into Iowa Park—too tired to give the Sr locomotive!

We really did have a wonderful time and appreciate everything everyone has done for us all year to make the trip possible.

Tuesday morning in chapel we relived the trip, and read the will and prophecy.

We'd love to have you all at our baccalaureate Sunday at the Methodist church and our commencement Monday night at the school! Ruth Mary.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

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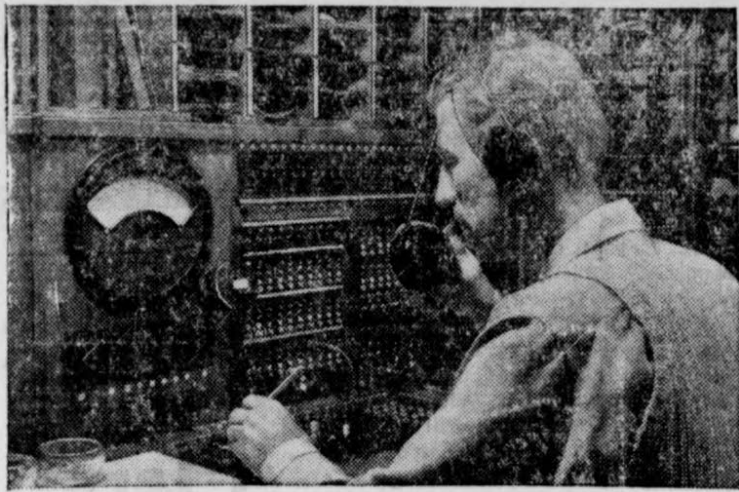

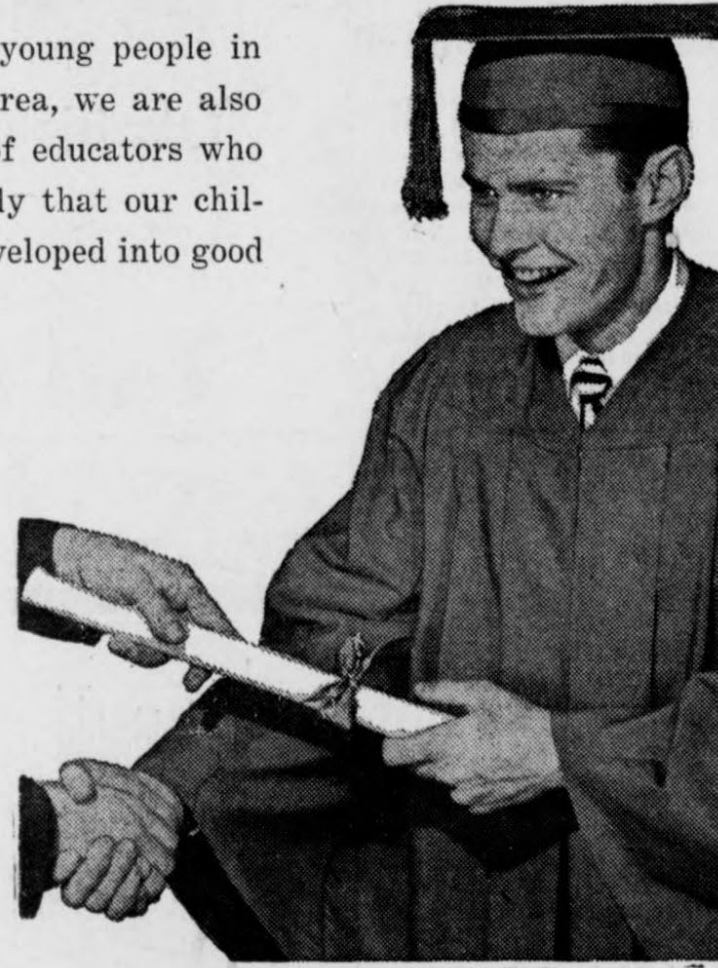
