AFTER RATE INCREASE

No stamp shortage for local patrons

While some post offices around the state have reported difficulty in supplying postage stamps to their patrons this week, there have been very few problems in Iowa Park, according to Lee McQuerry, postmaster.

A run on stamps has been experienced everywhere, because postage rates went up effective last Sunday. But there were more than postage rates involved in the increases.

First class letters now require 18

cents postage. McQuerry said his office has plenty of the "B" stamp, which costs 18 cents but doesn't have the amount printed on it. The office still has plenty of stamps costing 15, 2 and 1 cent, he added.

There's been a shortage of 17 and

35 cent stamps, for heavier mailings, but McQuerry said he expected a shipment soon.

The last postal increase came in May of 1978, when the rate went to the past 15 cents. Previous increases included May, 1971, the rate rose from 6 cents to 8 cents. In 1974, it rose to 10 cents and in 1975, it rose again to 13 cents.

Also included in the new first class postage is the increase to 17 cents per additional ounce up to 12 ounces. Presorted mail, in keeping with requirements, receive discounts of 3 and 4 cents.

The postcard increased from 10 cents to 12 cents.

Other categories affected by the new rate are money order fees, registered mail, certified mail, special delivery, insurance for parcel post and post office box rental.

Money order fees increased, but the postal service also increased the maximum amount that can be mailed to \$500. Rates are 75 cents for any

money orders to \$25; \$1.10 for orders from \$25.01 to \$50; and \$1.55 from \$50.01 to \$500.

Registered mail increased about 30 cents per each break listed in the 59-page booklet which explains how the new rates work.

Certified mail is one of the few areas that decreased, with the new rate dropping from 80 cents to 75.

Insurance for parcel post decreased in one area, but increased in other areas.

Special delivery increased from \$2 to \$2.10.

Box rentals increased, but only in cities where alternate delivery methods are available.

A small box in Iowa Park was \$8 for a six-month period, and is now to \$10. But in a small town where optional delivery is not available, the same box would be \$2 per year, McQuerry said.

A small drawer, described by postal officials as a "quarter drawer" increased from \$16 to \$22.50 each six months.

Absentee voting extremely light

Absentee voting in the city and school Apr. 4 elections, which will close Tuesday afternoon, has been extremely light, according to officials.

Only two absentee ballots have been cast in the city box and one in the school box, as of noon yesterday.

Many election watchers predict election day turnout based on absentee voting. If their predictions are true, a week from this coming Saturday will be an extremely light turnout at the polls.

There are four candidates seeking two positions on the school board. They include incumbent Jerald Brown, Bob Goodknight, Rex Wells and Tom Venhaus. That is the order in which their names will appear on the ballots.

Seven candidates are running for three positions on the city council. Two of them are incumbents.

Candidates, in order of appearance on the ballots, include Herman Mahler, Harold Phillips, Jim Voyles, Bill Gilmore, George Hammonds, Michael J. Sargent and Charlie L. Lee.

Gilmore and Hammonds are the incumbents.

City seeks remodeling bids

Food handler's training requirement tabled

The Iowa Park city council Monday night authorized advertising for bids for remodeling of the city hall, as well as for bidders to purchase certificates of obligation to finance the project.

There was some disagreement on the method of financing, among council members, and the mayor's vote had to be called on twice to settle split votes.

In other business, aldermen tabled a proposed ordinance which would require employees of eating establishments to attend a food-handlers training school; approved a lease renewal for Shamburger Lumber; amended the animal control ordinance; and appointed a member to the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Aldermen Bill Gilmore and Bud Thompson stood against selling certificates of obligations for financing the city hall remodeling, explaining they preferred paying as money is available. Their votes were matched by Lita Watson and George Hammonds.

Since the fifth alderman's seat was vacated when Bud Adams resigned earlier, Mayor Johnny Crawford's vote was called on in both instances to break the tie. He voted along with Watson and Hammonds.

The first split vote was on a resolution to authorize publication of notice of intention to issue certificates of obligation, and the other was a resolution authorizing execution of a financial advisory contract.

An unanimous vote approved plans and specifications for the project and authorizing notice advertisement to contract bidders.

As financial consultant Ken Smith explained to the council, the \$300,000 established as the amount for certificates to be sold cannot be used if the bids are for less than that amount. Unlike bonds, only the amount of the contractor's accepted bid can be financed through certificates of obligation.

In the advertisement for certificate and contractor bids, they are to be received May 6 and studied until action is taken during the council's meeting of May 11.

Bids will be received on numerous alternates of the remodeling project in order for the council to decide whether to do all the work at one time, phase it out over a period of time, or alter some of their plans to fit financial needs.

The financial advisory contract was approved with Rauscher, Pierce, Refsnes, Inc. of Dallas.

An ordinance, recommended by Dr. Earl Watson, city health officer, was considered and later tabled which would have required "All such persons employed or seeking employment in any food service establishment, and any owners or their families who are involved in food handling, shall secure a food training certificate from the Wichita County Health Center.

"A food service establishment is defined as any place where people are employed to prepare and/or to handle food products for direct consumption. This definition shall include, but not be limited to, restaurants, cafeterias, nursing homes, and stores or markets that serve food products ready to eat," the ordinance stated.

A requirement exists in Wichita County for all such persons to have a food training certificate, but without a city ordinance adopting it, the county has no authority to enforce it, aldermen were told.

Dr. Watson explained all people handling food for the public should be required to have the training received in the short, half-day course, and that the public should be protected by requiring it.

Such a requirement would bring an unnecessary hardship on local businesses, Bob Hamilton told council members. He pointed out that local food businesses were already hard-pressed to find employees.

"I believe the owners are doing a good job teaching their employees how to handle food safely now. And can you imagine a student applying for a part-time job having to go to Wichita Falls, pay a \$6 fee and spend half a day so he can have a minimum wage job?" Hamilton said.

"If a need exists, which no signs have been shown in the past 11 years it does, I wouldn't disagree with it," he said.

The issue was tabled by a 3-1 vote, but it is expected to be brought up at the next meeting for reconsideration.

The city's animal control ordinance was amended to include "cats and other animals" to allow for loose animals of all kinds in the city be picked up by the animal control officer.

A five-year lease was extended to Shamburger Lumber for part of Smith Street. The fee is \$150 per year.

Dr. Watson was sworn in after being re-appointed city health officer for another term, and David Padgett was named to fill a vacancy on the Planning and Zoning Commission.

The city's application for a federal block grant which was to have been used to construct a second fire station and improve water lines in the south part of town was denied, Steve Morath, city administrator, told the council.

No comment was made following a 16-minute executive session when the audience was asked to leave the room for a closed meeting.

After the regular agenda was closed, council members met as the board of adjustments to hear a request for variance to the minimum side yard setback at 1001 West Louisa, where construction of a carport is proposed.

James Pappas was told he could build his carport to within five feet of his property line, under the variance which was approved, but he could not extend the roof of the structure beyond that point.

Barbour awarded school contract

Barbour Insurance was awarded the contract for property insurance coverage for the coming year, when school trustees met in a called session Monday evening.

Trustees had called for re-bidding during an earlier meeting when a conflict in bidding specifications was detected.

The accepted bid calls for a premium of \$25,906.

Bids for the sale of a wooden physical education building on the Bradford campus was opened and awarded, but Supt. Harold Cowley said the next day the bidder cancelled his offer because of moving problems.

Specifications call for the structure to be moved by this Saturday, making room for construction of a new,

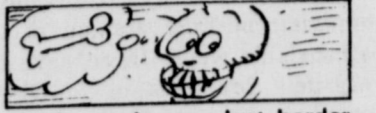

Lecture series is completed

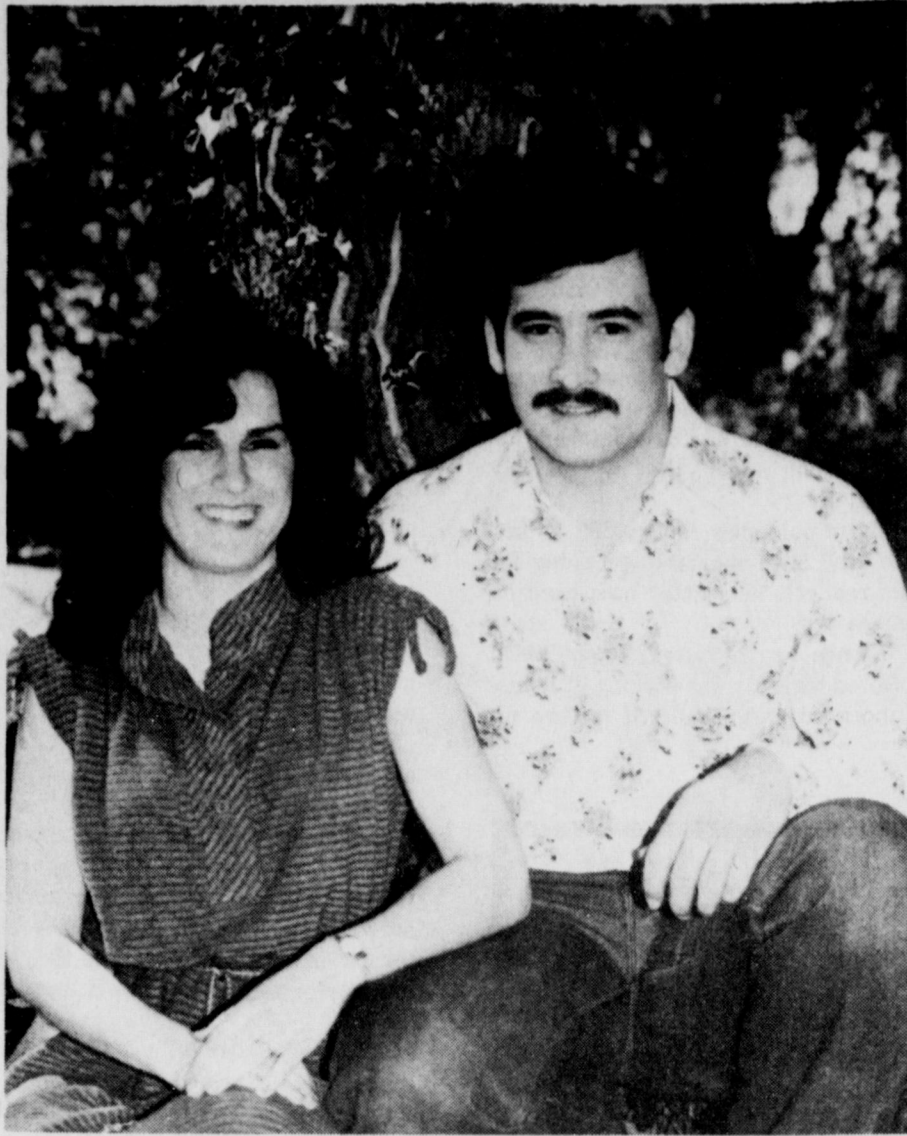
Mrs. Chauncey Weiler gave the last lecture in a series of five on Latin America for the United Methodist Women in a meeting held Tuesday morning.

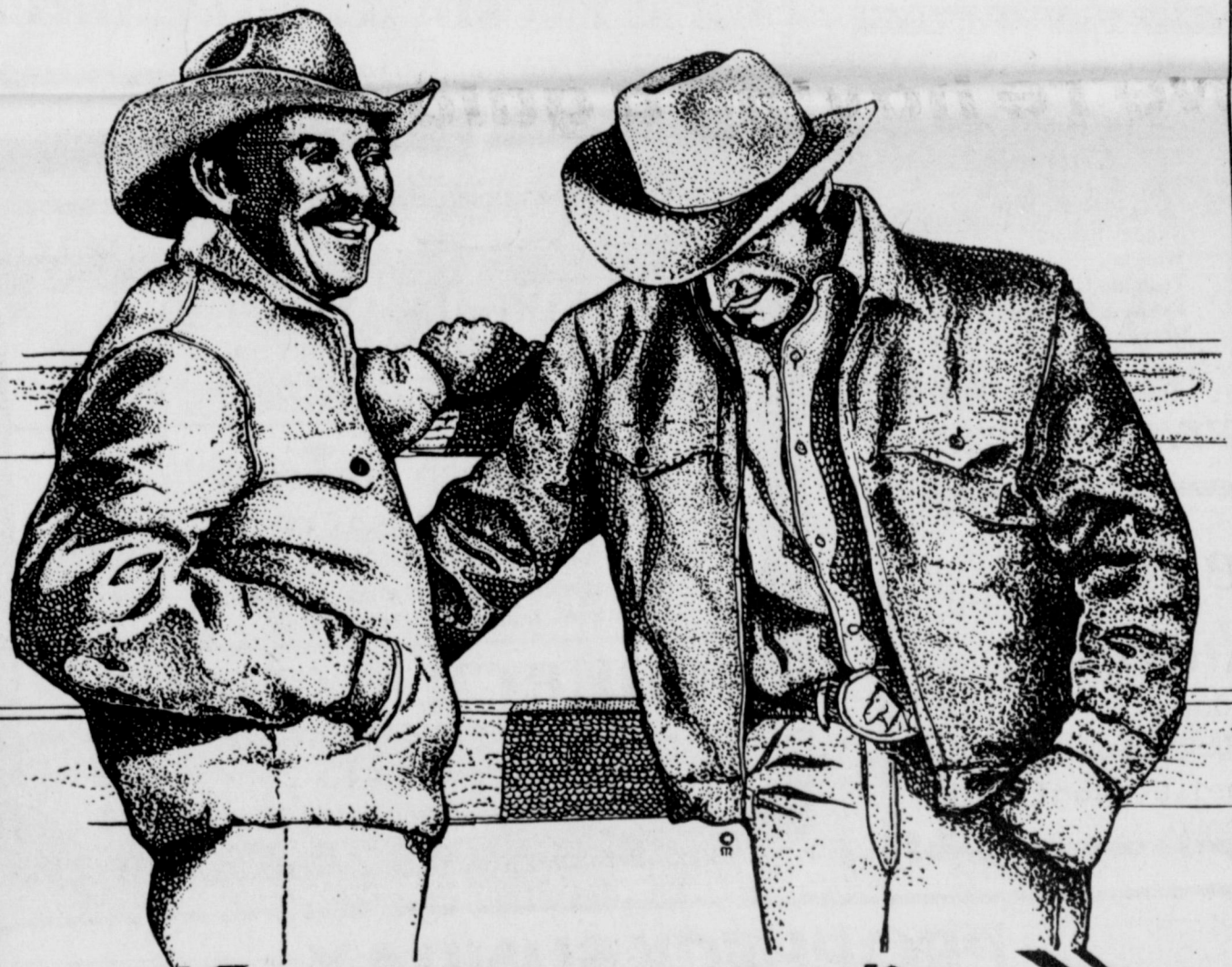

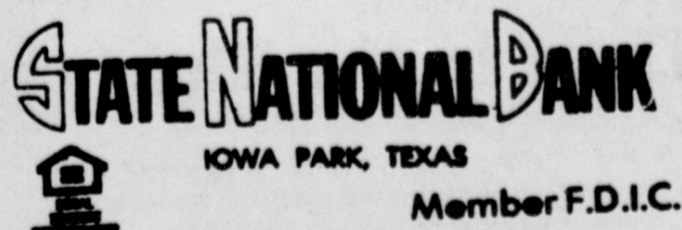

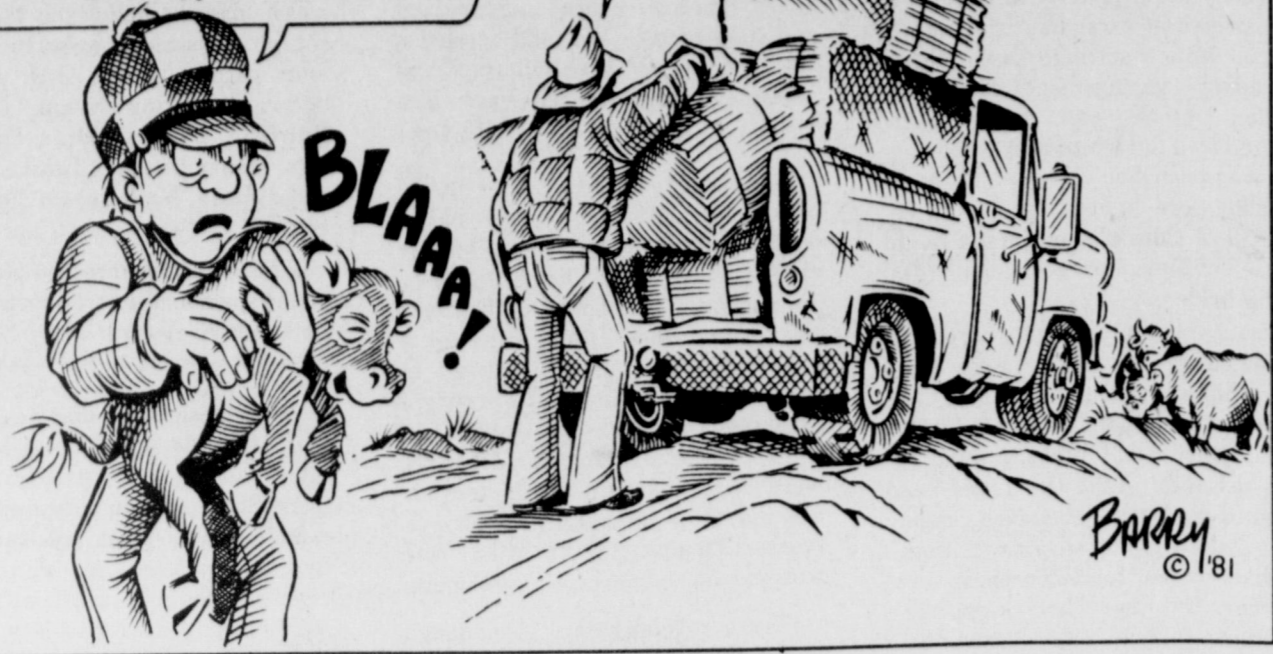

New medical act gets Finnell's support

Rep. Charles Finnell Monday announced his endorsement of a bill to enact a comprehensive new state law governing the practice of medicine in Texas. The legislation, entitled the Medical Practice Act, has the support of the Texas Medical Association.

Finnell noted the bill's similarity to legislation that the Texas Sunset Advisory Commission stopped just short of endorsing.

"This bill will carry out the excellent work of the Sunset Advisory Commission and its staff in

reenacting laws to create a new and even stronger State Board of Medical Examiners," Finnell said at his office. "It represents the culmination of 18 months of exhaustive research, drafting and redrafting of the complex set of laws known as the Medical Practice Act," he said.

Finnell emphasized the intent of the sponsors to keep the legislation in "close conformity" with the actions taken by the Sunset Advisory Commission in its work over the past year and a half. "The Commission's work was thankless and controversial

with no easy solutions for the many complex issues. There were some 29 proposed changes in the current law, with strong disagreement on only one or two points which apparently kept the Commission from reaching the three-fourth consensus necessary for a formal Commission recommendation. The Commission's failure to agree on a final report does not, however, wipe out its recommendations on each of the individual issues it considered. We intend to work hard to see that their efforts finally become reality," Finnell said.

He noted only one substantial difference with the work of the Sunset Advisory Commission—the retention of a flexible dual fund system currently used by the Board of Medical Examiners in which the bulk of the agency's funds are placed in the State Treasury subject to the legislative appropriations process. "We will be asking the legislature to continue to allow the Board of Medical Examiners to use a small portion of its funds in instances where the legislature fails to anticipate all of the needs of the Board," Finnell said. All of the funds come from fees paid by physicians and not from tax. The bill known as S.B. 315 in the Senate and H.B. 609 in the House, has the endorsement of a bipartisan group of several senators and representatives.

As I See It....

Just about every newspaper publisher I know keeps a sharp eye out for advertising which is probably deceptive to his readers. When they find one that is, and have information or a strong hunch, they will usually reject it.

But a publisher can go just so far. He can't always be the watchdog for his readers, no matter how hard he might try.

I once ran a classified ad which offered high pay for working at home. Innocence or ignorance, I ran the ad.

Soon a couple of readers called to tell me what the response was, the advertiser wanted to sell a list of companies that hired people to address envelopes.

The ad never ran again, nor will it ever in the Leader, if I catch it coming over my desk.

But there are other types of employment ads which sound great, even when one is interviewing with the recruiter. So good, in fact, the offer is almost impossible to turn down.

Watch out for such leads in the advertisement as "Too Short For A Stewardess?" because they are loaded. They are designed to attract young, attractive ladies who had thoughts about becoming an airline stewardess but couldn't for some reason or other make it. And they're looking for young women who want to travel.

An interviewer can sit down with such a candidate and tell them about how all expenses are paid, how they will be traveling, how they can earn big money and even have opportunities to earn big bonuses and even college scholarships.

With all that in mind, a candidate

for employment has so many stars in their eyes that they can't see such earnings are impossible, when done legally, selling subscriptions to magazines.

A small-town Texas beauty can be offered an opportunity to travel to cities in Ohio and other states, without training, and make big, big money... maybe even earn a \$1,000 bonus, with enough extra points for selling.

What isn't said, during such an interview, is that the living expenses handed out are subtracted from the girl's earnings. There aren't any sales on days when all the traveling is going on, or during bad weather, when housewives won't open their doors.

They aren't saying what will happen if the girl wants to quit and is still in hock for her expenses because she hasn't sold enough subscriptions.

It's difficult for a newspaper to check out the reputation of all its advertisers. That's up to the job applicant, who should want to see some sort of contract and know everything expected, before she loads up with suitcase and a head full of money-earning dreams.

IRS Tax Tips

Pay Taxes Due, But Not In Cash

Cash should never be sent through the mail to pay federal income taxes, the Internal Revenue Service says. If the cash payment should be lost, stolen, or destroyed, the taxpayer would have no record of payment.

Using a check or money order is much safer for two reasons, the IRS adds. First, either is hard to steal,

and secondly, the cancelled check or money order receipt will serve as a record of payment.

Taxpayers should also be sure to write their Social Security number, the tax period and the form for which the payment is being made on the check or money order. In the event the payment is separated from the tax return, proper credit can still be given to the taxpayers' account.

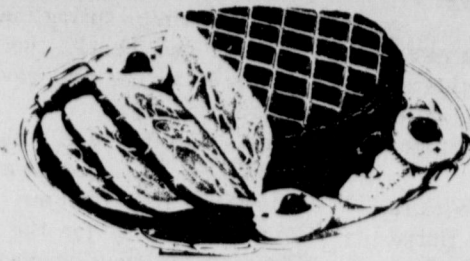

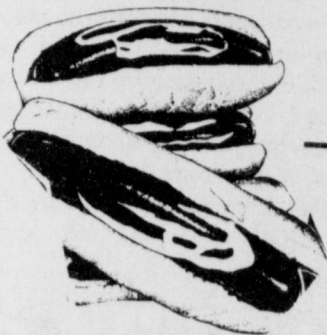

Cook of the Week

One of the nice things about the Leader's Cook of the Week feature is the inspiration that it gives for searching out colorful and historical background of recipes and their ingredients. Very often, as is the case today, the ingredient appears in a dessert, the menu finale which leaves a lasting impression on family and guests.

Maraschino cherries are called for in Fruit Pizza, one of Ruanne (Mrs. Earl) Morgan's dessert recipes today, and the fruit has an interesting history.

Cherries arrived in Italy about 100 B.C. Within the century, cherry trees were found growing throughout the Roman Empire. The Romans took the cherry tree as far as Britain, but it seemed to disappear from there during the Dark Ages. However, it was re-introduced in Britain a thousand years later by Henry VIII. Robert Louis Stevenson wrote "Up into the cherry tree, who should climb but little me?" English settlers

brought the cherry tree to America as early as 1629 and today they are grown in every state.

Ruanne Morgan is the new owner of Petal Pushers. She and her husband who is shop foreman at Longhorn Chevrolet, have lived in Iowa Park six years. They have one daughter, Patricia, three years of age.

FRUIT PIZZA

Line pizza pan with foil or spray with Pam

1 roll of Pillsbury's Slice and Bake Sugar Cookies. Cut 1/4 inch thick and cover bottom of pan. Bake as directed. Cool.

1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese
Mix with 3/4 cup powdered sugar. Spread over cookies

Drain:
1 - 8 oz. can mandarin oranges
1 can pineapple chunks
2 bananas, cut and place in pineapple juice to prevent darkening
Maraschino cherries

Place fruit in rounds on cookies. Heat 1 small jar apricot preserves and pour on top of fruit as a glaze when ready to serve.

PORK CHOP CASSEROLE

2 cans pork and beans
4 pork chops, 1/2" thick
1/4 tsp. caraway seeds or mustard
1/4 cup apple or plum jelly

Pour beans in greased 1 1/2 quart baking dish. Brown chops and place on beans. Stir caraway into jelly, spread on top of chops. Cover and bake at 350 degrees for 35 minutes. Uncover and bake 10-15 minutes longer until chops are done.

BLUEBERRY SALAD

1 large container Cool Whip
1 large pkg. blackberry jello
1 can blueberries, drained
1 can crushed pineapple, drained

Stir dry jello into Cool Whip. Add drained blueberries and pineapple, stir well. Chopped pecans may be added for variation. Cover and refrigerate so flavors can blend. Good with dinner or for a dessert-type salad.

BANANA NUT ICE CREAM

7-9 eggs, beaten until lemon-colored and thick
Pinch of salt
1 1/2 cups sugar, add gradually while beating eggs

1/2 cup Karo syrup
1 can Eagle Brand
1 T vanilla
3-5 bananas, mashed
1 1/2 cups pecans, chopped
1 carton whipping cream or half and half
1/2 gallon milk to finish filling freezer
Freeze immediately so bananas and pecans will not settle to bottom

MEXICAN CORN BREAD WITH GROUND MEAT

1 cup yellow corn meal
1 cup sweet milk
3/4 tsp. salt
1/2 cup bacon drippings
2 eggs, well beaten
1/2 tsp soda
1 No. 303 can cream style yellow corn
Mix all the above and set aside. Saute 1/2 lb. ground meat. Put on absorbent paper to drain grease.

Prepare separately:
1 large onion, finely chopped
1/2 lb. rat cheese, grated
2-4 oz. canned jalapeno pepper, chopped
Grease a large black iron skillet. Heat. Sprinkle a very thin layer of meal in skillet and let brown slightly. Pour one half the batter in skillet; sprinkle cheese evenly over batter, then the meat, onion and peppers. Pour remaining batter on top. Bake 45-50 minutes at 350 degrees. Serve with green salad.

Finnell bill helpful to crossing safety

State Rep. Charles Finnell introduced legislation last week that will establish a toll-free number for the reporting of malfunctions of mechanical signals at railroad crossings.

"There are 3,767 railroad crossings in Texas with automated signals," the 53rd District Rep. said. "Each one is a potential death trap if the gates or lights are not working properly. This bill will provide citizens with a telephone number to call and report the malfunction so it can be corrected as soon as possible."

House Bill 1939 will also call for an

adhesive sticker to be placed on each mechanical crossing safety device

stating the phone number, crossing number and directions for reporting the problem.

Finnell said that he expects this legislation to be referred to the Committee on Transportation next week and set for public hearing.

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New techniques proposed in abuse investigations

Criminal Justice Center researchers at Sam Houston State University will recommend to the Texas Legislature that videotape and closed-circuit television be used to protect victims of child sexual abuse from emotional trauma.

Only 10-50 percent of child sexual abuse is reported, said Dr. Glen Kercher, who directed a study which resulted in 13 legislative recommendations included in a report entitled "Responding to Child Sexual Abuse."

"The recommendations are designed to encourage more frequent reporting and prosecution of cases in child sexual abuse," said Kercher. "More importantly, they also address ways to more sensitively respond to the emotional needs of victims."

A child sexual abuse victim may be asked to re-live the incident as many as 14-16 times because of interviews with social workers, the police, medical doctors and the district attorney's office, said Kercher.

The psychological trauma of the investigation and judicial proceedings which may extend over many months may be more harmful to the child victim than the crime itself, he said.

Dr. Victor Streecher, dean and director of the Criminal Justice Center at Sam Houston, said that child sexual abuse is one area of criminal justice work which could take advantage of scientific and technological advances in videotaping and closed-circuit television.

Under Kercher's and Streecher's proposal, the initial interview with a child sexual abuse victim would be videotaped, and that tape could also be used for presentation at an examining trial or the grand jury, or to reduce the amount of a child's testimony during those proceedings.

To supplement the videotape, a Child Protective Services caseworker could prepare a written social profile covering such points as past history of the child, behavior and achievement in school, and other special circumstances.

Another videotaping session is recommended for taking the child's actual court testimony. This would be done in the presence of the judge, prosecutor, defense counsel, defendant, and Child Protective Services caseworker, but in an informal setting outside the courtroom.

Should additional testimony be needed at the time of the trial, the report recommends it be done by closed-circuit television.

prosecutor, defense counsel, defendant, and caseworker, and with the jury, press, and audience observing on television monitors in the courtroom.

"Every defendant in a criminal prosecution has a right to a speedy and public trial and to confront the accuser," said Kercher. "Any change in courtroom procedures designed to protect child victims must also protect the rights of the accused."

"This recommendation is the bare minimum which can be done for children without radically tampering with criminal procedure and constitutional rights," said Kercher.

Other recommendations of the report include:

- * Appointment of a Child Protective Services worker or representative as a special advocate to work closely with the police and district attorney to make the child's involvement in civil or criminal proceedings as untraumatic as possible;

- * Increase coordination between peace officers and Child Protective Services workers by requiring that each inform the other of all cases of child sexual abuse within 48 hours of the receipt of the report;

- * Special training for persons who handle child sexual abuse victims during their work in Child Protective Services, hospital emergency rooms, law enforcement, as prosecutors, and in juvenile, civil, and criminal courts;

- * Establishment of teams of representatives from the various local agencies involved, such as law enforcement, district attorneys, and Child Protective Services, to improve policies, procedures, and cooperation among those agencies;

- * Discontinue use of polygraph, or "lie detector," tests for victims, because of implications that the child is not telling the truth and because of recently-raised questions concerning the validity of such tests;

- * A statewide public school curriculum for grades kindergarten through 12, informing children what sexual abuse is, what they should do, and how they should report it;

- * Increase funding for Child Protective Services to pay for their added responsibilities in providing child advocates and in providing services to all child sexual abuse victims, not just those resulting from family members, and;

- * Develop and fund community and institutional treatment programs for sex offenders.

- * Develop and fund community and institutional treatment programs for sex offenders.

"The best way to keep children from being abused and victimized may be to more effectively treat offenders," said Kercher. "Most offenders who go to prison are merely out of action for awhile and return to their same behavior when released."

The recommendations were made as the result of a study requested of the Criminal Justice Center by Texas House of Representatives Concurrent Resolution No. 107 of the 66th session of the Texas Legislature.

The study included a review of relevant literature, analysis of data from the Houston Police Department and Harris County Sheriff's Department from 1977 and 1978, and a records search of the Harris County Child Protective Services and District Attorney's offices for those same years.

The study also included a child sexual abuse survey of 1,056 Texas residents, 162 Child Protective Services workers, 547 members of sheriff's and police departments, 149 district attorneys and county judges,

128 judges, 110 criminal defense attorneys, 190 juvenile probation department workers, and 203 high school officials.


Researchers concluded that there are 6,000-8,000 cases of child sexual abuse reported each year in Texas, but that the number of actual incidents may number 12,000-54,000. It was estimated that each year 1000 of these children are asked to testify in court about their victimization.

Streecher said that it is ironic that in our system of justice, juvenile offenders are presently given more consideration than juvenile victims.

Suspected juvenile offenders are questioned by specially trained officers, often not tried, and if tried, given special treatment by special judges in special courts, with assistance given by probation officers specially trained to deal with these kinds of cases.


"While it is true that the unique problems of juvenile offenders have recently been recognized in this country, and merit such treatment," said Streecher, "those of juveniles who fall victim to sexual offenders have not. This is one of the sad ironies of our criminal justice system."



**Choice of Tax Preparer
An Important Decision**

The choosing of a paid preparer by taxpayers to do their federal income tax returns should be done carefully and wisely. Most tax return preparers are honest and do not deliberately attempt to defraud either their clients or the IRS. However, a few misuse the responsibility of preparing a tax return for someone else, and the IRS has suggestions on how to identify these preparers.

Taxpayers should not sign a blank return, or one which is partially completed, or one prepared in pencil. These could be altered by the preparer. Preparers should be asked to sign the return in the taxpayers' presence, and give his or her identification number, as required by law. The taxpayer must be given a copy of the completed return.

Preparers who promise a refund, claim a special relationship with the IRS or boast of ways to beat the tax system should be avoided by taxpayers.



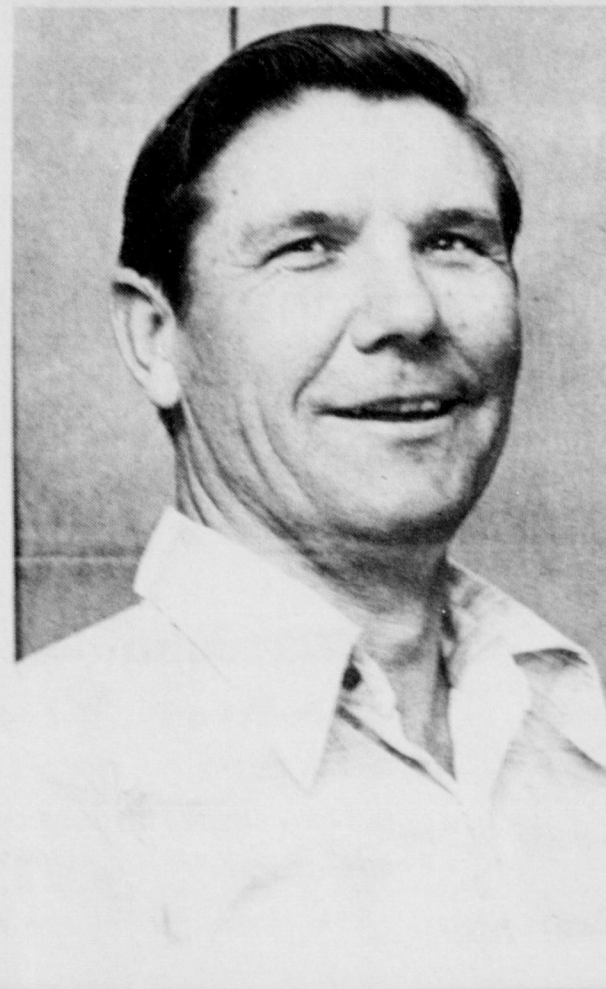

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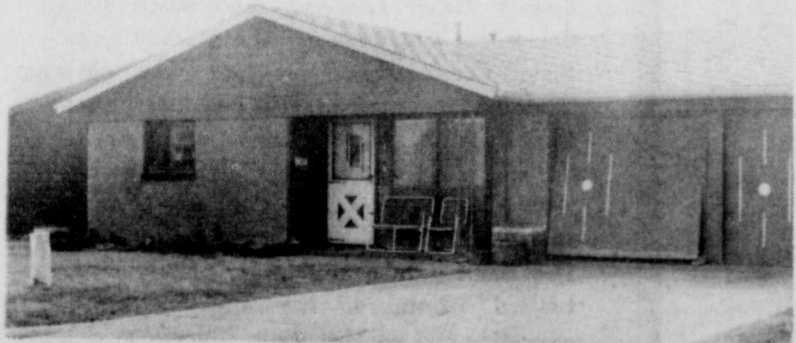
