# Hawks to begin practice Monday

The time: 7 a.m. Monday, Aug. 10. The place: Hawk fieldhouse. The speaker: Head Coach David Baugh. "Good morning, Hawks. You can now run a mile."

That's the way the 1981 edition of the Iowa Park Hawks will start their sessions.

The mile will signal the beginning of the new season for all members of the varsity and junior varsity. Freshmen will join the older players at 8:30 for a team meeting, and all will hit the field at 9 for regular drills.

The 9 a.m. time will stand for all morning sessions the rest of the two-day schedule, while afternoon sessions will commence at 5 p.m., Baugh said.

In accordance with University Interscholastic League regulations, the players will work out in shorts through Thursday, and Friday they will be allowed to put on their pads for the first time. Players were issued shorts and shoes yesterday.

All players were to have their physicals completed and forms turned in Monday, because Baugh said they could not work out until that is done.

In addition, all players are required to have some sort of insurance besides that which is provided by the school. The school board requires

players to have either the coverage provided through the school by Keystone Life Insurance Co. for at-school or 24-hour coverage, or they can opt to have family coverage if a waiver is signed by the parents.

The at-school coverage costs \$15 and the 24-hour coverage costs \$37, both good for the entire school year. In addition to those policies or that provided by the families, the school pays \$40 for insurance coverage of all sophomore, junior and senior players participating.

Whichever coverage the player and his family chooses, the forms must be completed before Monday's workouts.

### LOOKING AHEAD

This will be the first season for new head mentor Baugh, who was chosen to take the place of Tommy Watkins when he accepted a position at Uvalde. There has also been a considerable change in the coaching staff, due to moves and resignations of other coaches.

Baugh has named James Ivy varsity linebacker coach, Ray Sefcik to coach tight ends and defensive ends, Jim Clapp over defensive backs and receivers, and Earnie Reusch will continue to coach offensive and defensive interior linemen. Baugh

will coach the offensive backs.

New freshmen coaches will be Terry Davis, who has moved here after two years coaching at Chico, and Bill Bransom, a spring graduate of Midwestern State Univ. who did his student teaching here last spring.

Speaking Tuesday to the Noon Lions Club, Baugh said he felt the Hawks would be in the running for the Dist. 3-AAAA championship, despite having only four offensive and four defensive starters returning.

Well pleased with his starting 11, Baugh admitted his depth, especially among linemen, was shallow and injuries there could prove to be a problem.

Looking over the conference opponents, he made the following assessments:

Hirschi - had the best defensive team in the league last year, but lost nine of those players and will not be as strong a team as it was in its championship year.

Burkburnett - probably the largest

team in the district this year and will be considerably improved over last season.

Graham - probably one of the tougher teams in the league, with spring champion Ernie Jackson carrying the ball.

Vernon - probably weaker than last year, but they'll have something. They always do.

Mineral Wells - probably the most improved team in the district, with more returning lettermen than any other team.

Between 36 and 40 players will be carried on the Hawk varsity, about the same on the junior varsity, and about 30 are expected to report for the freshman team, Baugh said.

Only one pre-season scrimmage is on tap, and that will be Aug. 21, here against Jacksboro. Lawton cancelled its scrimmage with the Hawks, and because most teams already have their schedules made up, Baugh said finding another at this late date was improbable.

## Rehearsals set for band

Pre-school band rehearsals for the Hawk Band will begin Monday,

Aug. 17, and run two weeks with sectionals and full band rehearsals scheduled, according to Greg Miller, director.

Freshmen band members will meet at 8 a.m., with the full band to meet at 6:30 p.m. that evening. Rehearsals will run approximately three hours, combining marching and playing, said Miller.

Full band rehearsals will be held every weekday except Fridays.

"All band members need to meet with their section leaders, squad leaders and seniors at 1 p.m., Friday, Aug. 14," said Miller.

Uniforms will be distributed during the second week of practice. Percussion members will meet from 1 to 5 p.m. Tuesday, Aug. 11 through Friday, Aug. 14.

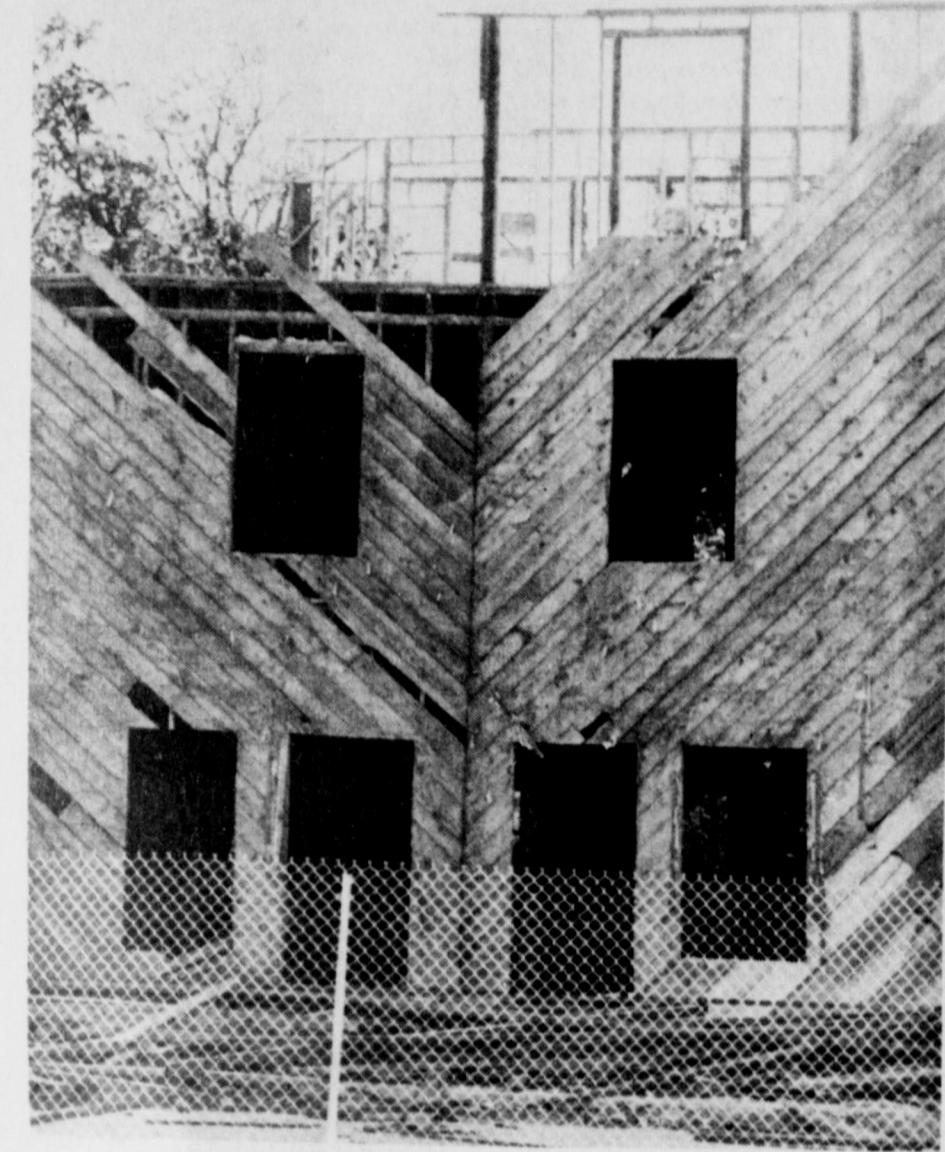

## New-student registration dates released by school

Dates for registering students who are new in the Iowa Park school district, who have not pre-registered, were announced by Harold Cowley, superintendent.

Aug. 13 and 14 have been set for all elementary students. Kindergarten, first and second graders can be registered between 9 a.m. and noon or 1-3:30 p.m. at Kidwell Elementary. Those who will enter grades three, four and five will attend Bradford, where they are to go for pre-registration.

Students new to the district who will attend junior high, which includes grades six, seven and eight, and have not pre-registered can do so 9-12 a.m. and 1-3:30 p.m. Aug. 20-21. The principal's office is open now from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at the high school for all students to register if they are new to the district.

All students entering school in the Iowa Park system for the first time must have their current immunization records when they register, as well as their birth certificates.

Aug. 20 has been set for screening of children who will be five years of age by Sept. 1 and who were not screened previously. Screening will be held between 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. at Kidwell. Parents will be required to remain with their children until screening is completed, but appointments can be made by telephoning 592-4322.

Any child being screened must have with them a birth certificate and immunization record.

A full year "Special Education Early Childhood" program for three and four year old children is available if they have a physical or learning deficiency, as determined by sight, hearing, speech, mental maturity or a physician's diagnosis.

Parents who feel their child may be eligible for the program and missed the screening in May should call the Kidwell office and schedule an appointment during the week of Aug. 10-14, according to Bob Cole, principal.

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## City, school meetings scheduled next week

At their meetings next week, the city council will hold a public hearing on proposed amendments to the zoning ordinance and the school board will consider action on the new year's budget and setting the tax rate.

The city meeting will be at 7 p.m. in council chambers and the trustees at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday in the administration building.

Most of the changes proposed for the zoning ordinance concern child care centers, establishment of mobile home parks and providing for carports.

Because no provisions were included in the original zoning ordinance to permit child care centers in residential areas, planning and zoning commission members felt the issue should be addressed; primarily for the protection of residents in the neighborhood.

More than a year's study and writing has gone into the proposed ordinance changes. The council postponed action on the amendments at its last meeting for further study by aldermen.

An ordinance will be considered, changing the zoning of the old fair grounds, located between Park West Shopping Center and Shaw Motor Co., from CA/R to CC. The site is now known as Lot One, Block One,

Wal-Mart Addition.

Two other items may possibly be on the city's agenda, which will not be finalized until tomorrow afternoon.

One item would be consideration of a site for a fire department sub-station in the south part of town. City administrator Steve Morath was instructed at the last meeting to have three proposed sites ready for consideration, but the proposals must be accompanied with a purchase option. Morath said the options may not be completed by tomorrow.

The other item could be a working copy of the new budget, which

Morath has been working on but may not have completed by meeting time.

School trustees will consider the 1981-82 budget and setting the tax rate for the coming year, according to Harold Cowley, superintendent.

Other items on the agenda include: adoption of the supplementary reader report; accepting band depository for next two years; budget changes; accepting contract with Region Nine Service Center; hospitalization insurance rate increase; and under the topic of personnel, accepting resignations and hiring of new teachers.

Homecoming will be Oct. 2 against Fort Worth North Side. Two Dist. 3-AAAA games played on the local field will be Graham, Oct. 23, and Wichita Falls Hirschi, Nov. 6.

Other table appointments were the crystal punch service and bridal napkins lettered with "Love Is Beautiful, Jill and Billy, July 31, 1981."

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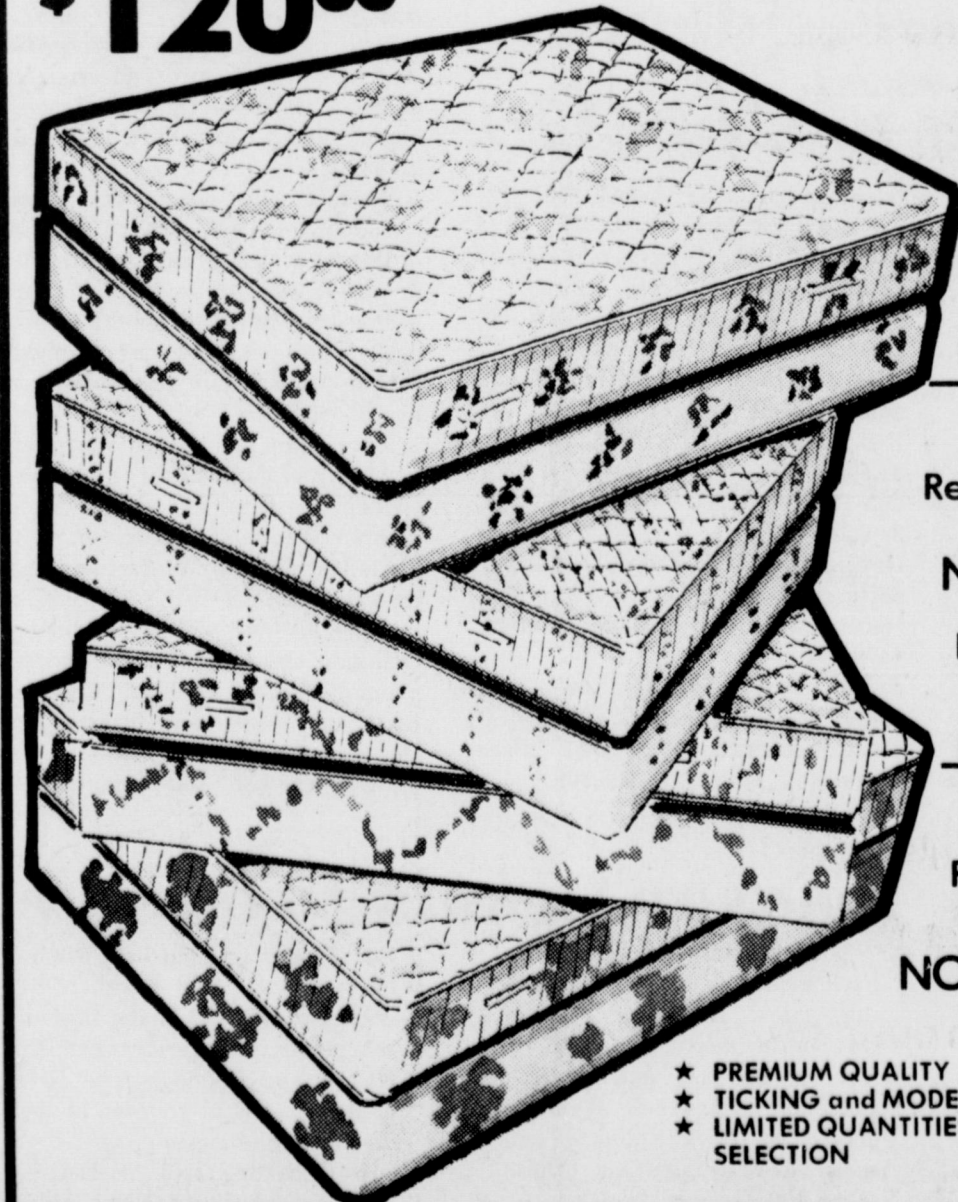

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# Texas political leaders applauded

A vice president of the North Texas Oil and Gas Association said Tuesday that the success of the compromise version of President Reagan's tax cut bill was due in a large measure to the efforts of Texas congressmen.

E.W. Moran, Jr., a Wichita Falls drilling contractor, specifically cited House Democrats Ralph Hall, Kent Hance, Jack Hightower and Charles Stenholm. Republican congressmen mentioned were Bill Archer and Tom Loeffler. "The continued leadership of Senator Lloyd Bentsen and the support of Senator John Tower were critical factors in the success of the effort," Moran stated.

"In the House, it was Hall and Hightower who recognized that energy production incentives were

missing from the tax cut package and negotiated to have these incentives included in the Democratic proposals. It is important that producers and royalty owners recognize the essential role these congressmen played. After that, the coauthor of the bipartisan bill (Reagan's bill) convinced the administration to offer even greater incentives," Moran said.

"Archer and Bentsen played crucial roles in the Conference Committee, with Loeffler and Stenholm providing overall direction throughout the complicated process," Moran stated.

"The nation's independent petroleum industry supported the President's bill because oil and non-oil provisions were geared toward tax relief and greater production by business," said Moran.

Royalty owner provisions will be especially helpful to small interest owners and should benefit about 650,000 Texans. The bill allows a \$2,500 tax credit for 1981 and in 1982 an exemption of two barrels per day until it increases to three barrels per day beginning in 1985.

"Royalty owners should never have been treated like major oil companies. This relief will be helpful," said Moran.

On January 1, 1983 the tax paid by independent producers on stripper well production will be eliminated. "This is the most significant feature for North Texas energy producers," said Moran.

According to Dr. Tom Haywood, Executive Vice President of the North Texas Oil and Gas Association, the yearly savings to North Texas producers could easily exceed \$100,000,000. "This money will mean more energy production in the future," Haywood said. To estimate the impact on a county by county basis, variables such as the price of crude, number of barrels of stripper oil produced by independents, and other factors must be taken into consideration. "We have made our best guesses on these variables, with the following results," Haywood said.

The phase-down of the tax on newly discovered oil to half its current rate will be completed in 1986. This is also considered to be a production incentive.

"There are still critical energy issues which must be addressed, including the unfairness of the entire Windfall Profit Tax and reasonable policies regarding natural gas pricing. But, the picture is a little brighter than it was," concluded Moran.

# Bollworm battle

The county bollworm model indicates a major bollworm flight will occur this week. The model also indicates another flight will occur Aug. 20 to Sept. 2. Cotton producers are alerted to the possibility of a bollworm infestation beginning this week.

A cotton bollworm meeting was scheduled Monday at the ASCS Office Building.

This bollworm prediction model is based on moths caught in a trap located on the Rufus King farm located west of Valley View. Special appreciation is extended to Allison VonMertz who made the daily moth counts during June and early July. She is a horse trainer who is associated with the Charlie King horse farms.

The moth counts and daily temperature were placed into a computer at the Research and

extension Center at Vernon by Emory Boring. The cotton insect computer program provided the predicted bollworm flight dates based on local data.

In view of the predicted bollworm flight, Stan Hoye of Kadane Corner delayed his irrigation until Tuesday. By the time the cotton could react to the water, making succulent growth, the major bollworm flight should be over. He is hopeful there will be enough beneficial insects to handle the lighter worm activity for the remainder of the month.

The largest bollworm flight is predicted for Aug. 20 to Sept. 2. By then, beneficial insect population should be large and if spraying is required for control, a grower can get by with only 1 to 3 applications. Stopping the worms from this week's flight is a critical point toward making this year's crop.

Leo Fletcher, cotton insect scout in the Iowa Park area, reports very light insect activity up to this point.

# Letter to the Editor

OPEN LETTER TO THE CITIZENS OF HOLLIDAY, TEXAS.

We in Holliday have been surprised lately to find our water turned off at the most awkward times. Almost every time this has happened, my telephone has begun to ring even before the water pressure has dropped enough at my house to let me know there is a problem. And almost every call begins with the question, "How long will the water be off?" Although I appreciate the citizens letting me know they have a problem, I would urge them to have a little patience and understanding during these times, because they are equally hard for the City.

There are only three times when the water will be turned off:

(1) when there is a severe water leak on the main line coming from Wichita Falls which causes a substantial loss of water, or

(2) when there is a water leak which cannot be fixed without turning the water off for a short period of time, or

(3) when the City of Wichita Falls turns off the supply at the east end of the line.

In the past two weeks, we have had a lack of water twice, once from a severe leak and once due to an interruption by Wichita Falls. Each time, city employees and members of the City Council worked late into the night repairing the problems.

The reason why the question "How long will the water be off?" cannot be answered is that we never turn the water off for pre-determined lengths of time; it is off only as long as it takes to repair the problem.

In Holliday, at City Hall, we have posted the name and phone number of the city employee who is on duty for the weekends. If you have a water problem, please call the person whose name is posted. During the week, you can call me, the city administrator, or any member of the council. When you call, please give your name and address so we can know the area of town in which we have a problem and will be able to call you back if necessary.

Above all, please have patience. Chances are the water is off at our houses, too.

Dean French, 16, was treated and released from Wichita General Hospital after being stabbed in the back. Tom Jones, 18, was also treated and released after being hit in the head.

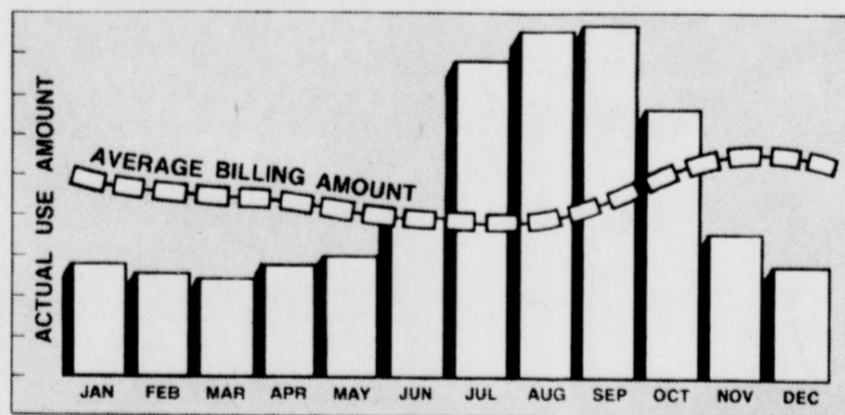
The two reportedly were driving on Kemp and got into an argument with a group in another car, leading to the fight in which the pair was injured.

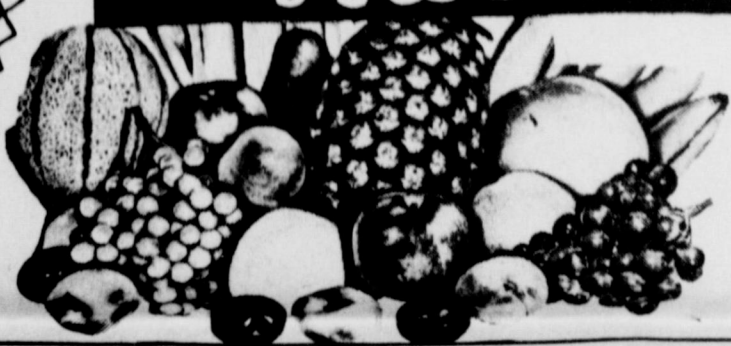

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# Street repairs occupy council

In a special called meeting of Holliday's city council Monday night, aldermen re-designated the streets to be resurfaced, after a closer inspection of the streets targeted for resurfacing during the council's regular meeting last Monday were found to be in worse condition than anticipated.

After the council's July 28th meeting, city administrator Jim Hamill and three council members, Leon Addison, Jimmy Willis and Fred Daume, inspected the streets which were designated for repair.

"We've lost quite a bit of the streets, especially with curb and gutter," Hamill told council members

Monday night. "There are places where three to five feet of street from the gutter is gone."

The inspection left councilmen doubting whether the streets could be readied in time for resurfacing. Hamill, with the help of county commissioner Yvonne Carter, had county street sweepers brought into Holliday to sweep the streets under consideration for repair, making assessment of their condition easier.

Monday morning, the sweepers cleared most of N. Main, and city officials again inspected its condition. "I believe after exposing the sides of N. Main, that by next Wednesday we should have it ready for resurfacing," Hamill said. "The sweepers made it

easier for us to see what areas needed repairing the most, and we appreciate Mrs. Carter and the county for their cooperation."

According to Hamill, N. Walnut and N. Pecan will not be ready in time for resurfacing this fall, but will be the first streets on the list for repair late next spring.

Council decided to begin work on N. Main, and continue through S. Main and then Chestnut, which runs in front of the city hall.

Mrs. Carter informed the council that the county can be ready to shoot the roads on a two-day notice. Hamill responded by saying the city should be ready for the equipment no later than Wednesday. One possible holdup

could be the condition of the trucks carrying the chat, with one currently in the shop for repairs, said Mrs. Carter. Barring any unforeseen problems, the truck will be in service before work begins in Holliday.

During earlier meeting, it was guessed that two loads of asphalt would cover about two miles of streets, but at the meeting Monday night Hamill said Main is more than twice the width of the other streets, therefore it will take twice as much material to cover the same distance.

"I think N. Main would be an appropriate place to start since it is one of the most travelled thoroughfares in the city," Hamill remarked.

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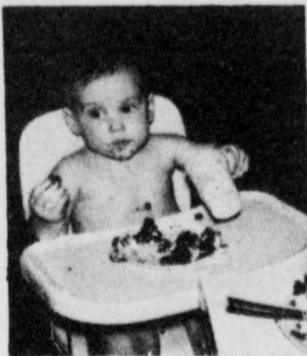

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# Cook of the Week

One of the most rewarding things in preparing the Cook of the Week stories is to be able to search out the colorful and historical background of recipes and ingredients.

This week the Hungarian paprika in Mrs. Dennis Patterson's Chicken Paprihash recipe inspired delving into a bit of paprika's history, a favorite American garnish known as the "cosmetic spice."

Paprika is a Hungarian word meaning Turkish pepper. However, it did not originate in Turkey. It is one of the marvelous new foods found in the New World by Columbus and his successors and taken back to the Old World. It eventually reached Hungary and the cooks there believe in using it lavishly to make everything "good and red."

The Pattersons have lived in Iowa Park three and a half years. She is currently working as an advertising representative for KLUR radio station and he works for the South Solvent. She was employed by Sears-Roebuck & Co. as an advertising manager for five years before accepting her present position.

1 tsp. finely chopped onion  
1 tsp. prepared mustard  
1/2 cup shredded cheese  
Place cauliflower in 1 1/2 qt. glass casserole. Add water; cover with glass lid or plastic wrap. Microwave on high for 8 to 9 minutes or until tender-crisp. Combine ingredients and pour over cauliflower, sprinkle with Cheddar cheese. Microwave on Roast for 1 1/2 to 2 minutes. Let stand

**CHICKEN PAPRIKASH**  
1 or 2 fryers, cut up  
Salt and pepper  
1/4 cup butter or margarine  
3 large onions, chopped  
1 small green pepper, chopped  
1 ripe tomato, chopped  
2 Tbl. sweet Hungarian paprika (There is also a hot paprika, please do not use that)

1 cup chicken broth or stock  
1 cup (1/2 pint) sour cream  
Wash chicken and pat dry; sprinkle with salt and pepper. Heat butter in a large skillet or Dutch oven. Brown chicken pieces on all sides, removing as they are brown.

Saute onions, green pepper and tomatoes until wilted. Add paprika and chicken broth. Add chicken pieces, turning them in pan drippings to coat. Cover and simmer until tender, about 40 to 45 minutes. Remove chicken to platter and keep warm. Stir pan drippings to loosen all particles; stir in sour cream. Heat but do not boil; spoon sauce over chicken.

**Teacher resigns post for missionary work**

The name Eleanor "Ellie" Bell is one that had been synonymous with consistent Christian living in Iowa Park since she moved here in 1966. The name in itself has been a Christian witness in First Baptist Church where she is a member, a longtime Sunday school teacher and director of the Children's Church Training Union, in the school classrooms, having taught at Bradford Elementary School the past 15 years, among her neighbors and

everyone who has been touched by the warp and woof of her life. If one doubted that her priorities have been Spirit-controlled through the years, her recent response to a question the Lord asked Isaiah long ago, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" will dispel all doubts. She has resigned her job as teacher and surrendered for service with the Southern Baptist Convention's Home Mission Board and Mission Service Corps Volunteers. The volunteers serve from one to two years and are not paid a salary. Some are sponsored by churches; others, like Ellie, go on faith.

Mrs. Bell has been assigned to the Women's Shelter sponsored by Tulsa, Okla. Baptist Association where she will be one of the assistant directors.

The shelter, one of the 12 divisions of volunteer work, is designed to help women in need of shelter due to domestic violence, alcohol/drug problems, transient ways of life, recent release from prison and other emergency needs.

Mrs. Bell's family and friends feel that she is qualified to serve in the shelter because of her deep spiritual commitment, and for her sincere concern and compassion for the neglected, submerged, despised and troubled. She is also qualified to serve in other divisions, both in the homeland and overseas, if she desires. Just now, she is radiantly happy because she feels she has found true happiness and meaning for her life in Christ. She plans to rent her home here in Iowa Park and leave for Tulsa within a few days.

Mrs. Bell has been intensely interested in doing volunteer mission work since the Southern Baptist Convention launched its Bold Mission Thrust in 1978. About a year and a half ago, her interest was rekindled when she viewed a film at the church on the volunteer work and realized how many opportunities it offered for people of different age groups.

She made application to the Home Mission Board in the spring of 1981 after she was approved by her church. She soon learned that she was qualified to serve in different capacities in several divisions. She had faint hopes of serving in Hong Kong for a time, but that assignment was postponed for a period, then came a time of waiting.

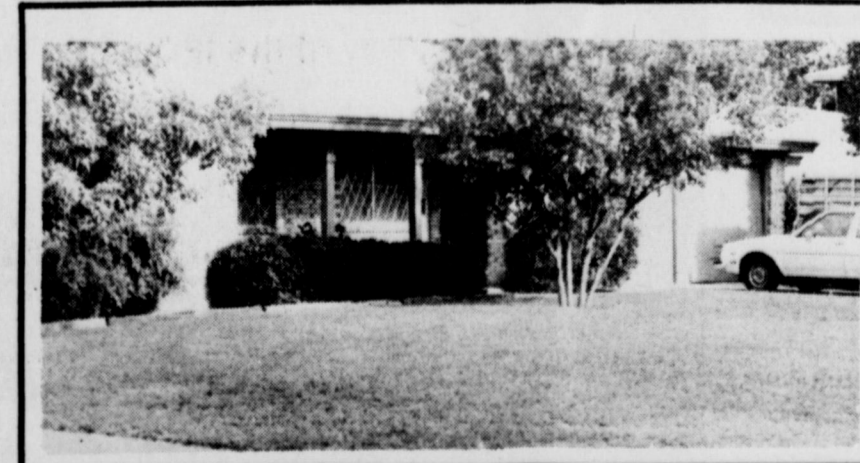
