In the city election held Tuesday, H. Schwartz, Mayor of Baird for the past four years, was re-elected with-out opposition. Price McFarlane was BAIRD CHURCHES elected City Marshal by a small majority over J. C. Barringer, who has held the office for the past six years. W. T. Hensley was third in the Marshal's race.


