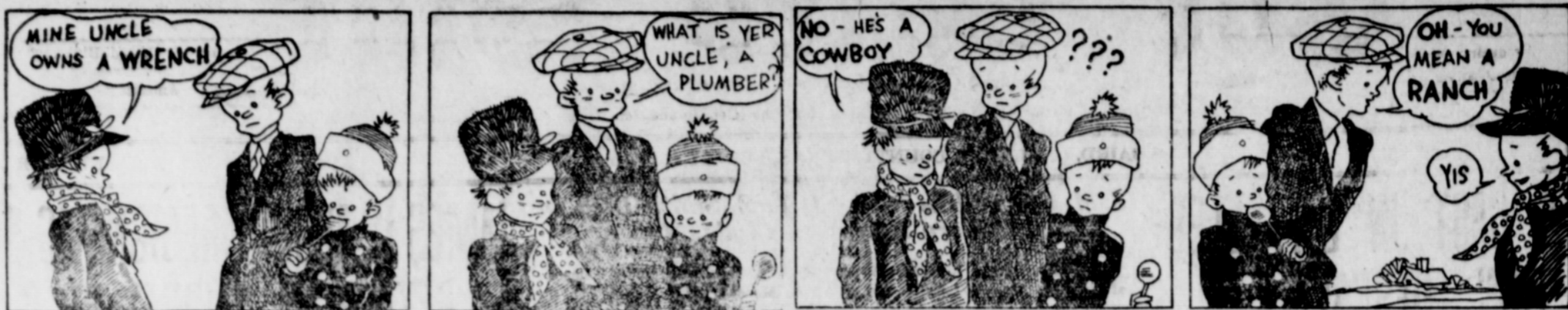

This Week in Washington
Special To The Baird Star (Autocaster)

Washington, D. C., April 8.—Anybody who can guess what this Congress is going to do is entitled to some sort of a medal. Everything was moving along smoothly, in the most statesmanlike effort on the part of leaders of both parties to straighten out the nation's finances, when the most peculiar combination of radicals of both parties mustered strength enough to smash the whole program.

No one else who is being talked of for the nomination is showing any real strength. Speaker Garner is not talking personally about his Presidential boom, but William G. McAdoo, former Secretary of the Treasury, who was an unsuccessful candidate for the nomination in 1924 and 1928, is actively promoting Garner, and may be able to muster enough delegates for the Texan, not to nominate him for the Presidency, but possibly to make him seem the most eligible candidate for the Vice-Presidency.

Of Mr. Hoover's renomination, nobody familiar with the workings of political machinery has the slightest doubt, although there are irresponsible people who still talk about drafting Coolidge or nominating Genl Dawes. There is much more interest in informed political circles, as the Conventions approach, over the Republican Vice-Presidential nomination. Mr. Curtis will not run again, he says. Mr. Hooper is credited to California, so his running mate will probably be picked at least as far east as the Mississippi Valley. However, the Vice-President will be a matter of compromise in the Convention, and it cannot be said of anybody who is now in the political limelight that he really wants it.

This Feature Discontinued
This column is to be discontinued as a regular feature of this paper. For several years it has appeared in many Texas papers, and the continued use of by so many publications proves that the public has been interested in the kind of constructive news comment that has always characterized it. The reason for its discontinuance is that the writer has accepted the arduous duties of the executive vice-presidency of the Texas Centennial Committee, which means that he is to be the "laboring man" of that important committee, a task that will require all his time and energy. He will continue to write constructive news comment for the press of Texas from time to time, most of which will be centered around the activities necessary to holding a Centennial celebration in 1936 commensurate in magnitude and grandeur with the heroic sacrifices of the founders of Texas and the wonderful development of its first century. In this great work, in which every patriotic Texan should want to participate, the writer hopes to have the cooperation of every Texas newspaper loyal to the interests of the State and anxious to see those interests advanced and given widest publicity to the people of the entire Nation and foreign countries.

Centennial Press Resolution
Practically every Texas press organization has given hearty endorsement to the movement for a Texas Centennial celebration in 1936. Illustrative of the enthusiasm of the press which after all reflects the feeling of the public, the State Press Association at its last meeting, among other things, said, by unanimous vote: "We hereby pledge the unqualified cooperation of this association in every effort that may be made to present to the people of Texas the plans and purposes of the proposed Centennial celebration to the end that every citizen may be inspired to lend utmost support to its success and thus assist in portraying the past glory, the present development, and the future progress of our great State." There was much more along the same line, but that excerpt shows something of the Texas spirit that has built and will continue to build Texas into the great Empire of which its founders dreamed.

Land Deals Increase
Real estate activities are increasing in many parts of the State. The most noticeable increases are in suburban acreage and in ranch properties. Most of the ranches that are being sold are either to be retained by purchasers for sheep and goats or are for sub-division into small tracts. The suburban sales generally are to city and town people who are getting away from crowded urban districts to places where they may have their own gardens and fruit, and yet be close enough to carry on business in town.

Building Texas Highways
Communities that want to get large visitations from tourists who will be coming to Texas for the Centennial celebration of 1936, should not delay the building of highways of a kind to invite travel, wherever the Centennial may be held, practically every out-of-State visitor, and many from within Texas, will want to see all Texas that has attractions to offer, and attractiveness will be gauged by access by roadways and things of

Pat Neff To Baylor
As has been expected by his intimate friends ever since the presidency of Baylor was offered Ex-Gov. Pat M. Neff, he has accepted the position. He could do nothing else. Pat Neff is a statesman, with an intense love for his State and everything Texan, easily tempted to throw himself with all his energy and enthusiasm into every political scramble in which he feels that he can serve his beloved State, but with a keen feeling that a country's best interests can best be served by the proper training of its youth. He believes that the zeal of a State depends upon the character of its citizenry and that our schools must bear the responsibility for character building. He accepts the responsibility as a call to duty that his conscience will not allow him to shirk.

One Man's Vision
Nearly everything worth while that is accomplished comes as the result of the vision of one individual. One enthusiast who will not acknowledge defeat, who works only the harder in the face of criticism, who faces discouragement heroically, after a time will draw to his help others who are inspired by his courage, still others follow, and in time the vision, if really a worthy one, will be transformed from a dream into a fact. This is the history of all progress. Thousands of instances could be given to support this statement, but this paragraph is inspired just now by the statement that the beauty of San Antonio—city so much admired by every one for its civic beauty—owes that beauty largely to the early efforts of one man, A. F. Wulff, pioneer citizen forgotten by most, who personally changed the leading plazas from barren, rough spots into beautiful parks, and worked away until he created a city-wide love of beauty.

Three Day Jubilee
Eagle Pass is to have a three-day jubilee, April 7, 8, 9, celebrating the completion of the first unit of its \$8,000,000 reservoir and irrigation project. When completed, the irrigation system will cover about 60,000 acres of land as rich as ever was the valley of the Nile. The transformation of the cactus-covered acres into prolific gardens has been a dream of years that will soon become a realization.

Do you know that for more than a year past over a million dollars a month has been spent in the development of water reservoirs and irrigation plants in Texas and that equally large sums are to be spent throughout this year? Travel over Texas next summer and take notice of the great development going on.

Chicago parties, with faith in Texas are getting ready to spend \$600,000 in building a club house near San Benito, which will be part of a \$2,000,000 resort project on a 700 acre tract of land that contains numerous resacas, lakes and other attractive resort features.

After having had a comprehensive survey made to ascertain whether the project would be profitable, the industrial committee of the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce is planning to interest experienced furniture manufacturers in establishing a factory in or near San Antonio large enough to supply the demand for furniture in the Southwestern section of the country. There is no reason why Texas should continue to buy practically all its furniture from Michigan and other distant States.

The towns in the three counties of the Valley are only a few miles apart, and if an editor gets tired of one place it is easy to walk over to another town and get another job.

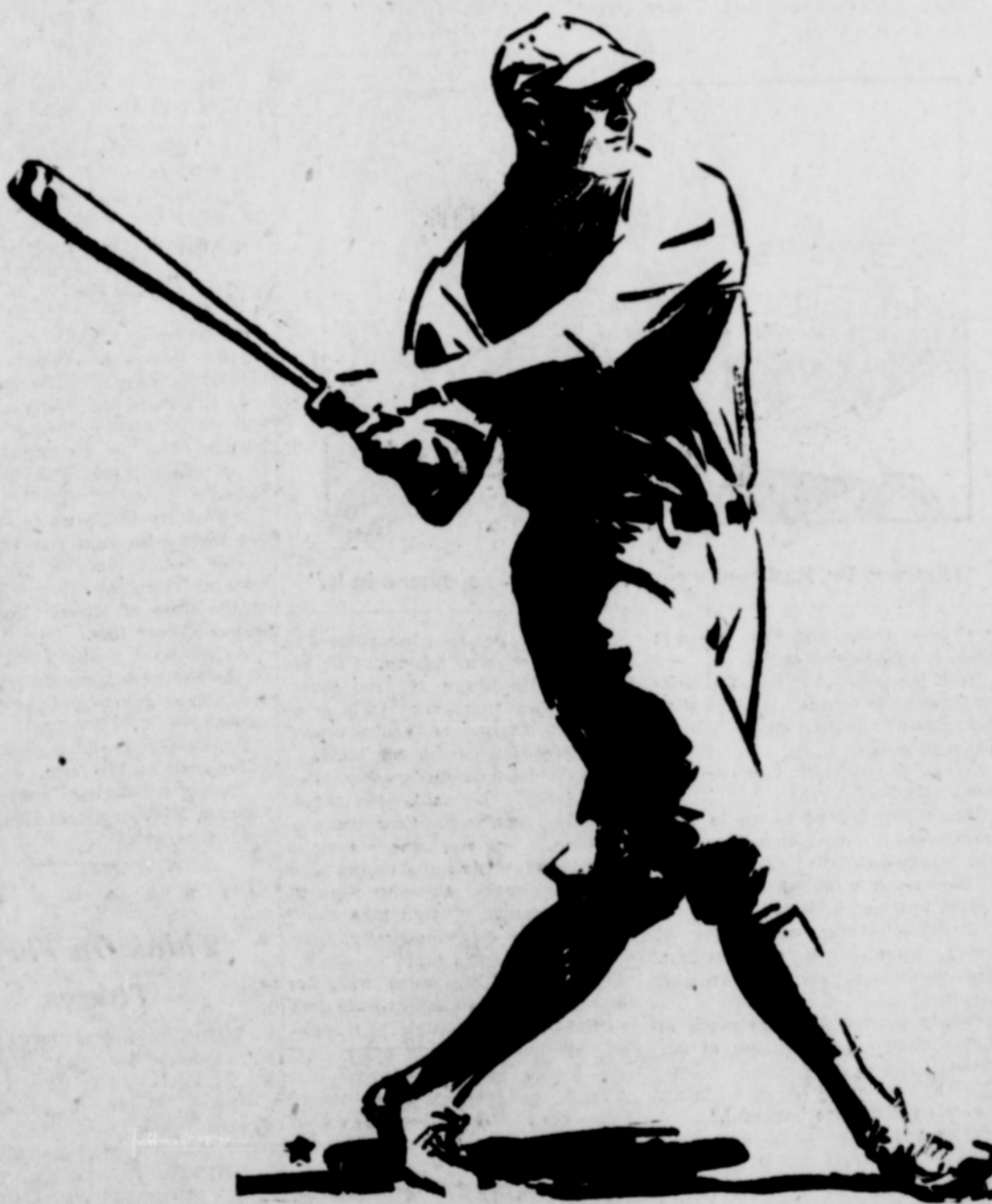
