## Women Are Wanted On The Second Front

Call for volunteers to aid the second front.

Women of Baird were appealed to today by the Callahan County Chapter of the Red Cross for additional assistance in the surgical dressings project.

"Surgical dressings for wounded Americans become more and more needed with the invasion of the continent of Europe," said Mrs. L. L. Blackburn, chapter surgical dressings production chairman.

"If chapter quotas for the army are to be met we must have additional assistance. Surely there are many more Baird women who can spend a few hours a week at the production room in behalf of the boys who are risking everything for us.

"Think of the moral lift, a Baird boy would have if the nurse told him the dressings used on his wounds came from a box labeled Baird." That very thing has happened. These boxes of dressings from home towns let the fighting men know that the home folks are working hard to back them.

Mrs. Blackburn explained that commercial concerns cannot possibly produce enough dressings to meet the demands of global war and that the American Red Cross has accepted from the war department the responsibility for additional production.

Specifications for the dressings and regulations in connection with their making are issued by the army. Medical corps doctors desire the same uniformity in Red Cross dressings as in those made by machinery.

The Red Cross assigns quotas to chapters according to population, on the basis of war department requests.

The surgical dressings project has operated here since November 9, 1942. The current quota calls for 25,200 which is almost completed and the next quota calls for 37,200 dressings which must be completed by the last of September and it will be necessary for more workers to help us complete this quota on schedule.

Gauze sponges, packs and face masks comprise the greater part of recent production here. This involves folding and cutting of gauze and cotton and some basting and stitching in the case of abdominal packs.

Actually there is no "bandage rolling" as there was in special production of the Red Cross for the French in 1939. The term remains in use despite the fact that the job no longer involves measuring, cutting, folding and some stitching.

A branch surgical dressing room will be opened within a few days in Cross Plains where surgical dressings will be made. A number of ladies from Cross Plains were here Tuesday and Wednesday taking instructions in making the dressings. Those here were, Mrs. Tom Bryant, chairman, Mrs. H. E. Coburn, co-chairman, Mrs. Clyde Lane, Mrs. A. J. McCain, Miss Hallie Peters, Mrs. Eli Powell and Mrs. Fred Tunnell.

The dressing room will be up-stairs over the Cross Plains post office. The help of the Cross Plains workers will help materially in completing the quotas on time.

## The Navy Wants Ship Repair Men

Lieutenant Commander, G. W. Cook Jr., officer in charge of the Office of Naval Officer Procurement, 1530 Allen Building, Dallas, Texas, has announced that the Navy will begin immediately accepting applications for commissions in a new special program. The new program, SHIP REPAIR OFFICERS, is one of a number of special billets open at this time. This new program is significant in that it affords an opportunity to men with engineering and technical experience to be commissioned as officers in the Naval Reserve. It also changes current procurement policy in that the rank of warrant officer is again open for qualified machinists, steel men, shipfitters and similar skilled trades.

Civilians who meet the qualifications for appointment as ship repair officers are urgently needed at this time. These men will be given regular Navy indoctrination training in ship repair work at Navy yards. After this training, officers will be assigned duty in ship repair units for service at advanced bases and on repair ships. Commander Cook points out that the Navy's ability to repair ships quickly will be one of the most important factors in maintaining our naval strength in the Pacific and elsewhere.

Men who are able to qualify as engineers are particularly desired. Engineers classified as agricultural, ceramic, chemical, civil, general, industrial, mechanical, metallurgical, mining, petroleum, architectural and electrical; as well as chemists, metallurgists, physicists, architects, naval architect, machinists, shipfitters, and other skilled trades are specifically mentioned.

Appointments may be had in the ranks of Lieutenant, Lieutenant (junior grade), Ensign, and Warrant Officer Candidates must have a good record of practical experience with a mechanical background in maintenance or repair, or in steel construction or installation of machinery and equipment. It is not necessary that they have previous experience in ship repair. The Navy will give all necessary training but it is required that applicants have a good background for ready assimilation of instructions.

While the age limits for this program are given as 21 to 42, outstanding candidates over 42 will be given consideration. Commander Cook expressed the belief that many men with technical training who are physically qualified and who have previously been rejected by the Navy because no appropriate billet was open, may be given reconsideration for this program. He suggests that all such men immediately write the Dallas Office, since the process of reviewing the old files is necessarily rather slow.

A number of other billets in commissioned rank for young men under 38 years of age are open now. As a general rule, a college degree and successful practical experience of an administrative or supervisory nature are required. For further information inquiries should be directed to the Office of Naval Officer Procurement 1530 Allen Building, Dallas, Texas.

While the need for officers in the Naval Reserve is urgent, the requirements are still strict and Commander Cook recommends that preliminary inquiry be made by mail due to present transportation difficulties.

## PRICE CEILING ON SEED IN TEXAS TO BE \$55.00 PER TON

The War Food Administration has established a ceiling on cotton seed of \$55 per ton, raising the ceiling from \$49 for cotton seed for the 1943 season. This price is for Texas and New Mexico and all other states the price will be \$56.

The new price of \$6.00 over the per ton price of 1942 and will be in effect through an open order of OPA by the community credit corporation to support the cotton seed market.

## John T. Perrin Died At Clyde

John T. Perrin, 74, an orchard owner at Clyde the past 35 years and one of the first growers of the delicious apple in this vicinity, died at his home in Clyde early Monday. Mr. Perrin suffered a heart attack Sunday following his return from a visit to his orchard. He succumbed at 7:30 a. m.

A former railway station agent who returned to Clyde to live following his retirement in November, 1943 Mr. Perrin was employed for 13 years by the Texas and Pacific railway and for 31 years more by the Southern Pacific. He was stationed at Clyde, Midland and several other points with the T and P. His retirement followed immediately after his final assignment with the Southern Pacific at Picocho, Ariz.

Survivors are his wife, the former Ola Graham, to whom he was married Oct. 10, 1900, at Midland; and a daughter Mrs. Mable Drum of Los Angeles, Calif.

Mr. Perrin was born April 19, 1869 at Asika, Miss., and came to Texas as a young man.

He purchased land and planted his orchard south of Clyde while still with the T and P, returning for two and three month vacations every year to look after the property.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at the Methodist Church in Clyde, the Rev. E. A. Irvin officiating. Pallbearers were, M. M. Woodward, M. H. Perkins, Sam McIntosh, R. M. Pyeatt, John Dailey and Harry Berry. Burial was directed by Patterson Funeral home.

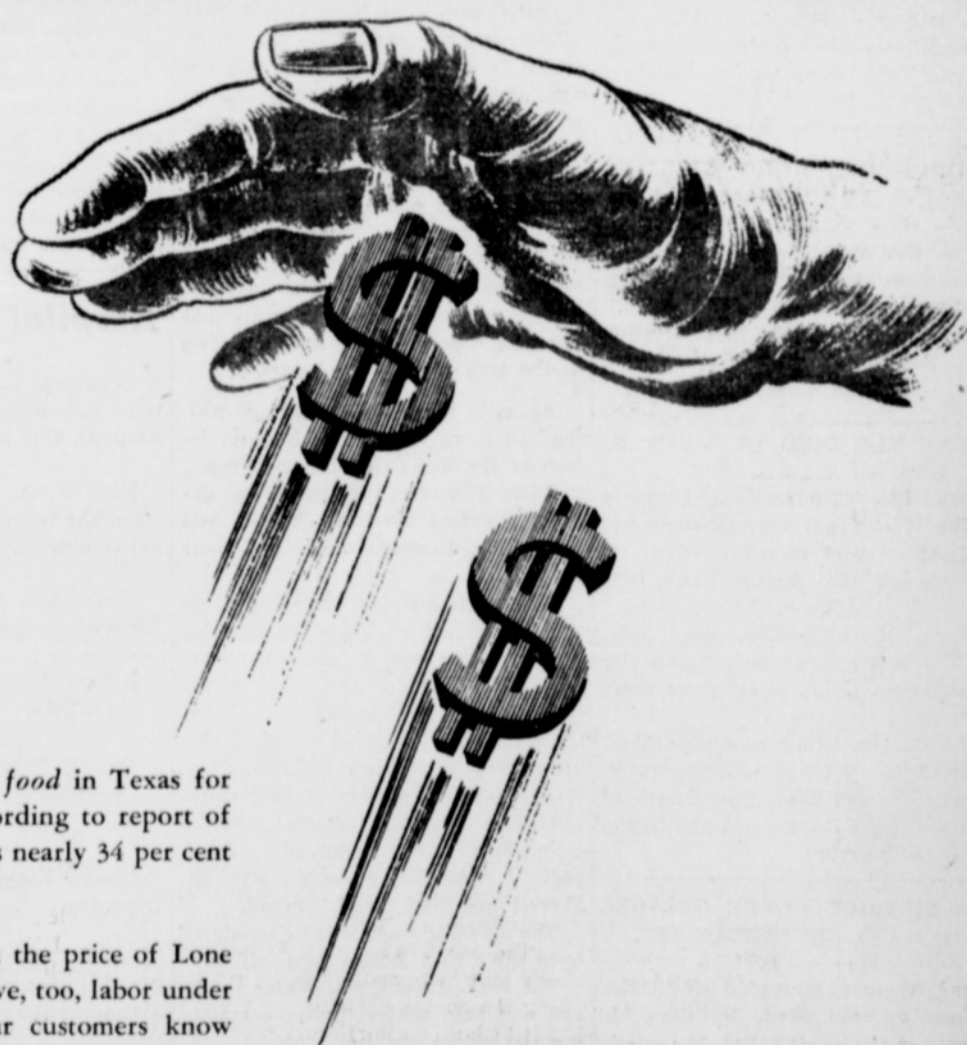

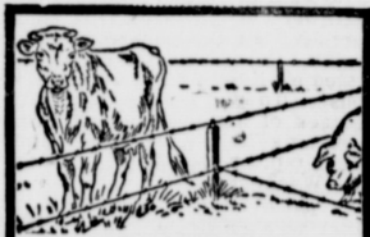

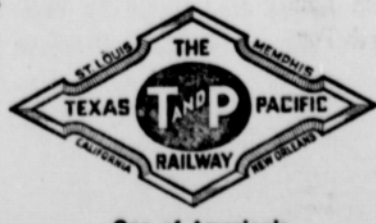

**Jar Rubbers Are Different This Year**

It is now thought that red rubber will be available for jar rings this year but there will be no cause for alarm if the rubbers you buy turn out to be black. It is the rubber, not the color, that counts. True, you may be a bit startled when you open your first package of the war models. "But what of it?" asks Gladys Kimbrough, Home Service Director of Bull Brothers Company. "Our grandmothers got along well enough with lipless rubbers and so can we."

Months ago, manufacturers began experiments to learn how to make jar rings that would conserve both rubber and food—the government set its scientists to the same task. One of the first things upon which all agreed was that lips are unnecessary for opening jars. The point of a thin knife can be run under the rubber to make a tiny space for air to seep through and break the seal. It is then easy to remove cap or lid. It was also agreed that jar rings could be a small fraction of an inch narrower but the thickness must remain at the pre-war standard.

War-time rubbers will keep jars sealed air-tight, but they won't stand abuse. To get good results, break yourself of that never-good habit of stretching to test and follow these four simple rules:

1. Wash and rinse rubbers. Boil them to sterilize if you can fruits the old-fashioned open-kettle way. If processing is to be done, drop the rubbers in boiling water and set aside until needed.
2. Have rubbers wet when they are used—and be sure that each rubber lies flat on the sealing surface of the jar.
3. Partly seal all jars before processing.
4. Screw zinc caps and bands on glass top seal closures slowly when sealing, as quick or jerky turns cause rubbers to slip out of position.
