## Husband shoots wife

A domestic disturbance ended in a shooting here Friday afternoon, and the husband arrested on a charge of aggravated assault.

Alan Ray Conrad, 29, was arrested about 2:30 p.m. in unit 22-A of Colonial Apartments after he allegedly shot his wife with a .22 caliber rifle.

Conrad was taken before Justice of the Peace Bill Robinson, placed under a \$10,000 bond and transported to county jail at 4:47, according to police records.

His wife was transported to

Wichita General Hospital with a wound in the lower left abdomen.

According to Chief of Police Alan Sheffield, Mrs. Conrad had called the police dispatcher requesting an officer accompany her to the apartment so she could get her belongings.

The request was denied, Sheffield said, because the couple was still married and were both living at the same address.

Mrs. Conrad reportedly asked her boss, a Wichita Falls businessman, to accompany her, which he did. And

when they arrived and entered, the husband shot her during an ensuing argument.

While investigating the incident, police learned several items in the apartment were alleged to have been stolen in Wichita Falls, and police in that city acknowledged suspicion that the allegations were correct.

Some of the items, including a cowboy statue, were confiscated at the request of Wichita Falls police, and investigation of thefts is underway.

## City to move water tower

The city council took very little time in accepting a bid to move the water tower from Lake Gordon to a new location on West Emerald, when they were informed of bids Monday night.

The accepted bid was not only much lower than was budgeted, but the difference between it and the next lowest bid is enough to complete the project and pay the engineer's fee.

Pittsburg Tank and Tower Co. offered a bid of \$189,746. Next lowest bid was \$218,800, then \$224,300 and \$292,000.

There were five bids offered to build a new tower, of similar design, that ranged from \$254,990 to a high of \$356,250.

And as an alternate, bids were asked to construct a new tower similar to the new Wichita Falls tower on US 287. The two bids on that alternate were from \$373,400 to \$387,100.

Engineer Kerry Maroney told the council he had inspected the tower earlier that day, and declared it to be in "excellent condition, much better shape than the one we moved for the city of Wichita Falls."

He said any additional welding work that might have to be done, as well as site preparation, painting, fencing, and his fee would still leave money, from what was expected to be spent on the project.

The new site will be in the dedicated but never opened right of way for Emerald, next to the city's western city limits.

The contractor said 180 working days were needed to complete the job. Not included in the bid specs was connecting a 12-inch line to the existing 10-inch line on the east side of Colorado, Maroney explained.

The relocated tower will have 35 feet more tower than it now has, in order to raise it to the same level as the tower on Johnson Road. That will enable the two towers to provide water to residences simultaneously.

Because of the differences in the heights now, only the Johnson Road tower serves the entire city. Neither of the other two towers have functioned since the Johnson Road tower was built, the council has been told.

The new tower will increase water pressure seven pounds, the engineer said.

In other business, aldermen accepted bids received at auction of excess items, discussed major street work priorities for the year, as well as improvements to the library and its grounds, granted a request from the volunteer firemen for a vehicle, and approved two resolutions.

The auction brought a total of some \$3,700, including bicycles that sold from \$1 to \$30, and a 1985 police car that sold for \$1,350.

There is some question about the car's sale, however. The firemen ask that it be turned over to their department, for use when traveling to area schools and other activities.

But Dan Ainsworth's bid had been accepted, and he ask the council whether he would get it or if the firemen would, and was told the firemen would.

However, Tuesday morning Mayor Tim Hunter said during a discussion after the meeting, the firemen agreed to not take the car and wait to see if another type vehicle might be

made available. Hunter said he did not know whether Ainsworth still wanted the car.

Streets under consideration for major work this summer included the north end of Third Street, Texowa, West Texas and Ruby.

No priorities will be set on the proposed streets until Public Works Director Mike Price provides some cost estimates, which are expected at the next meeting.

Because space for library use is already at its limit, the council said it would be advisable to have a representative of the state library to study the situation and make recommendations.

Also discussed was application for a cost-sharing grant on the project.

Another grant request proposal that was accepted was one from the state for a juvenile officer. No new personnel in the police department would be on a one-year basis, council was told.

The council approved a resolution supporting the Southwestern Bell "Texas First" program, which if approved by the Public Utilities Commission, would allow the utility to earn more money on its investment but in return provide several benefits.

The benefits, if approved by the PUC, would include a five-year freeze on local rates, replacement of present switching machines to digital switchers, expand the local calling area to Burkburnett, lower Bell charges to long distance companies, and provide new facilities for customers with four-party services.

Also approved was an ordinance revising the building and construction code to include the 1988 Southern Building Standards.

Mayor Hunter also read a proclamation declaring April 9-15 as National Building Safety Week in Iowa Park.

## Police report busiest week in recent memory

The past week was one of the busiest in memory for the Iowa Park Police Department, with numerous complaints ranging from loud noises to a man shooting his wife.

The department is investigating several cases of theft which occurred during the same period.

The first theft complaint was received Thursday morning, when a resident reported three chests of hand tools were taken from a garage in the 1500 block of Karen. Value was set at more than \$750.

Other major reports that day were to assist an injured man who had fallen from a roof at 404 W. Poe, a tire slashing in the 1400 block of West Highway, and a man being bitten by a dog in the 100 block of Westview.

Three thefts were reported Friday.

More than \$50 in coins were reportedly taken from gum ball machines at Wal-Mart, a boy's Huffy bicycle was taken from a home in the 1300 block of Mockingbird, and approximately \$1,500 in jewelry taken from a home in the 100 block of Hope Lane.

Two more theft reports were filed Saturday.

A camcorder valued at more than \$750 was reportedly taken from Parkway TrueValue, and a tool box with tools from a home in the 700 block of North Yosemite.

Two arrests were listed on the police blotter Sunday.

Michael J. Ristow, 31, was taken into custody at 1:32 a.m. in the

500 block of East Highway on a charge of public intoxication, and at 10:25 p.m., police took Johnnie Wayne Owen, 28, into custody on warrants issued by Wichita County sheriff's department, and turned over to a deputy at 11:51.

Within a four-minute period Monday, police received reports that all four tires were taken from vehicles in two different locations.

At 7:41 a.m., a report was taken from Bob Ritchie Chevrolet, and four minutes later, from an owner in the 500 block of South Texowa.

At 7:26 p.m. Monday, police arrested Fletcher Christian Cash, 21, in one of the Woodbriar Apartments on a charge of disorderly conduct.

Also Monday, the theft of a lawnmower from a residence in the 700 block of South Wall, according to the police blotter.

Possibly because students were out of school for spring break, there were 12 complaints concerning juveniles received during the week by the police department, as well as six complaints of loud music and other noises during late hours.

### Students absent, parent is fined

The mother of two Iowa Park elementary school children was fined \$100 in Justice of the Peace Bill Robinson's court Tuesday morning for violating the compulsory school attendance law.

The woman reportedly works at a job until late hours, and oversleeps in the mornings, failing to get her children off to school on time.

School officials say the situation has been prolonged into the second year, and one of the children was held

over in the same class last year, because of excessive absences allowed by the law.

"The Iowa Park school district is working in cooperation with the Justice of the Peace in truancy cases. When the campus discipline committee determines that there is truancy, we will file against the parent in order to keep the student in school and prevent having students retained from excessive absences," stated Supt. Glen Mitchell.

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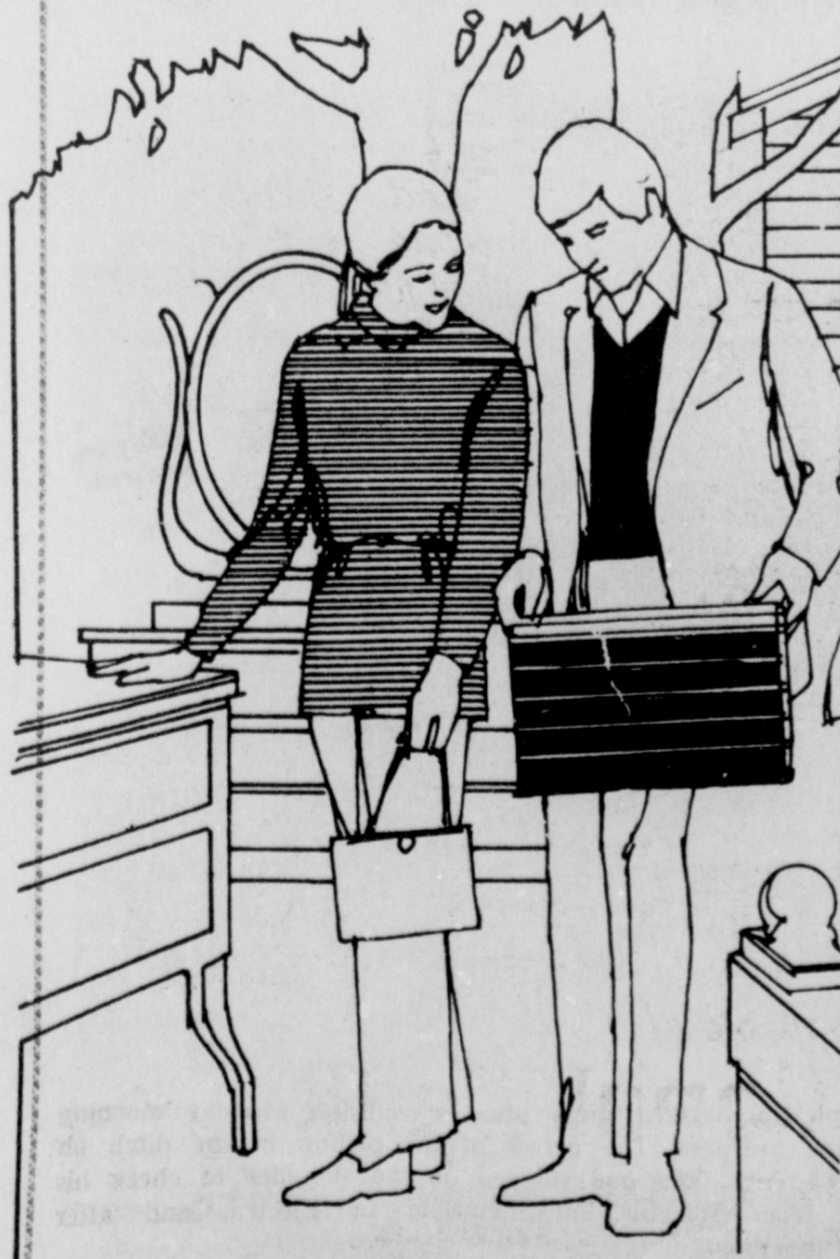

## MAKE-AHEAD CABBAGE SALAD

1/2 med. head cabbage, chopped  
2 cups chopped tomatoes  
1 cup chopped green pepper  
1 cup sliced green onions, including tops  
1 cup cubed mild Cheddar cheese  
1/4 cup grated carrots  
3/4 cup mayonnaise  
1/3 cup milk  
1/4 to 1/2 t. salt, if desired

In large bowl, combine cabbage, tomatoes, green pepper, green onions, Cheddar cheese and carrots. Mix well. In small bowl, combine mayonnaise, milk and salt, whisk until smooth. Pour over vegetables, toss gently. Chill overnight. Serves 8 to 10.

TIP: If you are counting calories, use Weight Watchers reduced calorie mayonnaise and non-fat milk.

## SQUASH CASSEROLE

1 1/2 lbs. squash, cooked in salted water, drained and mashed  
2 carrots, grated  
1 small jar chopped pimiento  
1 can condensed cream of mushroom or cream of chicken soup  
1 medium onion, chopped  
1 pkg. herb dressing mix, divided  
1/2 cup (1 stick) butter or margarine, melted

Combine all ingredients except 1/2 of dressing mix and butter. Mix well and pour into casserole dish. Combine remaining dressing mix and butter. Spread on top of squash mixture. Bake at 350 degrees until brown, about 30-40 minutes.

## EVERYBODY'S FAVORITE MEATLOAF

2 lbs. ground beef  
1 cup seasoned Italian bread crumbs  
1/2 cup finely chopped onion  
1/3 cup catsup  
1/3 cup water  
1 t. garlic powder  
2 eggs  
Pepper to taste  
Salt, if desired  
4 strips bacon, if desired

Heat oven to 350 degrees. In large bowl, combine all ingredients except bacon. Shape into a loaf and place in 9x5-inch loaf pan. Arrange bacon strips on top of meat mixture, if desired. Bake at 350 degrees 60 minutes. Serves 6 to 8.  
TIP: To reheat, cover with foil, bake at 350 degrees 15 minutes, or until thoroughly heated.

## PORK CHOPS & RICE

4 (1/2 inch) pork chops  
1 1/2 cups pre-cooked rice  
1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup  
1/2 cup water  
1 pkg. onion soup mix  
1 T. chopped pimiento

Brown pork chops in frying pan. Mix rice, soup, water, soup mix and pimiento in 13x9x2-inch baking dish. Place browned chops on top. Place covered in 350 degree oven 20 minutes. Remove cover and bake an additional 10-20 minutes.

## TEXAS HASH

3 large onions, diced  
1 green pepper, diced  
1 lb. hamburger meat  
2 cups tomatoes  
1 can baked beans  
1/2 cup uncooked rice  
2 cups noodles  
1/2 tsp. pepper  
2 tsps. salt  
1 tsp. chili powder  
Saute onions and green pepper in 3 T. oil. Add hamburger and brown. Stir in remaining ingredients. Pour into baking dish and bake at 350 degrees 1 hour.

## GREEN CHILI CORNBREAD

1 cup cornmeal  
1/4 cup flour  
1 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. baking soda  
1 cup fresh corn, cut from cob, drained

1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese  
2 eggs, beaten

Twenty-two members attended the meeting.



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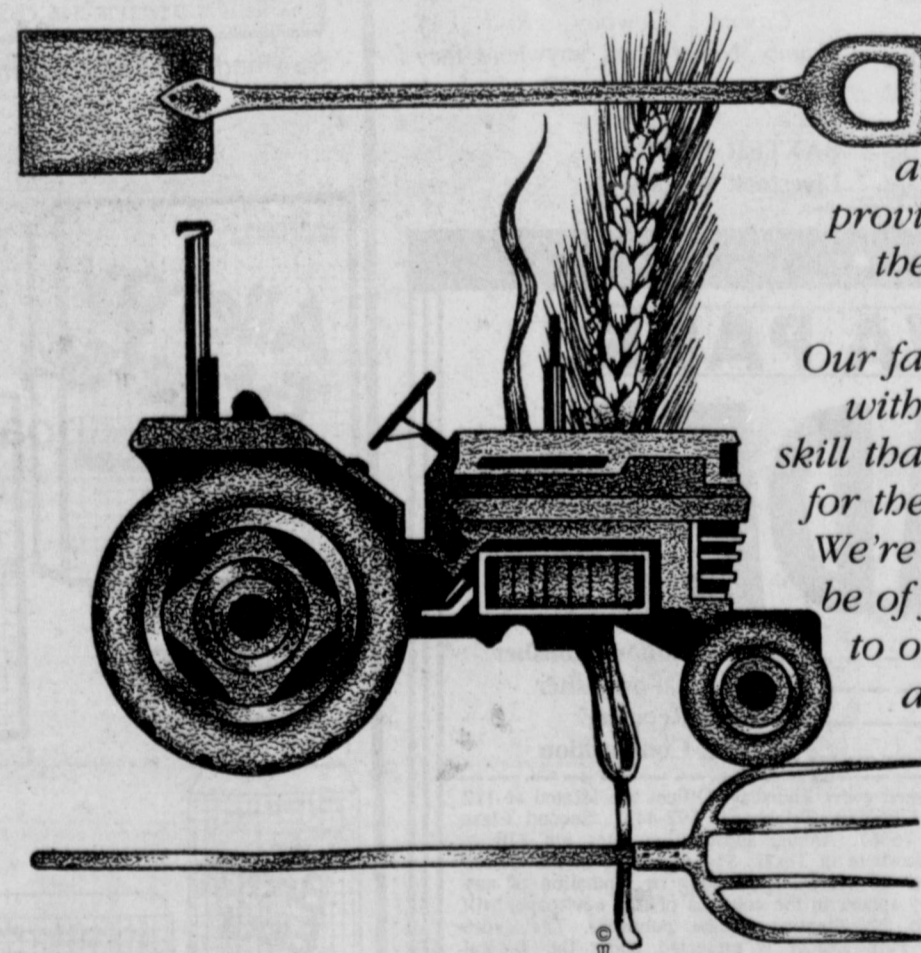
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# As I See It... By BOB HAMILTON



A growing problem in education is its problems in courts.

It seems any time someone has a different idea of how things should be done, and don't get their way, they rush down to the courthouse and file suit.

That's one reason a bill has been introduced in the legislature to make the University Interscholastic League the absolute ruler on any issue involving the UIL activities.

A milestone case involving the UIL is to be ruled on in April. It involves a suit brought by the Dallas School District and one of its football teams.

Most of you have read about the Dallas Carter High School issue that made all the headlines last fall, when one of its players was ruled ineligible to compete on the team because of the "no-pass, no-play" rule.

Dallas supported its school by going to court and not only getting a delay in a ruling about the player, but about the team's continuing in the playoffs. The team eventually won the Class AAAAA title.

At issue was a teacher's grading of a star player, failing him because he did not turn in homework. Really, his grade was "NC" or not complete.

Boy, it hit the fan!

The school's principal promptly changed the grade to passing, and the teacher complained to the state.

First the UIL ruled Carter not only had to forfeit its playoff games, because the player had competed, but would be ineligible to continue in the state playoffs.

Then, when Dallas' school complained, William Kirby, state Education Commissioner, involved himself. He also ruled the student to have failed.

That's when the Dallas schools found a judge to listen to both sides, and then delay a ruling until spring. Thus, Carter was able to not only continue playing, but to win, and with a player everyone except Dallas school people said was ineligible.

Dallas attorneys complained that the UIL and TEA has no standing in ruling on the eligibility of a student! Carter has a predominately black student body. So what comes next? A couple of black legislators from the big city sounded off that the UIL and Texas Education Agency were making rulings based on race!

Carter's grading system gives equal balance to attending class, weekly tests, six-week tests and semester tests. In other words, a student gets 25 percent of a passing grade just by walking through the door each period.

I suspect Commissioner Kirby figured out that no other schools do their grading on that basis. I'm sure the UIL did also.

So, what happened was, while the Dallas school was demanding to compete in the football playoffs, and abiding with all the rules concerning the game of football, they didn't want to go by the same rules as all the other schools were using to determine their students' eligibility.

I suggest State District Judge Paul Davis just make a ruling that Carter keep its championship trophy.

However, added to that ruling, he should state that all Dallas School

District students can no longer compete in any of the UIL events, be it athletic, music or scholastic, in the future.

Small towns are takin' a beating. The depressed agricultural and oil economy has a lot of'em staggering. But there is another more insidious menace that's been closing the small businessman's door. It's that hangout of teenagers and out-of-work Santas alike: the shopping mall.

I've always preferred to park in front of the store I was shopping in. Parking at a mall requires a wilderness guide. There are three million cars crammed on six sections of bubbling asphalt or glacier ice. Unless you are driving a pink 18-wheeler with a load of giraffes, you may never find your car again.

When you walk through a mall, you could be in Abilene, Edmonton, Des Moines or Denver. The stores are alike. The merchandise is the same. The air is filtered and maintained like a hog confinement shed and interchangeable robots take your money.

I appreciate a merchant remembering my name, not having to call the IRS or the KGB to take my check and offering to order something for you if they're out.

But not everybody likes it that way. Many prefer to shop anonymously. There is no such thing as loyalty to a chain store in a mall. You can always look for the cheapest price without feeling guilty. It's convenient, one-stop shopping. And they take the universal bus token: the credit card.

Small town businesses depend on local residents to survive. But good roads, cheap gas and chain store advertising lure even the most civic-minded small town citizen to drive a hundred miles to buy furniture, clothes, cars, even groceries.

Those of us in agriculture should understand. You know how we feel when our neighbors buy Argentinian beef or New Zealand lambs. "Buy it at home!" we say as we get in our Toyota, put on our Mexican boots and drive to the nearest big city shopping mall.

Small town businessmen have no God-given right to survive. They are not a protected species any more than farmers and ranchers. But we need each other. Our purchases, even little ones, are important in small towns. In a shopping mall you're just another blank face with plastic money.

*Coyote Cowboy Rule of Thumb:* Never shop anywhere they have to ask for your ID to take a check.

Instead of riding into the sunset they are bogged down in federal red tape.

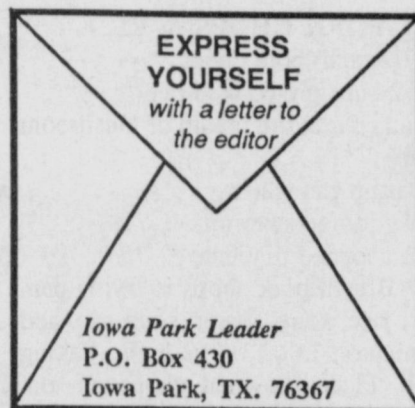
The Montana promoters plan to drive 10,000 cattle some 58 miles from Roundup to Billings. Cost estimates are already more than \$500,000 and still rising.

## TU Electric asks PUC permission to refund

TU Electric recently filed an application with the Public Utility Commission asking authorization to refund about \$46.6-million, including interest, to its customers.

The amount the company is asking to refund was overcollected through January this year. Primarily because the unseasonably warm weather experienced in the company's service area resulted in lower costs for fuel to generate electricity.

When weather is milder than normal, customers use less electricity. Therefore, the company uses less of its higher-priced fuel supplies

to meet demand.

The refund would be made through a credit to bills. Under TU Electric's proposal, the refund would be made in May, and residential customers who use 1,000 kilowatt-hours will receive refunds averaging about \$10. The exact refund month will depend on when PUC approval is received.

TU Electric's rates have been lowered by more than 10 percent since 1986, primarily because of the decreasing cost of natural gas and the company's program to renegotiate gas contracts and make advantageous spot market purchases.

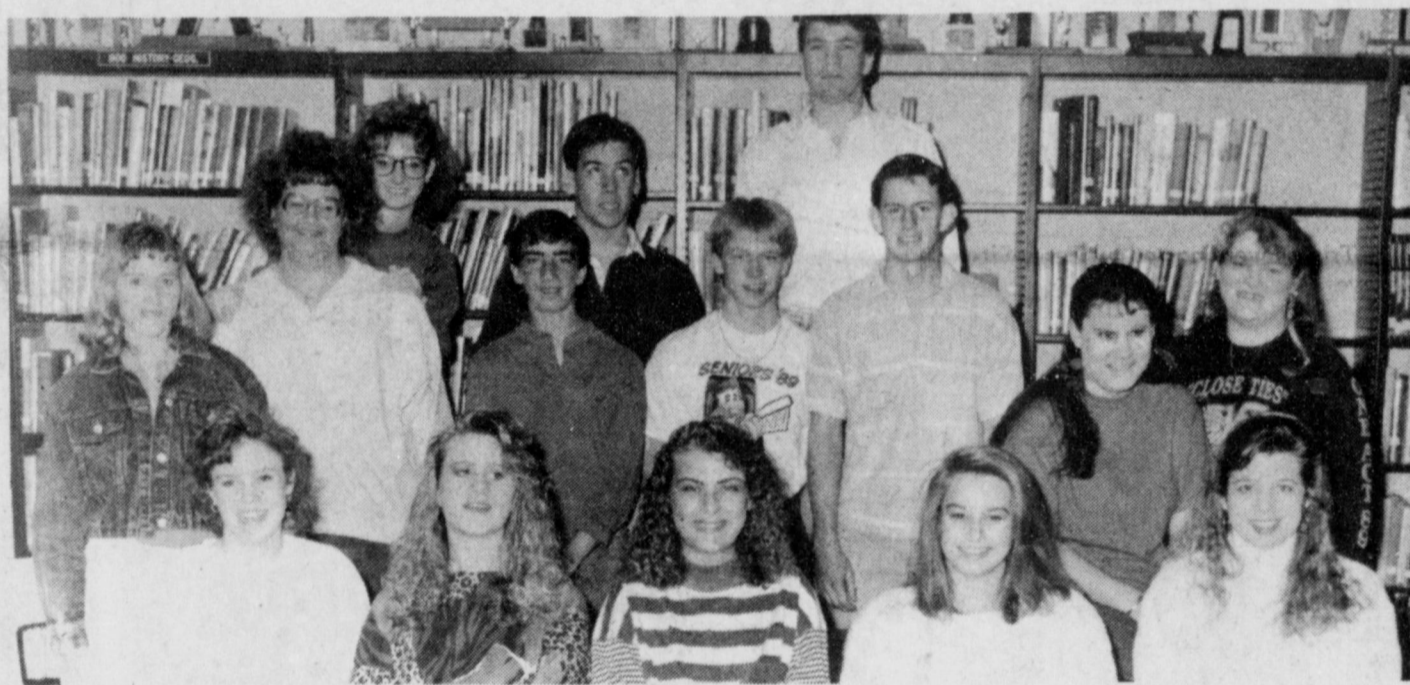

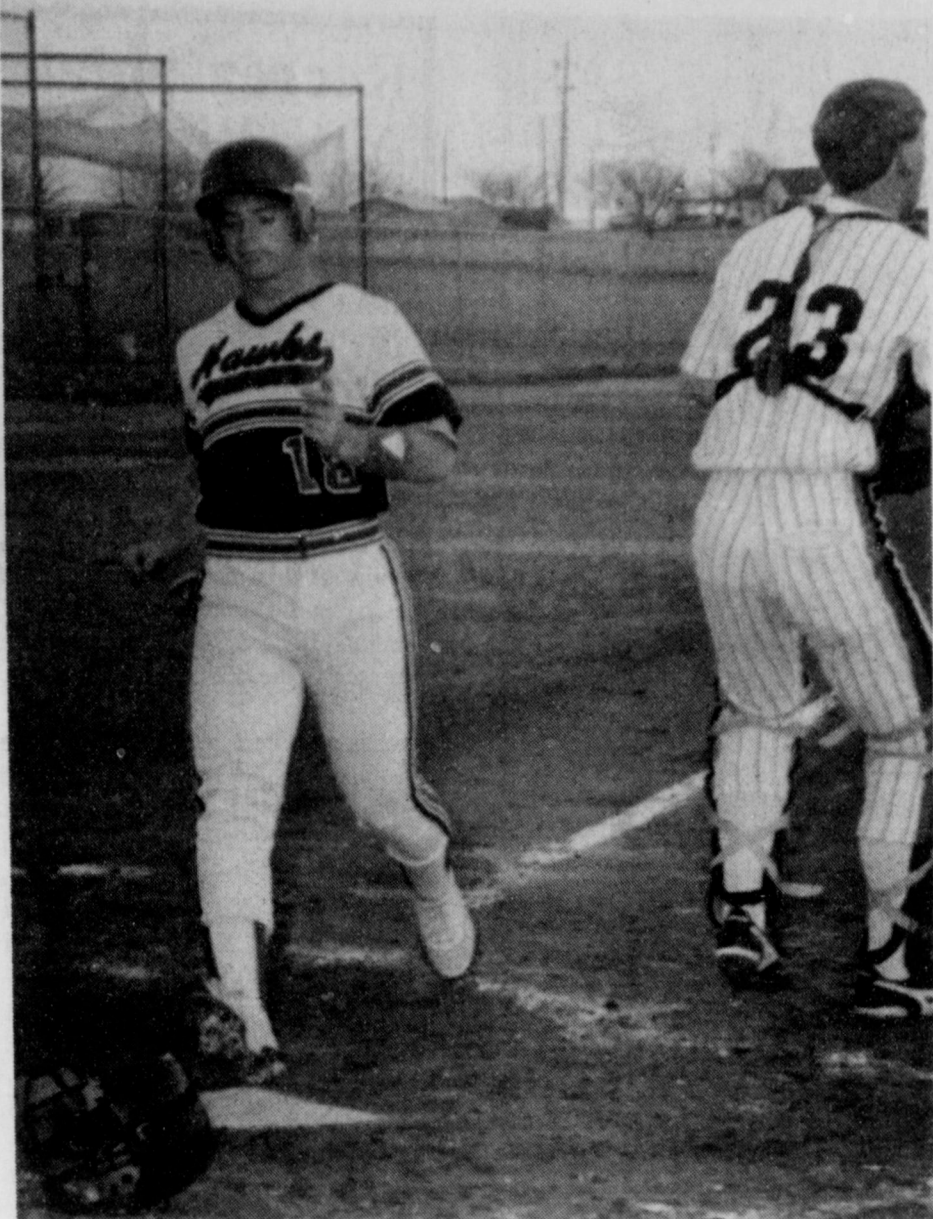

He said that he could not be too optimistic about House Bills being passed soon to improve the situation, and he sees the need of reanalyzing the criminal justice system.

Lee Pelz, chairman of the Community Club Awards program that the club is participating in, distributed buyer's guide booklets and said that the first turn-in proofs of purchases from the participating sponsors would be April 8.

## Finnell, Carriker bill would help rural hospitals

Rep. Charles Finnell and Sen. Steve Carriker have introduced legislation to encourage rural students to pursue medical careers and return after college to practice in their home communities.

HB 2951 and SB 1351 would combine support from rural communities and the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board to pay for the medical education of outstanding students who want to pursue health-service careers.

Participants in the program would be selected from community-sponsored applicants in a special statewide competition.

"Rural communities across Texas are suffering from a shortage of doctors and other health-service providers," Finnell said. "The Outstanding Rural Scholar Recognition Program is an attempt to bring newly-graduated medical professionals back to the areas that need them most."

Sponsoring communities would have to agree to furnish 50 percent of the cost of a selected applicant's tuition, class materials and living expenses. The commitment would be in the form of scholarships, grants or private support.

The Higher Education Coordinating Board would loan the remaining 50 percent of college expenses to the selected applicants. One year of loan repayments would be forgiven for each year the graduated health professional practiced in a rural area.

## Optician gives program for I.P. Optimist Club

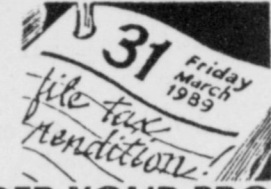

**RENDER YOUR PROPERTY**

A **rendition** is a report to the appraisal district that lists all the taxable property you own or control on January 1, 1989. The form is available at your local appraisal district or you may draft a similar form.

You must file a rendition if you own tangible personal property used to produce income—such as the machinery and equipment used by a business.

The appraisal district may require any taxpayer to file a rendition by sending the taxpayer a written notice and a rendition form.

The advantages of filing a rendition:

- You give your opinion of your property's value. If the appraisal district places a higher value on your property, it must notify you in writing of the higher value and explain how you can protest that value to the appraisal review board.
- You record your correct mailing address so your tax bills will go to the right address. If your bill is mailed to the wrong address, the

law still holds you responsible for paying your taxes on time or paying extra charges for late payments.

You can also file a report of decreased value, to notify the appraisal district of significant depreciation to your property in 1988. The district will look at your property before assigning a value in 1989.

The deadline for 1989 renditions is March 31. You can get an extra 30 days if you ask for it in writing before the March 31 deadline.

File renditions with your local appraisal district at the address shown below.

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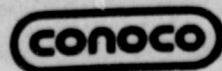

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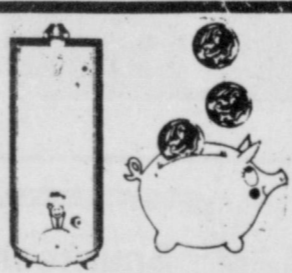
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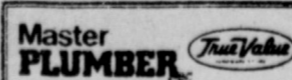
