Hawks Close Season With Loss to Archer City Wildcats, 6-12

The Iowa Park Hawks failed to regain possession of the "Little Brown Jug" which goes to the winner of the annual Archer City—Iowa Park football game, played last Friday at the Archer City athletic field.

In the first half, the Wildcats and the Hawks battled furiously between the two 35-yard lines. Archer City seemed to have the most luck at ramming the line, while Iowa Park had a definite edge in passing and kept the Wildcats deep in their own territory with long booming punts off the toe of Robert Nolen. Iowa Park completed three of four passes and rushed to four first downs. Archer City completed no passes, throwing two. They rushed to five first down. Archer City was forced to kick six times. Iowa Park kicked four times. Score at the half 0-0.

To begin the third quarter Knox kicked off for Archer City to Reneau, who took the ball on his goal line and returned to the 24, where he handed off to Huckaby who cut back to the left and behind blocks of Parish and Johnson outran all the Wildcats for the first touchdown of the game. The conversion attempt was blocked.

Iowa Park kicked off and Knox was spilled on the 26. Archer City moved 74 yards on four consecutive first downs in 11 plays. An attempt to pass the conversion failed and the third quarter ended 6-6.

In the early part of the fourth quarter Knox skirted Iowa Park's left end behind beautiful blocking by Bully Green for 27 yards and the winning score. Another pass attempt to point failed.

Iowa Park had one more chance to tie or win the game but the hard charging Archer City linemen put a quick stop to it. Williams had taken Nolen's kick and had returned to the 38 yard line when Eddie Watson, Iowa Park guard, hit him low and hard. He fumbled and the Hawks recovered. On the next play Iowa Park tried to pull a double reverse. Two big Archer City linemen crashed into Reneau just as he was trying to hand off to Huckaby and the pigskin squirted loose to be recovered by Stubbs of Archer City on the Iowa Park 42. The Wildcats retained control of the ball till the final whistle.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit:
After alleging jurisdiction, plaintiff further alleges that she and defendant were married on or about September 4th, 1946, and continued to live together as husband and wife until on or about the 14th day of January, A.D. 1950, when by rea-

son of the cruel, harsh and tyrannical treatment toward this plaintiff by the defendant without cause or provocation on the part of the plaintiff was of such nature as to render their further living together as insupportable; that there was one child born to this marriage.

Wherefore, plaintiff prays that defendant be cited by publication as required by law, to appear and answer this petition, and that on final hearing she have judgment for an absolute divorce and for the complete care, custody and control of the minor child.

If this citation is not served with-in ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned un-served.

The Officer executing this process, shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

We wish you all a pleasant season of Thanksgiving. There should be lots of news next week, so let's have it.

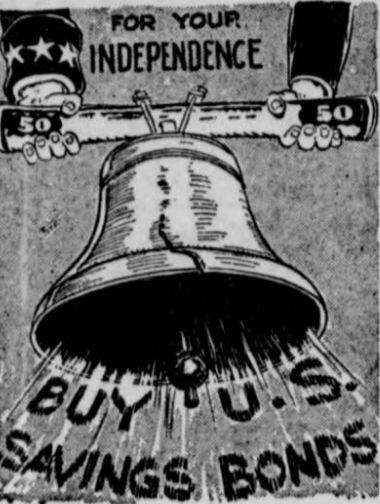
Lloyd Lowe was taken to the Clinic hospital this week by Tanner's ambulance service. He is confined with a severe attack of flu.

Agriculture Forecast Made by Local Boy As F.F.A. Study

A brief livestock survey has been conducted and reported by Amon White, vocational agriculture student in the local high school. The boys are being encouraged by their instructor, J. K. Bradshaw, to do considerable study on the national and world agriculture picture. Information in this article came from the United States Department of Agriculture.

Poultry
It is anticipated that 60,500,000 pigs will be raised in the spring of 1951 which is less than 1 per cent increase over the number raised the spring of 1950.

It is estimated that farmers will raise a 1950 fall crop of 39,125,000 pigs, a 5 per cent increase over the number raised the previous fall. It is expected that the average slaughter weight of all hogs marketed in the 1950-51 feeding year will be 240 pounds, which is about the same as the preceding year.

Eggs
It is estimated that 1951 poultry production, excepting commercial broilers, will show a moderate reduction.

Layers on farms January 1 are expected to be 430 million, or 2.8 per cent less than the January 1, 1950, total.

The number of young chickens raised for flock replacements are expected to total 650 million as compared with 670 million a year previous. This would represent a reduction of 3 per cent.

In contrast to the above trend, commercial broiler production is expected to reach 585 million. This is an increase of 6:3 over the estimated 1950 production of 550 million.

Turkey production is expected to total 42,300,000, a decrease of 5 per cent from the all-time record crop of 44,550,000 produced in 1950. Likewise the number of breeding turkeys is expected to decline to 3,750,000 to allow for adjustment to a smaller crop.

Dairy Cattle
Dairy cow numbers leveled off in 1950 and there is not likely to be any substantial change in 1951. It is estimated that the average number of cows milked will be 22,800,000. Numbers of heifers being raised for replacements show an increase; but with favorable beef prices, rates of culling cows are expected to be somewhat higher than in 1950.

Because of this higher rate of culling and with more favorable milk-feed price ratios in some fluid milk areas, it is estimated that milk production per cow will be slightly higher in 1951. With an estimated total production of 121 billion pounds in 1951, an increase of 1/2 of 1 per cent over 1950, this will amount to an average production per cow of approximately 5,300 lbs.

Sheep and Lambs
It is expected that sheep numbers will increase very slightly following rather drastic reductions for several years. Greatest expansion is expected in the farm flock states and in the irrigated areas. If good grazing conditions continue in the range area and with the retention of more ewe lambs for replacement purposes, fewer lambs will be available for feeding.

Horses and Mules
Further reduction in horse and mule numbers is anticipated, but it is expected that the future rate of decline will be less rapid because of the sizable number of horses that will be retained for recreation and sport, and for cowhorses in the West.

Beef Cattle
It is estimated that beef cattle numbers will continue to increase, with cows kept to slightly older ages and more replacement heifers added. Greatest expansion in beef production is expected in the South and Southeast. With the retention of more animals for breeding purposes, proportionately fewer feeder cattle will be available. Higher feeder prices with ample feed supplies will result in greater demand for younger feeder cattle which will be fed longer, and greater demand for the lower grades of cattle.

George Pybuses Back In Cleaning Shop After Year Layoff

Mr. and Mrs. George V. Pybus returned to the cleaning business in their former location on November 1 after having the shop leased out for a year. The Pybuses have been in Iowa Park 14 years, most of which time has been spent in the cleaning business.

They plan soon to install a great deal of new modern equipment and have secured the services of B. C. Coleman to help in the operation of the machinery. He has come here from Bowie and is a member of the Methodist church.

ORDINANCE NO. 259

State of Texas
County of Wichita
City of Iowa Park.

1. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, in regular session assembled on this the 20th day of November, A.D. 1950, that the City of Iowa Park Police Commissioner is hereby fully authorized and empowered to place, and have erected, stop signs at such places and street intersections within the corporate limits of the city of Iowa Park as said City Police Commissioner may deem necessary to carry out the provisions of the laws of the State of Texas, for the safety of pedestrians, and other persons using the streets and highways within the corporate limits of the City of Iowa Park.

2. Be it further ordained that any person operating a motor vehicle upon any of the streets within the corporate limits of the City of Iowa Park shall, upon approaching any intersection where there is a stop sign erected, come to a full stop at least ten (10) feet back of the line of such street intersection before proceeding to enter such street intersection.

Be it further ordained that any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$5.00, nor more than \$50.00, for each separate offense.

This ordinance shall become effective after its passage and publication, as required by law.

Approved by unanimous vote of the City Council in regular session on this the 20th day of November, A.D. 1950.

The next meeting will be the first Monday in December.

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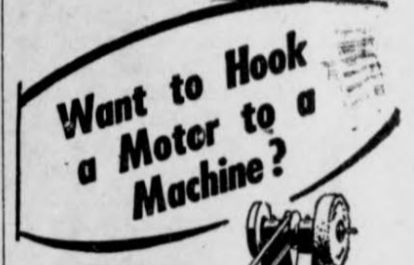
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Methodist Juniors Given Party

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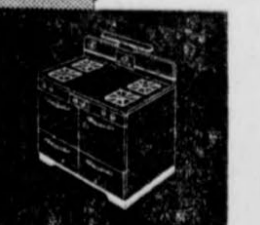
