Improved Hawk Team Falls Before Nocona Indians, Score 13-7

Gene Parish, 190-lb. guard, was shifted to the Iowa Park Hawks' backfield during the last half of Friday's game with the Nocona Indians and spearheaded a 60-yard drive to score in the third quarter.

The ground attack started on the Hawks' own 40 and ended when Parish drove over left tackle for the second Iowa Park counter of the 1950 season. Parish ended the evening's scoring when he kicked the extra point with Leroy Weiss holding.

The Indians did their scoring in the third period also, when they fought their way over the ground for two counters and one conversion, to defeat the much improved local eleven 13-7.

By dropkicking squarely between the goal posts, Paul Cable, right half for the Indians, carried football fans' memories back several years, when it was common practice to use the dropkick in trying for field goals or extra points after touchdowns.

Right side of the starting lineup for the Hawks was outstanding on defense, Kenneth Munden, right end, led the charging right side with Thomas Johnson, right tackle, closing in to get his share of tackles along with other team members.

Both teams were evenly matched, according to statistics.

The local eleven dedicated their night's efforts to their two coaches, and their keyed-up determination almost paid off in the winning column when Robert Nolen's pass to Munden was ruled complete on the one-yard line, due to pass interference.

Jamie Jameson, right guard, and James Bowerman, center for the visiting Indians, proved to be hazardous for Hawk ball carriers.

Allen Byron, quarterback, and Donald Sewell, fullback, carried a large share of backfield offensive load for the winners. Byron scored on a sneak, plowing one yard for the first score, and Sewell went inside his own end and outside the Hawk secondary for 35 yards and the final goal for Nocona.

Coaches for Nocona are Ralph Porter and Ki Aldridge.

First Hawk conference game of the season will be on the local field, Friday, Sept. 22, when Burk Burnett Bulldogs clash with Coach Jeter's line-up.

FLUORINATION OF PUBLIC WATER SUPPLIES

After years of research by the dentists, up to this time, the only effective measure of controlling tooth decay to any appreciable degree has been a radical reduction of sugar and carbohydrate intake in the diet. To hope for a mass application of such a measure would be futile.

It is now strongly apparent that with all the accumulated evidence, the most potential approach to the control of dental caries is through fluorination of municipal water supplies.

There is an old adage, "You can lead a horse to water, but you can't make him drink." As for the children, by fluorination of their water supply, we can lead the horse to water and MAKE him drink!

SUMMING IT UP

It reaches every person in the community.

It requires only continuous residence in the community during the first ten years of life.

There is no individual expense.

The demonstrated reduction in decay rate is 60 to 70 per cent.

The reduced liability to decay continues to a high degree throughout life. The beneficial results are perpetual for all future generations so long as the proper fluorine level in the water is maintained.

It is safe and has no objectionable features.

THE COST IS SMALL

A recent estimate for fluorinating the water supply for Corpus Christi is 84¢ per capita per year. At the prevailing cost of sodium fluoride, about two pounds of the salt will treat 100,000 gallons of water for about 25¢.

Decisions regarding the fluorination of water supplies should be made on a local level and not on a national level.

Should we penalize our children by depriving them of the benefits of this therapy for another ten or twelve years, or longer, when it is assured that there are proved substantial benefits to be derived from it and that theoretically there is strong evidence of greater benefits with longer use of the fluorinated waters?

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Parish returned Sunday from Fort Worth to find their home completely gone as the result of a fire Sunday afternoon. Their children Paul, Dick and David had been left with Mrs. Mary Beggs and were of course safe.

Loss to the home, Unit No. 92 of the Wichita Valley Farms, has been estimated at \$9,000. Only items saved were a few pieces of children's clothing.

Avery Hooten discovered the fire at 3:30. Volunteer firemen from Iowa Park came as soon as they were notified, but too late to save the house. Only the south wall and part of the west wall remained when the flames were extinguished.

For the recitation of marriage lines the couple stood before the fireplace in the living room, which was filled with greenery. The mantle was decorated with white gladioli and stock and swags of mimosa fern and ivy, which were caught up with satin bows as they descended from the mantle's edge. White cathedral candles burning in seven-branched candelabra were used as effective flanking completions to the setting.

Providing music for the occasion were Mrs. Joe Chandler, vocalist, and Mrs. R. A. Tanner, pianist. Dr. Simpson Making Earnest Effort to Add Fluorine to Water

Dr. C. J. Simpson made an earnest appeal to members of the Iowa Park Lions club this week that his members support him in his effort to obtain for Our Town the necessary equipment for adding fluorine to the city water.

He began by tracing the history of research which has led the dental profession to advocate this decay preventive measure. Back in 1906, he said, it was noticed that school children of Deaf county had mottled enamel on their teeth to a noticeable degree. Examination disclosed that 65 per cent of the children were free from tooth decay. It was discovered that the water they had been raised on contained an excessive amount of fluorine, resulting in the mottled enamel and, more important, the absence of tooth decay.

Dr. Simpson told the Lions that there were not enough dentists in the world to examine all the teeth in the world, to say nothing of treating defective teeth. The dental schools are unable to turn out dentists in sufficient quantity to keep up with tooth ailments. The dentists are interested in this new and inexpensive method of relieving suffering from oral defects.

Dr. Simpson has given this subject a great amount of study and has found that the equipment needed by Iowa Park will cost about \$600. Supplies will cost about \$1 for 400,000 gallons of water, making the cost insignificant in comparison to the benefits.

The speaker stressed the need of building good teeth in children up to eight years of age. After that, the dental researchers say little can be done to prevent tooth failure.

The executive committee of Lions club will meet Thursday evening with President Scott Ralston to investigate Dr. Simpson's project and make recommendations to the club.

Program for the day was presented by O. R. Kelly. He introduced A. R. Bradshaw, vocational agriculture teacher in Iowa Park High School, who gave Lions a comprehensive outline of the work he proposes to do here with students interested in agriculture and shop.

Frank Cripplinger, visiting Lion from Wichita Falls, congratulated the local organization on having such public spirited men as Dr. Simpson, who is advocating a measure that will eventually take work away from his profession.

W. A. George was elected chairman of the Community Chest drive which is tentatively scheduled for October 17, at a meeting of representatives from several of the town's organizations held in the director's room of the State National Bank, Friday morning. Sam Hill, representing the Lions club, was in charge of the meeting. Others present were Mrs. Gordon G. Clark and Mrs. Homer Blalock, Iowa Park Council of Church Women; T. J. Pace and R. A. Tanner, Chamber of Commerce; F. E. Hill, Camp Fire girls; and Rev. M. C. Yeagan, Lions club.

Mr. George served as chairman of the drive last year and organized such an efficient working system that the drive exceeded the goal that had been set. At present he is selecting his captains, who will then choose their lieutenants. The names of these will probably be announced next week.

The four projects which benefit by the money received from the drive are Boy Scouts, Camp Fire girls, summer recreation program and welfare needs.

The Boy Scout budget is similar to the Camp Fire expenditures.

The value of the summer recreation program has been proved innumerable times during the four years of the project; and the funds for carrying on the programs are chiefly derived from the Community Chest drive.

Defendants, Greeting: You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable 78th District Court of Wichita County at the Court House thereof, in Wichita Falls, Texas, at or before 10 o'clock a.m. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 16th day of October, A.D. 1950, then and there to answer Plaintiff's Petition filed in said Court on the 29th day of August, A.D. 1950, in this cause, numbered 47708-B on the

docket of said court and styled S. T. Buzzard, Plaintiff vs. All of those persons first named in this writ and to whom the same is directed. A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit: This is a trespass to try title suit wherein plaintiff alleges that on or about August 15, 1950, he was and still is the owner in fee simple of the following described lands and premises, situated in Wichita County, Texas, to-wit: All of Lots 1, 2 and 3 in Block lettered "Y" of the Original Townsite of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas.

That on the day and year aforesaid defendants unlawfully entered upon and dispossessed plaintiff of such premises and withhold from him the possession thereof to plaintiff's damage of \$100.00. Plaintiff further alleges the ten year Statute of Limitations; that plaintiff and those under whom he claims by mesne conveyances and those whose title he holds have had peaceable possession of the property above described, cultivating, using, paying taxes and enjoying the same, for more than ten years preceding the filing of this petition, claiming under deed or deeds duly registered purporting to convey such lands and tenements, such lands and tenements have been actually enclosed and that plaintiff and his predecessors in title have claimed the same openly, adversely and notoriously as owners during said period aforesaid. Wherefore plaintiff prays that citation issue and that on final hearing he have judgment for title and possession of the above described premises, for his damages, for costs of suit and for such other and further relief as he may be entitled to, either in law or in equity.
