Mr. Tate plans to accept a similar position with the Hale Center Schools.

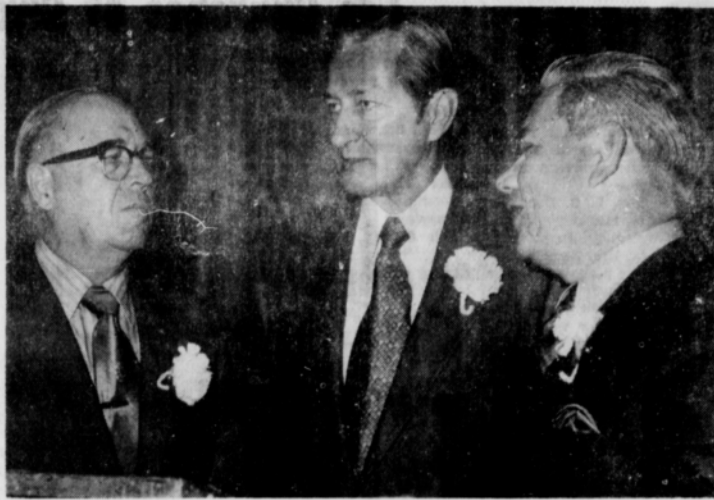
Prior to coming to Baird, Mr. Tate had been High School Principal at Albany for three years. He assumed his duties as Baird School Administrator on July 1, 1968, replacing L. B. Howard, who had held this position for nine years.

Tate is a native of Crystal City in Southwest Texas. He graduated from Crystal City High School and received his BS degree in Science in 1956 from Sul Ross in Alpine. He has a Master of Education from ACC.

He taught three years at Eastland and a total of six years at Clyde, prior to his 3 years in Albany. In Clyde, he was Jr. High Principal and football coach. He is married to the former Joann Durham and they have on son, Jon, Jr. They are members of the First Baptist Church.

This reporter talked to Mr. Tate and he remarked that after many hours of deep thought and discussions, he and his wife decided to make the move to Hale Center. He said "it was not an easy decision by any means - but there are certain things one must do."

Mr. Tate said he has enjoyed working with the fine teachers and all the other fine people in Baird.

CLYDE — Pupil transfer policies for the 1971-72 school year have been established by the Board of Clyde Public Schools. This policy will remain the same as the 70-71 school year.

Pupils from school districts joining the Clyde district may transfer on an individual approval basis with no tuition charges so long as the district of residence does not charge tuition for students transferring to that district from Clyde.

Forms for application transfers are available in the office of the Superintendent, and must be picked up in person. Deadline for completing the application for transfer is June 1st. No exceptions to this deadline will be made unless there is a case of extreme hardship.

Brightwell was also honored as a Life Member of Mesquite District.

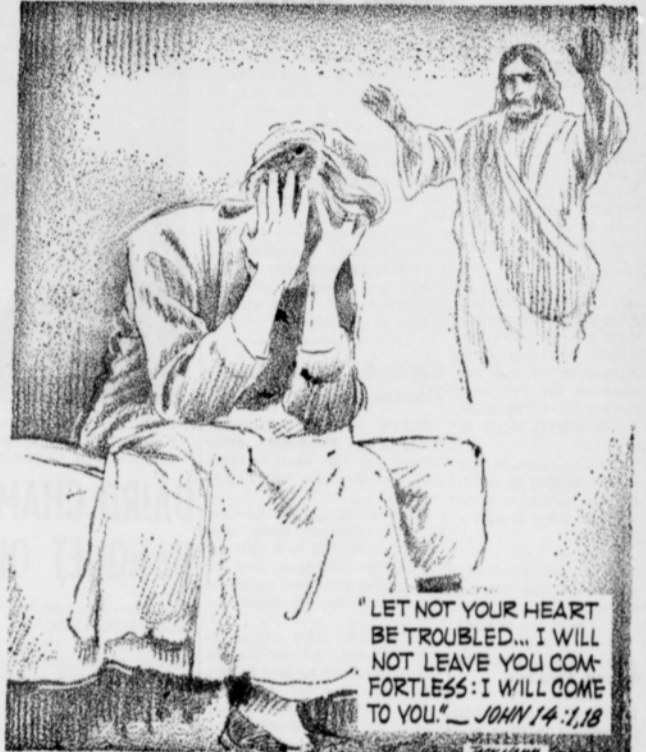

Social Security Benefits Increased

A 10 per cent increase in social security benefits has recently been passed by both houses of Congress and was signed into law by the President on March 17th, and made retroactive to January 1st.

The first check including the increased payment will be received by some 26 million people who are eligible under the Social Security Law around June 4th, and will be for the month of May.

Later in June, each beneficiary will receive a check to cover the 10 per cent increase for the months of January through April, amounting to 40 per cent of the monthly check now being received.

Persons who are 72 years or older who do not qualify for regular Social Security benefits will receive a raise of 5 per cent. Their monthly payments will be increased from \$46.00 to \$48.30 for an individual and from \$69.00 to \$72.50 for a couple.

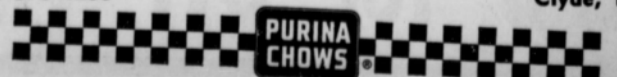
