Town without an auto dealership

As of Monday morning, Iowa Park will be one of the largest cities in the state without a new car dealership.

Herb Easley Chevrolet will be merged with the former George Davis Chevrolet in Wichita Falls, and Park Ford officially closed its doors the first of the year.

The economy of the community is expected to be felt by the closings.

Besides the loss of more than 30 salaries and sales tax, the two businesses paid \$40,260 in personal property taxes to the city and school in 1990.

On an inventory of \$1,282,850, Park Ford paid the school \$12,315 and city \$10,262. The Chevrolet dealer's inventory of \$1,004,770 produced \$9,645 in

taxes for the school a \$8,038 to the city, according to tax records.

The loss to the school district is almost equal to one-cent on the tax rate.

Easley had purchased Bob Ritchie Chevrolet here only a few months earlier, and recently announced the purchase of the larger dealership in Wichita Falls.

After Park Ford's closing by Leon Stevenson, who said he was buying a dealership in the East Texas city of Henderson, Easley was reportedly attempting to acquire the Ford franchise here.

The intention was to construct one large facility at Bell and US 287, where the Chevrolet dealership is located, and

combine the two major brand sales at the one location.

However, Norman Hodges, who was a partner with Bob Ritchie and currently a salesman for Easley, said that site would be void of vehicles as of Monday morning.

While the closings were unexpected locally, they apparently were not on the national scene.

According to an article in Sunday's Dallas Morning News, 1,200 of the nation's 23,000 dealerships were closed during 1990, and an additional 2,000 closings are anticipated this year. David Power, an automotive consultant in Agoura Hills, Calif. was quoted on those figures.

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Streets due attention

City aldermen Monday night said they want to do as much street work this summer as money permits.

After viewing a list of streets determined by the public works department as being in the greatest need of attention, Mayor Wayne House warned that there likely would not be enough money to take care of all the list.

He pointed out \$155,000 was budgeted for streets this year, but part of that had already been spent or allocated with a project on Valley Drive and purchases of a truck and slurry applying equipment.

Monies allocated for street work come from sales tax receipts.

In addition to approving the proposed list of asphalt surfaces in need of slurry applications, aldermen also agreed to the need of rebuilding the 800 block of Vogel with concrete, because it was

beyond repair.

Public Works Director Mike Price told the council the list included "only" 57 blocks, but explained the square feet was actually like 91 blocks, due to the extra length of some blocks.

The mayor warned against over spending the budget, saying, "I want to meet payroll in September."

Alderman Virgil Woodfin's motion, "Go as far as we can, including Vogel, and shut off when we run out of money," was unanimously approved.

Part of the street funds available was used to pay for the rebuilding of the Wall and Valley intersection with concrete, in an effort to alleviate flooding.

Because of an additional \$1,986 expense in the project, caused by rains that interfered with the work, the total cost of that project was \$22,903.50.

In other business, the council set

May 4 as the date for this year's election of three aldermen, approved by a split vote additional work at the Recreational Activities Center, and discussed two different issues concerning the Tom Burnett Memorial Library.

With terms expiring for aldermen Woodfin, Johnny Coker and Diane Robnett, filing of candidates will be opened Monday, Feb. 18, and close Mar. 20.

House proposed the city pay for the framing of three small meeting rooms and installation of their doors at the uncompleted RAC building.

The mayor broke a 2-2 tie on the proposal, after Woodfin and Robnett voted for the motion and Johnny Crawford and Charlie Helms voted against. Coker was absent.

Crawford stated, "I'm for getting work done but I think we're going about it in the wrong way. I would like to see it done in a more orderly basis."

The alderman has commented earlier he feels all the work should be completed by a general contractor.

House responded, "I agree the best way would be with a general contractor. This is piece meal. But when a contractor gets through, he wants his money, in a lump sum. But this way we do with what money we have."

Members of the RAC board were in the audience, and told the council they were in agreement with a contract proposed by House on the management and operation of the city-owned facility.

House asked Woodfin and Robnett to work along with David Collins of the public works department in coordinating work on the building with the RAC board.

House told the council JoLynn Cockrum, program coordinator for the library, was asking to be placed on a full time basis, rather than part time.

She has been offered full time employment in Wichita Falls, but would prefer to remain here if the change could be made.

Aldermen agreed with Robnett, however, that they felt there was not enough work for a second full-time employee at the library at this time.

Frances George, in a public appearance before the council, asked if the council would approve the lowering of a deposit fee charged for renting the library's meeting room.

She said the \$50 was more than some organizations could pay, even if it is refunded.

It was decided the library staff should review the fee and recommend whatever changes should be made, based

Trustees okay contracts; recalling coach applicant

Following an almost hour-long executive session Tuesday night, the Iowa Park school board approved one-year extensions for key personnel contracts, and to invite one of the finalists for the head coach position back for an additional meeting.

Contracts through 1993 were granted to Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, and principals of all four campuses, Richard Davis, Randy Lovelady, Kenneth Davis and Ron Woods.

The others receiving extensions hold one-year contracts, including: Dennis Brooks and Steve Moody, high school and junior high assistant principals; counselors Herman Escue, Pat Davis and LaRae Collins, and tax collector Allen Shewmake.

Trustees interviewed four of the eight coaching finalists Friday and the other four Monday.

The board instructed Supt. Glen Mitchell Tuesday to invite Lucky Gamble, currently head coach at Little Cypress/Mauriceville in Orange and formerly head coach at Springtown, to return for additional interviewing.

When asked if Gamble would be offered a contract upon his return, Supt. Mitchell responded, "The board is asking Gamble back, and at this time he is the only one we're asking back."

Finalists interviewed Friday were Ted Giddens of Canyon, Jim Amberson of Garland Lakeview Centennial, Bret Boyd of McKinney, and Gamble.

Monday's interviews were with Ron Steele of Wichita Falls, Mark Bateman of Electra, Chuck Curtis of Millsap, and Iowa Parkan Dean Kirkpatrick.

Each of the three counselors went over the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) test results for their respective campuses for the board.

Escue twice made the comment that the numbers not mastering the tests were "a manageable number we can work with."

He explained the remedial work used to overcome the shortcomings of those students who did not master all phases of the tests.

Concerning the "exit level" test, administered to eleventh grade students and on which mastery is mandated by the state in order to graduate, Escue stated, "We have not had a student not graduate because of not passing the exit level test."

Mrs. Davis, junior high counselor, said the earlier timing of the test, taken this year for the first time in October, gives the faculty an entire semester in which to work with students who did not master all test phases.

In the past, she pointed out, it was not until the following school year the faculty could do remedial work, because the test results were not available until late in the spring semester.

The board officially set May 4 as this year's school trustee election. The three members whose terms expire this year are John Sibley, Sherri Kennedy and Wendall House.

Filing of candidates can begin Feb. 18 at the school administration building.

Each of the principals reported on their campus improvement plans.

Probably the most significant plan

of change was that which came out of the high school committee, and reported by Richard Davis.

The change is in the classroom grading policy, which reevaluates the value of six weeks tests, and when those tests are administered.

The tentative policy states:

"In the absence of a scheduled six week exam, a cumulative, major, or unit test (or similar major project assignment) must be given at some point during the six week period. The test or project shall count 20 percent of the six week grade and the balance 80 percent shall be distributed as departmental policy. (No one test or assignment shall count more than 20 percent of the six week grade.)

"Grades are to be obtained weekly with a minimum of eight grades per six weeks. Teachers are encouraged to have as many grades as possible.

"Semester tests will count 1/7 of the semester grade.

"When a written composition is assigned there shall be more than one grade assigned to the composition. A written composition grading policy will be developed by each department or subject that requires a written composition."

Trustees rejected the only bid received on the proposed sale of a vacant house lot, stating the bid was too low, based on the assessed value.

Norma shares some of her favorite recipes with our readers. The first is one Mrs. O.N. Newman shared with Norma.

Sweet and Sour Meatballs

(Ideal for party food)
3 pounds seasoned ground beef
Sauce:
1 jar (18 oz.) grape jelly
2 bottles (12 oz. each) chili sauce
2 Tbsp. lemon juice
2 oz. (8 slices) pumpernickle bread, crumbled with crust removed
Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
Prepare ground meat into meatballs using favorite recipe. Form into cocktail size balls, (approximately one teaspoon each.) Place in large pan. Makes 170 meatballs.

In a large saucepan, combine remaining ingredients and bring to a boil. Boil five minutes. Pour sauce over the meatballs. Bake covered in oven 50 or 60 minutes or until meatballs are cooked and sauce bubbles.

NOTE: Ground meat can be prepared as follows: remove crust from three slices bread; pour one-half cup milk over bread and let soak for 10 minutes. Combine bread, milk, ground meat, one-half tsp. salt, one-half tsp. pepper, one-half grated onion and two tsp. chopped parsley (if desired) and mix well.

Rice Pilaf

Cook two-thirds cup long grain rice.

Saute 3 Tbsp. chopped onion in 2 Tbsp. butter.

In another pan simmer 2 and one-half cups tomatoes, one-third tsp. salt; one-fourth tsp. paprika, one-half bay leaf and three celery stalks, with leaves.

Cook until thick and remove bay leaf and celery. One cup cooked meat may be added.

Combine tomato mixture with rice in a greased baking dish. Top with one-fourth cup grated cheese and bread crumbs. Brown under broiler. Season with Louisiana hot sauce.

Jan's English Toffee

1 c. pecans
1 lb. butter (not margarine)
2 c. sugar
Plain Hershey Chocolate for topping
Grease a large flat pan and sprinkle pecans over entire pan. Melt butter in heavy skillet add sugar gradually, stirring constantly with a wooden spoon. At first the butter will be on the bottom and then will mix and look like thick gravy (white) then separate again and start to turn a light brown. When it goes together again it is done.

Pour immediately over the pecans. Melt the chocolate over hot water and spread on top of candy. When cold break into pieces with small mallet.

New Orleans Pralines

2 c. sugar
one-half c. brown sugar
1 c. water
1 Tbsp. butter
1 c. nut meats

Combine sugar and water and stir over low heat until dissolved. Boil to 235 degrees or until soft balls form when syrup is tried in cold water. Add butter and nut meats and boil to 245 degrees or until a firm ball will form when tried in cold water. Remove from heat and stir until syrup begins to sugar. Drop quickly by spoonfuls onto a greased surface.

Mexican Squash Casserole

2 lbs. yellow squash
1 green onion
one-half stick butter
1 c. grated cheese
3 eggs (beaten)
2 c. cracker crumbs
1 small can milk
1 small can green chilies
1 small jar pimientos
salt and pepper to taste

Wash squash, slice thin and partially cover with water. Add chopped green onion (tops too) and cook for 15 minutes. Drain well. Add butter, grated cheese and eggs. While squash is cooking, pour canned milk over cracker crumbs. When soft, add to squash mixture. Then add chopped green chilies and pimiento, salt and pepper.

Pour into casserole dish and cover with grated cheese. Cover with foil and bake 45 minutes at 325 to 350 degrees.

Broccoli/Cauliflower Marinade

4 c. fresh broccoli flowerettes
4 c. fresh cauliflower flowerettes
three-fourths c. reconstituted lemon juice
three-fourths c. vegetable oil
3 Tbsp. sugar
1 Tbsp. salt
1 one-half tsp. oregano or may substitute tarragon
one-half tsp. pepper
chopped pimiento, toasted sesame seeds (optional)

Combine ingredients; pour over vegetables. Refrigerate six hours or overnight.



Active Parenting Program to begin

Iowa Park CISD will present an Active Parenting Program for parents of Iowa Park in a four-night series.

Beginning Thursday, Feb. 21, the series will continue each Thursday evening through March 14.

The program is designed to improve parenting skills, according to Colleen Roberts, parent involvement coordinator.

Two 30-minute videos, dealing with advice to parents on drug prevention in children will be shown each night at 7 p.m. in the high school auditorium. There is no admission charge.

Mrs. Roberts, who retired last year as junior high counselor, said a counselor will be present each night and all four counselors will be in attendance the final night.

First of the series will be "The Active Parent" and "Developing Responsibility: Discipline." The elementary school counselor, LaRae Collins, will be present for this meeting.

"Winning Cooperation: Communication," and "Instilling Courage: Encouragement," will be shown Feb. 28. Pat Davis, junior high school counselor, will attend this meeting.

Title of the March 7 program will be "Understanding Children" and "The Democratic Family in Action," with Herman Escue, high school counselor, in attendance.

The final program March 14 will be "Say NO! to Drugs" and "Sons and Daughters: Drugs and Booze," with all of counselors and Mrs. Roberts present.

"Say NO! To Drugs" is a 45-minute film that offers solid advice

and techniques you can use to teach children the truth about drugs and alcohol.

"Sons and Daughters: Drugs and Booze" a 28-minute film, uses scenes from everyday life. This film offers realistic, pragmatic advice to parents whose children may begin or have already begun to use alcohol or other drugs. The parent's role in prevention is also explained and reinforced.

These meetings will give parents opportunity to meet the counselors who work with their children. Letters will be sent home by students as a reminder to parents of the Active Parenting Program.

Premise of the innovative programs of Dr. Michael H. Popkin is that it takes skill to help children survive and thrive in a world of challenges and choices, and like any important job, parenting deserves training.

The program combines parenting philosophy with state-of-the-art videos presented in a structure that is easy to understand. It also provides parents with practical tools to bring the family together.

Parents learn how to prepare their kids for life in the democratic society of today, by helping them develop the qualities of responsibility, cooperation, courage and self-esteem.

These are major factors in preventing and combating drug and alcohol use, eating disorders and irre-

sponsible sexual activity in the teen and pre-teen years.

There are encouragement skills to develop courage; discipline skills to teach the consequences of choice; communication techniques to help

develop responsibility, and communication skills to promote cooperation.

Parents are encouraged to attend this series, especially on the night the film concerns your age child.

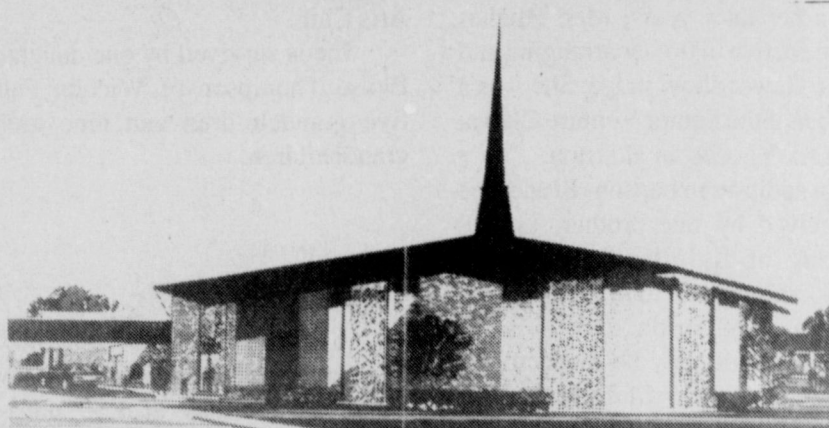

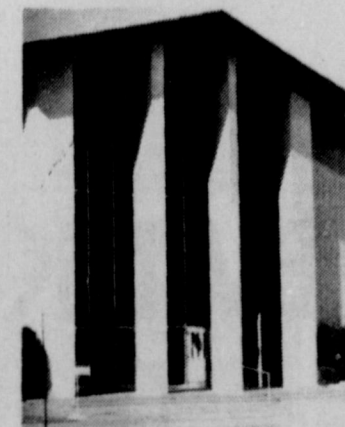

HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN - Some may picture Gov. Ann Richards as the "Annie Oakley" of Texas politics, but her tough talking last week makes her more like a saloon-clearing Dodge City marshal.

Speaking to a joint session of the Texas Legislature, Gov. Richards told representatives, senators, lobbyists and polluters to clean up their act, but it could have been worse.

She told two State Board of Insurance commissioners to get out of town by next week, as she tried to hand them their pink slips, while the entire state watched.

Some openly resisted her public arm-twisting, especially the two targeted commissioners, chairman James Saxton and Richard Reynolds, two appointees of Gov. Bill Clements.

Mouth, Muscle and Mandate

Without question, her's was the toughest talking State of the State speech in recent memory, and many of the new guard Democrats loved it.

Lots of pocketbooks on Main Street loved it, too, for Richards has uncovered a popular gripe: roughshod treatment by insurance companies.

But the old guard lawmakers, lobbyists and power-players doubt whether she has the political muscle to back up her threat, which is to get the State Conservatorship Board to take over the insurance board.

In fact, one senator said she doesn't have the mandate she thinks she has, since she got less than 50 percent of the votes cast in November.

But, she got many last-minute votes by promising to make the insurance industry more responsive to consumers, and to rezone state government with a new breed of appointees.

Some reports indicate the governor plans to appoint Houston insurance agent Georgina Gonzales and former Texas Supreme Court Justice William Kilgarlin, lately the court-appointed master over the poor schools bail-out plan.

High Stakes Bluff?

Is this a high stakes bluff on her part, or does Richards have the face cards, the secret facts to drive out Saxton and Reynolds for poor management?

One thing is certain: she walked into the House chamber to shake things up, and they're still straightening the pictures on the walls.

The governor may be the only woman in the top echelons, but when it comes to bravery, she tops them all.

School Funding Plan

The crisis at hand, though, is not the insurance industry, but the challenge to adopt a new school funding plan before a court-ordered deadline.

Unable to get the votes for a new statewide property tax, Sen. Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, filed a compromise plan which would take local taxes over a certain rate from rich districts and share them with poor districts.

Without a constitutional amendment, which is much harder to pass, the dollars would be shared among 20 large taxing districts drawn statewide.

Education Commissioner

After a nationwide search, the State Board of Education recommended that Gov. Richards appoint Lionel "Skip" Meno to be the new education commissioner, replacing Bill Kirby, who retired Jan. 31.

Meno, 43, is the deputy commissioner for elementary and secondary education in New York.

The governor's initial comments were favorable. "Everything I have heard about Mr. Meno would suggest he fits our needs to a T."

"In general, I want someone who's not afraid of change. I want someone who understands that excellence can be measured by something other than a test... and I want someone who is not afraid of sharing power," Richards said.

Until Meno receives the governor's official approval, and is confirmed by the Senate, Tom Anderson, the number two man at the Texas Education Agency, will serve as the interim commissioner.

Speaker Lewis Update

The attorney for beleaguered Speaker Gib Lewis updated Lewis' version of an alleged unreported loan from a lobbyist:

Lewis sold his part-interest in an Austin condo to Purchasing and General Services Commission director Bubba Steen, who with lobbyist Dean Cobb lost it to foreclosure in 1988.

That equity, plus a \$5,000 check from Lewis to Cobb, bought Cobb's share of a ranch they co-owned.

According to the attorney, the promissory note indicating a loan to Lewis from Cobb never was really a loan.

Other Highlights

■ Comptroller John Sharp says his crackdown on delinquent taxpayers doesn't include Speaker Lewis because taxes owed by the Fort Worth businessman's two companies technically are not delinquent.

But Lewis, who was treasurer of Sharp's campaign last year, will be treated the same as everybody else once an administrative process known as redetermination is complete, said a Sharp spokesman.

■ Newly appointed Texas Railroad Commissioner Lena Guerrero told independent oilmen she will push a state energy policy, and asked them to be patient with her while she learns the energy business.

■ According to the latest census reports, combined minorities are now majorities in Houston and Dallas.

Chamber to sponsor golf event

When Joe Hughes was installed last month as the organization's new president, he said the Chamber would initiate several new projects.

His proposal for the tournament was approved Monday during the Chamber's monthly board of directors' meeting.

Robert Palmer and Bob Hamilton were named chairmen to finalize the tournament details.

During a discussion concerning the annual banquet, complaints concerning the quality of food served by the MuleSkinners were expressed.

Hughes said he and Palmer would meet with officers of the MuleSkinners to discuss the alleged problem and see if it would be avoided in the future.

Former president Harold Smith completed Chamber Secretary Susan Dillard for the banquet's decorations.

Hughes announced the 23 Study Club was offering to donate a tree to be planted on the Chamber grounds.

No action was taken on a proposal by a representative of Banker's Publishing of Oklahoma City to sponsor the sales and publication of a community information guide.

Directors will make a decision on the proposal at next month's meeting.

Finnell opposes proposal

Rep. Charles Finnell last week announced his opposition to the current school funding proposal which he said would limit the ability of local school boards to manage themselves.

Proposed by Sen. Carl Parker of Port Arthur, Senate Bill 111 would replace local property taxes for schools with a state-wide ad valorem tax set at \$1 per \$100 of assessed valuation.

If passed by the house and senate, a state-wide property tax would still require approval of a constitutional amendment by the voters.

The Holliday legislator said the Parker plan would not be in the best

interest of the 31 local school boards in his district.

"I just believe this bill, as introduced, is not the answer to the state's school financing dilemma," Finnell said.

"Instead, our citizens would simply be denied of any remaining local management of their school systems."

Lawmakers have been struggling to find a new financing method since the Texas supreme court in January declared the current funding system unconstitutional.

Legislators have until April 1 to come up with a more equitable system of funding education.

"Obviously, it is imperative that we find a plan that is not only more equitable, but also would not deny an element of local control of the public education system," Finnell said.

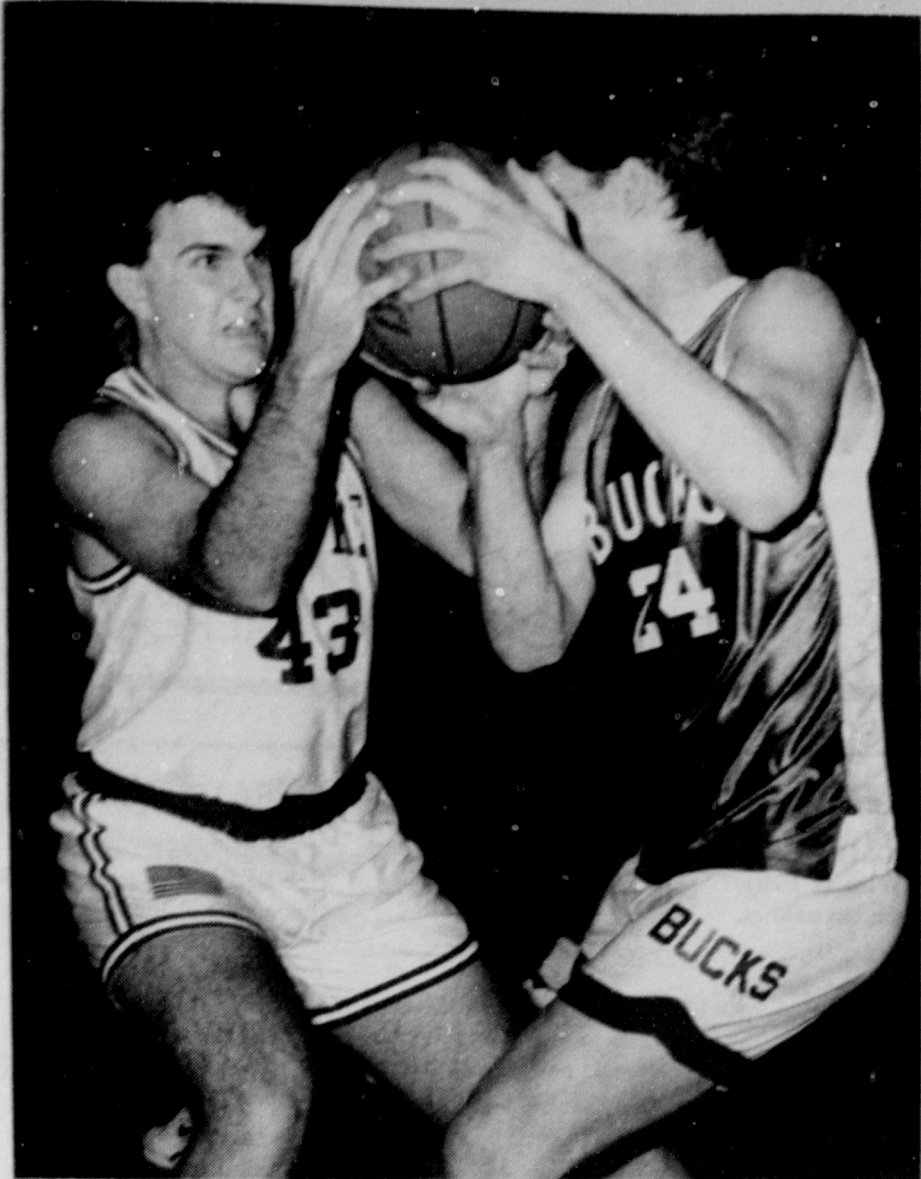

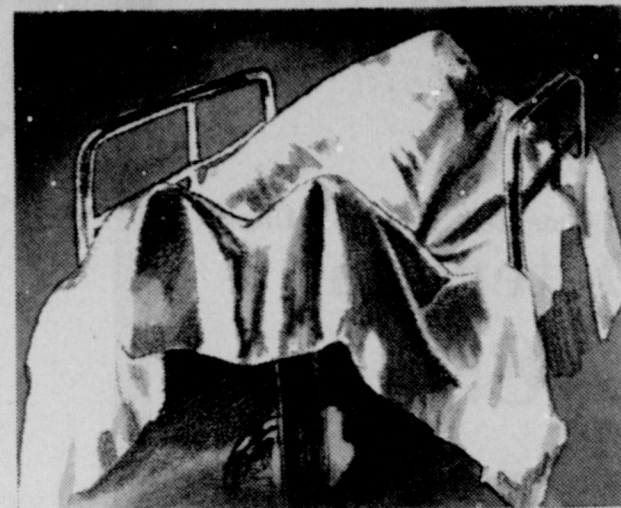

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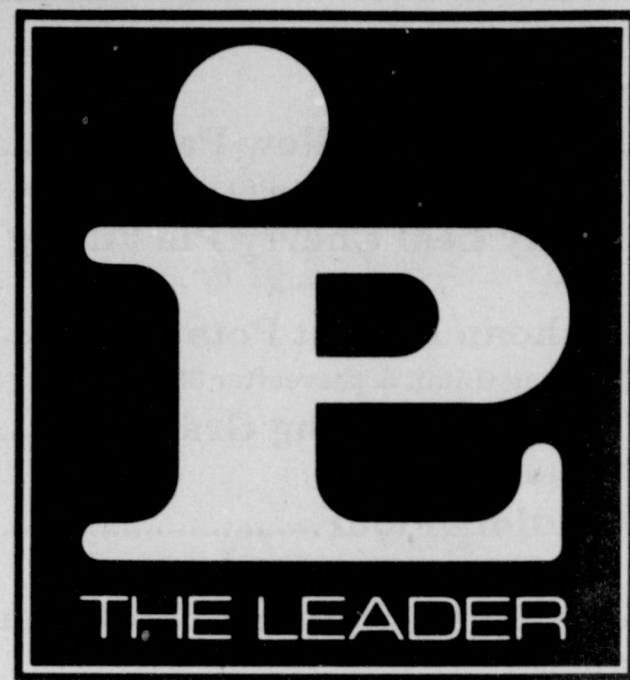
