

## Trustees hire Lucky Gamble as head coach

The waiting, the guessing and the rumors were all ended Monday afternoon, when Iowa Park school trustees named a new head football coach and athletic director.

He is Lucky Gamble, currently head coach at Little Cypress/Mauriceville in Orange, but better known locally as the former coach at Springtown.

Gamble, who is to begin work here Mar. 11, succeeds Len Williams, who resigned after coaching his third football season here.

According to the motion made at the called meeting Monday, Gamble's contract extends through June 10, 1993. His annual salary, based on 202 days, is set at \$42,500.

Gamble is also to receive a \$100 monthly in-district travel expense, and \$2,500 in moving expenses.

His pay for the balance of the 1990-91 school year will be prorated over the actual days employed, based on the \$42,500 annual salary.

Gamble was selected from among seven other finalists who were interviewed two weeks ago, including Dean Kirkpatrick of Iowa Park, Chuck Curtis of Milsap, Mark Bateman of Electra, Ron Steele of Wichita Falls, Bret Boyd of McKinney, Jim Amberson of Garland, and Ted Giggins of Canyon.

He is to bring at least two assistants with him, but there apparently could be more, depending on his interviews with the existing staff.

When asked Monday if he had talked with any of the coaching staff, he responded, "No. It would not have been proper for me to talk with any of them until after I'm hired."

Gamble would also not say what other sports those he intended to bring coached, because the interviews with the existing staff members would have a bearing on that.

The vote of the board Monday was not unanimous in favor of Gamble. The lone dissenting vote was cast by Sherri Kennedy, who explained she would support the program under Gamble, but was sticking with her earlier commitment.

She did not elaborate. All discussions about coaching candidates were held in closed board sessions. However, rumors are that she has steadfastly supported Kirkpatrick.

Also elaborating on the voting, Denny McCarthy said he was voting for hiring Gamble, but objected to the amount of money involved in the contract.

Most Hawk fans remember the four-game series Iowa Park had with Springtown, 1984-87, because they were so close and competitive.

Gamble's Porcupines won the first two games, during the two years Springtown and Iowa Park were in the same district.

The third game, 1986 IPHS homecoming, ended in a 14-14 tie.

And the fourth contest, won by Iowa Park, was decided on a last-minute pass play.

After all four games' scores were added up, there was a six-point difference.

During his six years at Springtown, Gamble's clubs amassed an inviolable record of 63-8-4, including one regional title and three area championships.

Born in the community of Chilton, Gamble was graduated from Waco High in 1968, and immediately entered Baylor Univ. on a football scholarship, playing all four seasons.

Upon graduation, he continued at the institution through 1974, earning his Master's Degree.

After serving as assistant at Highland, he was head coach there 1976-79, taking his club all the way to the state finals that last year.

His teams at Deweyville earned two district titles, and then he moved on to Lancaster, before his stint at Springtown.

He rates his current conference, 23-AAAA, as probably the toughest in the state for that classification. In his two years at Little Cypress, his clubs have had records of 5-4-1 and 5-5, respectively.

The 1990 team was standing at 5-1 when his leading back, who was leading the state in scoring at that point with 17 touchdowns, suffered a season-ending knee injury.

Gamble's teams have been in the state playoffs 13 of his 16-year career.

The new coach could not say Monday, when he would move his wife and their three children to Iowa Park.

## Gary Jones selected city administrator

Wichita County native Gary W. Jones was named city administrator Monday night by the Iowa Park city council.

Currently a resident of Burkburnett, Jones was born and raised in the Kamay, Kadane Corner area and was graduated from Valley View High School in 1953.

On Mar. 4, Jones will fill the vacancy created in January when James Barrington accepted a similar position at Neptune Beach, Fla. after eight years here.

The council narrowed a field of more than 60 applicants to 10, and held interviews over the weekend with the

finalists.

The decision on Jones was reached during a two-hour executive session of a called meeting Monday.

As to salary and other benefits, Mayor Wayne House said "there are some things to be worked out; no salary agreement yet."

Jones, whose father is W.G. Jones, a retired oilfield contractor, is currently a project coordinator and inspector for the firm of Corlett, Probst and Boyd, Inc.

Following graduation from Valley View, Jones entered the U.S. Army as a private, and 25 years later retired at the rank of major.

Since leaving the military, he was city manager of Electra, 1981-83; production control chief of Absolute Computer Co. in Austin, 1984-85; city administrator of Holliday, 1984-85; and project coordinator and inspector for Biggs and Mathews Engineering Firm, 1985-90.

In 1975 he earned his Bachelor of Science Degree at Embry Riddle Aeronautical Univ. He also had extensive training during his military career in leadership and management.

During his five years with Biggs and Mathews, his responsibilities included: construction and start-up of a 16-million gallon a day water purification plant for Wichita Falls; renovation of a water plant; construction of two five-gallon concrete ground storage tanks; renovation and new construction of pump stations, lift stations and overhead water towers, and installation of water and sewer lines.

Mr. and Mrs. Jones have two adult children. He lists golf, flying and fishing as his favorite activities.

He is a past adult leader with Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts and Little League, and is a current member of the Association of the U.S. Army and Army Aviation Association of America.

As to the recent decision of the city council that requires the administrator and other key personnel to reside inside the city limits, Jones said he would immediately offer his Burkburnett home for sale, and move as soon as possible.

If the home does not sell within the prescribed time period set by the council, he said he would lease his home.

In his letter of application, Jones wrote, "The operations of day-to-day city business, budgets, administration, master plans, etc., will be equal to and in most cases exceed any applicant that may apply with a master degree in public administration and years of experience. My past record will prove this. Electra, Texas was on the verge of bankruptcy. In one year the City was in the black."

## Pastor called to military duty

Rev. Mike Grubbs, minister of First Christian Church for the past five years, announced his resignation Sunday morning to his congregation.

Rev. Grubbs, who has been in the U.S. Air Force Reserve eight years, has received orders to report for active duty assignment at Sheppard Air Force Base March 5.

His assignment will be for one year duty as a protestant chaplain, but until he reports for duty he will not know where he will be serving.

Grubbs hopes his assignment will be for SAFB, because he hates to leave this area. Since he has been in Iowa Park he has been doing reserve work as a chaplain at Sheppard.

He received his initial training at Maxwell AFB in Montgomery, Al., and Lackland AFB at San Antonio.

Working with the Air Force as a chaplain is a shared ministry concept, in providing for the spiritual welfare of the military. It is task oriented, rather than unit oriented as it is in other branches of the service, he said.

The area minister, Dr. Fred Gee, will meet with the First Christian Church board Feb. 28 when they will discuss an interim minister. Dr. Gee will make recommendations at that time from screened applicants. The board and congregation makes the final decision on the full time minister.

Since Rev. Grubbs came to Iowa

Park he has been active in community and civic work. He is Rotary Club president, has twice served as president of the Iowa Park Ministerial Alliance, has been active on the Recreational Activity Center Board, is a Master Mason and has been Worshipful Patron of the Iowa Park Order of Eastern Star.

## Burglaries, arrests reported by police

## News Briefs

### Only one candidate has filed

Only one candidate has filed for the May 4 school board election, and none for the city election that will be held the same day.

Sherri Kennedy has filed for re-election to Place Three on the school board.

John Sibley stated this week he would not seek re-election. Denny

McCarthy, whose term also expires this spring, has not indicated his intentions.

None of the three current city aldermen has filed for re-election, nor has a challenger.

Terms expire this spring for Virgil Woodfin, Diane Robnett and Johnny Coker.

### December good for sales tax

December was a good month for Iowa Park business sales, according to the sales tax report from the state comptroller's office.

Iowa Park received a check last week for \$20,904.39, a 2.54-percent increase over the previous year.

Only Burkburnett reported a gain for December sales, 0.98-percent, but Wichita Falls was a minus 2.50-percent and Electra minus 2.93.

Rebate checks for the two months of 1991 have now meant \$32,575.42 for Iowa Park, a 1.79-percent gain over the same period in 1990.

In fact, all four cities in Wichita County are on the plus side thus far this year: Burkburnett 1.47; Wichita Falls 2.02 and Electra 4.64.

Also, for the year, Holliday has a whopping gain of 66.12 percent, with \$15,117.87 for the two months.

### Projects on council's agenda

Most of Monday night's regularly-scheduled meeting of the city council will deal with projects, either underway or in the planning stages.

The meeting is to get underway at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

The on-going construction at the Recreational Activities Center building is on the agenda, as is action on the contract for use of the facility between

the city and RAC board.

Progress reports also are listed on the agenda, concerning the sanitary landfill, water lines at Shiloh and Cash Street, water plant and wastewater plant improvements, and equipment for the street and sanitation departments.

Also to be discussed are the apparent needs of signs on West Smith designating speed limits and city limit.

## Worth Quoting

No wonder Americans are confused these days. We watched and listened for weeks as Congress wrestled with the budget and the opposing political parties threw so many figures around that most of us didn't know what to believe. However, after the dust has cleared it has become apparent that the Democrats succeeded in passing off three ideas as gospel truth when in fact all three are fiction.

The first idea is that the huge deficit is the result of the 1981 Reagan tax cuts. Actually, revenues were \$1.1 trillion more in the 1980s after the tax cuts than before. Federal revenues in 1990 are more than one third higher than in 1980. So the Reagan tax cuts did not result in less money for the federal government. It resulted in very much more. The problem is that Congress succeeded in spending this new money faster than it came in instead of applying it to the debt already owed.

The second idea presented by the Democrats is that federal spending, especially for social programs, was slashed in the 1980s because of a heartless Reagan philosophy toward the poor and disadvantaged. Spending increased by \$1.9 trillion on various social programs. It is true that 46 percent went to Social Security, Medicare and health programs but that means that more than half of this went to new social programs. Hardly a case for fiscal stinginess.

The Democrats' third idea is that rich families got a tax gift from the government while poor folks were saddled with a heavier burden of taxes. It is true that the top tax rates were dropped to 28 percent and this meant a lot of upper income taxpayers got a break. But the rich, the top 20 percent of American taxpayers, continue to pay 58 percent of all tax revenues. The lower fifth pay just 1.6 percent of the tax revenues.

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 coupled lower tax rates with closing of tax loopholes, primarily for the rich. So

it is pretty clear that the Reagan tax reform package did what was predicted, stimulated economic growth and brought in much more tax revenue for the government. The only thing the Reagan program failed to do was to put the brakes on those Congressmen who simply could not resist introducing bills to spend this money as fast as it came in. In fact, they spent it faster than it came in and we are worse off than before.

# Injury leads to developing talent

That something good can come out of misfortune may be proven in the case of Marc Newman.

A fall on ice resulting in a severe back injury almost two years ago, followed by necessary surgery, left Marc unable to work. As a result he has become a developing artist.

"I would like to say I am self-taught, however I can't, I watch videos on painting and programs on Public Television that have helped me to get started," Marc explained.

Possibly one of the things that made him determined to try his hand at

painting was his wife, Janice, daughter of Dorothy Harris and the late Jo Harris.

When she found out he had been watching the programs and videos on art, she "laughed for 30 minutes" Marc said. That was when he decided he was going to show her.

His first completed painting, a monochrome landscape, was to be her Christmas present. He made her promise before he gave it to her that she wouldn't laugh. To his surprise, she didn't, "She really seemed to like it and thought I might have possibilities after all."

Newman has done seascapes and right now he is into florals. In contrast to his landscapes and seascapes his florals are executed in vivid colors.

It may not be his objective, but in sort of a Monet style, Marc uses varying degrees of light in his work. His range of lighting seems to bring a more natural look to the canvas. He especially likes to do mountains and water, and continues to work to achieve a more realistic look.

The artist in the making likes to explore nature as a subject and as he showed one of his florals he commented, "I've got to do this one over." He had painted two flowers and said, "I realized this is not right, nature's way comes in one, three or fives. I've got to add another flower."

"But, you know nature can do a lot of things man can't," Marc interjected. "It is very elusive when you try to copy it on canvas."

He explained why he does not do preparatory sketches, "I took art in the ninth grade and made a C minus, because I couldn't sketch." He doesn't use photographs either. "I just have a vision in mind that I try to put on the canvas."

Newman works almost exclusively with oils, wet on wet. He likes watercolor, but says it is too slow because you have to wait for one part to dry before you can continue.

"I like the wet on wet technique so I can sit down and finish what I start if it takes five hours, or more, so be it," he said.

"You can call me a frustrated would-be painter, but I guess that is part of being an amateur. I'm working now on the finer details, trying to get the depth and perspective right. I'll just keep working at it," he continued.

Newman came to Sheppard Air Force Base in 1970 from his home state of Ohio (but he doesn't care to go back) and was stationed there as a medical services specialist. "At least I never had to empty bed pans," he laughed. While at Sheppard AFB he also worked at Wichita General Hospital.

He said, "The pay back then was so little that it wasn't enough to live on, so I had to work extra." After his discharge from the service he worked for the Sheriff's office as a detention sergeant at the county jail.

He came to Iowa Park and was on the police force for about two years. "I was about 30 years old then and I soon found out that the 15-year-olds could run a lot faster and longer than I could."

Newman later worked as an emergency medical technician and was an ambulance driver while attending Midwestern State University to earn his degree in Criminal Justice.

Marc has really liked all of his jobs. He was an insurance adjuster for about 10 years before receiving his back injury. He said, "If I'd known I was going to live this long, I'd taken better care of myself."

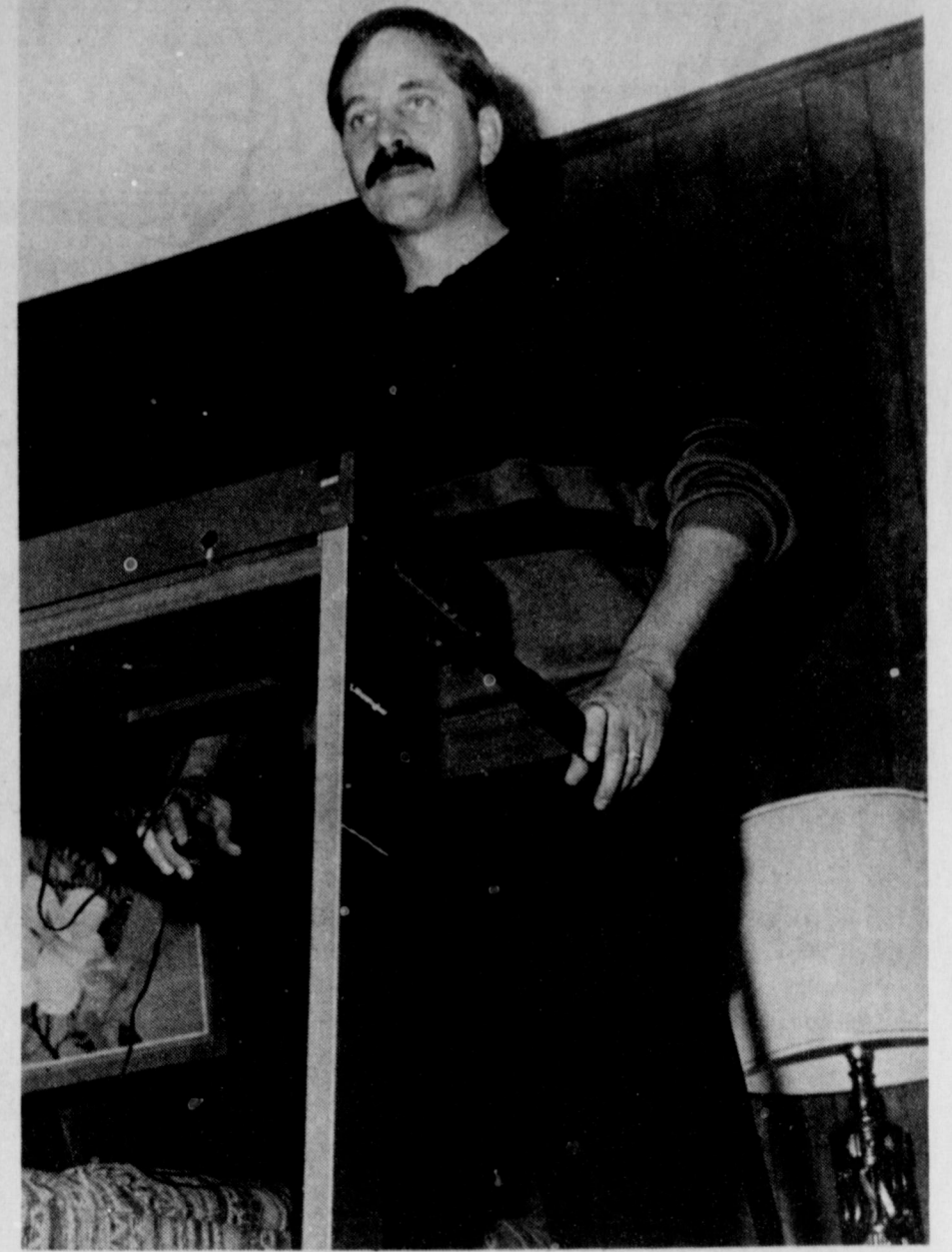
He has probably thought at times he was accident prone. In 1968 he was headed home driving his Triumph and ran into an Impala. He wound up on the passenger side of the seat, all four tires were flat and his car was "a wreck." He had to be driven home in the Impala he hit. "I learned then not to ever drive a little short car." (I noticed a long one in his driveway).

At a later date while on bivouac training he was helping dig a hole when a telephone pole fell on his leg, doing considerable damage to it. Still later, he was on his motorcycle and all he told about that accident was that his cycle stopped and he didn't, but he didn't discuss his injuries.

"I guess my number one interest is the stock market," Marc admitted as he glanced down at the stock market pages of a folded newspaper at his side, as if verifying his statement.

He worked in the Trading Department in Cleveland, Ohio, where the family lived, and there he developed his interest in the stock market.

His parents now live in Florida. When his father retired they moved from Ohio and Marc said when his

father started being at home all of the time his mother went to work. "You know why," he said. His mother was selling real estate and then took up an interest in swimming. She is a competition swimmer and now ranks as one of the top 10 national swimmers in her age group.

Not having been able to work for almost two years, Newman says life is getting a little more normal now and he is trying to be a good househusband. His wife is city secretary.

He cooks a lot of the meals, cleans the house, does most of the laundry and keeps their two and one-half year

old son, Wesley, two days a week. Wesley stays with his grandmother three days when Marc has to go for physical therapy.

Presently, his daughter Jennifer, 19, from Lakewood, Ohio is visiting here until May. She has been attending the University of Dayton. When she returns to Ohio she will enter Fairview School of Nursing in Cleveland.

But at this point Marc plans to continue painting. And, who knows, some day he may be having his own one-man-show and receiving critical kudos.

## Area Oil & Gas News

The No. 2 Pearl Boyd is scheduled for spudding in the Wichita Regular Field with Athena Resources Inc. of Dallas as the operator.

Located 4.5 miles east of Kamay, the well is in a 150-acre lease block in the John T. Lewis Survey A-462. It carries authority for 1,999-ft. maximum drilling depth.

Two ill-fated developmental wells have been written off as dry holes in the Wichita Regular Field three miles northeast of Holliday.

With Ronkaran Oil Co. as the operator, the wells were known as the No. 4 James Cullum and as the No. 1 Perkins and Cullum "D." Both bottomed dry at depths of 1,862 feet in the Denton School Land League 4. The wells will be plugged and abandoned.

A Wichita Falls operator is preparing to make hole for a Hardeman County wildcat 9.5 miles northwest of Chillicothe.

The venture will be known as the No. 1 Beverly Sitta Unit. It is in an 80-acre drilling unit in the HE&WTRR Survey A-1595. It is 141 feet from the south line and 900 feet from the east line of the survey. Trio Operating Inc. is the operator.

Two 1,950-ft. developmental wells are scheduled to be drilled in the Wichita Regular Field, two miles south of the Burkburnett townsite by F.T. Felty Operating of Burkburnett.

The wells are designated as the No. 10 and No. 11 L.K. Holman and are located in the 120-acre lease in the Reuben Hornsby Survey A-97.

The No. 17 Parker Heirs has been written off as a dry hole in the Wichita Regular Field 10 miles west of Wichita Falls. It was spudded on Nov. 18 with L.J. Miller and B.J. Parker as the operators. It bottomed dry at 1,954 feet.

ABB Drilling Co., of Wichita Falls has staked location for the No. 1 Perkins and Cullum in the Wichita Regular Field, two miles north of Holliday. The well is in a 40-acre unit in the Denton School Land Survey A-59. It is under permit for 1,900 feet of hole making.

The same operator has filed for permit to drill the No. 1 Daume-Jones-Tholl in the Wichita Regular Field, about one mile north of Holliday. Carrying permit for 1,900 feet of hole, it is in an 18-acre lease in the SPRR Survey A-266.

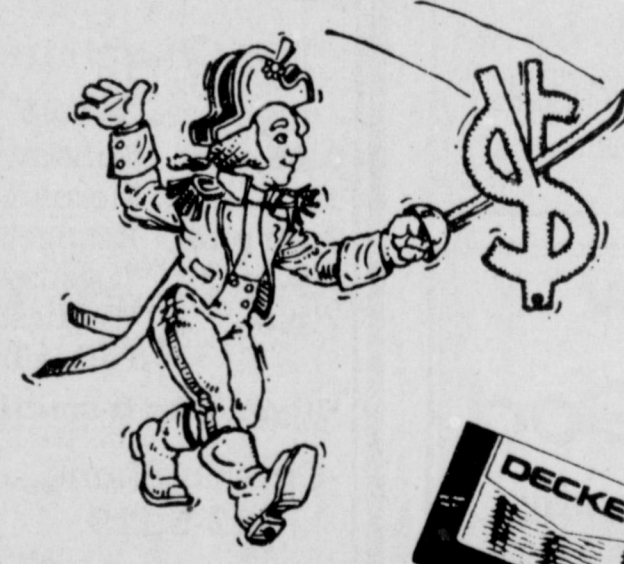

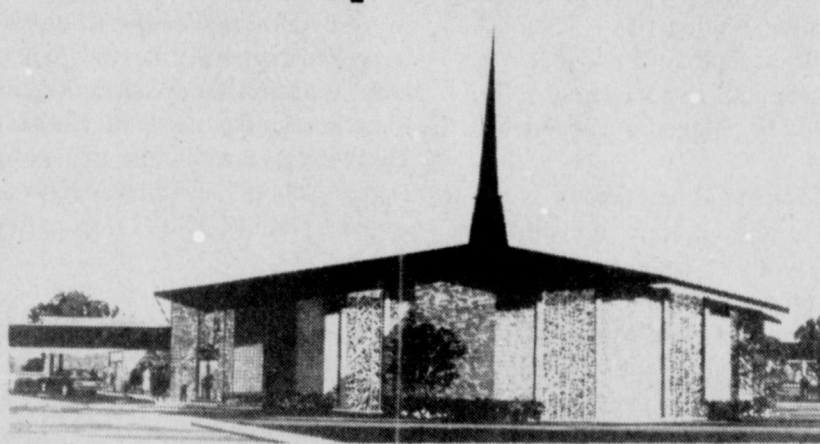

Abraham Lincoln took the soldier's hand and held it all through the night until finally, as the dawn was breaking, the young man's grip weakened and he died.

- Dissolve 3 pkgs. yeast in 1/4 cup warm water.

- Add:
- 3 cups water or milk
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1 cup sugar
- 3/4 cup shortening
- 3 eggs

Mix well. Gradually add approximately nine cups flour. Let rise in greased bowl until double in size. Punch down. Let rise again. Roll out and cut.

Fry in hot oil and top with sugar or icing.

**Baked Round**

- 2 round steaks
- 1 cup water
- 1 pkg. A'ujus mix
- Flour
- Salt and pepper
- 1 clove garlic

Cut round steak in serving size pieces - pound meat. Flour and salt and pepper meat. Brown in skillet.

Mix A'ujus mix as directed on box. Line a roasting pan with heavy duty foil. Add A'ujus mix, meat, garlic. Cover with foil. Bake at 325° 1 1/2 to 2 hours. Makes perfect brown gravy.

- 2/3 cup shortening
- 1 1/3 cup sugar
- 4 eggs

- Add:
  - 1/3 cup buttermilk or 1/3 cup milk and 1 tsp. vinegar
  - 2 cups mashed bananas
  - 4 cups flour
  - 2 tsp. baking powder
  - 1 tsp. soda
  - 1 tsp. salt
  - 1/2 cup nuts
- Mix well. Grease 2 bread pans and add dough. Let stand 20 minutes. Bake at 350° 50 to 60 minutes.

**Nacho Cheese Dip**

- 1 lb. hamburger
- 1 small onion
- 1 medium green pepper
- 1/2 tsp. each garlic salt and pepper
- 1 pkg. taco mix
- 1 can cream of celery soup
- Milk
- 1 lg. box Velveeta Cheese

Brown hamburger, drain grease. Mix in crock pot with onion, green pepper, garlic salt, pepper, taco mix, celery soup and Velveeta cheese. Add just enough milk to make it creamy. Serve when hot.

While the Whites have lived at Eagle Butte, they have observed many changes for the better, such as modern housing, medication, and school facilities. Mrs. Reaves said that even so, missionaries and Christians face many

problems today, some of these are fundamentally spiritual.

She reminded her listeners how the Sioux culture has been rent and torn and only recently have they begun to pick up the pieces and reshape them for the future.

Other problems that missionaries have to deal with include the reversal of roles where the majority of jobs are held by the women, alcohol, drugs, child and spouse abuse.

Mrs. Reaves told how the Whites have taken advantage of every opportunity to develop relationships with the Indians so their response to the gospel would be good. They have served at Eagle Butte, Cherry Creek, Bridger Valley and numerous other places in the Cheyenne River area.

The meeting was held at the church building with 13 members present. Mrs. V.I. Woodfin directed the business and Mrs. E.T. Patterson had charge of the missionary birthday calendar of prayer before the program.

Mrs. Eleanor Bell and Mrs. Elmer Singleton served as hostesses. The refreshment table decorations were especially appropriate for the Presidents Day holiday.

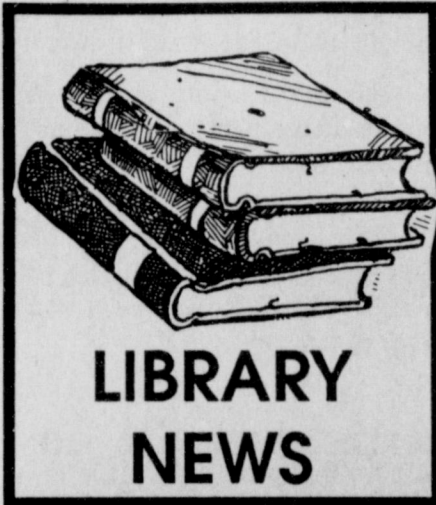

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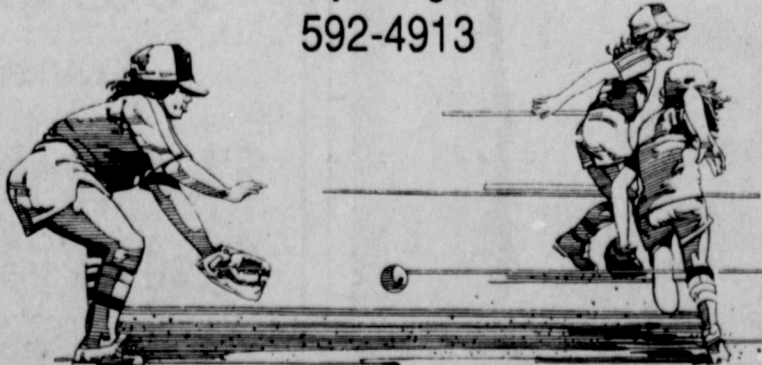

Iowa Park's crowd in the Hardin-Simmons Univ. gymnasium was estimated slightly larger than the following of Cooper. And the Lady Hawk supporters made their presence known

throughout the contest.

Iowa Park could do nothing wrong during the first eight-minute period. The Lady Hawks, at one point, established a 10-4 lead, and held a 16-10 advantage at the first rest period.

Iowa Park lit up the scoreboard first, but Cooper pulled to within four points twice before the quarter ended.

Cooper made a comeback in the second, to cut the lead to 26-22.

It was during Cooper's rally in the second that Iowa Park's only starting senior, Dornier, picked up two personal fouls within a four-second time span on the clock.

Cooper took the lead for the first time in the contest, 30-29, with 3:06 left in the third quarter. Two missed shots in the final seconds of the third period by the Lady Hawks allowed the Lady Pirates to hold a 35-30 lead going into the final eight minutes.

Early in the last quarter, Marcy McCarthy pulled Iowa Park to within two points by hitting five unanswered points. She sank a pair of free shots, and then was fouled on a jumper that went through the nets, and tacked on another from the charity line. That brought Iowa Park to within 37-35 at the 5:47 mark.

Cooper made another field goal,

and then Misty Cook cut the lead to one, 39-38, when she was fouled making a field goal and tacked on a free shot for three points.

Erica Knight fouled out of the game with 3:12 remaining on the clock and Cooper leading 43-40.

McCarthy intentionally fouled Cooper players three times in the final 48 seconds of the game, with the hope Cooper would miss free shots and giving the Lady Hawks chances to score points.

But it didn't work, as the Lady Pirates were deadly at the foul line, sinking all six attempts.

Dornier finished her high school basketball career by leading the Lady Hawks in scoring, with 13. McCarthy tacked on nine, Knight and Cook each had seven, Melody Gray four and Stefany two.

Both of Gray's field goals were made in the first quarter, and she was held scoreless the balance of time.

The loss gave Coach Jimmie Cain's club a season record of 21-10.

The Lady Hawks were Dist. 4-AAA champions, while the Lady Pirates were runners up to Slaton in Dist. 3-AAA.

Slaton, playing Bridgeport Friday night in the same gymnasium, beat the Sissies, 59-43.

## Four players All-District

Four of the five starting members of the Lady Hawk basketball team received post-season honors by the coaches of Dist. 4-AAA.

Kerri Dornier and Melody Gray were unanimous All-District choices.

Erica Knight was named "Sophomore of the Year."

And Marcy McCarthy received Honorable Mention.

To top it all off, Coach Jimmie Cain was selected "Coach of the Year." This was his third year at the helm.

Dornier, one of only three seniors on the district championship team, and the only 12th grader among the five starters, led the team in scoring with 399

points. She also had the best field goal percentage, hitting 147 of 288 attempts for 51 percent.

Knight, a sophomore, led the team with 194 rebounds and 108 assists. She also was the second-leading scorer, 276, and was second to the other starting sophomore, Misty Cook, with 26 blocked shots.

Eventhough she was the team's point guard most of the game, Gray, also the shortest of the squad, was credited with 61 rebounds and 38 assists. Her 235 points ranked her third in scoring.

McCarthy, the other starting junior along with Gray, led the team in free shot percentage with 71. She sank 44 of 62 attempts on the season.

In earning 22 wins against only 10 defeats this season, the Lady Hawks outscored their opponents 1,483 to 1,193 by hitting 39 percent of their field goal attempts and 56 percent from the charity line.

Joining Dornier and Gray as unanimous All-District selections were Terri Thompson and Ann Parry of Graham, and Tamisha Hall of Vernon.

Kayca Clifton of Bridgeport was

selected the district's Most Valuable Player.

Other All-District selections were Alisha Sheppard of Vernon; Tonya Scruggs, Jody Lancaster and Jennifer Hamilton of Bowie; Jona Wallace of Graham and Robyn Shawn of Bridgeport.

Honorable Mention selections along with McCarthy were Courtney Wilbourn and Shelley Cypert of Graham; Kari Kitchen, Casey Wolfe and Rachel Moore of Breckenridge; Brandy Jackson of Vernon, and Bridgeport players Tracy Phillips, Stephanie Flavin and Aimee Carlton.

### Grades are no problem for All-District players

None of the Lady Hawks who made All-District had to be worried about the "no pass, no play" rule, because all four were also Academic All-District.

Marcy McCarthy has the highest grade average, with 103.58.

Kerri Dornier is right behind, with a 103.22.

Melody Gray's average is 96.54, and Erica Knight has a 90.94.

## Girls' future bright

After reaching their preseason goal of making the playoffs, the Lady Hawks are already looking forward to the 1991-92 basketball season.

Coach Jimmie Cain, in a meeting Monday morning after losing Saturday to Lubbock Cooper in bi-district, told the players the state tournament was his goal next season.

How could a coach look at such a lofty goal?

Well, it could be because the three high school girls' teams this past season earned a combined record of 69 wins against only 14 losses, as well as laying claim to the varsity, junior varsity and freshman district championships.

And of those three teams, only three players, Kerri Dornier, Stefany Lozipone and Michelle Cannedy, will be lost by graduation. All the rest should be back in uniform.

The varsity finished the season 22-10, and 7-3 in district.

The junior varsity, coached by John Hoelter, was 26-2 on the season and 10-0 in district. One of their losses was to Seymour, and the other was to the varsity team of Munday.

Coached by Lorna Klinkerman, the freshmen went 21-2 during the season and 9-1 in district. One loss was to Graham, a team Iowa Park beat two other games. The other loss was to Burk Burnett, also beaten twice by the Lady Hawk freshmen.

Coach Cain warned the returning players that off-season training would be hard and suggested they be mentally prepared.

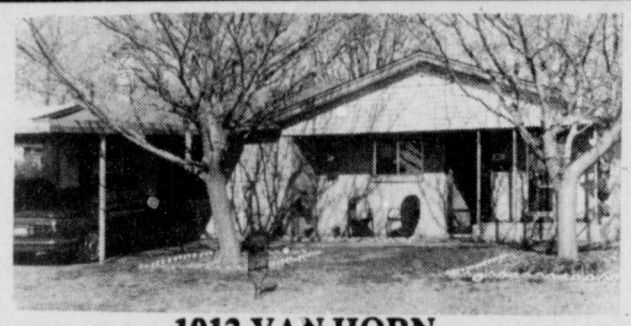
