This license fee must be paid before the dance can be held.

ANNUAL COUNTY JUNIOR HORSE SHOW AT EULA SAT.

EULA — The annual Callahan County Junior Horse Show will be held Saturday, April 29 at 10 a. m. at Eula, announces C. Lee Smith, president of the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show Association. Burrus Miller of Eula will be show superintendent and Bill Brewer of Abilene will judge the show.

Any youngster, 9-19 years old, who attends school in the county is eligible and is invited to participate in the show.

State 4-H Horse Show Rules and Regulations will be used for the show. Only one horse per exhibitor. Each exhibitor may enter one halter class and two performance classes. A horse used by one exhibitor may not be used by another exhibitor.

In the barrel racing contest, knocking over a barrel or failure to follow the course shall cause disqualification. Also, touching a barrel with a hand is a disqualification.

In the reining and western pleasure classes, split reins must be used. Mechanical hackamores are not allowed in either of these events. Boals may be used on horses four years of age and younger.

Western attire is mandatory in western pleasure classes.

An overall showmanship trophy will be awarded to the showmanship winner. This trophy is being donated by the Callahan County Riding Club at Eula.

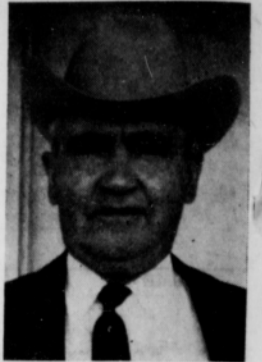

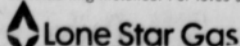

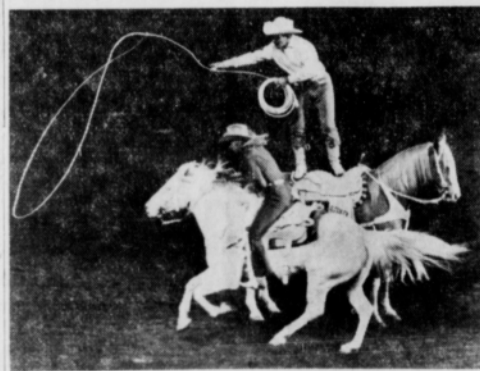

Clyde Native Hired By Arizona School For Grid Coaching Past

TUSCON, ARIZONA—Sunny-High School in Tuscon, Arizona is turning to a Texan to try to lift its football program from rags to riches. For this Texas touch the school has hired Paul Petty, born and reared in Clyde for the grid coaching post.

The 43-year-old Petty has an extensive and successful background as a player (Hardin-Simmons), coach (football, basketball, baseball and track) and athletic administrator (assistant athletic director to Warren Woodson at New Mexico State).

Petty is not a newcomer to Arizona. He gained statewide recognition in building Miami High's football program (1954-63) and has served for the last five years in the Phoenix Union School System.

A proponent of the wing-T, Petty posted a 74-10-6 record in 10 years at Miami. He won three mythical state titles (1954, 1959 and 1961). He also had a 34-game winning streak, stretching from the final five games in 1954 to the final game in 1956.

The man who ended Petty's 24-game winning streak was John Pavlich as Globe upset the Vandals, 15-7. Petty returned the favor in 1957, ending Pavlich's 19-game winning streak, 12-7.

With Petty becoming Sunny-side's fourth football coach, he will renew his friendship with Pavlich. Pavlich became the

Blue Devil's head basketball coach this school year.

After his 10 successful seasons at little Miami High, Petty went to New Mexico State serving as Woodson's frosh football coach, assistant athletic director and school athletic business manager during 1964-65.

He returned to high school coaching in 1966 in a one-year stint at Bridgeport before returning to Arizona.

He spent three years at Phoenix Union as football assistant and head baseball coach. Ironically, in his last game as Union's baseball coach, he whipped the school he was going to—Carl Hayden, 1-0. He also whipped Tucson High, 8-2, in 1970—the year the Badgers finished runnerup to Chandler in the state finals.

He has served as football assistant and track assistant at Carl Hayden for the past two years.

Petty isn't the only athletic coach in the household. His wife, Cecile, a former Texas tennis queen, is now in her second year as Grand Canyon College's tennis coach. The Petties have one child, Steve, age three.

Petty succeeds Joel Favara, who had a 10-26-1 record in four years.

Since going into Class AAA, the Blue Devil's best record was 7-2-1 in 1963. The coach was the late Elwood Turner, who gained his football fame as a player at Texas Christian University and
