UW drive goes over goal 4%

Larry Dutton, local United Way campaign chairman, proudly announced at the wrap-up report meeting last week that Iowa Park had surpassed its goal.

In fact, with pledge envelopes still working, Iowa Park had a total of \$66,935, which is 104 percent of its goal.

The local drive exceeded all others reported at the meeting.

Dutton praised volunteers, businesses and individuals for "excellent commitment."

He also recognized the super accomplishments of Cryovac and the City of Iowa Park for the drive.

While overall campaign figures released at the report meeting topped the 91 percent mark, volunteers felt that the businesses and individuals who have given in the past will make the current drive a success.

This year's goal of the Greater Wichita Falls United Way is \$1,550,000. Of that, \$1,410,109 was reported at the meeting as having been pledged.

Showdown at Vernon

Hawks taking on defending state champs

The outcome Friday night at Vernon will determine whether Iowa Park's Hawks will extend their season into the state playoffs, or hang up their pads and stay at home.

It's showdown time in Lion Stadium, where the kickoff is scheduled at 7:30 p.m.

Never mind the fact that Vernon is 8-1 for the season and undefeated in Dist. 3-AAA play, while the Hawks have only a 4-5 record and one conference loss.

Never mind the fact that the Lions are the defending state champions and haven't lost to the Hawks since the season of 1986.

The Hawks, who have steadily improved as the season has progressed, have a shot at the district title, or at least a runner-up slot in the playoffs.

"To have a chance at going into the playoffs, we must either win or tie," said Coach Lucky Gamble.

Going into Friday's action, Iowa Park and Graham are tied with 3-1 records against conference opponents. The Hawks lost to Graham, 26-17 after

leading 17-0 early in the third period. And Graham lost 27-6 to Vernon.

Graham must travel to Breckenridge Friday, where they will try to retain their second-place standing.

The district has a rule that takes point spreads into account to break ties in standings, rather than a flip of the coin.

The Hawks could represent the district as champions, if they can beat the Lions by five or more points.

Breckenridge could advance as runner-up, should the Buckaroos win by seven or more points, and Vernon beat the Hawks.

A tie between Iowa Park and Vernon, coupled with a Breckenridge win, also would advance the Hawks into the playoffs.

Vernon lost heavily via graduation

after humiliating Crockett 41-20 last December for the AAA crown, and completing the 16-game season undefeated.

The Lions, however, have shown they are vulnerable, even though they have continued to be ranked among the top 10 teams in the state by the Texas Sports Writers. They currently are in the fourth slot.

Vernon knocked off the top-ranked Oklahoma team, Altus, 28-7 in the season-opener, and then shut out Wichita Falls High 21-0, before beating Burk Burnett, 24-7 winner over the Hawks, by a 33-14 margin.

But in week four, Gainesville took measure of the Lions, 17-13. Vernon then closed out its non-conference

TOYS FOR TOTS'

Firemen seek donations

The Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department is soliciting donations for the organization's annual "Toys for Tots" project.

Firemen annually assist needy families by delivering toys, with the assistance of a "real live" Santa Claus.

When the deliveries take place, as it is expected to be done Dec. 17 this year, Santa arrives at the homes riding atop a fire truck.

While many of the toys have been donated and in excellent condition, very often the age of the children and the toys on hand don't match, according to Chief Danny Skinner.

In those cases, the gifts are purchased from a special fund maintained

by the department. Each child in the selected families receives at least one new toy, plus donated toys.

To continue the project, funds can be mailed to the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Dept., P.O. Box 190, Iowa Park. Checks made out to the department should be noted in the lower left hand corner as donations to Toys for Tots.

Persons wishing to donate usable toys which also are given to the children can leave them at the fire department where members store and sort them for delivery, according to Donald Jones, president of the firemen's organization.

"Toys for Tots" has been carried on by the local firemen several years, and 35 to 40 children benefit annually.

No time to be idle

"A creative mess is better than tidy idleness"-- reads a witty observation believed by the John Chapmans and hangs on their wall in printed form.

And, blessed with a variety of talents and the tenacity to use them, that trite statement pretty well summarizes how John and Etoy feel about their creative lives and their living area.

The Chapmans enjoy harmonizing their talents as ceramists, but they also leave time for their singular pursuits... and they leave no time for idleness.

They have several hobbies they do together. For instance, they both are involved in creating glazed porcelain and bisque decorative objects. John makes a lot of the molds they use. He pours the slip (clay particles in suspension) and she fires them. "But I don't take them out of the mold, I'm too heavy handed," he commented.

They have a full kiln, a seven-foot kiln and a small six-inch square one. Etoy has just completed an order for 89 tiny birds that John made the molds for, and she is now working on Santa Claus heads which she will finish and give some of them for Christmas gifts.

Most of the white procelain the Chapman's use comes from Japan, Germany, or Brazil, and one of very high quality they now get from France. They then finish the pieces to suit themselves.

John and Etoy are in a china painting class now. "If we are in a class we will paint, if we aren't we have a tendency to say we'll do that later and start something else instead," Etoy said.

Through the years, the Chapmans have gradually realized some of the dreams they have had since childhood.

The Chapmans moved to Iowa Park about 30 years ago from Wichita Falls because they wanted their children to attend Iowa Park schools.

The Chapmans have four children, three sons, Brent and Kent of Iowa Park and Louis, in the Air Force in San Antonio, and one daughter, Joy (Mrs. Scott Toller) of Iowa Park; and seven grandchildren.

And, a note of sentiment can be detected as John relates having proposed marriage to Etoy as they were driving through Iowa Park on the old Iowa Park Road. They will celebrate their 36th wedding anniversary Dec. 31.

They both come from a small town environment. She grew up on a sandhill farm near Chillicothe. He was reared on an oil lease in the Texas Panhandle town of Kellerville that was located in Wheeler County. Nothing of the town is left now, he says.

As a little girl Etoy thought she would love to do china painting, but living on a farm and being one of seven children, she didn't think she would ever have the opportunity to do that.

After the Chapmans' marriage in 1955 Etoy began "dabbling" in low fire ceramics. Then, one year for Christmas John gave her a gallon of procelain and told her "There goes your diamond ring." Etoy said, "No, I still don't have my diamond ring." She either has not cared if she had one, or they had rather spend their money on supplies for their hobbies.

About 25 years ago she began making porcelain dolls, and still does occasionally.

Etoy remembered, "When I first became interested in making dolls, our daughter was watching me and asked, 'Can I go through child life with you?'"

While Mrs. Chapman was taking lessons on making dolls, her husband made some molds for her teacher that are reproduction molds of some very old porcelain dolls. He also made some for Etoy of the heads, arms and legs. They have heads for three different size dolls.

When the Chapmans first began working with ceramics they were told that red was the hardest color to get a good return on clay for the effort it takes to get there.

Typical of Chapman, his first piece was painted red. He is one who loves a challenge. But, he said, "They knew what they were talking about when they said it was the hardest color to work with."

Etoy also studied portraiture. "Someday I'm going to have to quit learning and start doing more of the things I have already learned," she quipped.

A procelain plate hangs on their living room wall that is a portrait of Chapman's grandmother. Mrs. Chapman took an old picture of her and from it painted her face on the plate. She took her skin tone from her husband's and how she remembered her mother-in-law.

John has one piece that he is especially proud of...a framed tile that he painted of a scene typical of some he has seen in the Panhandle area where he grew up. It is of a wagon and a ramshackled outbuilding.

The piece was first glazed, then painted and fired again which causes the glaze to open up and absorb the paint. To get the depth and the intense color desired, the piece had to be fired many times.

When it was finished Etoy matted it with brown suede and framed it with wood, to give it a rustic look.

Both John and Etoy have inquisitive minds and innate desires to know what makes a thing work and why, so they keep on until they find out.

He not only has an inquisitive mind, he also has a technical mind and used it in his career. He retired 10 years ago from civil service, teaching in the U.S. Technical School at Sheppard Air Force Base.

Chapman had always wanted to throw pottery. When he retired he took a course in pottery through the art department of Midwestern State University.

His desire to throw pots developed at an early age as did his avid interest in reading. He reads at least 200 books a year.

"My mother developed arthritis when my sister was a baby, so I became my mother's hands and legs. It was all she could do to take care of my sister. That was when I developed both my interest in reading and in wanting to learn the hobby I now enjoy," John explained.

He read a story about a blind girl who learned to throw pots. "I got real interested and decided I was going to do that some day."

Most of the time he throws small pots and usually uses color glaze on them. Then he gives them away.

After working with the solid mass of clay and centering on the pottery wheel, he begins to work with it and shape it with one hand, and has a book he is reading in the other hand.

Chapman said his mother had an inborn talent to do anything she wanted to do and she wanted to do everything.

"She said many times that her life would not be long enough for her to do everything she wanted to do," Chapman said. "I didn't get the inborn talent, I just have to teach my body and mind to do the things I want to do," he added.

John also crochets, he began that when he started having arthritis in his hands. He has done two afghans, bedspread size, and five small ones for their grandchildren. "I just want them to be able to say 'PawPaw made this for me.'"

He also sews and mends, builds model ships from scratch, and Etoy says he is a good cook and does the cooking when she has a lot of orders to fill.

Another interest of Chapman's is genealogy. "I can really get interested in tracing my family roots," he said. He discovered that his great-grandmother was a cousin to Orville and Wilbur Wright.

He loves opera and would have loved to have been an opera tenor. Etoy said she had to learn to enjoy classical music and still does not enjoy all of the operas that John does. But they can both enjoy Strauss waltzes.

Any hopes he might have had to try out for opera was taken away with his singing voice when he developed polyps on his vocal chords and re-

quired surgery twice. This also explains his "gravelly" voice that he says no one seems to have trouble recognizing.

"But chess is really my first love," Chapman commented, and after an inquisitive look from Etoy, he added, "after Etoy, that is."

But she intimated she didn't know if she believed that or not. She remarked, "He told me before we were married that he played chess and that he was going to play every time he had a chance unless there was a death or if someone was seriously ill. And he has kept that promise."

Chapman's mother came from a game-playing family and she was a chess champion. She taught him how to play and he hasn't quit.

He has been president of the Wichita Falls Chess Club and regional vice president of the United States Chess Federation, as well as having served as a delegate to several of their conferences.

He now is a senior tournament director, qualified to direct chess tournaments that draw from 200 to 300 players.

John joined the Iowa Park MuleSkinners about a year ago and is enjoying that activity.

In addition to ceramics and china

painting, Mrs. Chapman sews, knits and crochets, makes sweaters and smaller crocheted and knitted pieces.

It has just been the last few years that she has done a lot other than be a mother and housekeeper. During the time the children were in school she was active in PTA.

She is a member of Wichita Falls Porcelain Art Club and has held several offices in that organization. John was the first male member of WFPAC. She is now serving as president of the Falls World Organization of China Painters. He is the only male member of that group.

The Chapmans went through a very difficult period when their son, Brent, now 33, became ill at age 19 with viral encephalomyelitis. Brent had graduated Iowa Park High School where he was a member of the choir and of the band. He played all woodwind instruments except the oboe and bassoon.

The disease did not affect his mind, but his motor skills. He could not talk for a period of time, but could only make guttural screams when he wanted something, his mother said.

"He would become very frustrated when he was trying to communicate. We had to try to decide what he wanted and spell the words to him," Etoy said.

He came home from the hospital

the Wednesday before Thanksgiving 14 years ago. By Christmas they could see his muscles deteriorating. They had a physical therapist come to the home twice a week and work with him and show them how to work with him.

The Chapmans later took Brent to the Rehabilitation Clinic for speech and occupational therapy twice a week.

Five years later when Brent got more active, he was diagnosed with Hodgkins Disease. Through the next several months he went through the usual chemotherapy and radiation treatments five days a week.

Brent has been left a paraplegic, but his motor skills are better, even though he has to think to have his feet move. He can use a camera and he has mastered his computer. He writes many letters.

Currently the Chapmans are adding some more room to their house and are enclosing their front porch where their supplies and equipment have spilled out of the living room onto the porch.

They are attempting to get their living room back to the purpose for which it was built.

But, they would not give up their creative activities and talents for a neat and tidy house if they had to make the choice.

Troutman was released at 2:26 a.m. Thursday after signing a personal recognizance bond, according to the blotter entry.

Two local females in a four-day period reportedly took overdoses of medicines, and both were taken to the Sheppard AFB hospital for care.

The first non-fatal overdose report was reported at 11:07 p.m. Thursday, and the second was reported at 4:31 p.m. Sunday.

Officers were told that, over the past three years, the same female had applied for a new library card, and each time had used a different drivers license.

None of the books checked out had been returned, police were told.

The different identifications used, according to the police blotter, were Michelle Gregory, Angela Gregory and Michelle Ingram.

Someone broke into four money boxes at Catlin Car Wash in the 400 block of West Bank sometime between Oct. 29 and Oct. 31, police were told.

Approximately \$150 in coins were taken, and damage to each of the four boxes was said to be \$50. A tool was apparently used to pry open the boxes.

I was very pleased with the voter turnout for an election without any names on the ballots.

In Iowa Park's two voting boxes, we had a total of 1,144 votes cast. That included 907 in Precinct 32 and 237 in Precinct 33. Add to that the 125 at the Valley View box and 161 at Chaparral Baptist Assembly.

I have no idea at this writing what the state totals were, but on the county level I lost three votes. They were on the veterans' land board investment authority, bond for college student loans, and the lottery.

On the lottery issue, as I explained last week, it wasn't so much the gam-

bling issue to me as it was about how it can cause shortfall money to budgets, if the state comptroller messes up on a revenue estimate when the legislature is working on a two-year budget.

Actually, before it ever got on the ballot, I was upset with the legislators, who acted like they wanted to make the decisions for the voters, by denying them the right to cast their opinions.

Locally, county-wide, and early returns indicate, everyone was ready to approve bonds for the construction of more prisons.

That may have been the most important issue to come out of the entire day's effort of voting.

Council to consider carport ordinance

The city council Monday night will consider an ordinance establishing standards for carports associated with multi-family dwellings.

The meeting is to be at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Iowa Park does not currently have an ordinance permitting car ports other than at single-family dwellings. Residents of two-family town houses have asked for a similar privilege.

Another ordinance listed on the meeting's agenda would, if approved, replat "Lot 1A, Block 69, Original Townsite." That is the northwest corner of the block on which Park West Shopping Center is located, Gary Jones, city administrator, said.

A public hearing will be held on the annexation of a nine-acre tract of land on FM 368 South. That will be followed by action on an ordinance establishing date, time and place for the second required hearing on the annexation.

The administrator will ask authorization to advertise and take bids for the purchase of three vehicles, including

schedule with a 27-7 win over Hirschi. And though the Lions have won all four of their 4-AAA contests, the scores have not raised many eyebrows.

They beat Bowie, a 35-7 loser to the Hawks in only a half-time of play, 29-2, and then defeated Graham 27-6.

Vernon's win over Breckenridge was by almost an identical score as was Iowa Park's. The Lions came from behind to win 10-7, while the Hawks did the same, but by a 10-6 margin.

Both team's scores also were similar against Bridgeport: Vernon 45-7; Iowa Park 40-0.

Since Iowa Park and Vernon began playing each other, back in 1970, the Lions hold a slim 11-9-1 margin in the win column.

But Vernon has earned that lead of wins only during the past four years. After losing 17-7 in 1985 and 5-0 the following year, the Lions have won four straight by scores of 16-14, 28-7, 48-14 and 28-0.

The Hawks' ranks were thinned last week when tackle Shawn Green suffered a neck injury. That was the third season-ending injury for an Iowa Park player (J'Bill Merrick, head; Jason Dudley, shoulder).

Coach Gamble credits the continued improvement of his players to their maturity. "We've made lots of strides," he said.

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



"PERSPECTIVES: GOOD MARRIAGE CALLS FOR EXCLUSIVENESS" (CONCLUSION)

"The devil is successfully destroying homes and corrupting marriages by deceiving us regarding a most critical ingredient of God's planned intimacy between the sexes. This fundamental ingredient is exclusiveness - one man and one woman sharing of themselves as an exclusive lifetime commitment. Of course, for the Christian this commitment grows out of an even deeper commitment to God.

"This law of mental and physical exclusiveness in marriage is forcefully taught in Scripture: "Thou shalt not commit adultery" was one of the Ten Commandments. Jesus used strong words to teach against easy divorce (Matthew 5:32; 19:9) knowing that when divorce is commonplace, the exclusiveness of the man-woman relationship vanishes. Hebrews 13:4 clearly defines the sin of ignoring the exclusiveness of this relationship.

"If we look beyond the basic cause - denying the right of God to order our lives - to some of Satan's other tools in bringing about our surrender of this exclusive commitment to our mates, we need not look far. Television, movies, contemporary literature, and music have been handily used by him. All too often they present fidelity as a vestige of a past era which we are now sophisticated enough to cast aside.

"While marital infidelity has reached epidemic proportions in our society, it is not a new phenomenon. Preachers, priests, and kings have discredited themselves with romantic episodes since such roles first came into being. The lists grow longer and will continue to lengthen until both men and women resist with resolute hearts the attraction of others, acknowledging that marriage includes an exclusive door-slamming commitment, shutting out dalliance with any other person of the opposite sex.

"Christian men and women, it is up to you to dignify your mate and glorify your God by making that relationship exclusive. Or, on the other hand, you can let a foolish affair corrupt your life, ruin your marriage, and endanger your soul's eternal destiny. Intimacy, commitment are all wrapped in the same package. We break the package and befool its contents at our own peril."

The recipes Linda submitted are favorites of her family. She said that every Sunday after church she has to make Chocolate Oatmeal No-Bake Cookies, and the Peanut Butter Fudge is a must at Christmas time. She mentioned that the Mexican Chicken Crepes are easy to make and really good.



Mexican Chicken Crepes
So easy and so good!!!

- 1 1/2 cup sour cream
- 2 garlic cloves, pressed or minced
- 1 1/2 tsp. chili powder
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. ground cumin
- 1 - 4 oz. can diced green chiles, drained
- 2 1/2 cups shredded Monterrey Jack cheese, divided
- 2 cups diced, cooked chicken
- 1 1/2 cups thinly sliced green onion
- 10 crepes, (made according to your favorite recipe - or flour tortillas - wheat or white)
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese
- 2 cups shredded lettuce
- 1 cup chopped tomatoes
- 1 cup guacamole

Stir together: sour cream, garlic, chili powder, salt, cumin, chilies, 1 1/2 cup Jack cheese, chicken and green onion. Spoon about 1/2 cup of the mixture down the center of each crepe. Roll up to enclose. Place crepes, seam side down, in a single layer in a shallow 3-quart baking dish. Bake covered in a 375 degree oven until hot, about 20 minutes. Remove cover and sprinkle evenly with the Cheddar cheese. Return to oven and bake uncovered until cheese melts, about 3 to 5 minutes.

To serve, offer lettuce, tomato, 1 cup remaining Jack cheese, and guacamole to sprinkle over individual servings. Serves 5-6.

Note: If made ahead, cover and chill. Then bake at 375 about 30 minutes.

Chicken Spaghetti

- 4 to 5 cups chicken
- 1 1/2 cup chicken broth
- 1/2 cup bell pepper, chopped
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 cup celery, chopped
- 4 Tbsps. parsley flakes
- 2 cans mushroom soup
- 2 1/2 cups spaghetti, broken
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. pepper
- 1 lb. Velveeta cheese

Cook chicken and dice. Reserve broth. Simmer vegetables in broth 1 hour. Cook spaghetti and drain. Mix 2/3 of cheese in spaghetti while hot until melted. Add soup, vegetable mixture, salt and pepper; mix well. Add chicken; mix. Place in large casserole dish and top with remaining cheese. Bake in slow oven until bubbly.

Chocolate Oatmeal No-Bake Cookies

- 2 cups sugar
- 3 Tbsp. cocoa
- Dash of salt
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 stick butter
- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- 2 tsps. vanilla
- 3 cups oatmeal

Mix all ingredients. Bring to boil and boil for about 3 minutes. Remove from heat. Add peanut butter and vanilla. Before you stir, add oatmeal; stir. Quickly spoon out on wax paper.

Note: We eat these while they are still hot almost every Sunday night.

Stromboli

- Frozen bread dough
- 2 slices Provolone cheese
- Mozzarella cheese, grated
- Parmesan cheese
- Sliced pepperoni
- Pizza or spaghetti sauce
- 1 egg white

Thaw (do not let rise) the frozen bread dough. Pull dough out into a rectangle shape - flat like a pizza crust. Spread on small amount of sauce, keeping edges clear. Lay Provolone down 1 side. Cover sauce area with pepperoni slices, then grated Mozzarella, and shake of Parmesan. Using the Provolone as a guide, roll up like a jelly roll.

Seal all edges securely or cheese will run out. Lay on jelly roll or cookie sheet. Rub on egg white or milk. Sprinkle on tiny amount of Parmesan for decoration. Bake in a 375 degree oven 20 minutes or until browned. Let stand 5 minutes before slicing.

Peanut Butter Fudge

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup evaporated milk
- Dash of salt
- 1 cup marshmallow cream
- 3/4 cup smooth peanut butter
- 1 Tbsp. butter
- 1 tsp. vanilla

1. Stir sugars, milk and salt together in saucepan. Bring to boiling and boil 5 minutes, stirring constantly.

2. Stir in marshmallow cream, peanut butter, butter and vanilla. Pour into 9x9-inch square buttered pan. Cool and cut into squares.

Pot Luck Casserole

- 1 or 2 pkgs. smoked sausage
- 2 cans whole green beans
- 1 lb. carrots, sliced
- 2 cans cream of mushroom soup
- 5 or 6 potatoes

Thickly slice potatoes and line bottom of large casserole dish. Spread sliced carrots over potatoes, then spread green beans over carrots. Cut up smoked sausage in bite-size pieces and put on top of green beans. Spoon cream of mushroom soup over casserole. Salt and pepper to taste. Bake at 350 degrees until potatoes and carrots are tender.

Note: Onions may be added on top of potatoes.

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
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99-yard pass wins game for Hawks

The Hawks scored on the longest play possible from scrimmage here Friday night that not only handed the Breckenridge Buckaroos second conference loss, but more importantly, kept the Mean Green in the hunt for at least a playoff spot.

Down 6-3 in the fourth quarter, and with their backs virtually against the wall, Robert Denton threw a short pass over the line to Joel McIlroy, and the senior receiver raced the distance untouched to rack up a 10-6 victory for Iowa Park.


Though the play is officially noted as a 99-yard pass, it was really 99-plus. And, in some minds, could even be said to have covered 100 yards.

As the fourth quarter got underway, the momentum had clearly swung in the favor of the visiting Buckaroos. They had punted on the second play since switching ends of the field for the final period, to the Hawks' 23. On the next play, a Denton pass was intercepted on the Hawks' 49.

On the next three plays, the Bucks were unable to muster a first down, and punted the ball to the Hawk two.

Todd Pulley attempted a sweep around his right end, but was nailed on or near the goal line, with the ball squirting out of his grasp upon impact.

The official's ankle was touching the goal line marker, when he indicated where the ball crossed the sidelines. And when the

ball was set on the in-bound marker, its nose on the Hawks' side was touching the goal line.

Breckenridge pulled 10 players up on the line, in an effort to stop Iowa Park for a safety. Only one player was in the secondary, but he was only some five yards deep, and slightly to the wide side of the field.

McIlroy flashed into the secondary from the right, took the pass near the 15, and the rest was victory history.

Pulley's extra point made the 10th point, with 9:23 remaining on the scoreboard clock.

Pulley had given the Hawks the initial lead early in the second quarter, when he kicked a 27-yard field goal. It was his second attempt, having pulled one to the left of the goal posts in the first quarter. Ironically, that attempt also was from exactly the same distance.

The Bucks lit up their side of the scoreboard before the half, however. On a fourth down play and lacking only inches for a first, Dwight Smart broke through the Hawks' defense and raced 37 yards to score. But the Bucks' Caleb Myers missed his kick attempt for the extra point, leaving the score 6-3 in the visitors' favor with 1:52 remaining in the first half.

The Hawk defense had to stiffen in the final moments of play to stave off deter-

mined passing attack by Breckenridge. The drive ended on the Hawks' 14 when, with seven seconds remaining on the clock, Denton intercepted a Buck pass.

Both the score and statistics proved the pre-game billing as being between a pair of evenly-matched teams. Iowa Park finished with 219 net yards on offense, and Breckenridge had 195. Both teams were forced to punt eight times. The Bucks lost the ball four times, two interceptions and two fumbles, while the Hawks lost one by fumble and one interception.

Pulley and Mark de la Rosa were the leading carriers for the Hawks, with 36 and 35 yards, respectively. McIlroy also had another catch, for 18, while Mike Brewer caught one pass for five.

Greg Steger and Denton each had pass interceptions, while the Buck fumbles were credited to T.J. Bean and Brent Brown.

SCS offers tree seedlings

The Wichita Soil and Water Conservation District has announced its annual offering of conifer (evergreen) and hardwood tree seedlings for windbreak and wildlife plantings. Ordering is underway, and will continue to be accepted until February, with orders being sent weekly to the nursery.

The seedlings are grown at West Texas Nursery in Lubbock, and sold on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Minimum order will be 25 hardwood and 20 conifers per species, which will eliminate any competition with area nurseries.

Examples of conifers offered last year were: Austrian pine, Ponderosa pine, Arizona cypress, and Redcedar.

Hardwoods should include American plum, Green ash, Hackberry, Honeylocust, Little walnut, and native pecan.

Wildlife packets have also been offered, consisting of 25 each of hardwood species, packaged in four different combinations.

Delivery to the SCS office here in Iowa Park will be around Feb. 15, at which time producers can obtain their trees for immediate planting.





DID YOU KNOW???

That the library has 343 Video Tapes and 103 Cassette tapes for your viewing enjoyment? You need to be 18 years of age and have a library card in order to check out videos.

If parents put their children's names, who are under the age of 18, on the video contract, each library card holder may check out two videos. Each video may be borrowed for three days. They ARE NOT to be returned through the drop box. Videos returned late are assessed a \$1 fine for each tape and day late.

Growth Where needed

The best part of this news is that the job growth has occurred in two areas which suffered the most last decade.

Sharp said the fastest growth has been in the petrochemical sector of the Beaumont-Port Arthur area, and the maquiladora activity

of Brownsville-Harlingen. Houston added more jobs over the past year than any metropolitan area in the nation.

Sharp predicted Houston will lead over the next three years with actual number of new jobs added, while El Paso will lead percentage-wise; San Antonio will advance slower than the state as a whole.

Other Highlights

The Associated Conservatives of Texas announced it is opposed to a statewide petition drive to limit terms of elected officials. The Dallas-based group urged Texans not to sign petitions being circulated by Texans for Term Limitations, headed by Republican Rob Mosbacher.

The average property tax rate in Texas school districts has risen from \$1.06 per \$100 valuation last school year to \$1.20 this year, according to preliminary results of a survey by the state comptroller.

Austin's State District Judge Scott McCown temporarily blocked the state insurance board from enforcing its emergency rule barring insurance companies from charging higher rates or denying coverage to first-time auto insurance buyers.

AUSTIN - State Comptroller John Sharp last week pointed to a silver lining in the cloud over the nation's recession-troubled economy.

Texas ranks first in new job growth among the 10 most populous states, for the first time since 1982.

"The turbulent Texas economy of the '80s is giving way to tamer times," Sharp predicted.

"In 1992 and 1993, Texas will experience slow-to-moderate growth of about three percent annually with relatively low inflation. And that steady rate should continue over the next 10 years, compared to a national growth rate over the next decade of about 2.5 percent per year," Sharp said.

The news should be tempered somewhat by the fact that only three states - Texas, Ohio and Illinois - have seen job increases, while the recession pulled others down.


