Callahan County voters will go to the polls Saturday, May 6, for the Democratic Primary Election.

The race creating the most interest in the county is for Commissioner of Precinct 1, with Irvin Corn seeking re-election, and Tommy Tucker, Cecil Mings and Ralph E. McAdams seeking to unseat him.

Another contested race in the county is for Sheriff, with Grayson Miller seeking re-election, and Billy C. McMillian as his opponent.

Unopposed will be James Paul Shanks for County Attorney and Albert Lovell for Tax Assessor-

Collector.

The governor's race will also be interesting as seven candidates have filed for that position.

State Representative Lynn Nabers has filed for re-election and is challenged by Charles E. Spellman Jr., both are from Brownwood.

## CHARLES McCOWEN GETS 5 YEAR PROBATED SENTENCE

BAIRD — Charles Vincent McCowen, 24, of Cross Plains was convicted of felony charges with a motor vehicle on Jan. 8th. In the death of his wife near Cross Plains. The all-male jury set a maximum five year prison term and recommended probation for the Callahan Co. man.

Evidence showed McCowen's wife and brother-in-law were killed instantly, and his four-year old son critically injured when the McCowen car hit the other car broadsided.

McCowen showed no emotion and continually denied he was intoxicated to the extent that his driving was impaired. A blood alcohol test, taken approximately two hours after the wreck, showed he was beyond the percent reading recognized as the legal point of intoxication.

The jury, after hearing all evidence concerning the case, deliberated about 55 minutes before convicting McCowen and set his punishment after about 25 minutes of discussion.

## CALLAHAN COUNTY SCHOOLS GET REFUNDS ON BOOKS

AUSTIN — Attorney General Crawford Martin today announced recovery of almost \$700,000 from the book publishers and distributors that allegedly conspired to fix the price of children's books sold to Texas schools and libraries.

Martin said the most recent refund boosts Texas' total recovery to more than \$1.1 million in the past year, and that more would be coming.

"In April, 1971, Texas recovered \$464,929 and we now have received an additional \$676,216," Martin said. "There will be one final refund coming this year."

The refund to Texas schools and libraries stems from settlement with the last of more than 30 Book Publishing and Distributing firms sued by Martin in antitrust litigation in 1968.

"As this alleged conspiracy was aimed right at the taxpayers," Martin said, "I'm delighted with the chance to return the taxpayers' money."

Martin said his office is mailing out checks to 757 school districts and 189 public libraries on whose behalf the Attorney General originally filed the price-fixing suit.

General Martin said the most recent refund in Callahan County totals \$495.36 and goes to Baird Independent School District, Clyde ISD, Cross Plains ISD, and Eula School District. Total recovery to date for these entities now amounts to \$887,38.

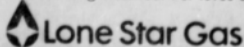

## Area Farmers and Ranchers Convert Old Land To Grassland

**BAIRD** — Approximately 55 Great Plains Conservation Program producers in Callahan County are seeding native and introduced grasses on their farms and ranches this spring, reports A. H. Ringhoffer of the Soil Conservation Service.

These grasses are being seeded on old cropland being converted to grassland, native rangeland, and on waterways which serve as outlets for terrace systems.

Coastal Bermuda grass is scheduled to be sprigged on about 2000 acres and other grasses such as Kielegg, Side-oats Gramma, K. R. Bluestem

and Weeping Lovegrass will be seeded on approximately 4,000 acres.

At this time 151 Great Plains Contracts have been developed on 84,826 acres in Callahan County. Applications have been received on 44 additional farms with 14,515 acres.

These contracts have resulted in the establishment of thousands of acres of productive rangeland on converted cropland and the re-establishment of grasses on native rangeland.

The application of pasture and range management practices such as crossfencing, watering facilities, fertilizing, weed control and a planned grazing system following the establishment of grasses has brought about a greater stability on farms and ranches in Callahan County.

In addition to stabilizing their operating unit, landowners may include practices and measures for enhancing fish and wildlife and recreation resources, and reducing or controlling agriculturally related pollution.

### Don Henry Receives NSF Biology Grant

**CLYDE** — Don Henry, a junior in Clyde High School, has been selected to participate in a Biology Summer Science Training program for High Ability Secondary School student, to be conducted at The University of Texas at Austin June 18 to Aug. 19, with support from the National Science Foundation.

The program will consist of a combination of special course work and research participation based on the individual needs of the participant. Each student will attend classes in the morning and work with a research scientist in laboratory research in the afternoons. Library research will also be an integral part of the program.

Areas in which the students have the opportunity to do laboratory research include: botany, microbiology, zoology and biochemistry, and several related fields such as geology, psychology and pharmacy.

Selection to the program is based on qualification exams given by the National Science Foundation and previous academic work completed in high school.

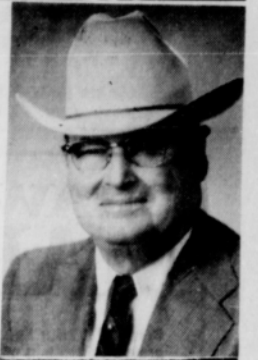

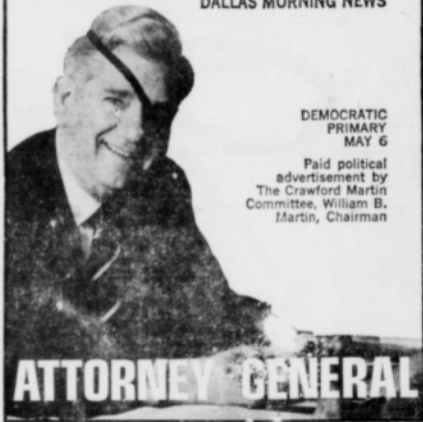

The application for rate increase listed increased costs of buying gas, higher property and equipment costs, increased costs for employee compensation, higher interest rates on borrowed money and increased taxes as primary reasons for the increase.

While other sections of the country are experiencing some shortages of natural gas, Lone Star has maintained favorable supplies. maintain its favorable gas supply position and assure our customers of natural gas service for the future."

Approval of the company's application would increase the average monthly residential gas bill by approximately 78c. Lone Star serves more than 700 customers in Baird.
