#### Chicken Spaghetti

1 chicken, boiled and boned (reserve broth)  
1 medium onion, chopped  
1 medium green pepper, chopped  
1 pkg. elbow or long spaghetti  
1 can tomatoes  
1 can English peas, drained  
1 small jar mushrooms (bits & pieces)  
2 cups grated cheese (low fat)  
Salt, pepper, garlic salt to taste

Saute onions and peppers only until tender, not brown. Add tomatoes and let simmer 25-30 minutes. Add peas, mushrooms, tomato mixture and cut-up chicken to cooked and drained spaghetti. Add enough broth to be moist, but not too soupy. Let simmer about 1 hour. Serve with grated cheese on top.

#### Chicken Salad

4-5 cups cooked chicken  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
1 tsp. celery seeds  
3 diced hard boiled eggs  
1/4 cup green bell pepper  
2 Tbsp. sweet relish  
1/2 cup chopped celery  
1/2 cup light dressing to moisten  
1 tsp. mustard  
1 tsp. sugar  
1/2 cup pimento  
Put ingredients together in that order. Refrigerate.

#### Strawberry Bread

3 cups flour  
2 cups sugar  
1 tsp. soda  
1 tsp. salt  
3/4 cup sugar  
1/4 cup butter  
1 egg  
1/2 cup milk  
1 1/2 cup flour  
2 tps. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 cups frozen blueberries

**Topping**  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/3 cup flour  
1/2 tsp. cinnamon  
1/4 cup butter  
Mix sugar, butter and egg. Sift dry ingredients and add with milk; mix well. Rinse blueberries and stir carefully into batter. Spread into greased and floured 9-inch square pan. Mix topping ingredients together and sprinkle over batter. Bake at 375 degrees 45-50 minutes.

1 Tbsp. cinnamon  
2 (8 oz.) pkg. frozen strawberries  
4 eggs  
1 1/2 cup oil

Combine dry ingredients in large bowl and form well in middle. Place strawberries (minus 1/2 cup juice), 1 1/2 cup oil and well-beaten eggs in flour mixture. Stir well.

Line loaf pans with foil. Bake at 350 degrees 1 hour.

#### Topping

8 oz. light cream cheese  
1/2 cup strawberry juice (from frozen pkg.)

Topping - Combine cream cheese with strawberry juice; mix well; spread on bread.

#### Chicken Wrapped in Bacon

8 boneless chicken breasts  
1 large ctn. sour cream (light)  
8 slices bacon  
2 cans cream of mushroom soup  
Wrap each piece of chicken with 1 slice of bacon. Mix sour cream and soup. Pour mixture over chicken and bacon. Bake covered at 450 degrees 1 1/2 hour. Serve with rice.

#### Blueberry Coffecake

3/4 cup sugar  
1/4 cup butter  
1 egg  
1/2 cup milk  
1 1/2 cup flour  
2 tps. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 cups frozen blueberries

**Topping**  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/3 cup flour  
1/2 tsp. cinnamon  
1/4 cup butter  
Mix sugar, butter and egg. Sift dry ingredients and add with milk; mix well. Rinse blueberries and stir carefully into batter. Spread into greased and floured 9-inch square pan. Mix topping ingredients together and sprinkle over batter. Bake at 375 degrees 45-50 minutes.

Any family in need of assistance may register for the program by calling **Melinda Gonzales at 592-2188** by November 29. Organizations or individuals wishing to help may also call.

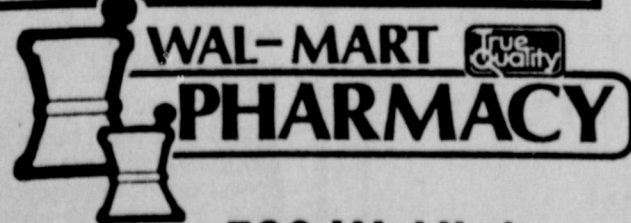
The main goal of this program will be to collect and distribute food and gifts for those in need. Collections will continue through Dec. 19.

She really got into painting during a two-year period when she was having some medical problems. She made many shows then. "It was very good therapy for me," she said.

She enjoys sewing and doing varied crafts but doesn't have time to do much now since she has gone back to work. She is financial secretary for the Woman's Forum in Wichita Falls.

A native of Grandfield, Okla., the Hicks came to Iowa Park shortly after their marriage in 1952. Hicks was from the San Antonio area. Shirley met him when he was in the Oklahoma area crop dusting.

After moving to Iowa Park, Hicks taught general construction in junior high school until his retirement in 1985 because of some physical problems. He does some woodworking now.

Shirley says she was always interested in doing crafts, but really got into it after her three children were grown. Also she enjoys reading and doing crossword puzzles and keeping the grandchildren. "When they get pesky I can always take them home" Shirley said.

HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN - Texas Hispanics and Texas Republicans both called it a victory last week when the U.S. Justice Department threw out the Legislature's proposed redistricting plan for the Texas House.

But unless the federal court orders an interim plan, it's likely to be a short-lived win for Republicans because Democrat Gov. Ann Richards rejected calling the Legislature into special session to devise a remedy.

Instead, Democratic leaders in the House along with Attorney General Dan Morales will redraw political boundaries for approval by a state district judge (Democrat) in South Texas.

While House Republicans, as minority party, were virtually shut out of the legislative process, they will probably have even less voice in crafting the new plan.

Thus, the last hope for Republicans is to ask a three-judge federal panel to draw an interim plan which doesn't squeeze them to extinction.

Anti-Hispanic Bias

The Justice Department struck down the House map for packing and fragmenting Hispanic voters in new districts, particularly in South Texas, El Paso, San Antonio and Dallas.

The plan was basically a compromise to protect Anglo Democrats and ensure solid Hispanic majorities in new seats, but some Hispanic leaders sued to get the extra seats that population figures indicated were due them.

So did Republicans, who were basically cut down to nothing in the Democrat-dominated plan.

What Will Happen?

The course of future Texas politics will be decided by whichever court receives the issue.

To create the full measure of Hispanic seats, the new architect will have to thin out Democratic voters in several districts now held by Anglos.

If that happens, Republicans hope to win more seats at the ballot box; on the other hand, any compromise by Richards and her fellow Democrats will be designed to eliminate them, if possible.

Meanwhile, earlier predictions appear to be coming true: Hispan-

ics will dominate the Texas Democratic Party in the '90s.

Health Policy Task Force

Gov. Richards has established the Texas Health Policy Task Force, which she charged with developing a plan to address the health care and health insurance needs of Texans.

"I am urging the task force to explore comprehensive and meaningful reform — narrow little nips and tucks to pieces of problems will not do," the governor said.

Richards named Shirley Carter, president of Texas Women's University, Denton, to chair the 26-member task force.

The panel, which includes 14 public members and 12 lawmakers, is to issue recommendations for consideration by the Legislature in 1993.

Cooking Hamburgers

Gov. Richards told Texas business leaders to get with it in the international market.

"I'll be darned if I am going to stand by as Governor of Texas and watch us kid ourselves that we can continue to grow economically by cooking each other's burgers and watching each other's hair."

Her speech preceded, by three or four days, the announcement that Houston's Brown & Root Inc. had won a \$7 billion contract to build a luxury resort in Japan.

Gas Pump Inspection

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry is seeking proposals from the private sector to inspect the state's 153,000 gas pumps.

The inspections, currently done by the Agriculture Department, cost the state \$310,000 last year, and the price is expected to rise to \$634,000.

The agency inspects the pumps for accuracy by pumping the gas into a five-gallon container, Perry said.

Low Graduation Rate

The U.S. Census Bureau reported that less than half of Hispanic students in Texas finish high school, compared with graduation

rates of 75 percent for Anglos and 70 percent for African Americans.

"You either educate us (Hispanics) or you pay for building more jails or for more welfare," said Edward Codina of the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities.

Free Campus Condoms

State Rep. Ron Wilson, D-Houston, wants the Legislature to pass his bill next session requiring all public and private colleges to distribute free condoms to students.

Wilson, author of the lottery bill and perhaps the most powerful member of the House Black Caucus, said he would be "naive not to seek passage" of his bill which died in committee last year.

Other Highlights

■ House Speaker Gib Lewis, facing two misdemeanor ethics charges, will go on trial in Austin on Jan. 27, unless his lawyers get his trial moved out of Travis County.

■ Gov. Richards appointed Roy Lee Orr, a former Dallas County commissioner and long-time Democratic Party activist, to the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission. Orr, 59, replaces Louis Pearce Jr. of Houston on the three-member board.

■ Former state Representative, now Houston city councilman Ben Reyes, plea bargained no contest to charges of theft and accepting illegal contributions. Reyes, a Democrat, received probation, then said he may run for the new congressional seat there.

make a difference. The next time they bring home test results, written comments, or report cards, discuss the reasons why they did well or poorly. Help them relate their efforts to the result.

Rewarding a child for improvement is very important. A parent's praise is music to the child's ears. Parents might consider treats or trips or privileges for special achievements. The benefits of doing well in school should always be stressed. Some benefits are immediate, such as having more free time; and some are long-term, such as getting a scholarship or an interesting job upon graduation.

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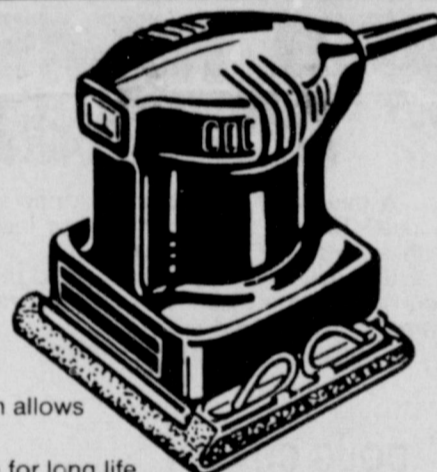

Wichita Falls held a commanding 35-10 lead at the halftime.

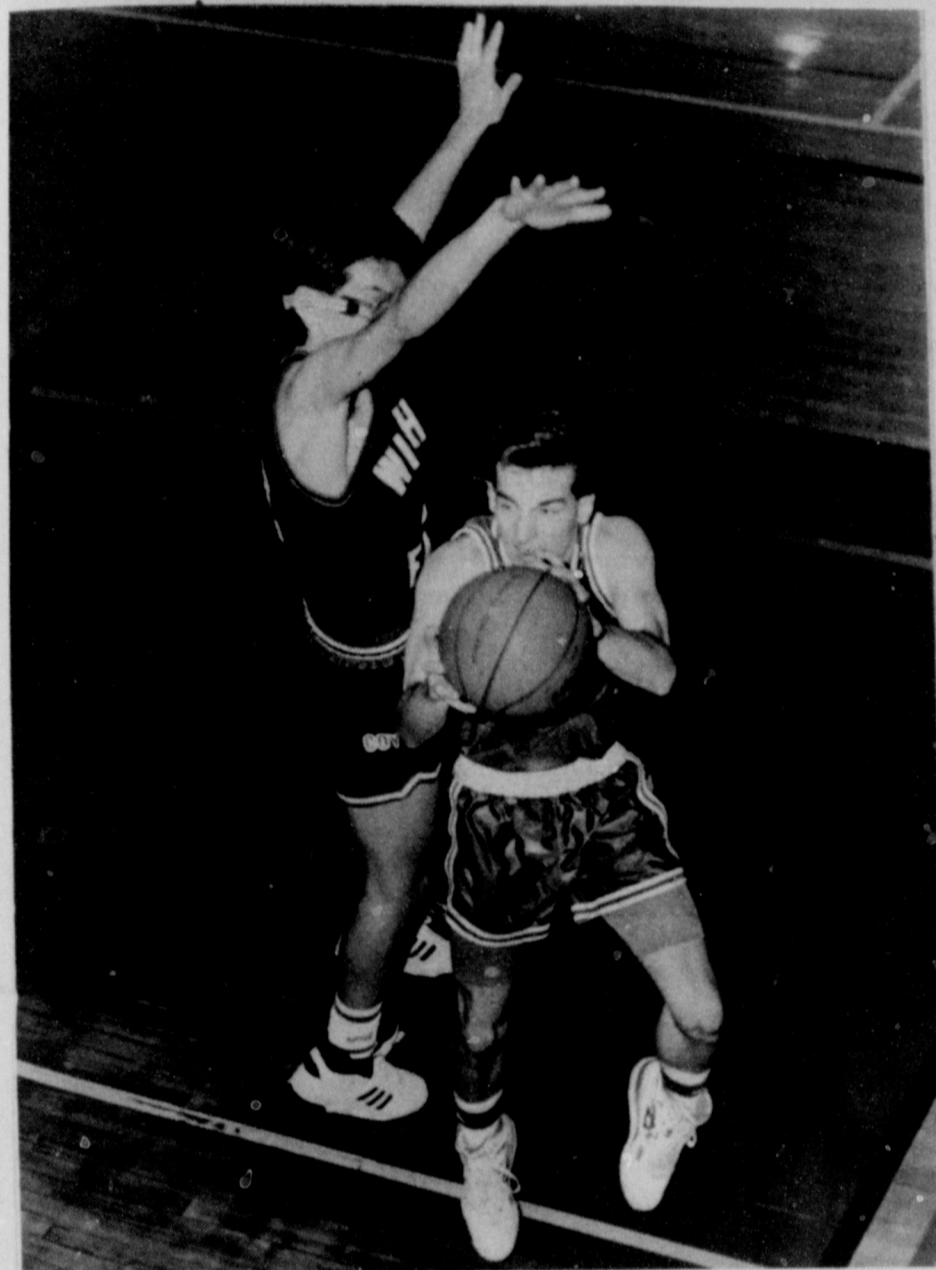
Jon Hankins had eight points to lead the Hawk scorers, and Jeremy Carroll had six.
