## Teachers get contracts

Iowa Park school trustees Monday approved one-year extensions of teacher contracts, and also approved the 1992-93 school calendar, which must receive the blessings of the state commissioner of education.

Classes would begin Aug. 19, and the fall semester completed by Dec. 17, before students go on their Christmas holidays.

One of two full-week breaks that was on a previously-considered calendar was eliminated, leaving one week, Mar. 15-19, for spring break, and the final day of classes will be May 28.

But, because the calendar calls for only 174 days of classes, and six days of teacher inservice sprinkled through the school year, Supt. Glen Mitchell told the board it would require the commissioner's approval.

While recognizing the responsibility of the school was to accomplish many of the junior high band building's improvements, the board "gratefully" accepted a donation of \$4,800 from the students to do part of the work.

Director Ed Hefti told the board the students had raised the money during a fall project, with the desire that improvements not funded by the recent bond issue be made.

During a discussion on the proposal, it was generally agreed by the trustees that donated money not needed in the project would be returned to the students to be used however they wished.

Among the improvements proposed for the instrument room were: gut it completely; cover existing heading and air conditioning ductwork, install drop ceiling and new lighting; build instrument shelves and cover with carpet; tile floor; painting room, and install double door with windows and locks.

Additionally, the proposal included painting the restrooms, replacing ceiling tiles near water fountain, replace broken mirrors, replace cracked commodes, paint outside door and lock fuse box.

Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer, who oversees work requests on all campuses, said he had never seen requests for replacement of mirrors and

commodes. Trustees approved Career Ladder Levels II and III payments of \$1,500 and \$3,000, respectively, to be made with the May checks, following an April meeting concerning qualifications.

Tax Collector Allen Shewmake told the board his office had filed three suits in court against three major delinquent taxpayers, and one had already paid.

To better utilize the \$21,000 budgeted by the board for the purchase of a van, Palmer suggested the board consider purchasing as many as three used vans which may become available by local owners.

The vans, he explained, would be used by smaller groups being taken to numerous events and activities.

Board members accepted a recommendation of adding five honors classes to the high school curriculum, over a two-year period.

The classes would include Computer Science II, Algebra II, Geometry II, and English II and III.

Following an executive session that lasted from 6:18 to 8:35 p.m., the board voted approval of teacher lists from all four campuses to receive contracts.

## Water district contract approved by 3-2 vote

The city council Monday night narrowly approved an amendment to the contract for selling water to the Wichita Valley Water Supply Corp.

The contract, which sets the rate the corporation will pay at \$1.0715 per 1,000 gallons, was approved by a 3-2 vote.

Alderman Bob Hamilton voiced objection that the contract included no language limiting the growth of meters the corporation can put on lines served by the city.

"It's an open-ended contract," Hamilton said. "They (corporation) can continue adding as many customers as they wish, without even consulting us on how many and how much. We have no control."

Mayor Wayne House responded that even if the corporation should begin to purchase more water than the city's treatment plant can produce, "We still have a backup with our pipeline to Wichita Falls."

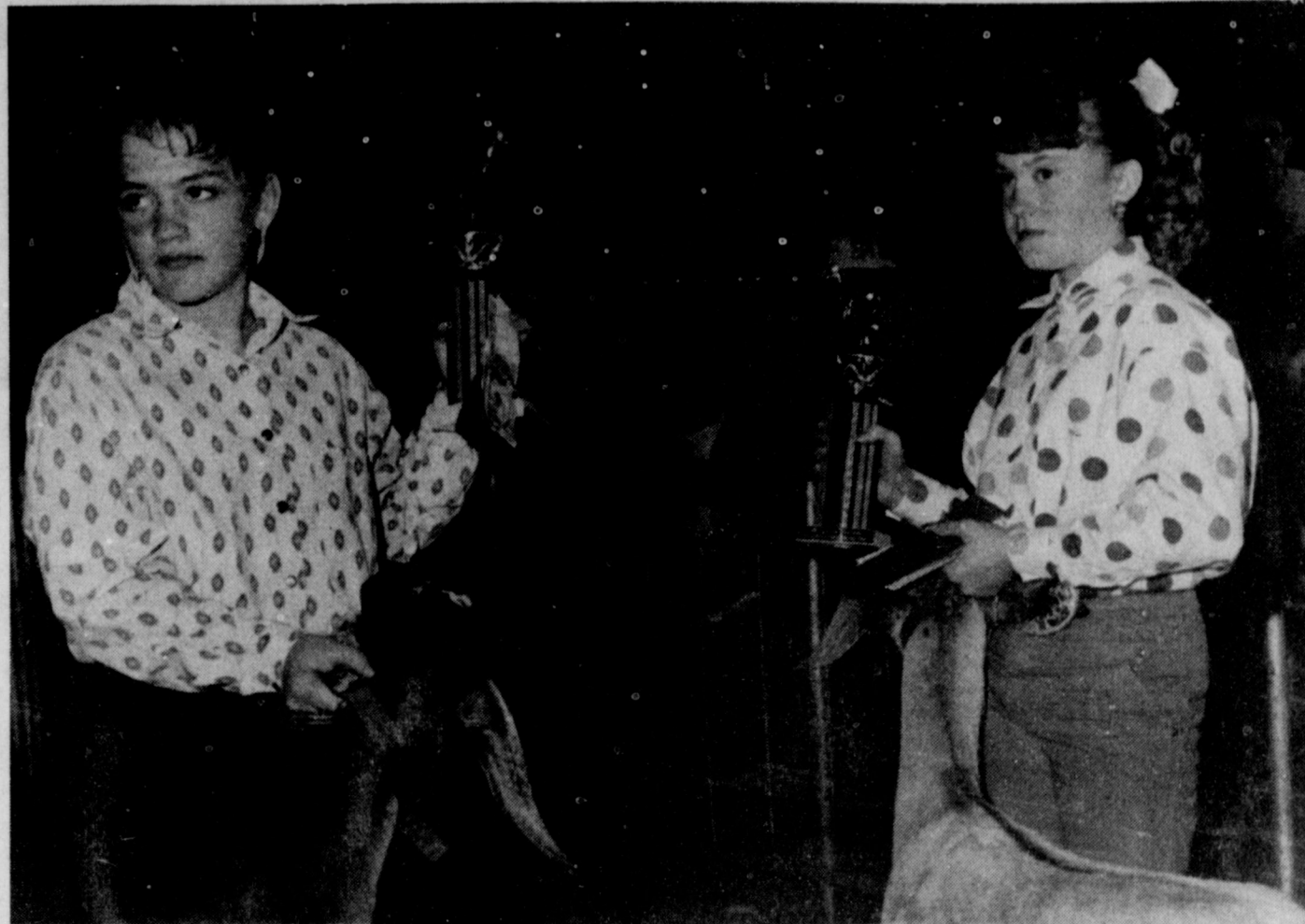
Besides the change in rate, the city's requirement to provide a certain pressure at the point of delivery was reduced in the contract's language.

A change in the amount charged for water will be varied in the fall, depending on any rate change charged by Wichita Falls for water sold to Iowa Park.

Hamilton and Mark Raby voted against the amendment, while Johnny Crawford, Charlie Helms and Virgil Woodfin voted for its passage.

The council heard a request from Mr. and Mrs. Danny Bohannon to purchase their property which is in the flood zone below Lake Gordon.

The couple complained that the city allowed them to put their mobile home on lots they had purchased, and then told them they could not make any improvements because of restrictions imposed by city ordinance regarding the floodway.

## Democrats must return for three local runoffs

Tuesday's primary election failed to decide all the winners.

Democratic Party voters in Precincts Three and Four will return to the polls April 14 to decide the winners of three runoff races.

Both county offices affecting Precinct Three voters in Iowa Park, county commissioner and constable, will be decided then, as well as the Precinct Four constable.

Incumbent Commissioner Gordon Griffith drew 1,294 votes, 39.22 per-

cent, and Wichita Falls challenger J.C. Thompson received 739 votes, or 22.4 percent of the votes cast.

Neither Aubrey C. Bohannon nor Sam Fairchild drew a majority in their bid for Precinct Three constable. Bohannon, seeking the position being vacated by his retiring father, received 635 votes, 43.7 percent, and Fairchild drew 573, 39.44 percent.

A runoff also resulted for Precinct Four constable, when Don Brewer drew 240 votes and Jerry Jones received 185. Mary Ward was third-highest vote

getter in the commissioner's race, receiving 550, or 16.67 percent of the votes.

Other Precinct Three commissioner candidates were Denny McCarthy, 228, and Jerry Dean Simmons, 186.

Receiving 113 votes in his bid for Precinct Three constable, and preventing a clear majority, was Joe Price.

Jeffrey Don Gee drew 158 votes in his bid for Precinct Four constable, and Glen Avery earned 63.

Brewer was one vote short of equaling Avery's 61 at voting precinct 34 box, which was at West Wichita Coop Building where Brewer works as director of the Coop.

The winners of the three runoffs will be declared the winners, because there are no Republican candidates for either of the offices.

The voting was extremely close in voting precinct 32, where Bohannon got 353 and Fairchild 351 votes.

Bohannon received a commanding lead from voting precinct 33, where he got 138 votes and Fairchild only 98.

Bohannon also edged Fairchild in box 35, at Chaparral Baptist Assembly. There, he received 54 votes and 39 went to Fairchild.

As usual, box 32 had the largest voter turnout in the county with 841 ballots cast. Box 33 had 297, 67 at box 34 and 108 at box 35.

## January business jumps, according to sales taxes

January sales gave Iowa Park a whopping increase in sales tax receipts, according to this month's statement by the state comptroller's office.

The city received a check for \$17,106.72, reflecting sales taxes collected by local businesses in January, and paid to the state office in February.

That was a \$1.14-percent increase over the \$11,318.19 check the city received this month in 1991, according to the report.

It also increased the city's sales tax receipts by 13.29 percent over the same period last year, which is almost four

percent greater than any other city in Wichita County.

So far this year, \$49,727.31 has been received by the city, as compared to \$43,893.61 during the same period in 1991.

Electra is showing a 9.81-percent gain over last year, Burkburnett 5.92 and Wichita Falls 3.24 percent, for an overall county average of a plus 3.68 percent over the same period last year.

Business has not been as good in Holliday and other Archer County communities. Holliday is a minus 12.99 percent.

## School draws trustee candidate

Both places on the school board, to be voted on May 2, now have a candidate, election officials report.

But both the city alderman positions that are up for election this year remain without candidates.

Incumbent Jerry Reed has filed for re-election to his Place Four position on the school board.

Place Five, which has been held by Denny McCarthy, drew a candidate this week, when Jennifer Stewart filed for a place on the ballot.

Places Two and Four on the city council remain without any takers. They are currently held by Charlie Helms and Johnny Crawford, respectively.

Incumbent Mayor Wayne House has drawn a challenge from Mike Grubbs.

Wednesday, Mar. 18, is the deadline to file in either the school or city election.

To file in the school election, candidates must register at the administration building. City candidates file at city hall.










## March is Poison Prevention Month



## Police activity slow last week

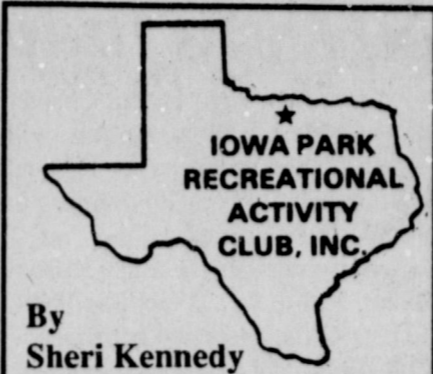
In an unusually slow week for the Iowa Park Police Dept., only one arrest was recorded, as well as one theft and one case of forgery.

# SCHOOL SCENE

Information prepared by Iowa Park School Counselors

A new program will be underway at Bradford Elementary Monday, March 23. It has been named The Exemplary Reading Program.

The program is for students that have been identified as dyslexic and in need of different methods of instruction to learn reading, writing and spelling.

Dyslexia is a disorder where one has difficulty learning to read, write or spell with conventional methods used in the regular classroom, despite adequate intelligence and socioeconomic opportunity.

Iowa Park Consolidated School District has chosen the curriculum designed and used at the Texas Scottish Rite Hospital in Dallas. This curriculum includes more than one mode in presenting information to be learned by the student.

The student will "see" (visual),

"hear" (auditory) and "touch" (kinesthetic) what they are to learn. This program will emphasize the teaching of phonics and comprehension skills.

Once a child is accepted into the Exemplary Reading Program it will take two years (350 one-hour lessons) before they can graduate from this program.

We are looking at the first 10 weeks of the program this year as a "pilot" so that we may work out the "bugs" and perfect our implementation.

The program will grow and expand as we are beginning with only two classes this last 10 weeks of school this year for the pilot.

Diane Granbery will teach one class, and Mary Helzlsouer will teach the second class. Class size is limited to eight students as recommended in the Scottish Rite curriculum.

**Cook of the Week**

Jean said that she loves to cook and use to spend hours in the kitchen. But when Bill had open heart surgery, it changed their eating habits considerably. She collected recipes from friends in the different countries in which they have lived, and the recipes for "German Beef Rolls" and "Oriental Fried Rice" are from that collection.

**All-Purpose Yeast Rolls**  
(no cholesterol recipe)

1/4 cup warm water  
1 pkg. active dry yeast  
Dissolve yeast in water.  
1/4 cup Canola oil  
1/4 cup sugar  
3/4 tsp. salt  
1 cup scalded skim milk  
Combine in large bowl and allow to cool.

Add:  
Yeast mixture  
1/4 cup egg substitute  
5 cups all-purpose flour

Mix well and allow to rise until double in bulk. Punch down and shape into rolls, or make cinnamon rolls. Let rise for one hour, then bake at 400 degrees until lightly brown.

**German Beef Rolls**

2 rounds of beef sliced paper thin  
2 Tbsps. bottled French dressing  
1 tsp. horseradish  
Spread French dressing/horseradish mixture evenly over sliced beef. Let stand several hours.  
1 med. onion, chopped  
3 slices white bread, cubed

Saute onion and bread in oil, then spread evenly on beef slices. Roll up and secure with skewers or toothpicks. Brown each beef roll on all sides. Place in oven-safe pan.

Combine:  
1 can tomato sauce  
3/4 cup beer  
1/2 tsp. thyme  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. pepper

Pour over beef rolls. Cover and bake 1 1/2 hours at 350 degrees. (Serves 4).

**Chili Con Queso**

1 1/2 pounds Velveeta cheese  
1/2 cup chopped onions  
2 fresh tomatoes, skinned and diced  
1 can diced green chiles  
1 - 14 oz. pkg. corn tortillas

Melt cheese. Stir in onion, tomato and chiles. Layer cheese sauce and tortillas in greased casserole. End with layer of cheese sauce on top. Bake at 350 degrees 20 minutes. Allow to stand 5 minutes before serving.

**Frozen Pickles**

2 quarts sliced cucumbers (slice thin)  
1 large onion  
2 Tbsps. salt

Mix and cover with water. Let soak for 2 hours, then drain. Mix 1 1/2 cups sugar and 1/2 cup vinegar. Pour over pickles and put in containers and freeze. (Will keep well in refrigerator for 2 weeks).

**Oriental Fried Rice**

3 cups water  
1 1/2 cups long grain rice  
Bring water to boil; add rice and bring back to boiling. Cover and let stand for one hour. (Or boil rice if desired.)

Slice:  
2 carrots  
1 large onion  
1 bell pepper

Saute in oil in large frying pan until crunchy. Add 1 cup chopped ham, cooked ground beef, chopped chicken or other leftover meat.

Add cooked rice and stir well. Add soy sauce to taste. Just prior to serving, make "nest" in center of frying pan and add 1 beaten egg, stirring constantly and gradually stirring in rice as the egg cooks. Serve immediately. Serves 4.

**Brownies**

1/4 cup melted shortening  
6 Tbsps. cocoa  
1 cup sugar  
2 eggs, well beaten  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1/2 cup flour  
1/2 cup nuts

Mix well and bake in square pan at 350 degrees 25-30 minutes. For an extra treat, ice with chocolate icing.

**Programs focus on preventing student problems**

Although Iowa Park's substance abuse statistics are among the lowest in the area, it is the feeling of the district that any problem is too much. Because of this, the district plans specific programs to combat drug and alcohol problems. Beginning in the lower grades students are taught the dangers of alcohol and drugs. Bradford Elementary is a participant in the D.A.R.E. program in cooperation with the Iowa Park Police. Local businesses during 1991-92 donated money to assist with prevention. At the high school level Just Say No, Students Against Drunk Driver, and Project Graduation are conducted each year. In addition the district periodically uses drug dogs. These programs have been highly successful with the number of problem cases dropping each year.

**Sex Respect curriculum to be presented at Iowa Park Junior High**

Iowa Park Junior High will present a three week sex education program entitled Sex Respect. The program is abstinence based, designed to teach students that it is O.K. to say no to sex, and teaches students how to say no to sex. The Sex Respect Curriculum was unanimously selected by the Iowa Park Junior High Sex Education committee after reviewing material for about six months. Pat Davis, Junior High counselor, chaired the committee, which consisted of four teachers, two nurses, and Edward Prince, Chairman of the local ministerial alliance. The program will be offered to sixth and eighth grade students in the 1991/92 school year, and in the 1992/93 school years. In subsequent school years it will only be offered to sixth grade students. This will allow all students currently enrolled to take the course before they go to High School. Funds for the program have been provided by the Optimist Club of Iowa Park, Noon Lions Club of Iowa Park, Iowa Park CISD, Iowa Park Junior High PTSA, Pediatric Therapy Associates of Dallas, and various anonymous donors.

**District Begins Sex Respect Program**

**District Scores Indicate Excellent Performance**

During the months of December, 1991, and January, 1992, the school system released test scores and data as part of the Texas Academic Excellence Indicator System. A wide range of information was presented that described virtually every facet of the school district operations. In addition the data was compared to a list of school districts having demographics similar to Iowa Park. The December report described the 1990-91 school year. The January report described the A.C.T. and S.A.T. scores from the 1989-90 school year and the T.A.A.S. data from the current 1991-92 school year.

Overall the reports showed the district to be performing very well on standardized tests. The S.A.T. scores of the 952 on the Total Mean Score exceeded the state average of 872 and the national average of 900. The A.C.T. Mean Composite Score of 21.0 place the Iowa Park Graduates well ahead of the state average of 19.8 and the national average score of 20.6. Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer in describing the scores stated, "This is where Iowa Park is superior. We have good to very good programs in many areas, but we are superior at getting our students ready for college. Among the important items of data presented as part of the A.E.I.S. report were: the district has a 19.9% mobility rate among its students which is lower than the state average despite the presence of a large number of Sheppard Air Base students; 21.7% of the students are listed as economically disadvantaged, again well below the state average of 39.1%; the largest percentage of school taxes are paid by businesses, paying 39.7% of the school district's taxes.

At the January meeting T.A.A.S. scores for 1991-92 were presented. The test scores reflected the new state scoring standard. Counselor Pat Davis explained that this made comparisons with past years impossible because two different standards were used to score the test. The highest percentage of mastery was 92% in third grade mathematics.

High School counselor LaRae Collins recognized the eleventh grade writing score of 89% as being outstanding.

**IOWA PARK WELCOMES CHANUTE FAMILIES**

As the time rapidly approaches for Sheppard Air Force Base personnel to begin their move from Chantue Air Base, the schools and citizens are extending an invitation for these future Texans to visit and join Iowa Park. At the present time 115 Iowa Park students are connected to Sheppard Air Force Base. The students are a welcome and vital part of the school district. The school recognizes this and makes special efforts to serve these students.

The district offers the incoming Chantue students a high quality district that leads area schools in many educational areas. Literary teams have won many competitions. Students entering college from Iowa Park have been highly successful. This success has been predicted by the school's area leading scores on S.A.T. and A.C.T. college entrance exams.

Iowa Park schools offer small school concern and large school course and activity offerings. As its motto states the district sees its students as "An Investment in the Future."

The district offers a stable environment that prides itself on the high level performance of its students.

**New commissioner moves Texas toward World Class Standard**

When the State Board of Education hired Dr. Skip Memo as the new Commissioner of Education, they also gave him the assignment of bringing Texas schools up to an acceptable level of performance. The commissioner not only accepted this assignment, but expanded it by declaring the schools of Texas to operate at a World Class Level.

The Iowa Park Schools, like all other schools in Texas, find themselves in the position of reexamining their programs and attempting to ascertain what changes will be required to get to the World Class Level. This is an unusual situation for Iowa Park. For many years Iowa Park schools have been considered among the highest performing in Texas. What appeared to be a good situation getting better was actually a good situation in Texas losing ground to the rest of the world.

The Iowa Park Schools were scoring among the highest in Texas and actually making small improvements on these scores. However, on a world scale, other industrialized countries, particularly in the area of science and math, were making much larger gains.

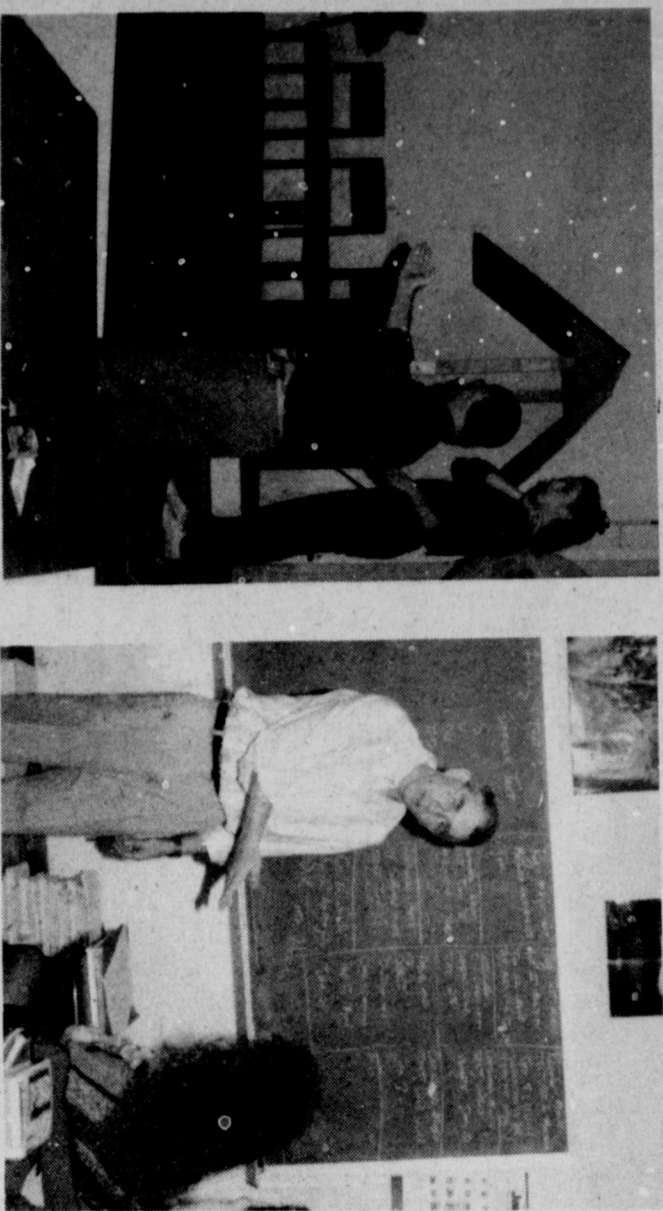
What does this mean for Iowa Park? It means, quite simply that, despite having a reputation for offering quality programs, Iowa Park will be studying the probability of making specific program changes. In fact, committees are already formed and preliminary efforts have occurred in the area of mathematics curriculum. Other areas will follow.

The challenge to the parents of Iowa Park is very simple. Your students will be entering an era of greater intensified study. Parents support and cooperation will be important. Parents should teach their children early in their school life that school is important and good study skills are structural and planned.

The students produced under World Class Standard requirements will have spent more time and more effort preparing themselves to go out into the world of work and compete successfully with students from other industrialized nations. We at the Iowa Park schools are preparing our students to meet that challenge.

## Programs provided for students with special needs

The Iowa Park Schools provide a wide variety of programs for students with special needs. These include: Gifted and talented, English as a Second Language, Special Education, Speech Therapy, Dyslexia, and Chapter 1. Gifted and Talented is offered at all grade levels K-12. A pull out program entitled S.P.A.A.C.E. utilizes a full time G/T teacher in grades K-5. The program provides extended activities in addition to the required curriculum. A special activity during the 1991-92 school year was the "Invention Convention" which allowed the students to combine their creative skills with their class learning activities.

The G/T program in grades 6-12 is accomplished as a differentiated instruction allowing the Language Arts teachers to modify their class activities to allow the G/T students to do problem solving and in depth research and reporting in areas of personal interest.

The English as a Second Language program is offered to all students who do not have English as a primary language. The students work with a highly skilled instructor to improve their language skills. In the past four years this has included students with primary language skills in: French, Spanish, Japanese, German and Norwegian.

All schools in the district provide Special Education instruction. Support skills are provided by the West Wichita County Cooperative. This past year the Transitional Learning Center was completed for students with Severe and Profound Handicaps. The center currently serves eleven students. It is one of the very few of its type in North Texas and is unique in its ability to provide services to these students. Speech Therapy is offered as part of the Special Education Program. The district employs a full time specialist to serve the students.

The Iowa Park School System is one of the very few in North Texas to use the complete Scottish Rites Dyslexia program with its students. The district purchased the system during the 1991-92 school year and it is currently being used with students in the district.

The District operates a Chapter 1 Remedial program in grades 1-8. Students scoring below the 50th percentile in Math or Language Arts have a Chapter 1 teacher's aide assigned to their Math or Language Arts class to assist them. They are not removed from the instruction received by all students but receive assistance with problem areas.

It is the desire of the district to meet the needs of the students and every attempt is made through special programs to accomplish this goal.

At a time when some school districts are decreasing their vocational programs, Iowa Park continues to offer strong programs in: Business, Cosmetology, Horticulture, Homemaking, Auto Mechanics, C.V.A.R., and Vocational Agriculture.

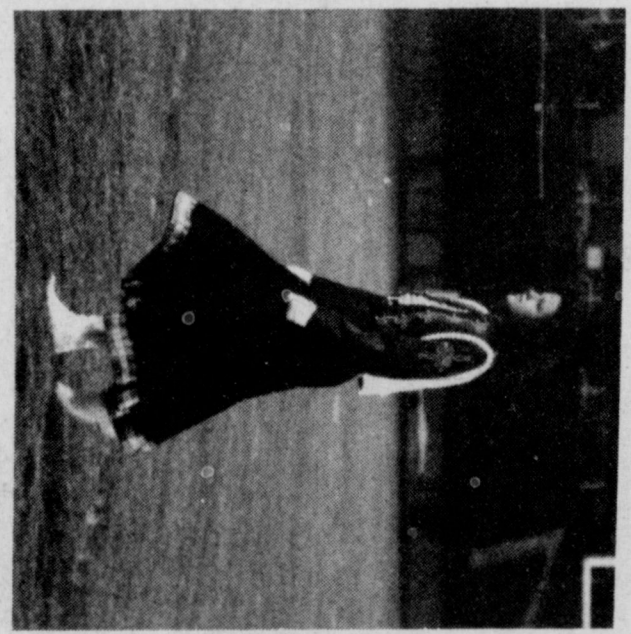

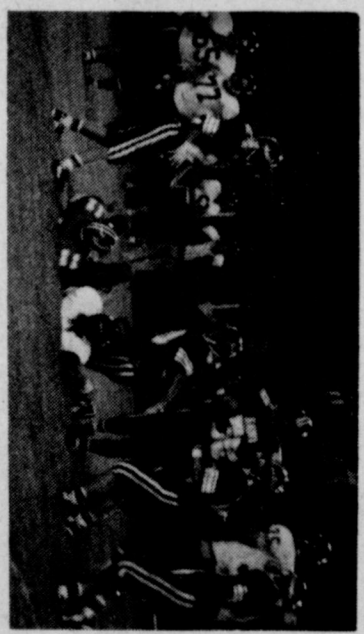

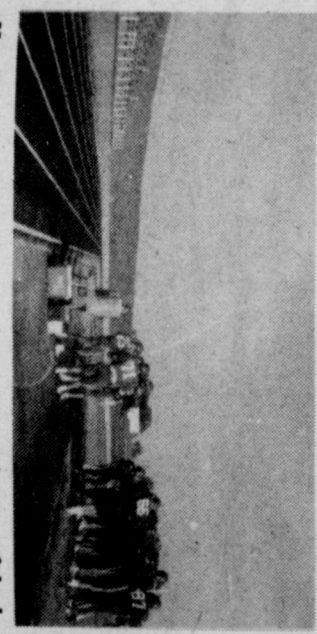

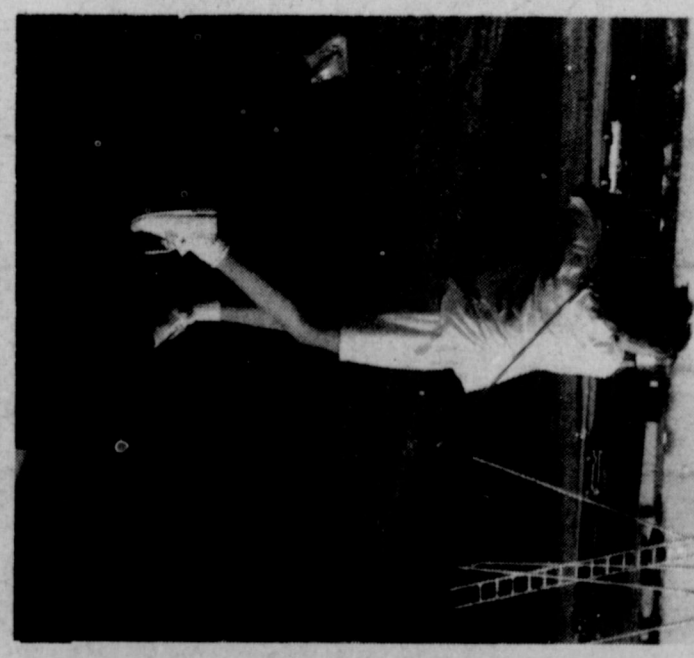

# Hawks, Lady Hawks second in own meet

Iowa Park's varsity teams placed second in last week's annual Iowa Park Lions Club Hawk Relays.

While the Lady Hawks were unable to defend the title they had held the previous two years, being relegated to second wasn't anything for them to hang their heads, however. They were defeated by Amarillo Tascosa, a Class AAAAA school.

The Hawks were edged by three points by perennial track power Vernon. Bowie was third and Childress fourth. Iowa Park was also the defending champion of that division.

The Lady Hawks were also forced to compete with another large Amarillo school, Caprock. Tascosa and Caprock were the only schools who had entered Division III, so they were placed in Division II, which originally had been set up for AAA schools, as well as AAAA and AAAAA junior varsities.

Electra girls won Division I, and Nocona was second. That division was for all schools smaller than AAA, and the AAA junior varsities. Iowa Park placed fifth.

Division III was for smaller schools' boys' teams. Electra also won that division, followed by the Bowie JV. Iowa Park's JV placed fourth.

Only four teams entered Division V. Three were AAAAA schools, Rider, Tascosa, and Wichita Falls High, and AAAAA Hirschi. Rider won first place and Tascosa was second.

This was the first year the meet was held over a two-day period. Preliminaries were run Friday afternoon, at the same time two field events, the boys' pole vault and girls' triple jump, were being run off. Saturday morning, the 3200-meter run was held, as well as all the remaining field events. The finals in all running events except the two-mile race were held that afternoon.



The Hawks finished in second place in the Wichita Falls Baseball Classic division for large schools.

After knocking off Hirschi, 13-3, and Burk Burnett, 5-2, the short-handed Hawks fell victim to Duncan by an 8-1 margin in Saturday's championship contest.

All the team showed up before the start of the title game, but two of the starters weren't on the field when the final out was recorded.

Catcher Todd Pulley was ejected when the umpire said he violated the "malicious conduct" rule as he attempted to score in the first inning.

The senior catcher was between third base and home when Duncan's catcher was thrown the ball on a defensive play. A collision ensued at the plate.

An off-duty official explained Pulley had, after the collision, extended his arms in a shoving motion, triggering the "malicious conduct" call.

Then, in the fifth inning, shortstop Tony Lozipone was ejected when he threw his batting helmet onto the field after being called out on a non-swung pitch.

Lozipone had been confronted just before the incident after apparently saying something to the umpire about another call. Coach Daryl Frazier also talked with the player.

Duncan scored twice in the third, added one more in both the fourth and fifth innings, and took advantage of

numerous errors in the final frame to send four more across the plate.

Chad Thompson, who was credited with the loss, and J'Bill Merrick both saw their first action of the season on the mound.

Miller, Robert Denton, Jeremy Carroll and Thompson were the only Hawks who had hits.

Iowa Park opened tournament play with a 13-3 win over Hirschi, as Brent Brown went the distance on the mound, allowing six hits.

Led by Lozipone, Pulley, Carroll, Denton and Merrick with their bats, the Hawks collected 13 hits against Husky pitchers. They also took advantage of six errors on Hirschi's part.

In Friday's game, which started almost two hours later than scheduled, the Hawks not only earned their ticket into the finals, but took revenge of an earlier one-point loss, by defeating Burk Burnett 5-2.

Ralph Dillard limited Bulldog batters to only three hits in the game,

while the Hawk bats supported him with five hits.

The Hawks jumped out to a 3-1 lead in the first inning, added another in the second and one more in the fifth and final inning. Burk's second run was posted in the third.

Lozipone, Patrick Kennedy and Carroll each had singles.

The Hawks apparently took out their frustration of losing to Duncan Tuesday, when they traveled to Olney and knocked off the Cubs 15-0 in five

innings.

That raised their record to 5-2. Merrick was credited with the win, as he and Hillard limited Olney to only two hits.

Two-base hits were recorded by Pulley, Kennedy, Carroll and Miller, and Denton had a triple.

Iowa Park is scheduled to travel to Childress Friday, and then play in the Mar. 19-21 tournament at Burk Burnett.

Two Iowa Park teams, the Spurs and Hornets, won their respective division championships in the Wichita Falls Boys Club league play.

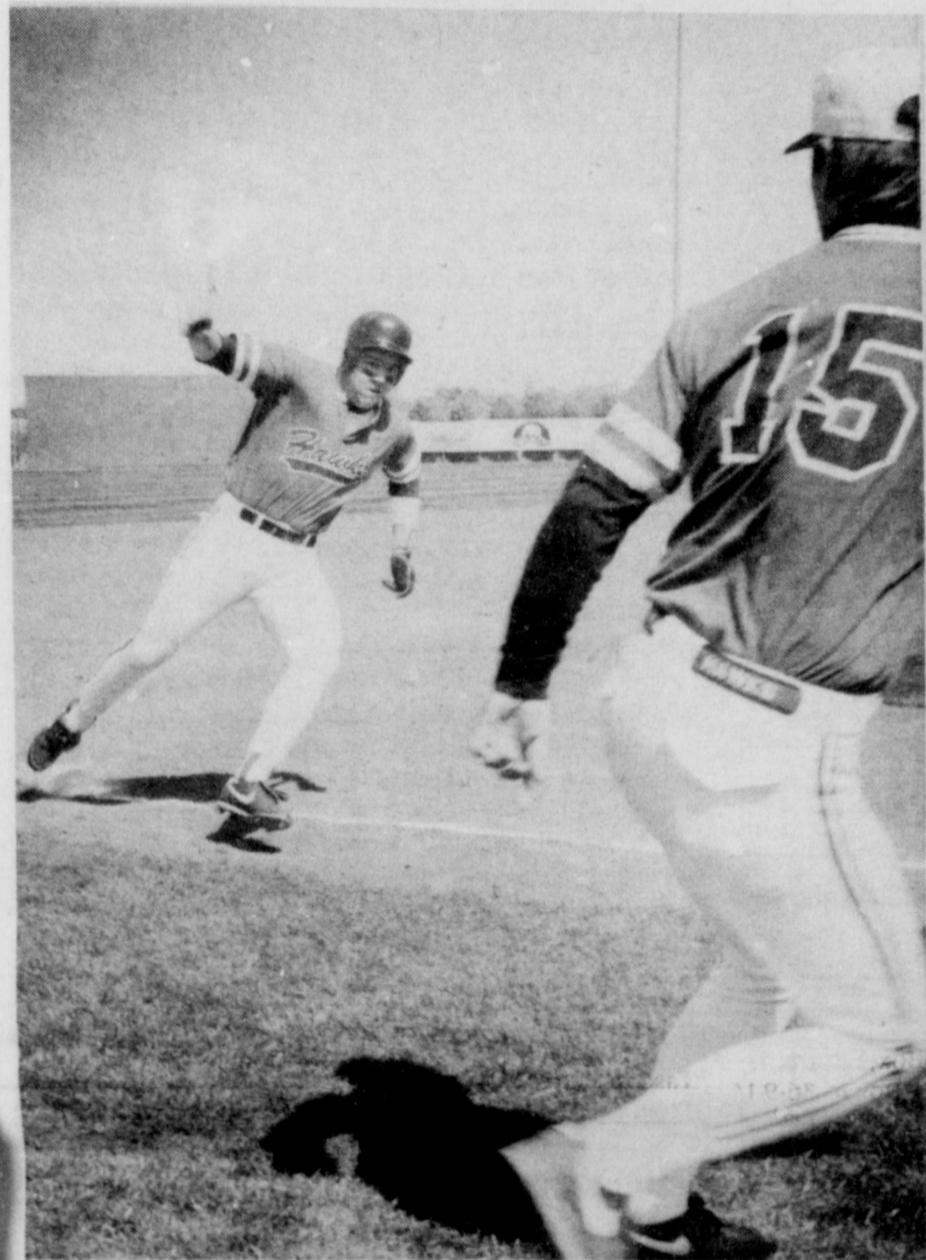
Both will now compete in regional play, with the Spurs playing in Wichita Falls and the Hornets in Arlington.
