A new program will be underway at Bradford Elementary Monday, Exemplary Reading Program. The program is for students that have been identified as dyslexic and in need of different methods of instuction to learn reading, writing and spelling.
Dyslexia is a disorder where one has difficulty learning to read, write or spell with conventional method used in the regular classroom, despite adequate imtellige
nomic opportunity.

Iowa Park Consolidated Schoo District has chosen the curriculum designed and used at the Texas Sco tish Rite Hospital in Dallas. This cur riculum includes more than one mode in presenting information tobe learne by the student.
"hear" (auditory) and "touch" (kines-
thetic) what they are to learn. This program will emphasize the teaching of phonics and comprehension skills. Once a child is accepted into the Exemplary Reading Program it will take two years ( 350 one-hour lessons) before they can graduate from this program.
We are looking at the first 10 weeks of the program this year as a "bugs" and perfect tion. pand as we are beginning with only two classes this last 10 weeks of school this year for the pilot.

Diane Granbery will teach one class, and Mary Helzlsouer will teach the second class. Class size is limited to eight students as recommended in the Scottish Rite curriculum.

## HOPE

A few years ago I was reading of an individual who visited the famous Menninger psychiatric clinic. He discovered from the staff what the key issue was in treating and healing people with serious emotional problems. The staff stated the key that made the most difference was hope! The staff did not know how to give people hope but readily recognized the change in a person when hope came!
In the Hebrew and Greek the word hope carries the meaning of awaiting with expectation. People lose hope from several factors: taking their eyes away from Christ and letting what appears weaken their hope, concentration on their own weaknesses combined with a feeling of being overpowered by an enemy: sometimes our own past experiences that have been filled with personal defeats and failures; friends who have broken promises to us and deserted us all work together to take away the glimmer of the light of hope.
What keeps the light of hope alive in man? As one reads the Word of God, we discover the faithful trust that awaiting people find in the Lord. The psalmist gives encouragement: "be of good courage and he shallstrengthen your heart, all ye that hope in the Lord." (Psalm 31:24). Jeremiah gives a great declaration of faith. "The Lord is my portion, saith my soul; therefore I will hope in Him." (Lamentations 3:24). When we consider the background and experiences of Jeremiah and David their statements of faithful hope mean more to us. Paul brings to the Christian a true and faithful hope, knowing the One who promised is always faithful and true, "in hope of eternal life, which God, that cannot lie, promised before the world began." (Titus 1:2).
