Officer's firing fails to get council support

The firing of Police Officer Wayne Shewey was not supported by the required number of aldermen, during Monday night's meeting of the city council.

A 3-2 vote to sustain Shewey's dismissal did not meet the two-thirds required by law. He is scheduled to return to work Friday, according to Chief Wayne Parsons.

Shewey, who was fired April 22 by Parsons and consequently supported by City Administrator Gary Jones, had appeared before the council last week, and through his attorney requested a week's delay in his hearing.

The hearing, by Shewey's request, was held in open session. He had the option of requesting the hearing to be held in executive session.

Voting in support of the firing were aldermen Charlie Helms, Johnny Crawford and Bob Hamilton. Virgil Woodfin and Mark Raby voted against it.

Following a statement by Parsons and Shewey's legal council, Marty Cannedy, four individuals from among the packed audience spoke in support of Shewey.

Parson's presentation primarily was to read from a letter he had prepared for the administrator's consideration to fire Shewey. It stated:

"Attached is a copy of a letter that I presented to Officer Wayne Shewey

on April 22, 1992. Listed below is a history of this officer which, in my opinion, indicates a lack of concern for the City of Iowa Park and the Iowa Park Police Department.

"The history also indicates to me that the officer is not willing nor has not made any attempt to improve or correct his mistakes. Therefore, I am left with no recourse but to relieve the officer of his duties in order to maintain discipline and promote harmony among the remaining personnel of the department."

The "history" Parsons referred to was as follows:

February, 1989: Officer was reprimanded for being late for a mandatory meeting of personnel of the department.

February, 1989: Officer was placed on a 90 day probation and reverted to a part-time position due to work record.

August, 1989: Officer received a 1 day suspension for violating the Open Records Act in disclosing confidential information of a personnel investigation on another officer to an unauthorized person.

May, 1990: Officer was suspended 3 days for causing an unauthorized expense to the City of Iowa Park.

June, 1990: Officer, while off duty, was in an altercation at Lake Iowa Park involving two intoxicated individuals yet took no enforcement action as required by policy.

August, 1990: Officer was coun-

seled on report writing and improper paperwork.

October, 1990: Officer was reprimanded for calling in sick and then attending a haunted house event in Wichita Falls.

January, 1991: Officer mishandled evidence that made the processing of the evidence for court purposes impossible. Officer also conducted improper search of prisoner.

February, 1991: Officer was counseled on poor report writing.

July, 1991: Officer was counseled on improper paperwork.

July, 1991: Officer was counseled on improper paperwork and incomplete paperwork.

September, 1991: Officer was counseled on incomplete paperwork and made insubordinate remarks in writing on the report towards another personnel of the department.

November, 1991: Officer was reprimanded on improper paperwork.

December, 1991: Officer was counseled on incomplete paperwork.

December, 1991: Officer submitted a letter to the Chief of Police, a Lieutenant, and the Sergeant of the department suggesting that he was being singled out from the rest of the personnel of the department. On the same day of the letter, officer failed to complete a citation properly.

March, 1992: Officer was late for court and had to be called at home. Officer was asleep and had no excuse.

April, 1992: Received a phone call from a concerned citizen regarding officers conduct while off duty. Caller advised that officer was intoxicated on Tuesday, April 14, 1992, and driving while he was intoxicated. The intoxication can be verified in that officer called the station on that date while in an apparent intoxicated condition.

April, 1992: Officer harassed and damaged former residence while under restraining order as a result of divorce proceedings. Wichita County Sheriffs Office was dispatched to assist officer's estranged wife.

Attorney Cannedy, as part of his presentation, told the council he had

Bank celebrates 60th anniversary

Highlighting its 60th anniversary observance Friday, the State National Bank will have what is expected to be the largest free lunch ever offered in Iowa Park.

A full meal, including brisket and sausage with red beans, cole slaw and all the trimmings, including dessert, will be catered by the Iowa Park MuleSkinners. Service is to begin at 11 a.m. and conclude at 1 p.m.

The west-bound lane of Park Ave. in front of the bank will be closed off to traffic, allowing space for a tent to be erected, as well as various displays.

Among the other activities of the day will be a 1930s period dress contest, between 10 and 11 a.m.; people's choice voting on best antique auto show entry; antique tractors; antique displays in the lobby; \$100 prize for guessing how many coins are in a jar, and door prizes every 30 minutes from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

State National Bank came into existence May 14, 1932, with the consolidation of the city's initial financial institution, First State Bank, chartered in 1919, and First National Bank, chartered January, 1931.

John Hirschi was president following consolidation, F.E. "Red" Hill

was vice president and Herman Mills was cashier.

The bank has always been under the ownership of local residents, except for a brief ownership by two Abilene businessmen in the 1970s. The bank was purchased in 1977 by Stanley Williamson, who serves as chairman of the board.

Gene Jordan now serves as president.

Water-test mandate to be met by city

The City of Iowa Park will begin testing water from homes for lead or copper content, beginning in July, according to Mike Price, public works director.

The lead-copper rule, adopted by the Environmental Protection Agency in 1991, took effect in January and requires the cities to test every six months.

Water must have no more lead than 15 parts per billion and no more copper than 1.2 parts per million, according to the Agency mandates.

The city is required to take a minimum of 40 water samples from residences that were built or re-plumbed between 1982 and 1986.

Newer homes were plumbed following the EPA's ban on lead in plumbing materials while older homes would have extracted any excessive lead

or content over that period of time.

The Public Works Dept. is attempting to determine which residences can be used for the water sampling.

Any residents knowing their water system to have been installed or replaced during the target years and who might be willing to assist the city in the sample collection process are encouraged to contact the Public Works Dept. at 592-2642 or 592-2131.

Samples collected must be "first draw," which will be taken after no water has been used for six hours.

Samples will be taken by the residents using a one-liter bottle, provided by the city. Samples are to be taken from the cold water tap in the kitchen or bathroom.

There are no costs to the residents associated with the sampling and all results are public information, Price said.

SATURDAY BY VOTERS

Incumbent trustees unseated

Two veteran school trustees were unseated in Saturday's election, which drew an unusually high turnout of voters.

In the city's election, both incumbents were re-elected, and a former alderman was successful in his bid to return to the council.

Max Henderson and Robert Cook were the two successful candidates for the school board. Neither has ever served an elected public office.

Henderson defeated incumbent

Jerry Reed, 481-372, for Place Four on the board.

Cook won the Place Five position with 287 votes over incumbent Denny McCarthy, 255, and challengers Jennifer Stewart, 238, and Carmen Lozopone, 73.

Returning to the city council after two years out of office is Bud Mercer, who outpolled Ira Hambright and Walter Beeman with a whopping 470 votes. Hambright drew 147 and Beeman 174.

Mercer will serve as Place Two alderman.

Incumbent Mayor Wayne House was elected to his second term in office by defeating challenger Mike Grubbs, 550-256.

Also successful in seeking his second term as Alderman Place Four was Johnny Crawford, who received 457 votes to Mike Sellers' 333.

Henderson won all three boxes Saturday, 330-258 at Kidwell, 109-64 at Bradford, and 14-3 at Valley View, but Reed had a 47-28 edge in early voting.

Cook and McCarthy both received 178 votes at the Kidwell box, which was led by Stewart with 180.

It was at the Bradford box and early voting where Cook got his lead.

He received 70 votes at Bradford to McCarthy's 55 and Stewart's 31. And from early voting, he outpolled his closest opponents with 32, while McCarthy had 20 and Stewart 18.

In all, there were 865 votes cast in the school board election, while 811 votes were cast by city voters.

House drew more than Grubbs in both boxes, 387-170 at Kidwell and 96-43 at Bradford, as well as in early voting, 67-43.

Mercer and Crawford both took their major leads in the Kidwell box, where each received an identical 320 votes.

The new trustees are to be sworn into office Monday night, but the three city winners will not take their oaths until Monday, May 18.

Board canvasses votes, hears parent complaint

Iowa Park school trustees held a called meeting Tuesday to canvass votes from Saturday's election, and will meet again at 7:30 p.m. Monday in the junior high library.

The two new trustees, Robert Cook and Max Henderson, who were declared winners after the canvassing, are to be sworn into office Monday.

Following their taking office, the board will reorganize by electing new officers.

Also approved Tuesday was a list of appointments to the Districtwide Educational Improvement Council, Campus Improvement Committees, parents, community patrons, administrators, and board members to the Site-Based Decision Making Committee.

Prior to adjournment, an executive session was held behind closed doors with Mr. and Mrs. David Bilyeu. With them in the room during the 30-minute session were four administrators and teachers from the junior high, including Randy Lovelady, Steve Moody, C.D. Knoblock and Daryl Frazier.

When the meeting was re-opened to the public, chairman Jerry Reed announced no action would be taken as result of the executive session, and the meeting was dismissed.

Parents of the groom were hosts

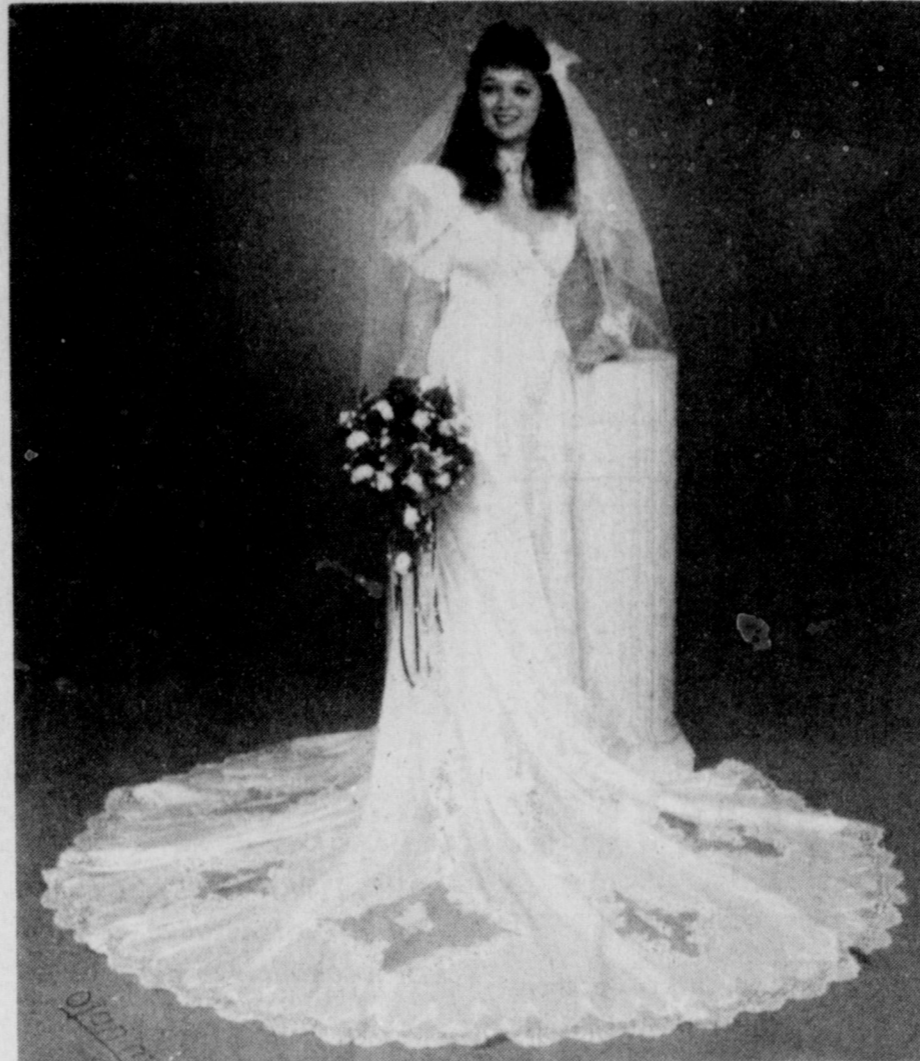
for the rehearsal dinner Friday evening at the LaFamalia in Wichita Falls.

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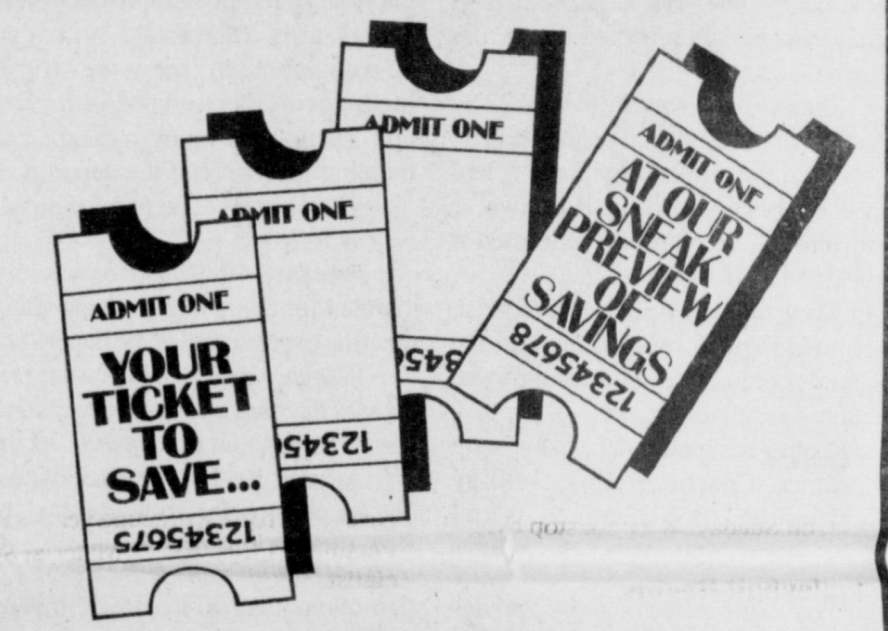

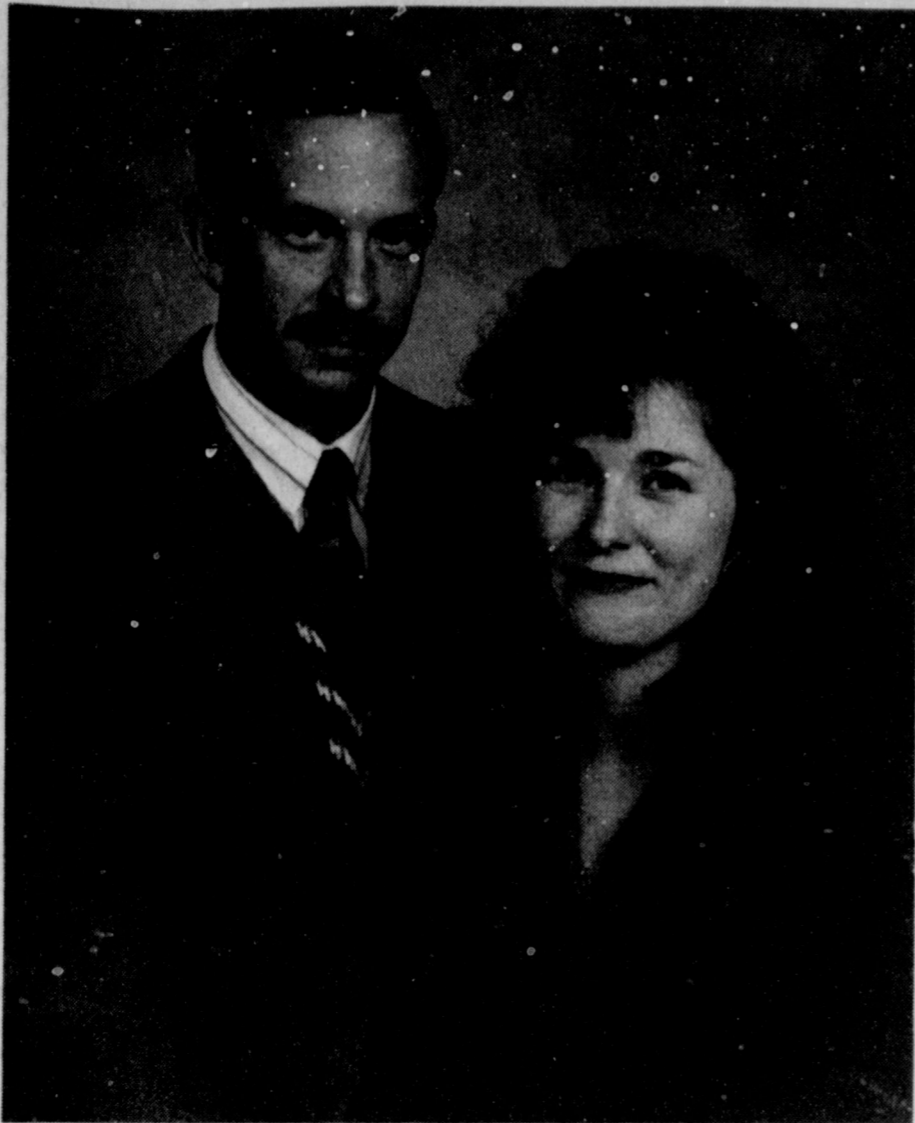
Volleyball Begins

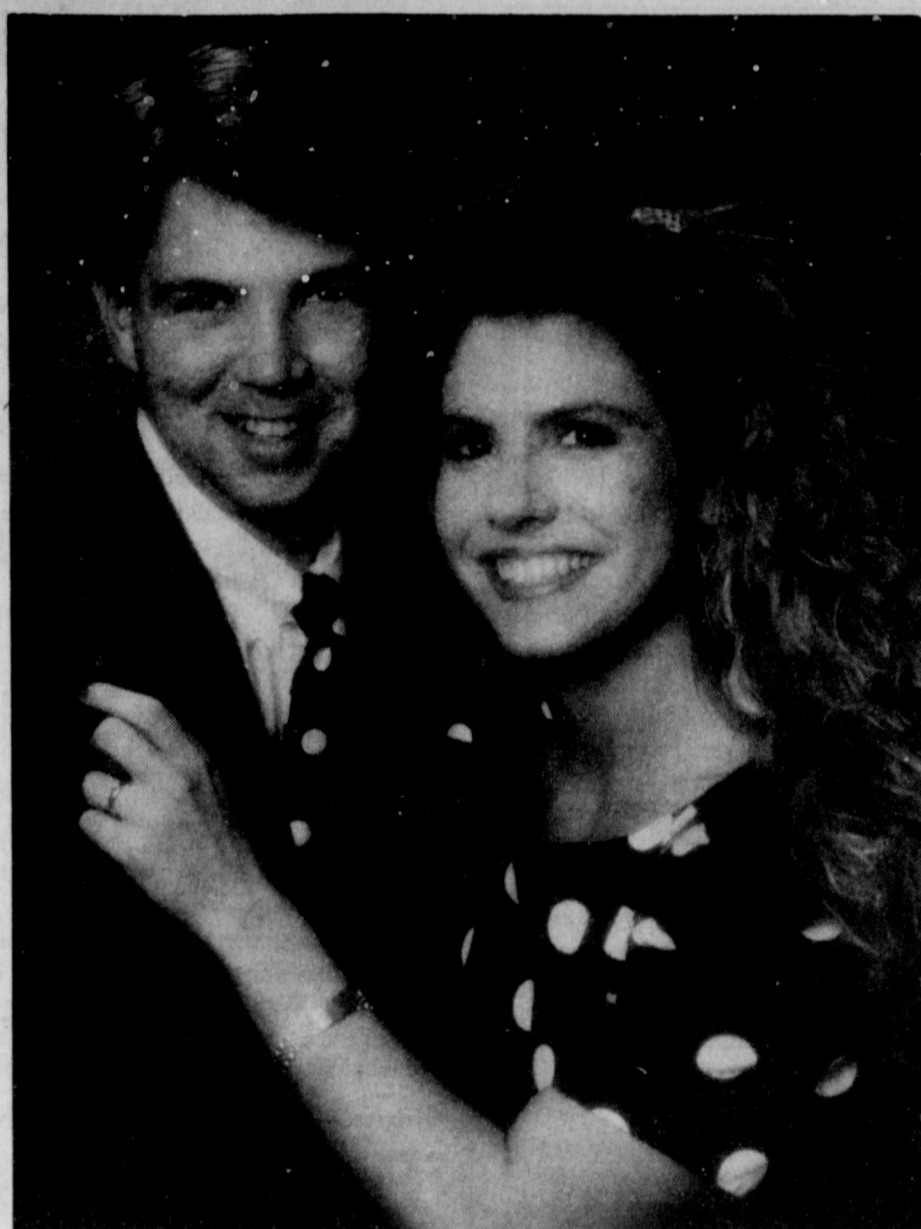

The current trend of American people toward preparing and eating more nutritious foods is nothing new for Rachel (Mrs. Jeff) Goodell who grew up in a vegetarian household.

Rachel, who classifies herself as a "military brat," was born in California. Her family was living in Utah when Rachel met Jeff, who was also stationed there with the Air Force.

Following their marriage, Rachel and Jeff spent three and a half years at Lajes Field in the Azores. That is where their two daughters, four-year-old Emilee and three-year-old Sarah, were born.

Jeff, an X-ray technician, is now stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base where he is teaching at the medical readiness site.

The Goodell's bought a home and moved to Iowa Park six months ago. "We have a large vegetable garden, chickens, rabbits, and a couple of ducks," Rachel said. "We prefer a simple, down-to-earth lifestyle and are trying to do things the way they use to be done," she commented. Rachel said that they like to grow as much of their own food as possible, and she makes her own bread, noodles and tortillas. The couple has a small business, Down to Earth Home Crafts, in which they sell items such as teddy bears and wood crafts. Also, because of cooperative chickens, they are selling eggs for 50-cents a dozen.

Jeff attends colleges classes three nights a week and is scheduled to receive his bachelor's degree in December. The family are members of Faith Baptist Church.

Rachel said that both she and Jeff love music. She plays the piano, violin, banjo and guitar, Jeff plays bass guitar, and they like to sing. She said

that their little girls sing with them and carry a tune very well.

Even though Rachel and the girls are vegetarians, she has no problem with preparing food for Jeff who still likes to eat meat occasionally.

The recipes Rachel is sharing with our readers would be good to try, not only for vegetarians, but for those of you trying to cut down on the amount of meat in your diet.

Cottage Cheese Loaf

- 1 sm. box or 2/3 - 3/4 box lg. box 'Special K' cereal
- 5 eggs
- 2 large tubs cottage cheese (low fat), drained
- 2 pkgs. brown or onion gravy
- 2 Tbsps. parsley
- 1 onion, diced
- 1/4 cup ketchup (optional)
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts (optional)

Mix all ingredients well until everything is moistened. Press into greased 9"x13" baking pan. Bake in 375 degree oven about 45 minutes or until firm and medium brown in color. Serve with mashed potatoes and gravy. It's also wonderful cold on mayonnaise sandwiches!

Jeff's Favorite Ketchup

- 24 ripe tomatoes - washed, peeled, cored, seeded, quartered and drained
- 1 cup vinegar
- 3 whole cloves
- 1 chopped onion
- 1 tsp. celery seed
- 1 cup sugar

In small pan put vinegar, celery seed and cloves. Cover and boil. Remove from heat. In a large pot put tomatoes and onion and boil 10-15 minutes. Push through a sieve and return to pot. Add sugar and simmer about 2 hours or until boiled to half gone. Run vinegar mix through a fine sieve into tomatoes. Finish cooking until it's as thick as you want it. Store in glass bottles or jars in the refrigerator. (Cool before refrigerating!) Makes 1 quart.

Spinach Lasagna

- Sauce:
- 16 oz. tomato sauce
 - 1 med. onion, diced
 - 3 dashes chili powder
 - Pinch oregano
 - 2 Tbsps. Canola oil
 - 10 oz. water
 - 2 Tbsps. flour
 - Dash pepper

Saute onion in oil until tender. Stirring constantly over medium heat, add flour, chili powder and pepper. Don't let it burn. When it is mixed, pour tomato sauce and water in pan. Stir well to be sure nothing has stuck to the bottom of the pan. Let it start to bubble, then remove from heat.

Lasagna:

- 1 pkg. lasagna noodles or homemade noodles, uncooked
- 1 lg. tub cottage cheese, drained & divided in thirds
- 16 oz. Cheddar cheese, shredded and divided in quarters
- 16 oz. Mozzarella cheese, shredded and divided in quarters
- 2 bunches fresh spinach, divided in thirds

Line bottom of 9"x13" baking dish with 3-4 noodles. Spread on 1/3 cottage cheese evenly. Sprinkle a handful of Cheddar and Mozzarella over that, then spread 1/4 cup sauce over cheeses. Lay 1/3 of spinach over all that, then cover with more noodles. Repeat so there are 3 completed layers. Cover with noodles. Pour remaining sauce over entire casserole, being sure no raw noodles are showing. Sprinkle last quarter of cheeses over top. Cover with foil and bake on top rack in 375 degree oven for about one hour. If you use fresh noodles, bake about 30 minutes or 5 to 10 minutes longer after the sauce has started bubbling.

Cream Cheese Patties

- 3 to 4 oz. light cream cheese, diced
- 1 sm. or 1/2 med. onion, diced
- 1 tsp. poultry seasoning OR 1 bouillon cube w/1/4 cup boiling water
- 14-16 crushed unsalted crackers
- 3 eggs
- 1/4 cup chopped, cooked broccoli (optional)

Combine all ingredients well, but don't puree (it will be a little lumpy from cheese). Use very little Canola oil in a skillet and spoon mixture into pan for patties (about 2 Tbsps. per patty). Brown on both sides. To serve you can put them in a casserole dish, cover with cream of mushroom soup gravy and bake 350 degrees 15-20 minutes. OR you can eat them like hamburgers with all the fixings. It is filling at the same time as having a better nutritional value!

Lentil Salad

- 1/2 lb. lentils, cooked and drained
- 1 small onion, sliced
- 2 carrots, sliced 1/8" thick
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
- 3 potatoes, boiled & cubed
- 1 tsp. lemon juice
- 1 bunch fresh spinach, chopped
- 2 dashes salt
- 1/8 cup one of your favorite fresh herbs (parsley or mint is good)

Mix and blend all ingredients well. can be served hot or cold as side dish or as main dish in pita bread. Very high in protein and vitamin A. Low in calories!

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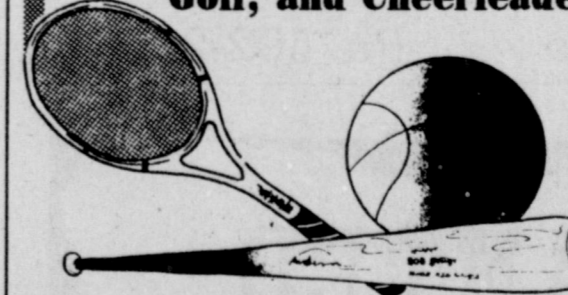

Tony Lozipone's single scored Carroll, narrowing the margin to 8-6.

Catcher Pulley then blasted a grounder between center and right fielders that reached the fence -- too far for the relay throw to reach home base before Thompson, Merrick and Lozipone scored the winning runs.

Pulley went ahead to run out all the

bases and was greeted at home plate by his elated team mates.

After a scoreless first inning, Buck batters began connecting on starting pitcher Merrick's throws, and scored twice before being retired.

But Carroll reached base on a single and Thompson walked. They both advanced on Merrick's sacrifice bunt. Lozipone hit a bouncing chop to third base, and reached first safely.

Meanwhile, Carroll scored. A throw from first to third to cut off Thompson was wild, and he also scored, tying the score at 2-2.

A double in the third scored one Buckaroo, to give the visitors a lead they held until the seventh inning.

Brown relieved starting pitcher Merrick to start the fifth inning, and gave up two unearned runs.

Pulley lead off the bottom of the fifth with a walk, and scored on a double by Robert Denton, narrowing the score to 5-3.

After Breckenridge had scored a

run in the sixth inning, Buck batter Chris Hagler hit a home run that will go down in the local field's record book. With slight aid of the northerly breeze, he sent the ball over the 14-foot tall center field wall which stands 396 feet from home plate for a home run.

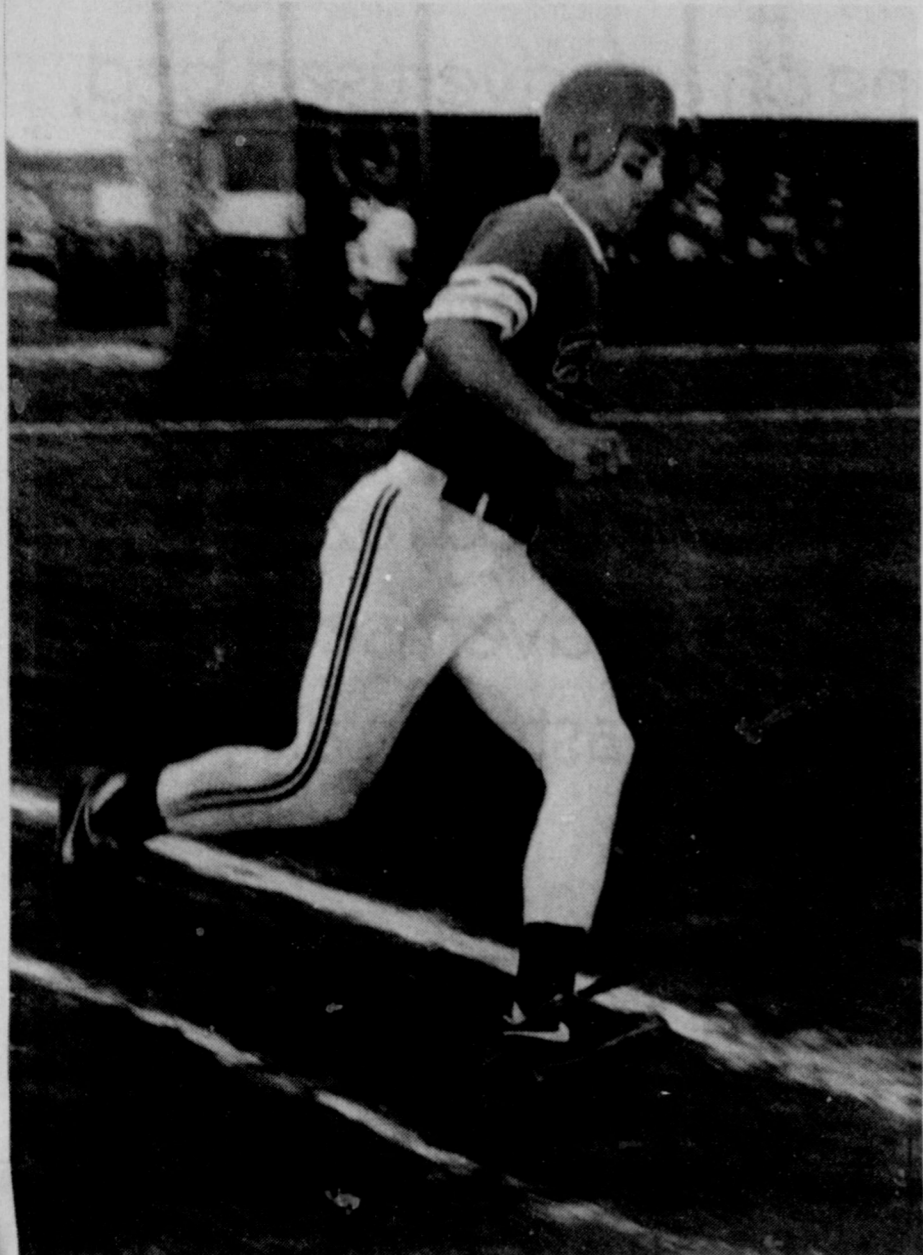
With one out in the bottom of the sixth, Merrick reached first base on a

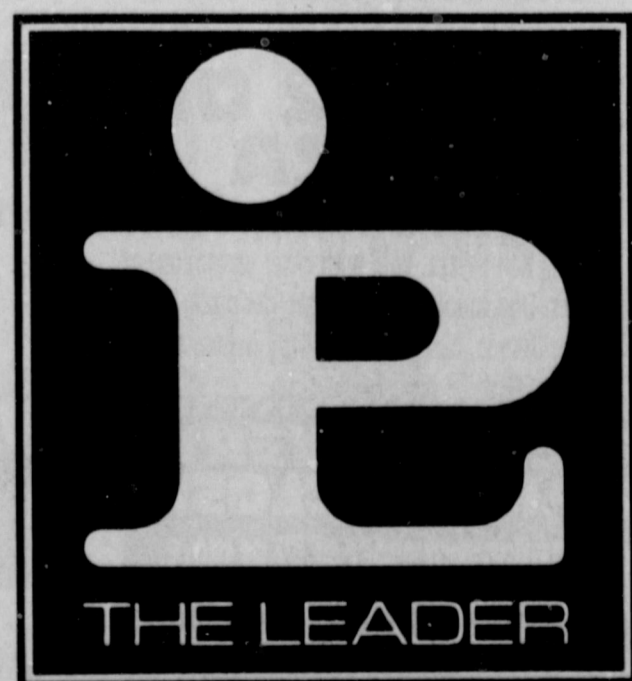

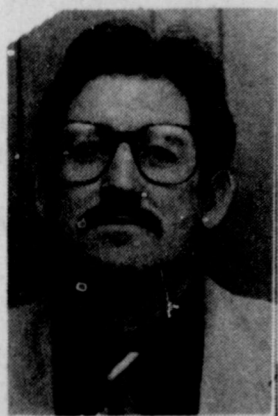

Drug, gun free campus law explained to IPHS students

U.S. Attorney Marvin Collins promised here Tuesday strong enforcement of federal laws designed to create drug-free and gun-free zones around schools.

Collins joined Iowa Park school representatives in unveiling a sign at Iowa Park High School, designating a 1,000-foot perimeter around the campus a federally-protected zone.

Collins' visit was part of a day-long effort to inform educators and law enforcement officials about the new law, which took affect last year.

He was accompanied by Phil Wilson, director of U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm's regional office in Tyler, who read a letter from the senator highlighting the virtues of the legislation.

Attending the presentation, held in the high school library, were Supt. Glen Mitchell, Principal Richard Davis, Police Chief Wayne Parsons, and members of IPHS student council.

"Congress has basically said we want to make islands of safety at schools," said Collins, who credited Sen. Gramm for his understanding of the drug problem and hard work on Capitol hill to put the legislation into motion.

"Phil Gramm has devoted a significant portion of his 13 years in Congress to visiting school campuses to educate students, faculty and parents about the dangers of drugs. He is convinced that America will win the drug war through the efforts of our young people who commit to make the drug-free lifestyle popular.

"I support that reasoning and am

fully committed to providing these young people with an environment conducive to learning," the U.S. attorney said.

Passed by congress in 1990, the law makes it a federal offense to knowingly possess drugs or firearms on a school campus or within 1,000 feet of the school.

The drug conviction carries a mandatory one-year jail term if the criminal activity is committed at the school, plus any sentence the person receives could be doubled.

People convicted of carrying guns on or near a campus face a five-year term and up to a \$250,000 fine.

"We will enforce the statute,"

Collins said. "We will vigorously prosecute violators in federal court, and those caught with drugs and guns within the zone will serve their sentences in federal prison where there is no parole. We take this statute very seriously."

Sen. Gramm said in his letter his goal is to have a sign at every junior high and high school in Texas by the end of 1992.

"This initiative represents a significant endeavor to halt the spread of drugs and violence onto our campuses," the senator wrote. "I appreciate the leadership the Iowa Park School District is providing the community in fighting the drug war and in educating America's next generation of workers and leaders."

Charges pending against two

Two young Iowa Park men are facing charges of criminal trespass, after one was caught stealing gasoline from buses in the school's maintenance facility.

Sgt. Mike Brewer noticed a car parked in the alley behind the 606 East Washington facility at 1:27 a.m. Saturday, and investigated.

According to the report, he first noticed the vehicle's gas tank lid lying on the ground, a fashioned funnel in the neck of the tank, and then saw a man lying under the vehicle.

The suspect was identified as Scott Russell Rotz, 20, who allegedly admitted having taken gas from one of the buses. He also said he was being helped by Gary Bernal, 19, who was not found in the area.

A search of the fenced area where the buses are kept by police and Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, determined one bus had a hose still in its tank which was being used to siphon the fuel from the tank.

Rotz also will be charged with "theft under \$20."

Police were notified April 27 by school representatives that gasoline had been taken from buses sometime over the weekend, as well as a window of one bus having been broken, according to the police blotter.

Additionally, police were called Saturday morning by a resident in the 700 block of East Bank, very near the bus storage area, by a man who reported having found some gasoline cans in his hedge.

During the past week, police made four arrests and received three reports of criminal mischief.

When officers responded to the 100 block of Westview at 1:41 a.m. Thursday, where a woman complained of being assaulted, Daniel Carrizales, 32, was arrested.

Carrizales was charged with resisting arrest and placed in the county jail. He later was released after posting a \$500 bond.

Willard C. Hall Jr., 42, was arrested at 9:04 p.m. Saturday in the 1700 block of Johnson Road on a charge of public intoxication. He was later released after signing a personal recognizance bond.

Arrested at 1:22 a.m. Sunday in the 500 block of East Highway was Argie Keith Gould, 31, and charged with public intoxication. After signing a personal recognizance bond, he was released.

A charge of public intoxication was filed against Rodney Lee Speegle, 28, when he was taken into custody at 12:08 a.m. Wednesday at Bell and Washington, according to the police blotter. He also was released after signing a personal recognizance bond.
