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I notice that one of the topics on Monday night's school board meeting agenda is a proposal to drop half-day kindergarten classes here and go to full day. This has been an ongoing subject ever since kindergarten classes were
first begun in Iowa Park. The response was to have full-day, but only half school year.

I can understand how working mothers would want their youngsters in school all day, and not have to arrange for the student's care half each week day. It's a hassle.
And a teacher's argument that the child can learn more if they have the student twice as long has merit.
There's one big hold up to the proposal, however. Where are the lassrooms? They werent included in he recent $\$ 2.7$-million bond issue, no was being studied to build additional classrooms permitting all-day kinder garten.
