TORNADO OR STRAIGHT WIND?

Storm lashes community

You'll never make some residents of the south part of Iowa Park believe Sunday night's storm damage wasn't caused by a small tornado.

But the official finding of Tommy Keesee, Wichita County Emergency Coordinator, is that the damage was caused by straight winds.

First indication of the storm's effect, as noted on the police department's blotter, was at 10:41 p.m., when the burglar alarm at Wal-Mart sounded.

One minute later, the radio dispatcher was notified that a motor home parked at 1219 South Wall had been blown over.

In rapid succession, calls were received from numerous locations in the south and southeast part of town about electrical outage, trees blown over, highline poles broken, fences blown down and residents wanting to know if in fact a tornado had actually struck.

There apparently were two main areas the stronger of the winds followed through the city.

A path was distinguished from the 200 block of Valley Drive northeastward to the area of Seneca and Ruby, and another, but not as defined, at West Smith.

Two highline polls were broken in the alley behind 209 and 207 Valley Drive, apparently where the winds first struck the city.

In the yard of 209, near the back fence, was a metal storage building. It was picked up, spilling its contents, and carried over homes before crashing into a fence behind the home where the motor home had been blown over.

Mrs. Larry Smith later said she had just left the motor home, carrying a can of soup into her house, when the winds hit. Her husband described the interior of the vehicle as "destroyed."

Volunteer firemen helped upright the vehicle. Near it, a motorboat on a trailer was moved around, but not overturned.

Further northeast, the winds moved large metal products in the Entex plant yard. Some were crashed into fences, damaging them.

One metal object, apparently from the plant, was picked up and blown against the upper part of the flag pole in the Bradford Elementary yard, and bending it.

One school official said the flag pole would have to be replaced, before it could be used again.

Bad night for firemen

Members of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Dept. were pressed almost to their limits Monday night.

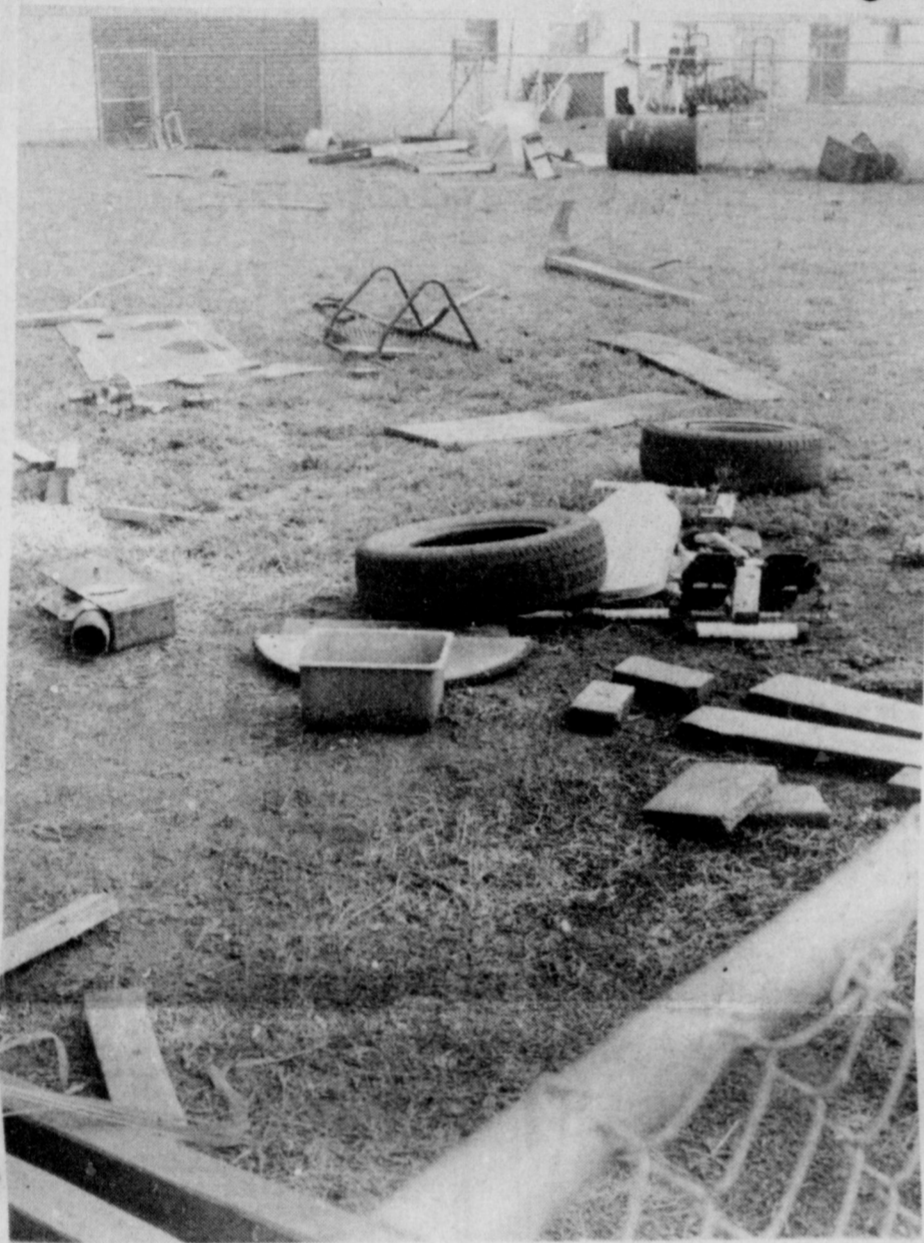
They were called out to assist with damage caused by high winds, administer to a wreck victim, and fight an oil tank fire.

They began at 10:42 p.m., when they assisted in uprighting a motor home that had been blown over.

Then at 12:01 a.m., EMTs responded to a one-vehicle accident on FM 368, just south of the Wichita River bridge.

Those who were lucky grabbed about an hour's sleep, before being called once more to assist Electra VFD fight a five-tank fire, apparently set by lightning, between Iowa Park and Electra. Firemen left the tank fire scene around 6 a.m.

Several were seen at the station later that morning, re-filling and repairing equipment from the night's activities.

the winds struck two small stock sheds just west of the school animal barn, on Seneca.

The tin roof of one shed was blown into electric and telephone lines, causing outages there, and other portions covered the yard west of Commissioner Gordon Griffith's home.

A large tree at the northeast corner of Griffith's front yard, on Ruby, was broken off at the ground.

Shingles on some homes in the southwestern part of the town were blown away, and other fences damaged.

A resident in the 1000 block of East

Pasadena told police a storage shed and riding lawnmower were blown over.

The primary damage further to the west was two highline poles being broken off in the alley along Smith Road.

Some damage was reported to fences near the 300 block of South Yosemite, the First Presbyterian Church suffered minor damage, and part of a sign at Hughes Pharmacy was blown away.

However, no injuries were reported as a result of the storm.

Rainfall measured by Virgil Woodfin amounted to .66 of an inch.

Lottery sales points reported

Iowa Park residents will have three places in town where they can try their luck when Texas lottery tickets go on sale Friday, May 29, and two others nearby.

Those in town will be Jim's Conoco, 612 W. Highway, King's Food, 300 W. Bank, and Allsup's, 200 W. Highway.

The two nearby locations will be Pleasant Valley Grocery, just east of FM 369 on Old Iowa Park Road, and

KC Oil, better known locally as the Shamrock Truck Stop, at US 287 and FM 369.

"Once the first Texas lottery tickets go on sale May 29 -- seven weeks ahead of schedule -- Texas will have a new millionaire every week for 12 consecutive weeks," said John Sharp, state comptroller.

"Those 12 winners will get their million dollars in cold cash, not in a

Sales tax shows big gain

Sales tax collections in Iowa Park are running well ahead of the increased averages for Wichita County and the state, according to this month's report from the state comptroller's office.

Iowa Park's sales tax rebate this month, which reflects taxes collected on March sales, as well as reports from businesses filing quarterly returns, is a whopping 50.47 percent over the same month in 1991.

The city's refund check this month was \$24,686.18. May's check last year was \$16,405.67.

The average increase for Wichita

County is 5.06 percent, which also is well above the state's average increase of 4.3 percent.

The other three communities in the county also are showing increases for the year, with Electra following closely behind Iowa Park, 16.37 percent; Wichita Falls 4.59 and Burkburnett 2.8.

Holliday, as are four of the other communities in Archer County, are reporting decreases for the year. Holliday is a minus 19.84 percent for the year, after this month's rebate check dropped 8.19 percent below May of 1991, to \$7,387, according to the report.

Full-day kindergarten okayed by school board

Iowa Park school trustees Monday night elected new officers, approved a proposal to hold full-day kindergarten classes, and elevated 12 teachers on the Career Ladder.

Keith Fisher was elected president of the board, succeeding Jerry Reed. But his election was not unanimous.

Trustee Sheri Kennedy was first nominated, but a motion to cease nominations and elect her by acclamation failed by a 2-4 vote.

Kennedy was then elected vice president on a 3-1 vote. And Martha Dudley was voted board secretary, by acclamation.

The reorganization of the board took place following the administering of oaths to the two new members, Max Henderson and Robert Cook.

Outgoing board members Reed and Denny McCarthy, who were defeated in the recent election by Henderson and Cook, were presented plaques for their years of service. The two left the meeting shortly after the presentations.

Only three additional teachers are expected to be hired next year, in anticipation of enrollment of about the same number of kindergarten students as have been in the half-day classes this year, the board was told.

Kidwell Elementary Principal Ron Woods said he predicts about 140 students to enroll in kindergarten classes next fall. There are 139 now enrolled.

To house the full-day kindergarten enrollment, three temporary buildings will be put into place at Kidwell.

The cost of additional teachers, furniture, equipment, supplies and preparing the buildings for use are estimated to cost \$106,567, according to a cost estimate presented the board.

That cost, however, should be offset by increased state revenues, Supt. Glen Mitchell said.

Increasing class time from half-day to full-day should produce an additional \$130,000 in projected revenue from the state, Mitchell said.

The classrooms would be placed in the area immediately west of the cafeteria, if a plan presented the board is followed.

The board also considered funding of four additional permanent classrooms, which also would be paid for by the additional increase in state funds.

However, Trustee Wendall House suggested delaying permanent classroom construction until it was determined how many new students would be enrolled here from new families moving into the area.

The new families to which he was alluding are those who would be connected with Sheppard Air Force Base and the new state prison.

Board members agreed with his proposal to delay any construction.

Kindergarten teacher Janet Bowling proposed a schedule for full-day kindergarten to be the same as half-day, with the following additions:

- * 15 minutes extra reading readiness;

- * 30 minutes individualized instruction;

- * 30 minutes centers-reteach;
- * 30 minutes snack and rest room break morning, same in afternoon (she explained there are no restroom breaks in the half-day schedule);

- * 30 minutes computer lab/story time; and,

- * 15 minutes review of the day.

The vote to elevate teachers on the Career Ladder was taken following a 23-minute executive session to discuss

Elevated to Level Three were Diana Collins, Tanya Daume, Kellie Gibson, Ed Hefti, Eddie Jones, Tim Kaspar, Shelley Merchant, Janna Monday and Tracy Otto. There are now 35 teachers on Level Three.

Three were added to Level Two, including Mary Alfert, Valerie Dillard and Kristine Lovelady. Thirty eight teachers are now listed on Level Two.

The resignation of Robert Sumner, auto mechanics instructor and a veteran of the Iowa Park district some 27 years, was accepted.

The board approved hiring of kindergarten teacher Debra L. Lytle. She holds a degree from Abilene Christian College and has five years experience, two of them at Holliday.

Trustees accepted two bids on land seized for taxes, but rejected bids on five other tracts.

Accepted were Don Kerns' bid of \$650 on a 3.5-acre tract near Kamay, and an offer of \$165 by Donald Lewis on a 37-foot strip of land in the

Thornton is a telephone switching specialist. His wife, Sara, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Abernathy of Iowa Park.

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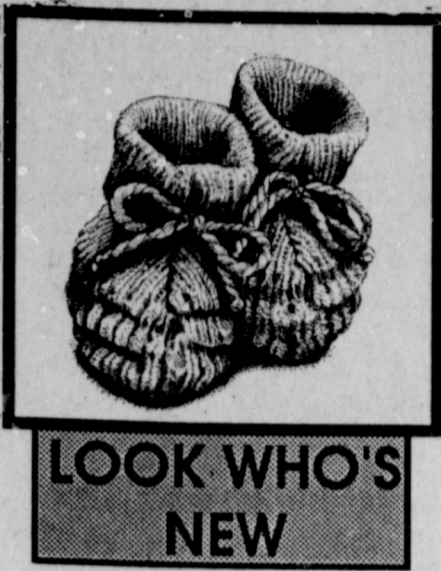

Following a meal, the business meeting will include discussions of summer projects, work at the school farm and the annual end-of-school party.

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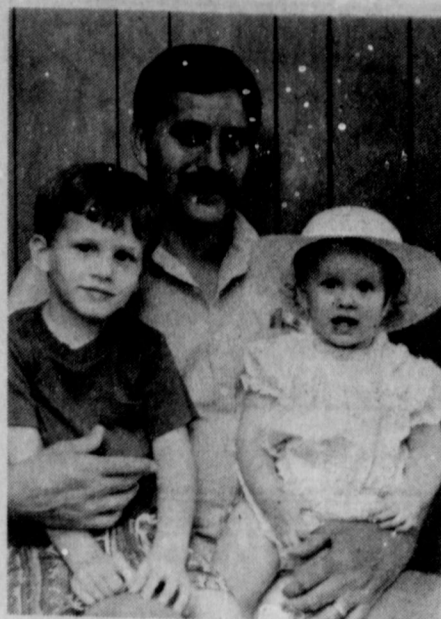

When Marc Newman severely injured his back in a fall on the ice over three years ago, he and his wife Janice were forced to reverse their roles.

Because of his strong personality and great sense of humor, Marc was able to adapt to the situation.

Now he cooks most of the meals, cleans house, does laundry and takes care of their two children, Wes, three and a half years old, and 13-month-old Alex, while Janice works in her position as Iowa Park's city secretary.

During the early stages of rehabilitation when his activity was limited, Marc developed an interest in oil painting and has become an accomplished artist. He also has a strong interest in the stock market, developed when he worked in the Trading Department in Cleveland, Ohio.

He said that most of his hobbies and interests are on hold at the present time because caring for the children takes up most of his time.

Marc was stationed at Sheppard Air Force Base in 1970 as a medical services specialist, and also worked at Wichita General Hospital. After his discharge from the service, he worked for the Wichita County Sheriff's Department as a detention sergeant at the county jail. He was an officer with the Iowa Park Police Department for two years, and later worked as an emergency medical technician and ambulance driver while attending Midwestern State Univ. Marc had been working as an insurance adjuster for 10 years when he injured his back.

Marc said that his mother taught him to cook and his father taught him to bake. He likes to make bread and pies from scratch, but doesn't mind using boxed mixes for other things. He is also highly complimentary of the family's new bread-making machine. Most of Marc's recipes are originals, with the exception of "Jailhouse Omelet," which he got from a friend while working for the Sheriff's Department.

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Brown Food

- 1 large can ranch style beans
- 1 cup minute rice
- 1 lb. sausage link (Kielbasa or smoked)
- 1 small can Rotel tomatoes

Chop the sausage into bite-sized pieces. Combine all ingredients in a medium-large saucepan and heat to boiling, stirring occasionally. Reduce heat, cover and simmer 5 minutes.

Jailhouse Omelet

- 5 eggs, beaten
- 2 slices American cheese
- 1/2 onion, chopped
- 1-2 jalapeno peppers (fresh or bottled)
- 1/2 cup diced ham (optional)

Heat a little butter in a large skillet. Add the eggs and distribute the chopped ingredients down the center of eggs. Once the bottom of the eggs begins to firm, fold over the sides and carefully turn the omelet over to complete the cooking. Serve with toast and apple jelly. Serves two.

Pico de Gaillo

- 3-4 large ripe tomatoes
- 3-4 fresh jalapeno peppers
- 2 large onions
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. ground cumin
- 2 cloves garlic

Use all fresh ingredients. Split and de-seed the peppers, unless you

like it REALLY hot. Chop tomatoes, peppers, onions, and garlic finely; add salt and cumin and stir. Cover and refrigerate 4-5 hours before serving as a chip dip or condiment. Keep remainder (if any) in the refrigerator. Good for 3-4 days.

Italian Vegetables

- 2-3 fresh zucchini
- 2 large firm tomatoes
- 6 green onions, chopped
- 2-3 cloves garlic, chopped
- 2 Tbsps. olive oil
- 1 tsp. crushed basil/Italian spice

Cut the tomatoes and zucchini into bite-sized pieces. Heat the olive oil in a large saute skillet and add the garlic, onion and spices. Saute 1-2 minutes. Add the tomato and zucchini and saute over high heat until the tomato just begins to break down. Serve immediately.

Meat, Peas and Junk

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 pkg. frozen green peas or 1 can early June peas, drained
- 1 can tomato soup
- Mashed potatoes

Brown the ground beef and drain. Add the peas and tomato soup (no water) and stir. Cover and reduce heat. Cook until peas are heated through. Serve over a bed of mashed potatoes. Salt and pepper to taste. Serves four.

**Victoria bridge
to be replaced**

Traffic on part of North Victoria will be inconvenienced during the early part of June, while city crews replace a bridge that is believed to have been constructed half a century ago.

The bridge over the drainage ditch is located just north of the city's two ground storage tanks.

Time, and increased traffic during the recent extended wet period, have taken their toll on the old structure. It has begun to sag and is considered to be dangerous, according to city officials.

Materials to complete the project will be in stock this week, and city crews will construct a temporary dam across the ditch next week.

The temporary dam is necessary to allow the area around the dam to dry out. Any water standing in the ditch west of the area will be removed with pumps, according to Mike Price, director of the Public Works Dept.

Traffic on Victoria will be closed beginning Monday, June 1, when workers begin removing the old bridge and replacing it with a pair of boxed concrete culverts.

Once completed, the presently narrow crossing will be widened to 30 feet, and guard rails will be erected.

Price anticipates the project to be completed in about 10 days.



Richard Allen Wright, 25, was stopped on a traffic check in the 200 block of South Yosemite late Monday night, according to the police blotter.

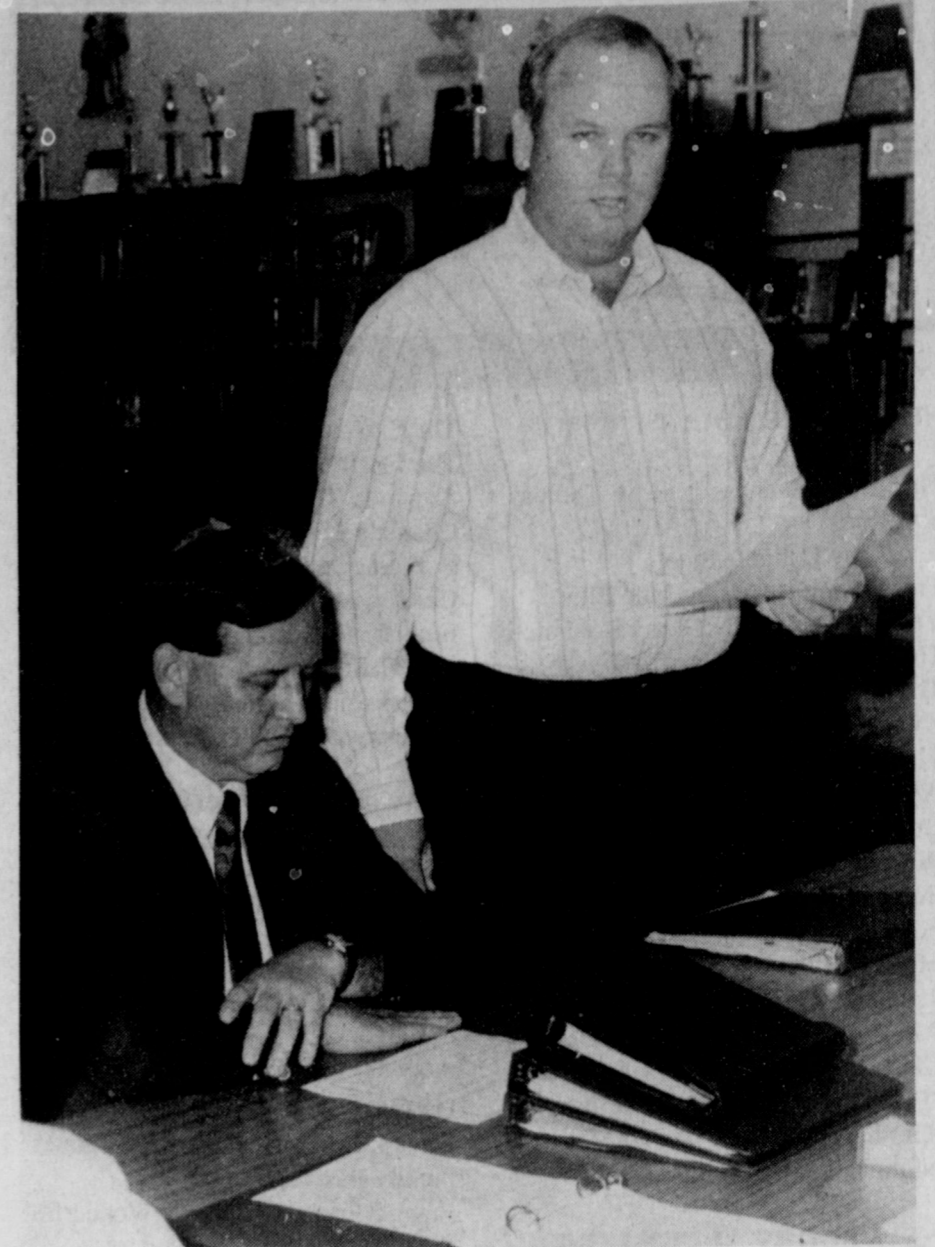
It was determined an outstanding warrant for his arrest existed, on a local charge of capis pro fine (failure to display drivers licensed).

All seven tracts had been offered for sale at the courthouse, but either bids were rejected because they were so low or no bids at all were offered on them, according to Allen Shewmake, tax collector.

The lowest of two computer systems for the school's tax office was accepted, at a price of \$21,534.

Mrs. Kennedy was named a voting delegate to the TASA/TASB convention to be held in Houston, with Henderson as alternate.

Two old buses of the district's will be completely reconditioned at the state prison in Huntsville, at an approximate cost of \$9,000 each.

The reconditioning, Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, explained, includes a new motor, painting and other needed work.

Palmer also reported that some recent expenses of the cafeterias could keep him from recommending lowering of lunchroom prices next year.

He had said at the last meeting the recommendation might be forthcoming.

In other business, the board approved a list of 58 students, mostly high school transfers from the City View district, for the next school year, and voted to authorize Linda Gray to sign a contract with Red Cross for swimming lessons.

Hawks make playoffs; meet Graham Friday

The Hawks nailed down a playoff spot by defeating Bowie Tuesday, and now will face district champion Graham Friday to wind up the regular season.

Iowa Park suffered a disappointing 7-2 loss here last Friday at the hands of Bridgeport, but rebounded with a 13-1 win Tuesday at Bowie.

Graham's five-inning 15-5 win Tuesday at Breckenridge extended the Steers' Dist. 4-AAA record to 9-0, and avoided any chance of upset when they

visit here tomorrow.

The Hawks are 7-2 in district play, and 18-6 on the season. Graham, ranked fourth among AAA clubs in the state this week, is now 21-2-1.

The game is to get underway at 6 p.m., but will be played at Hoskins Field in Wichita Falls.

Led by the bats of Patric Kennedy and Robert Denton, who accounted for seven of Iowa Park's 13 hits, the Hawks had a field day against the Jackrabbits Tuesday.

Kennedy went four-for-four and Denton two-for-three. Both Denton's hits were doubles, and Kennedy also had a pair of two-baggers.

Meanwhile, on the mound, J'Bill Merrick was limiting Bowie to only six hits, all singles. And the hosts couldn't get on the scoreboard until the seventh inning.

The Jackrabbits are now 3-6 in district play, including a win over Bridgeport Tuesday of last week, and 10-13 on the season.

In their game here Friday, Bridgeport's Bulls took advantage of starter Denton, who had been ill, and a strong southerly wind to accumulate 13 hits.

The senior hurler gave up 12 hits, had struck out three, and issued three bases on balls before being relieved with one out in the sixth.

Brent Brown allowed only one hit to the five batters he faced, but gave up a run.

Iowa Park started the game in good fashion, scoring a run in the first inning. The Hawks tied the game at 2-2 in the fourth, after the Bulls scored twice in the second frame.

Bridgeport scored four more runs in the sixth.

Denton and Tony Lozipone both had two hits in their two official at-bats, and scored both Iowa Park runs.

Iowa Park's other hits were by Kennedy and Ralph Dillard.

Coach Daryl Frazier said he is working to schedule a practice game with the top-ranked Class AA team in the state, Howe, 25-2. If possible, it will be played Tuesday, but neither date nor location was definite at presstime.

Council to meet Monday

Three on-going projects will be acted on when the city council meets Monday night, before newly-elected Alderman Bud Mercer is seated.

The meeting is to begin at 7 p.m. in council chambers.

Action will be taken on two bid items: grazing lease at the wastewater treatment plant, and approving dozer work on a pit at the same site.

Also on the agenda is action on a resolution establishing a workers' compensation escrow account, which was postponed from the May 4 meeting.

Merger, as well as successful incumbents Wayne House and Johnny Crawford, all of whom were winners in the May 2 city election, will be sworn into office.

Mayor House is to appoint a mayor pro-tem, a post held the past year by Crawford, as well as two council members to serve with him on the Recreational Activities Center council.

Another part of the reorganization will be passage of a resolution authorizing individuals to sign checks and other financial instruments for the city.

Outgoing Alderman Charlie Helms, who did not seek re-election, will be recognized for his one-term service on the council.

Approval also will be requested on changes in three areas of the city's insurance coverage, including deductibles, liability and public official coverage, according to the preliminary meeting agenda.

Work to close Cash Street

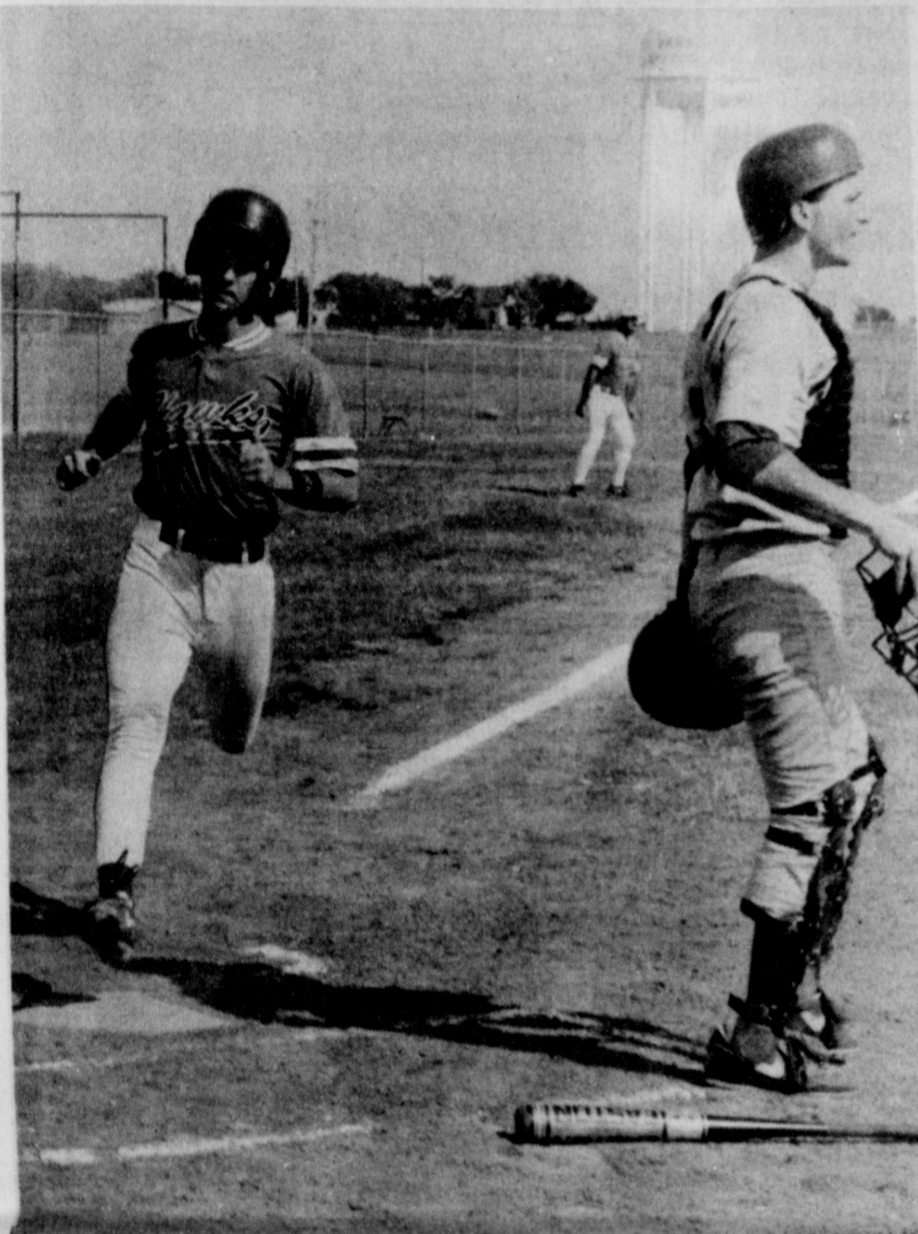

But, she says she has very few pieces of handwork she has done, because she gives it all away.

Sheri prefers handwork over other crafts to do in her spare time. She does needlepoint, knits, and sews, and does some plastic canvas work. She knits sweaters for her husband, Doug, and knits items for Christmas gifts.

She has always liked to sew and in addition to sewing for herself and her three daughters, she also sews for the public, does alterations, and irons for the public. She has a machine of her own that has all of the modern attachments, but most of the time she sews with the machine she has that had belonged to her husband's grandmother.

"Right now we are so busy with our garden I don't have a lot of time to sew for myself. My mother-in-law helped me get some things made for my girls for summer," Sheri said.

Sheri said their garden now covers about half of their back yard. "It seems we just keep expanding it each year. We started out with just a small area," she said.

Doug does the planting and she does the freezing and canning. "We plant almost all kinds of vegetables. I love fresh spinach and now Doug will eat it. He had never eaten anything but canned spinach and didn't like it," Sheri explained. That has changed since she began preparing it for meals

and finally managed to talk him into tasting it.

"We don't plant cucumbers for ourselves, but we do have some planted for a lady in Wichita Falls. The cucumbers she plants for herself are always bitter because of the soil where she has to plant them."

Sheri has done some ceramics. She received a kiln for Christmas and has some pieces started, but none in the finished stage.

They also have started building a greenhouse. "I don't know just when we will get it finished, but we are looking forward to it. We plan to sell only to nurseries," Sheri said.

Doug and Sheri have been married 12 years and have lived in Iowa Park seven years. He is a representative for Lone Star Gas Co. He also is a

member of the Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department.

They have a daughter, Ashley, eight years old and in the second grade, Katie, seven years old is in first grade and Linda is four years old.

Both Sheri and Doug graduated high school in Wichita Falls. By profession Sheri is a nurse. She studied nursing at the Wichita General School of Nursing and began working at Wichita Falls Clinic.
