BAIRD — Miss Amelia Smith has resigned as science and math teacher at Baird High School to accept a position as treasurer and manager of West Texas Floral Co., Inc., a long-time family business located in Abilene.

Miss Smith has been with the local school since 1960. She taught one year at Noodle-Horn High School before coming here, and prior to that worked as a laboratory technician.

She served as faculty sponsor of the Junior and Senior classes, girls basketball team, and Pep Squad since 1964. She directed UIL events in number sense, slide rule, and science.

During this time, Baird student reached regional competition in one or more of these events in all but two years. She had state competitors in slide rule and number sense four times. Last year Baird students participated at regional in all three events.

Gary W. Mabry will replace Miss Amelia Smith as Math and Science teacher at Baird High School. Mr. Mabry has a B. S. degree in Chemistry with a minor in Mathematics, and received his degree in August 1971 from Abilene Christian College. He has had one year of graduate work and served as lab instructor at ACC this past year. He was a member of Sub-16 social club and served as intramural director. Mr. Mabry earned a two year Associate of Science degree at Lubbock Christian College.

He grew up at Sunny Glen Children's Home in San Benito, and was all district defensive halfback at San Benito High School. He was a member of the Math Club, Key Club, and Letterman's Club.

CLYDE SCHOOL ENROLLMENT SETS NEW RECORD WITH 932

CLYDE — Opening day enrollment in Clyde Public Schools set a new record with 932 students reporting for classes. This is an increase of 25 students over the opening day enrollment when 907 students enrolled. Closing membership in May showed 882 students enrolled. The opening membership is 50 students above this figure.

A breakdown of the enrollment figures show 409 students in the elementary school, grades

1-6; 186 students in Junior High school, grades 7-8; and 337 students in high school, grades 9-12. These are new enrollment records in both the junior high and the high school. The elementary enrollment has exceeded this figure only two times.

School officials have predicted that only a few additional students will enroll during the next week. Total enrollment should not exceed 950 when all late registrations are in.

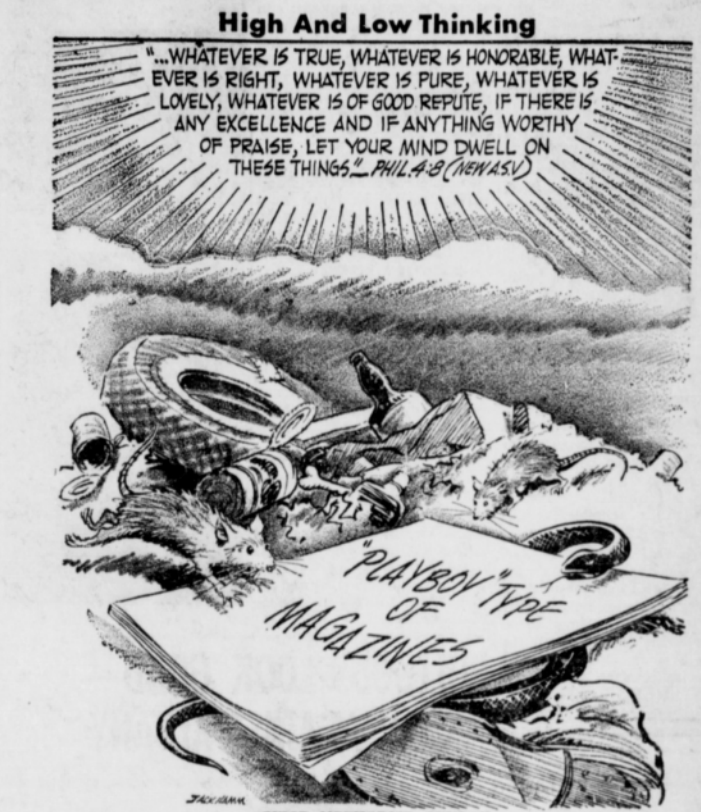

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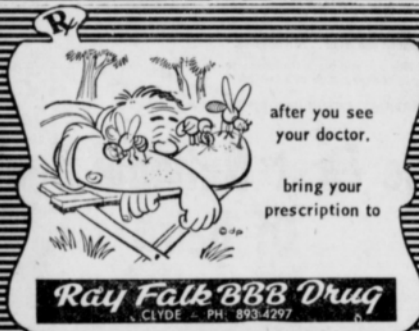

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — Lt. Governor-elect Bill Hobby called for an era of "getting together and working together to solve Texas' problems" in his fund raising dinner in Austin.

"We have been through some of the most turbulent campaigns in our recent history -- campaigns that left some wounds," he stressed.

"We need to see to it that those wounds heal without leaving scars.

"State governments are resuming their roles as vital members of the federal-state partnership," Hobby added. "Our federal system cannot work unless the states and the local government perform their functions responsibly and effectively."

Hobby told the audience of Democratic leaders that Texas has something to give the nation - simple virtues of courtesy and neighborliness.

He talked of the "new mood now running at tidal proportions throughout the state," and said he believed the entire nation could find hope and an example here in Texas.

"Only history will record whether or not Texans invested the conscience, the commitment and an effort to create a humane and just society in our state," Hobby concluded.

LABOR DAY DEATHS PREDICTED — Col. Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, estimates that statewide traffic accidents over the 78-hour Labor Day weekend will claim 48 lives.

The Labor Day holiday, as designated by the National Safety Council, extends from 6 p. m. Friday, September 1 to mid-

night Monday, September 4. At the close of the Labor Day period last year, a DFS tabulation revealed 41 persons had died in 34 traffic accidents in the state. Late deaths pushed the toll to 43 persons killed in 36 accidents.

Speir said the DFS and local law enforcement agencies will be taking all possible steps to reduce the holiday death toll. A special Operator Morticide will be in progress over the Labor Day weekend and tabulations on rural and urban fatal accidents will be reported to the new media of Texas three times daily.

As is customary on major holidays, says Speir, all available highway patrolmen will be placed on duty throughout the state. They will make full use of radar and breath testing instruments in an effort to curtail the major cause of fatal accidents - excessive speed and drunk driving.

Joining law enforcement officers in the effort to reduce loss of lives during the holiday period will be about 500 Texas National Guardsmen who will operate jeep controls to assist motorists and to ride partners with DPS patrolmen. The guardsmen, all volunteers, will concentrate their efforts in 107 Texas counties in far east, central and south Texas.

Speaking of Operation Morticide, Colonel Speir said, "those educational and enforcement program will have an impact, but a great deal of the responsibility for accident reduction rests in the hands of the individual Texans."

"I am appealing to all our

citizens to join with us in saving lives by Driving Friendly, both during the holiday and throughout the remainder of the year," the DPS director said.

GOAL FOR TEXAS CITIES— More than 70 urban experts from across the state met in Austin recently to draft goals which will be used to determine programs the Texas Municipal League will provide Texas cities in the Seventies.

Founded in 1913, the Texas Municipal League now includes more than 720 cities in the state among its membership. Its functions are to disseminate information, inform mayors and other municipal leaders about important pending legislation and to train municipal officials. Goals for the Seventies which will be widely disseminated among member cities in the state are expected to have "tremendous, long-reaching implications on the future of the cities of Texas," says former Dallas Mayor Erik Jonsson, chairman of the TML Committee of the Future.

Seguin Mayor Alfred Koebig, TML president, commented: "We know from experience that the usefulness of any institution is based largely on its ability to keep pace with present and emerging needs; and it is our hope that the Municipal League's goal-setting process will provide information and decisions so that work to solve urban problems can begin now rather than when the problems become acutely serious."

SIGNS OF THE TIMES — Texas Highway Department has joined a nationwide symbol sign program to bring all highway signing into conformance with the co-called international sign program used in many other nations.

Richard Oliver, traffic engineer for the State Highway Department, recently reported to the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee that the more important regulatory signs such as "Yield," "Do Not Enter" and "Wrong Way" are now being installed at critical locations, while other signs are being changed over on a maintenance replacement basis.

He explained the target date or full compliance with the National Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices is January 1977. Full compliance with the National Manual is expected to cost the State of Texas \$6 million for sign installation over the five-year period. Other costs will include \$4.5 million for conversion of highway markings and \$250,000 for installation of traffic signals.

"A folder describing the signs and new pavement markings is in preparation," said Oliver.

AGING TARGET AREAS ESTABLISHED — The Governor's Committee on Aging has approved 10 urban target areas for establishment of Area Agencies on Aging. Rural areas will be designated soon.

The Area Agencies on Aging will provide the governor's committee with planning for federal nutrition programs and related services, as well as additional programs for the elderly as they develop. Selected as target areas were the counties of Harris, Jefferson, Orange, Bexar, Dallas, Tarrant, Travis, El Paso, McLennan, Nueces, Hidalgo and Cameron. The areas were selected according to numbers of persons 65 and older, numbers of elderly below the poverty level and proportions of minority groups.

CAPITOL HIT BY STORM — Tornado winds raked the state capitol grounds August 22 ripping several giant elm trees out of the ground, roots and all, and smashing several windows in the capitol building itself. Tourists were sent scurrying from the first floor rotunda of the building when shattered glass from windows in the dome, 260 feet above came showering down along with mini-deluge of rain-water.

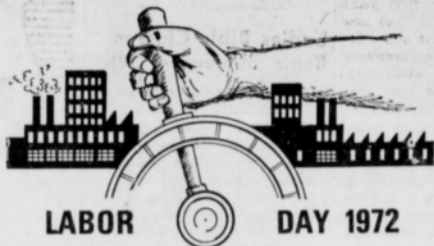
Capitol employees had windows repaired and the rotunda cleaned of glass and water by the following day, but several days were required to clear debris from shattered trees from the capitol grounds. Fortunately, there were no injuries.

SCS TO HAVE FIELD DAY SEPTEMBER 13 AT KNOX CITY

A field day will be held Sept. 13 at the Soil Conservation Service plant materials center at Knox City. State Conservationist Edward E. Thomas announced this week.

The center serves Texas and Oklahoma.

Livestockmen, seed dealers, sportsmen, and others interested in the search for improved plants are being invited to attend the field day.

Harvey Davis of Temple, executive director of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board, will be the principal speaker.

New grasses, forbs, legumes, and other plants under evaluation at the center will be discussed during the day. Some 1200 strains of 325 plants are being grown at the center.

Chief goal of the SCS plant materials work is to find new strains of plants that will solve specific conservation problems. Since livestock and wildlife co-exist on the same land, the search extends to grasses, legumes, forbs and shrubs that have dual values. Such plants are needed by landowners and operators for including in range seeding mixtures, for use in travel lane seedings, in border plantings, and for other uses. Strains that appear promising at Knox City are then grown and evaluated under field conditions on farms of soil and water conservation district cooperators under a wide variety of conditions. Selections that prove superior to other plants available commercially are then released by conservation districts to seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell it to the public.

A new grass variety, Mason sandhill lovegrass, was certified and released earlier this year as a result of work done at the center in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Selection 75 kleingrass was released in 1968. Other grass strains proven and put into use by SCS include El Reno, Uvalde and Vaughn side-osts grama; King Ranch blue-stem; green sprangletop, and Grenville switchgrass.

Some of the groups who cooperate with SCS in its plant materials work in Texas include Agricultural Research Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas A&M University, Texas Tech University, Prairie View A&M, Abilene Christian College, U. S. Air Force, U. S. Corps of Engineers, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and soil and water conservation districts.

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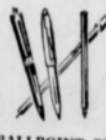
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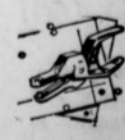

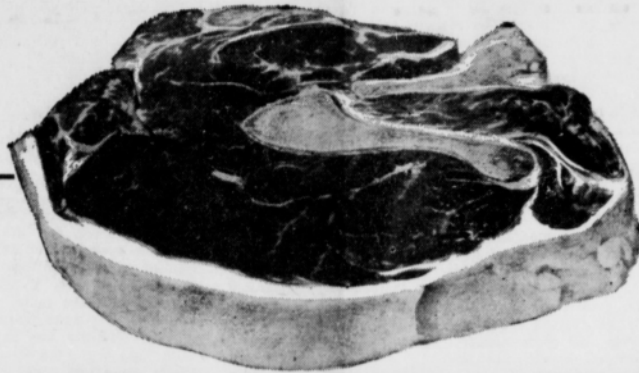

CALLAHAN COUNTY HISTORY

Following the lead of John Henry Brown, a member from Galveston, the legislature of Texas decided to honor a member of the tragic Georgia Battalion, when, on Feb. 1, 1858, Governor Hardin Runnels signed the measure that created Callahan County.

James H. Callahan was a native of Marion, Georgia. He was born there Sept. 14, 1814. Under the guidance of his father he became a mechanic and a blacksmith.

Venturesome and fond of outdoor life, he joined the Georgia Battalion in 1835 for service against the Mexican army in the Texas Revolution.

Callahan, along with other Georgia troops, fell prisoner to Mexican forces in the Battle of the Coletto. They were sent to Goliad as prisoners of war. With the order for the massacre of Fannin's troops, Mexican officers selected certain men to be spared. The officers considered Callahan's background as a mechanic and ordered him to be spared.

One of the provisions of the Treaty of Velasco which Santa Anna signed with the Republic of Texas recited that all Texan prisoners should be released. This provision applied to Callahan; and he decided to remain in Texas.

members of the district court. The Georgia native advanced to the rank of captain in the ranger force, and in 1853 proved his fearless leadership. A band of Apaches and Kickapooos from Mexico invaded Texas in the region of Eagle Pass.

The ranger captain and his men followed them closely and crossed the Rio Grande and entered the Mexican town of Piedras Negras. When the populace turned against the rangers, shots resulted and fires spread throughout the town. Callahan and his men withdrew to the Texas side of the river immediately following the outbreak of the fires. Mexican officials blamed the Texans for setting the fires, while Callahan steadfastly maintained that his men were blameless.

Callahan resigned from the ranger force at the end of 1853 and moved to Blanco, Texas, where he engaged in the mercantile business and in trading in livestock. Within two years all feeling developed between him and another prominent resident of the town, Friends of the two men formed sides, and in a pitched battle between the rival bands Callahan was killed in 1856.
