## One killed, five hurt in two-car collision

A two-car collision Tuesday evening southwest of Burkburnett resulted in the death of one young man and injuries of various degrees to five others.

Johnny Montgomery, 23, died as a result of injuries he sustained when he was thrown from a four-wheel vehicle in which he and four other young Iowa Park men were riding.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Montgomery, who reside on James Drive.

Montgomery was riding in the back of the vehicle between two others, when a collision occurred at an intersection on Haley Road and Schmoker Road.

Driving the vehicle was Mike Brewer. He and Michael Johnston both had their seat belts on at the time.

But Montgomery and the other two, Johnny Duggins and Jason McGrath, reportedly were not using seat belts, and were thrown from the rolling vehicle.

Brewer is 19, and McGrath, Johnston and Duggins are all 18.

All occupants of Brewer's car, except Montgomery, are seniors at Iowa Park High School and scheduled to graduate Friday night. Montgomery is a former student of the school.

The driver of the other vehicle, a station wagon, was identified as Val Howard, 62, a resident of Vernon.

Duggins was the most seriously injured of the survivors. He was held in the intensive care unit at Bethania Hospital until mid-day Wednesday, and then moved into another room.

McGrath also remained in Bethania at presstime. Brewer, Johnston and Howard were treated and released.

According to Trooper Mike Denk of the Department of Public Safety, the accident occurred at 6:45 p.m.

Brewer was driving south on FM 368, which becomes Haley Road south of the intersection, and Howard was driving west.

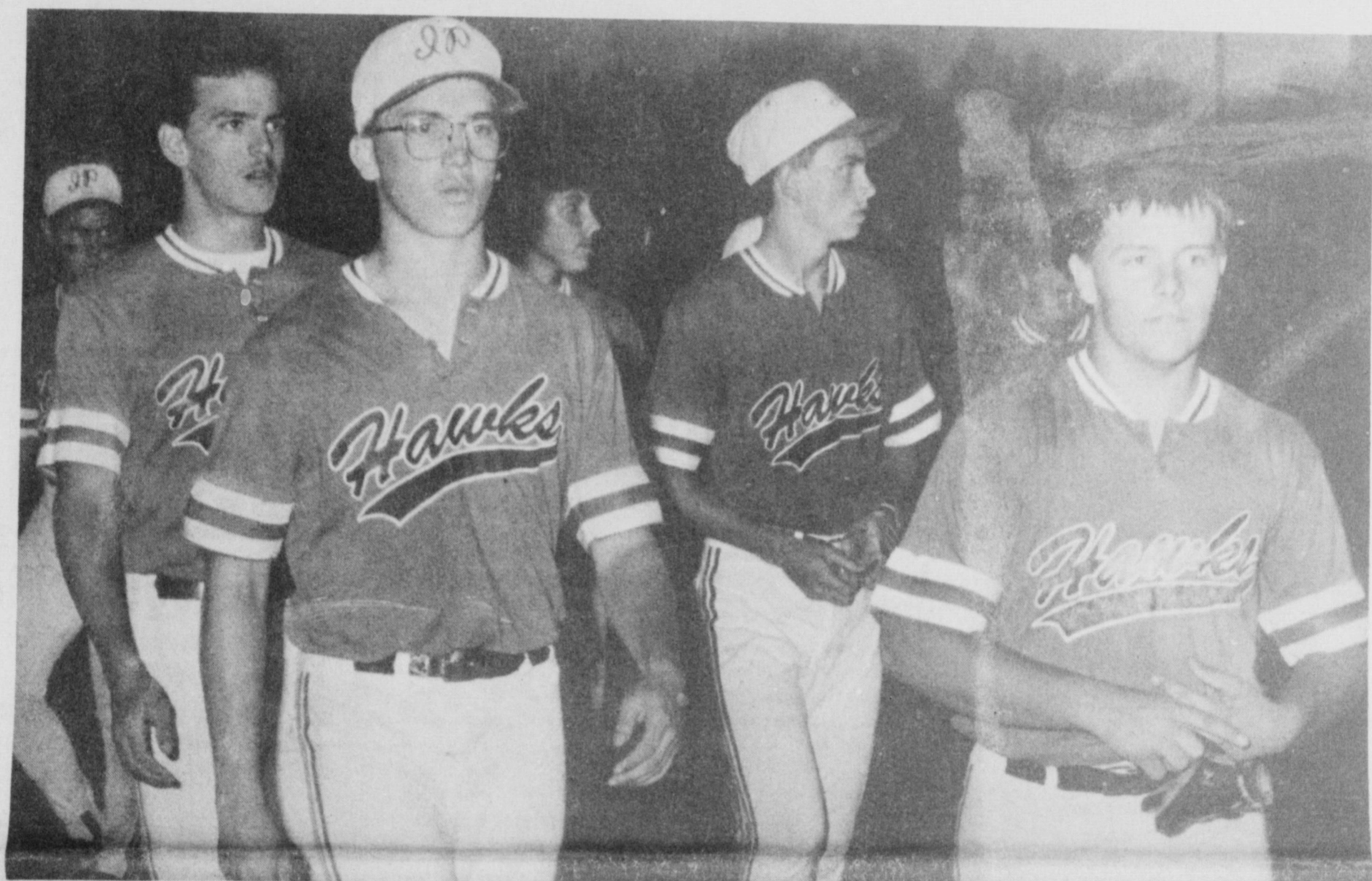
Trooper Denk said Brewer failed to yield the right of way, and his right front headfender struck the right rear fender of Howard's station wagon.

Both vehicles went into a spin. But the wheels of Brewer's vehicle dug into the dirt at the edge of the pavement, and flipped what appeared to be twice in the air.

A farmer was said to be plowing in a nearby field, and witnessed the aftermath of the collision.

The body of Montgomery was sent to Dallas Wednesday for an autopsy, which Denk says is a common practice whenever there is a fatality resulting in a vehicular accident in Texas.

Charges are pending completion of the investigation, according to Trooper Denk.

## Pool offers special rate Saturday

A special rate of \$1 is being offered to swimmers when the Iowa Park Bicentennial Swimming Pool observes Splash Day Saturday.

The season will get underway at 12-noon, and continue to open daily through the summer. Hours will be 12-6 p.m. Monday through Saturday and 1-7 Sunday.

Another incentive this year will be that the high school gymnasium also will be open, allowing youths to vary their time between basketball and swimming.

A major cut in individual season memberships was made this year. The price was reduced from \$40 to \$25.

General admission is \$2, except for children three and under who are admitted free when accompanied by an adult.

Books of 10 admission tickets are offered for \$10 for youths 10 years of age and under, and \$15 for all others.

Family season memberships, with a limit of six members, is \$75.

The pool is available during non-regular hours for parties at a rate of \$50, plus payment to the required lifeguard.

Two-week swimming lessons, with instruction 10-10:45 and 11-11:45 a.m. Monday through Thursday, will begin June 8. The fee is \$20. Instruction will be for beginners, advanced beginners, intermediate and for the more advanced swimmers.

## Police have young suspect in window-breaking spree

A series of window-breaking incidents may have been solved Friday when police took a 16-year-old male into custody on a criminal mischief charge.

A resident in the 300 block of East Garden called the police station at 12:59 a.m. to report someone had just broken out a bedroom window of the home.

Several reports of similar breakage, two of them from the same home in the same 300 East Garden block on successive evenings, were filed with police last week.

The owner of this week's home that was attacked found footprints in the wet grass and followed them to the house next door.

An officer discussed the situation with the juvenile the next afternoon. He was taken before the justice of the peace and then transported to the county juvenile detention center in Wichita Falls, according to the police blotter.

An Iowa Park woman received a citation for theft under \$20, when she was allegedly detained for shoplifting a carton of cigarettes Tuesday at a local supermarket.

Besides the citation, the woman, Angela Rae Wright, 24, was also barred from entering the establishment again when she was warned before an officer of criminal trespass, according to the

the use of the temporary buildings, purchased a few years ago to handle the overflow enrollment at Bradford Elementary, for the 1992-93 year.

Confirming a statement he had made at the last board meeting, Mitchell said he believed permanent classroom construction would be paid for over a four-year period, with the increased state funding created by holding all-day kindergarten instead of half-day.

Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent, warned the board that one more move may be all the temporary structures can withstand.

Two were moved from Bradford last year to the junior high school, for use in special education, but the plan was changed and the structures never used.

Palmer said the buildings are not like mobile homes, and were never intended for numerous moves which require a house mover.

The board voted to accept the resignations of Mary Lewis and Laura Dicaro, but did not hire any new personnel, even after holding an executive session that lasted an hour and 21 minutes.

His rain gauge caught .4 of an inch, raising the total for May to 1.92 inches, according to Woodfin.

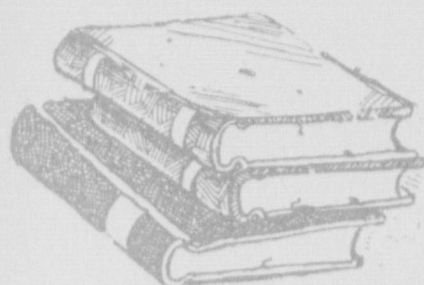
### Bloodmobile to be here June 8

A memorial award was given in Byrne's name and he was also recognized as an outstanding tennis student. We regret the error.

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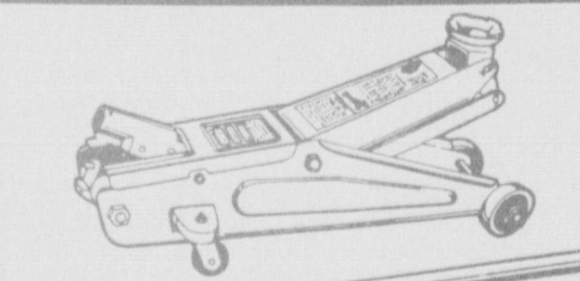

**Caramel Ice Cream Dessert**

- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 jar caramel ice cream topping
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 cup oatmeal
- 1/2 gal. vanilla ice cream

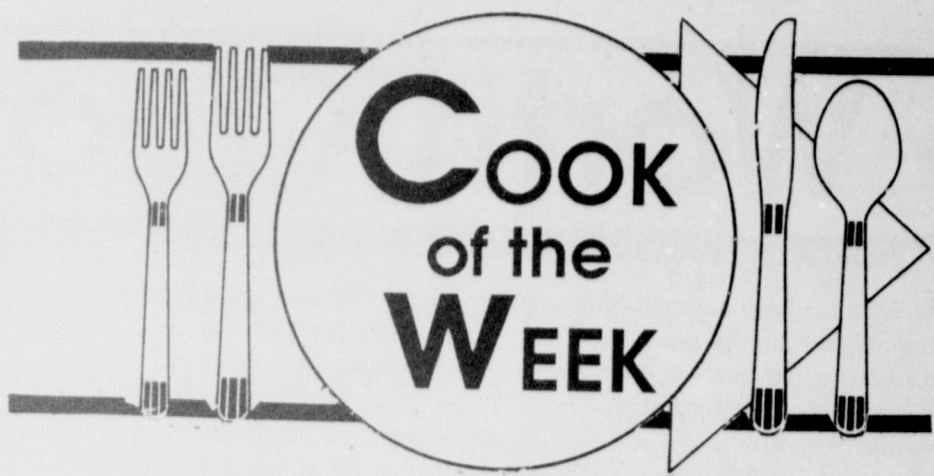
Mix flour, butter, sugar, and oatmeal. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes in 9x13 inch pan. Remove half of mixture from pan and break up remainder in pan. Pour 1/2 jar of topping over cookie crust. Spread 1/2 gallon ice cream over topping. Sprinkle the remaining crust over ice cream and pour remaining topping over crust. Freeze.

**COOK of the WEEK**

**Vegetable Pizza**

- 2 - 8 oz. pkg. refrigerated crescent rolls
- 1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
- 1 - 3 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
- 1/3 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing
- 1 tsp. dried dill weed
- 1 tsp. buttermilk salad dressing mix
- 3 cups desired toppings: finely chopped broccoli, cauliflower or green pepper; seeded and chopped tomato; thinly sliced green onion, black olives or celery; or shredded carrots.
- 1 cup shredded Cheddar, Mozzarella or Monterey Jack cheese

For crust, unroll crescent rolls and pat into a 15 1/2x10 1/2x2 inch baking pan. Bake according to package directions. Cool. Meanwhile in a small mixing bowl, stir together the cream cheese, mayonnaise, dillweed and salad dressing mix. Spread evenly over cooled crust. Sprinkle with desired toppings, then the shredded cheese.

**Surprise Casserole**

- 2 chuck or round steaks, cubed
- 1 stick butter
- 1/2 onion, minced
- Bay leaves
- 1 cup cooked macaroni
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 2 tsps. pimento
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup grated cheese
- Bread crumbs

Saute meat in butter. Add all ingredients except macaroni, cheese and bread crumbs. Let simmer 30 minutes. Pour into casserole, adding macaroni and cheese and topping with bread crumbs. Bake 30 minutes at 325 degrees.

**Orange Julius**

- 1 - 6 oz. can frozen orange juice
  - 1 cup milk
  - 1 cup water
  - 1 tsp. vanilla
  - 10-12 ice cubes
  - 4 Tbsps. sugar
- Place all ingredients in blender; blend. Serves 4-6.

**Cowboy Cookies**

- 1 cup butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 cups flour
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 1/2 tsp. vanilla
- 2 cups oatmeal
- 1 cup coconut
- 12 oz. chocolate chips

Cream butter and sugars; add eggs and beat well. Stir in remaining ingredients. Bake 10-12 minutes at 350 degrees.

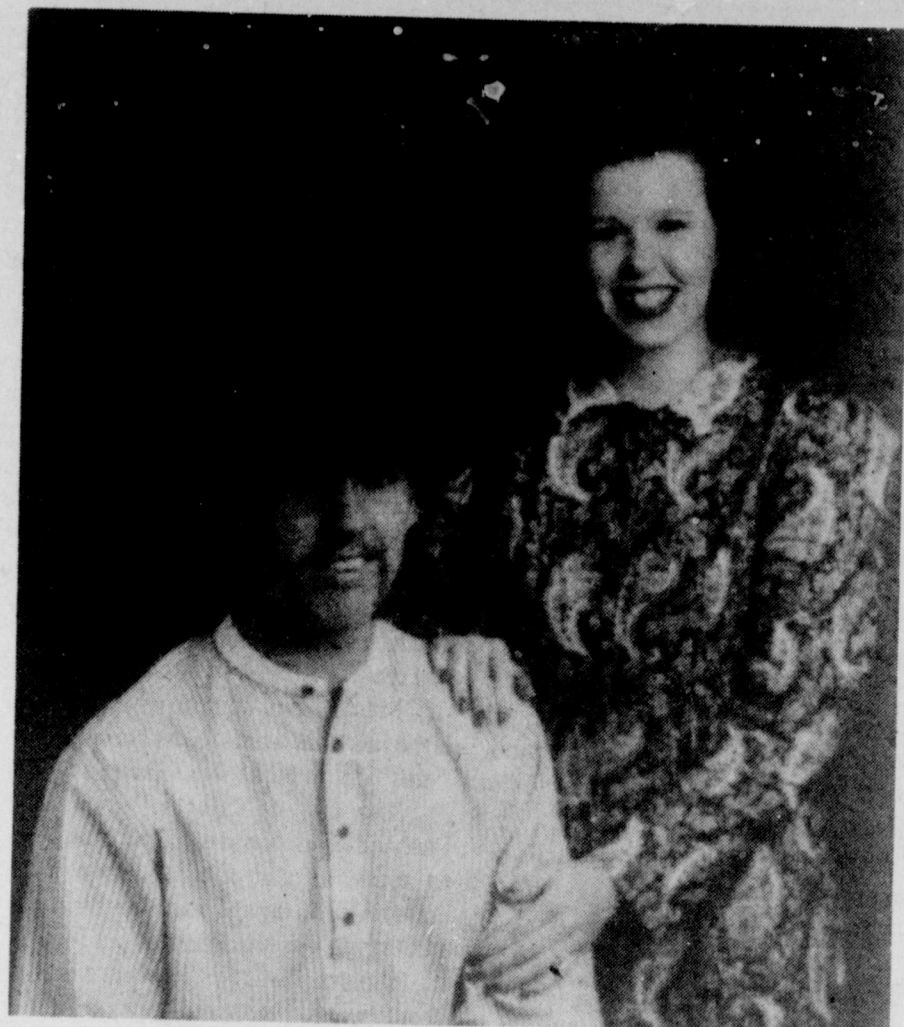

**Multi-purpose center explained to Lions**

Charles Harper, architect from Wichita Falls, spoke to the Evening Lions Tuesday on the proposed multi-purpose event center in Wichita Falls. The site for the center which was chosen after 15 sites were considered will cross Wichita River and will be bounded by Wichita Street on the north, Interstate 44 on the west, Scott Street on the east and 5th Street on the south. The speaker was introduced by Cornell Evans, club president.

Harper said the need for a large center arose when the county fair grounds had to be moved for security reasons and the need for a convention center in Wichita Falls was realized. He said that the center would cost \$25,000,000, and that the City of Wichita Falls and Wichita County would have to pay \$9,000,000 each and the rest of the money would come from the private sector.

During a lengthy question and answer period, Harper explained many of the ways that the area would benefit from the center as well as the city of Wichita Falls and urged his listeners to support the project.

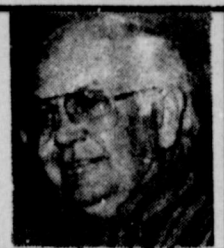

If Southerners thought they were being 'dumped' on by the Yankees during Reconstruction following the Civil War, wait'll you see what New York is trying to do to Texas now.

No, it's not trash to be buried, like that state sent down here on a barge a few years ago, and was refused.

This is big-time dumping. It's the sludge from that city's sewer treatment plants.

I first caught wind of the "stink" while reading the Perryton Herald. The story explained that a company which handles the sludge had been contacted by Perryton's industrial foundation, as a

possible source of free fertilizer.

In other words, those folks wanted it.

But not everyone around Sierra Blanca, down near El Paso, feel the same. In fact, a suit is being threatened by the president of the "Save Sierra Blanca" organization, if the project goes that far.

Numerous farmers in Colorado are already contracting to accept the sludge, according to a company the Perryton people were working with. Those folks up there liked it.

The sludge is shipped by sealed rail car to a receiving location, and from

there is distributed on the land with spreaders, similar to the equipment used in putting out barnyard manure.

There are some regulations that must be met, as far as the receiving soil is concerned. Among them is land that has almost zero slope, doesn't drain into a municipal water supply, and poses no threat to underground water because of soil type.

Merco Joint Venture of Oklahoma is the firm that wants to put New York's "stuff" out in Hudspeth County.

The city of Canyon, up in the Panhandle, got permission from the state to apply its sludge onto range land sometime during the past year, instead of burying it in the landfill.

I guess sewage plant sludge is like beauty -- it's whatever appears in the eyes of the beholder.

Worth Quoting

With the help of some "frequent flyer" miles from my sister, the Craig clan ventured to the frozen north of Minnesota the week between Christmas and New Year's.

Actually, we took some of our warm weather to the north as the temperatures ranged in the low 30's in the daytime and the upper 20's at night. Normal for this time of the year is a high in the 20's and a low in the teens or single-digits.

Much of the reason for the lack of temperature fluctuation was due to the fact that we did not see the sunshine the entire time we were there. In fact, Tuesday morning's weather showed a report that the area had been covered by clouds for 11 consecutive days.

While no new snow fell while we were in the St. Paul-Minneapolis area, there was plenty still left from two earlier storms that hit the area. The cities received over 20 inches of snow in an unusual Thanksgiving snow and another 18 inches on the day after Thanksgiving.

The snow that remained, which ranged from six inches to two feet in depth, provided a great deal of fun for two West Texas youngsters.

Having a sister living in the area made the trip more educational as well.

The Twin-Cities area has not been hit as hard by the downturn in the national economy and in fact is showing signs of growth. This is also coming to a state that has an income tax, sales tax and property taxes.

The state levies an 11 percent personal income tax, charges a 6.5 percent sales tax and levies a property tax for schools that is higher than most property taxes in Texas.

It was interesting, that clothing is considered a "necessity" there and is therefore not subject to the state sales tax. When the temperature can fall well below zero and remain there for days, clothing is indeed a necessity.

With the high taxes, wage scales are also high in the metropolitan area. In fact, the fast food restaurants are offering from \$6 to 6.50 per hour for part-time employees and are having a difficult time finding anyone to work.

The main reason for the lack of employees and the high taxes is that state's welfare system is among the best in the nation. Someone remarked that the Twin Cities would have more homeless people taking advantage of the welfare system if the winters were not so bitter.

We traveled into the rural parts of Minnesota and Wisconsin to see how these areas compared to West Texas. There we found large dairy barns which nearly always included a basement level to protect the cattle from the harsh

winters. Each barn had at least one large silo with other open silos made of wire mesh nearby for storing and drying corn.

It was also interesting to compare the state's roads and highways with those found in Texas. It was clearly apparent that much of the tax money was also spent on roads which were in excellent

shape despite the freezing temperatures and abundant snows.

While it was good to get to visit Beth in her adopted state, it was good to get back home -- especially to Sunday's balmy, springlike weather.

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Worth Quoting

Senator David Boren of Oklahoma has evidently correctly interpreted the mood of the country, and wants to overhaul the nation's welfare system.

He and eight other senators, including Sen. Loyd Bentsen of Texas, have joined together to introduce a bill to bring about a modern day version of two programs used during the great depression of the thirties.

Old timers here in Andrews will remember the Works Progress Administration and the Civilian Conservation Corps, programs designed to put millions of unemployed Americans back to work.

Senator Boren compares the results of our current welfare system with the eight-year record of the WPA and the CCC.

"In spite of billions spent on welfare programs, America's underclass is growing at an unprecedented rate," Boren declares. "In the last two years, the number of people receiving Aid to Families with Dependent children benefits has gone up 24 percent and total spending has increased 17 percent -- and only seven percent of the welfare population has actually switched from welfare to work under job search programs."

The Oklahoma senator compares today's welfare with the eight years the WPA was in existence in the late 1930s and early 1940s. The eight million WPA workers built more than 650,000 miles of roads, highways and sidewalks, 125,000 public buildings (including 39,000 schools), 124,000 bridges, 8,000 parks and 18,000 playgrounds.

WPA workers wrote hundreds of books and created countless artistic works. They served over one billion meals to hungry school children and sewed over 382 million garments for those in need. All this required an investment of about \$90 billion in today's terms.

Here in West Texas, the Indian Mountain Lodge in the Davis Mountains was a WPA project and streets in Lamesa, Lubbock, and several other area cities were paved with bricks -- and many are still in place.

In contrast, what has our current welfare system created in the last eight years?

At a cost of over \$900 billion spent on all public assistance, we have managed to produce nothing but subsistence level payments to an increasingly hopeless segment of American society. Boren says these recipients will never have the satisfaction of saying: "I helped build that park for the community" or "I served meals to the homeless."

Under Boren's bill, all able-bodied welfare recipients with the exception of mothers with small children and those enrolled in education and training programs, would be required to take an available job with the agency if they cannot find a job elsewhere.

Local and state agencies as well as private non-profit organizations would apply for work grants to help rebuild the infrastructure in cities, counties, and states. And an added incentive, pay for the workers would be at least 10 percent higher than welfare payments.

In addition to the adult programs, two youth programs would be created. A Youth Community Corps would allow students beginning in the 7th grade to work up to 250 hours per year until they reach the senior year of high school. Students participating for six years would earn up to \$10,000 in educational

benefits or \$5,000 in cash on graduation from high school.

The second program would create camps or dormitory units in urban areas for people aged 17 to 22 to work on projects ranging from reforestation to auxiliary police to town beautification. It would provide up to \$10,000 in educational benefits for one year of work. The program might well use excess military bases and personnel being phased out of the military in supervisory positions.

Like Senator Boren says: "The current welfare system cannot be fixed with patches and Band-Aids. It is time to recycle an approach that worked well in the past and modify it to fit current conditions."

"Maybe someday, welfare recipients whose talents are now being wasted can point to some major community facility and say with pride, like the WPA workers of old, 'I helped build it!'"

### New guidelines for AIDS procedures

New Public Health Service guidelines advise dentists and surgeons performing limited types of "exposure-prone" procedures to get tested for AIDS and, if infected, to refrain from these procedures.

The tests are recommended only for health workers involved in exposure-prone procedures such as abdominal and heart surgery, root canals and tooth extractions—in which an accidental cut could cause the health care worker's blood to contact a body cavity, subcutaneous tissue or mucous membranes.

James O. Mason, M.D., who heads the Public Health Service, said, "In most medical situations, there's no more risk from an HIV-infected nurse or doctor than from an infected lawyer, cab driver, waiter or teacher, which is to say, no risk at all."

We much get that across to the public—that AIDS will not and can

not be transmitted by most medical activities, from a physical exam to the treatment of pneumonia to the radiation of a tumor.

AUSTIN - State officials plan to throw 14 parties to boost and celebrate the new Texas Lottery.

Gov. Ann Richards plans to sell the first ticket of the 300 million printed for sale starting at 6 a.m. Friday.

Lawmakers hope the new game, which officials say makes one in every 7.9 tickets a winner, will raise enough state revenue to fund a desperate public education kitty.

Critics called the lottery a shell game sham on the poverty class, and Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock once said it was "a sleazy way to raise state revenues."

Budget Miscalculations

As state lawmakers, sitting in committees last week, heard grim predictions of state budget shortfalls, Bullock commented: "The truth is the Legislature has promised school districts more than it could ever fund."

Bullock also warned school officials that they should not assume they can continue collecting \$5.2 billion in illegal county education district taxes next year.

Bullock said he fears major corporate taxpayers will refuse to pay the CED tax while it is entangled in litigation. The tax is being appealed to the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals.

The budget examiners predicted school districts would start their next budget periods with \$350 million less in state revenues because of miscalculations.

Senate Education Committee chairman Carl Parker, D-Port Arthur, blamed school districts for

raising taxes "more than necessary to generate more state aid."

Census Report on Texas

The U.S. Census report for Texas released last week put the past decade of recession into numbers:

■ The population rose from 14.2 million in 1979 to 16.9 million in 1989, including thousands of Hispanics and Asians.

■ Households in 1989 with low incomes, below \$25,000, numbered almost three million, but shrank by a fourth compared to 1979.

■ Beneath the poverty line, or \$12,647 for a family of four, a million households were added in the 80s. One of every three was headed by a woman, with no spouse present.

■ More than a million households had \$50,000 incomes, five times more than in 1979. More than 85,000 households had incomes of \$150,000 or higher, many boosted by marriages of two professionals.

■ Overall, the poverty class increased 3.4 percent to end the decade with 18.1 percent of the total Texas population of 16,986,510.

Perot Reports Income

Independent presidential probable Ross Perot disclosed financial documents last week showing more than 176 investments each worth more than \$1 million.

He is expected to join the race as a candidate next month.

Meanwhile, Texas GOP national committeeman Earnest Angelo of Midland predicted if Perot throws the election into the U.S. House of Representatives, Bush would lose.

There, each state has one vote, cast by the majority of its congressional delegation; 26 votes wins it all.

Currently, Democrats control 31 delegations, Republicans have 10, eight are evenly divided, and Vermont has a lone, independent congressman.

Killing Phone Records

Records of local calls from state telephones now will be destroyed weekly instead of monthly, state officials announced. They said the

change will save money and free up computer data space.

The change comes after such records implicated Land Commissioner Garry Mauro in using state phones to help Gov. Bill Clinton's presidential campaign and also implicated U.S. District Judge James Nowlin in getting secret help from a legislator to redraw Texas Senate districts.

Sen. Dickson Has Cancer

State Sen. Temple Dickson, D-Sweetwater, has been diagnosed with lung cancer.

He entered the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn. last week and will be there several days, a spokesman said. The cancer was discovered during a checkup in April, early enough that doctors believe it can be removed.

Dickson, 57, was elected to the Senate in 1988, after serving six years in the House. After redistricting, he was defeated in March by Sen. Bill Sims, D-San Angelo.

Other Highlights

■ New Public Utility Commission member Karl Rabago voted to keep Robert Gee as chairman, but came under attack from the third member, Republican Marta Greytok, for potential conflicts of interest. Greytok pointed out Rabago and his new executive assistant made money previously representing ratepayers before the PUC. Rabago, a lawyer, said he knew the law.

■ Former Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby told a congressional committee to recruit ex-soldiers as school teachers and amend tax laws so they can roll military benefits into a teacher retirement plan. "Many (soldiers) are already experienced teachers, many will be men, many will be minorities," Hobby said.

■ Legislative leaders have approved a plan to audit Texas school districts in search of waste and inefficiency in the spending of some \$16 billion annually.

■ Richard Ladd, assistant director of the Oregon Department of Human Resources, was appointed by Gov. Richards as Texas' first commissioner of health and human services.

Beneficiaries' current addresses needed

If you're a current Social Security beneficiary who has changed your address and have not notified the Social Security Administration (SSA), you need to do it now.

It is important that SSA have a correct address in case the agency needs to contact you for information about current entitlement to benefits.

Currently, SSA is contacting national trade associations that represent banking institutions throughout the country. These associations are being asked to inform their member banks of the need for their cooperation in helping Social Security obtain correct addresses for beneficiaries who use direct deposit.

The associations also are being asked to alert their members that in May, SSA field office staff will request that banks furnish the correct

address of those direct depositors for whom a Form 1099 (Social Security Benefit Statement) was returned to Social Security as undeliverable. This request for disclosure is permissible under the "Right To Financial Privacy Act."

Before contacting the banks, SSA will recheck its records to see if a new address has been reported since the forms were returned.

All undeliverable forms will be mailed a second time, using a new address if it has been submitted. For those using direct deposit, if the form is returned after the second mailing, the financial institution will be identified and contacted for a current address.

If the financial institution cannot or will not provide the address, or if benefits are paid directly to the ben-

eficiary by check, SSA will contact the post office and telephone directory assistance to seek a current address.

If all these efforts fail, a "due process" letter will be sent to the last known address of the beneficiary and benefits will be suspended until he or she contacts SSA.
