Housing additions, golf course top work

A golf course and three housing additions consumed Monday night's meeting of the city council.

Mike Negri asked for an additional three months on a lease of most of the property around Lake Iowa Park, explaining he had a new group of investors interested in building a golf

course there.

Negri, who was granted a year's lease on the land last year, said his new group was "very positive" about the potential of developing the course.

He said an architect and engineer already had been working on a preliminary drawing, and "all parties involved are in agreement."

As to the extension period, Negri said the project would be decided within three months, at which time they would "either forget this thing, or move dirt."

The developing group also is interested in building homes on private property around the lake and course. A preliminary plat has space for 450 home sites, he said.

If approved, the lake's level would have to be lowered somewhat, to allow construction on the course, but when completed, allowed to reach its normal maximum level.

Another course development plan was proposed last year for the lake, but was never finalized.

To ensure adequate time for a decision to be reached, the council approved a motion granting Negri four months, instead of the three he requested.

Because of a change by the state legislature on annexation laws, the city was forced to begin once again a series of public hearings on the annexation of Park Place Addition, north of Country Hills Addition.

Two hearings had already been held, when the change was discovered, and three are now required. So, the city began the first of three new hearings on the annexation.

Tommy Key, one of the two principals in the development, told the

council some preliminary dirt work was begun that morning.

The first couple of homes to be built will face onto Johnson Road, where the dirt work was done.

Key explained there was still some necessary paperwork from an oil company, concerning a pipeline easement across the tract. Abandonment of the easement will be necessary, if homes are to be built where they are now planned.

The city earlier agreed to assist in the initial part of the development, by extending utilities to the first phase of the project, as well as building the streets.

The initial portion of the development involved in the annexation is a 9.758-acre tract.

The developers will refund money expended by the city, at an agreed interest rate, as the lots are sold.

Another proposed housing addition also was discussed by aldermen. It would be located north of US 287 and west of FM 368.

A final plat on the addition, which would include 214 homes and a large area for commercial development, is to be presented at one of the next two council meetings for approval.

The 48.2-acre tract also would be annexed into the city.

During Administrator Mike Price's report period, a report from the city's legal council on what and where city funds and labor can be spent and used on private property was discussed.

Lynn Collins, detective of the Iowa Park Police Dept., was recognized as the city's Employee of the Month for January.

Superintendent's contract is extended

Trustees voted to extend Superintendent Glen Mitchell's three-year contract one year during an executive session of the regular board meeting Monday night.

Board members agreed to extend the Mitchell's at the same pay he has been receiving.

The most lengthy topic of discussion during the open portion of the meeting was a review of the facility needs at Kidwell Elementary.

Cramped for space, three temporary buildings have been used as kindergarten classrooms since all-day kindergarten began two years ago. The portable classrooms have no restroom facilities, which requires the classes to go into the permanent building to use those facilities.

Mike Hoover, Kidwell principal, told board members that although enrollment is down from last year, a need for more permanent classrooms is still there, as well as a need for increased cafeteria space.

He said beginning in 1995, pre-kindergarten and kindergarten classrooms must meet state daycare licensing requirements, including restroom facilities, and the temporary buildings do not.

Last September the school board requested and received a delay until

1995 in enforcing the code to build restrooms for the portables by the city council.

There was a discussion concerning placing classes that do not require all day instruction in the temporary buildings until more permanent classrooms are built. No action was taken.

The board has been studying the need for more classroom space since August of 1992. At that session, a time line was approved to further study and revise the facility needs at Kidwell.

According to the time line, trustees will review the enrollment trends and vote to build permanent kindergarten classrooms during the December, 1994, meeting. August, 1995 is the goal date to move into permanent kindergarten classrooms.

Board members agreed to pay a monthly individual employee increase in health insurance of \$5.46. This will bring the percentage of health insurance paid by the school district for employees to over 70 percent.

Trustees accepted the resignations of Lisa Thomson, Kidwell Resource Teacher, and Deanna Swenson, high school resource room aide.

Neysia Wilson was hired to re-

place Thomson. She has a degree from West Texas State Univ., and 12 years teaching experience. Donna Williams was hired to replace Swenson.

Marsha Duffie was hired as the TLC teacher at the junior high. She received a bachelor of science degree from Houston Baptist Univ., and her masters degree from Southwest Baptist Theological Seminary.

During the superintendent's report Mitchell told the board that enrollment is up by 20 students from January of last year. The most significant gain was at the high school, up by 29. Kidwell was the only campus down from last year, with a decrease of 22.

Assistant Superintendent Robert Palmer reported on a new project for at-risk students in our district.

Palmer said \$2,000 has been budgeted for the "Turning Point Program," in which "at-risk" students, students at risk of not completing their high school education, and their families are counseled.

Palmer said each of the counselors at the four campuses have selected five families for the project. The project involves counselors at Red River Hospital and school counselors working with the families to help create a more stable family situation, thus keeping the students in school.

According to Palmer, the Iowa Park Recreational Activity Center has donated one of its meeting rooms for the project. The families and counselors will meet once a week for six weeks.

Iowa Park is the only school in the area participating in this project.

The board recognized four junior high teachers who had completed the

requirements for the Model of Successful Teaching Lab, sponsored by Region Nine.

Stan Dillmon, Shelia Gholson, Jana Monday and Eddie Jones were presented plaques from the board for their participation.

Other actions taken include:

*approved a request by the Wichita Falls Southwest Basketball Officials Assoc. to use the junior high gymnasium for a men's basketball tournament Jan. 29;

*approved bids from Brook Mays and Sam Gibbs on several pieces of band equipment;

*approved a bid of \$13,014.10 from Larry Slack on the purchase of a Ford F-150 maintenance pickup. The bid included long bed, 3/4-ton, V-8 motor, heavy duty rear bumper, automatic transmission and air conditioning;

*approved the purchase of a 1979 Chevrolet 1/2-ton van from Kenneth Via, Parkway True Value, for \$2,500. The van will be used for student transportation.

Palmer said the van would need rear windows, a paint job, passenger seats and detailing, which has been estimated at about \$2,500.

Four arrests reported

Of the four arrests made during the past week by the Iowa Park Police Dept., three of them, all for outstanding warrants issued locally, were made in less than three hours Sunday evening, according to the police blotter.

Actually, two of them were for two occupants of the same vehicle.

An officer making a traffic check of a vehicle at Pacific and Washington determined both the occupants had outstanding warrants against them.

The warrant for Jon Kevin Smith, 26, was listed as "unvaccinated animal," with a \$116.50 fine, and Tammy Ranae Daniel-Smith, 23, for "no liability insurance," with a \$255 fine.

Both were taken to the city jail, and later released after the fines were paid.

Less than three hours later, also on a traffic check, it was determined an outstanding warrant existed for the arrest of Cherri Lynn Owens, 32, for "failure to stop at a stop sign," with a fine of \$104.50. She also was released after paying the fine.

The fourth arrest was made Tuesday night, after a resident in the 1000 block of West Cornelia told police he heard a collision in front of his home, saw his parked vehicle had been struck, and a silver colored vehicle

leave the scene.

A citizen who had heard a description of the vehicle over his scanner later called and told police he could see it parked in the 1500 block of North Third.

The vehicle's only occupant, Jason Timothy McGrath, 20, was taken into custody for public intoxication, and transported to the city jail.

McGrath was not charged with hit and run, police explained, because they could not verify he was driving when the other vehicle was struck.

He was later released to the custody of his parents, and promising to appear in municipal court on the intoxication charge, police said.

Police dropped a charge of reckless conduct against a high school, who reportedly had taken a weapon into the building, to allow school authorities handle the matter.

The youth reportedly had threatened some students aboard a bus Thursday morning with the weapon, which turned out to be a BB pistol.

An eight-year-old girl was reportedly bitten by a dog Saturday afternoon in the 400 block of East Aldine. She was taken to Wichita General for treatment, and the dog was placed into quarantine.

Lehman leads cemetery group

Highland Cemetery Association elected officers and voted to purchase a new riding lawn mower at a meeting held at the RAC Sunday afternoon.

Garland Lehman, president, presided during the business meeting when he was re-elected president.

Other officers elected were Lowell Short, vice president, and Reat Spruiell, treasurer. Laverne Owens will serve as parliamentarian. Sandy Forsythe is office manager at the cemetery.

Pat Aulds introduced Lewis Jackson, newly elected to the board of directors. Other directors include Erna Mahler, Aulds, Robert Wilson, Larry Dutton, Herb Adcock, Sam Fairchild, Harold Phillips and Don Richter. Wilson will serve as board secretary.

In addition to voting for the purchase of a new mower, it was noted

that a heater has been installed in the pavilion area and a fire safe has been installed to protect cemetery records.

It was reported that work is progressing on clearing land for future development south of the present cemetery.

Families are reminded that Christmas decorations should be removed by Jan. 15. If not removed by the owner, the caretaker will remove and dispose of the items.

Donations are needed by the association to help cemetery serve the community's needs. Many families request memorials be made to the cemetery at the time of a death.

For a donation of \$100 an engraved plaque will be installed on the north wall of the pavilion. Engraved bricks to be used in future development may also be purchased for a \$25 donation.

Beautification projects defined for Amity Study Club

Ruth Welch, a member of Iowa Park Clean and Green, presented the program for Amity Study Club Monday in the home of Mrs. Joe Ward. Valerie Dillard served as co-hostess.

She said that Iowa Park Clean and Green was formed last April as a committee of the chamber of commerce in an effort to clean up the city, encourage recycling, and begin beautification projects.

The group is affiliated with Keep Texas Beautiful (KTB), a non-profit organization whose objective is to pre-

serve the natural beauty and environment of Texas by forging a partnership between grassroots volunteer organizations and the public and private sectors to improve the quality of life; to enhance economic development and tourism; and to conserve public and natural resources through education and public awareness activities.

Iowa Park Clean and Green will be entered in competition for the Governor's Community Achievement Award sponsored by KTB. This is the largest volunteer environmental improvements awards program in the

nation, offering over \$700,000 in landscaping and other cash awards to the winners. A city in Iowa Park's population division would win \$40,000 in landscaping by the Texas Highway Department. Burkburnett, Electra and Wichita Falls have won this award in the past.

Mrs. Welch told of the projects either underway or being planned by the group. They include work already begun at Oscar Park, a pocket park and planters downtown, and flower gardens. She suggested ways in which Amity Study Club could become involved, and told about the engraved

bricks that are being sold to help fund the projects.

Roll call was answered with each member naming an area in town that needs improvement.

Marilyn Hale gave the meditation, "A Pattern for the New Year," by Helen Steiner Rice.

It was announced that the project for the month of January was school supplies for the elementary schools, and for February, M.D. Anderson Hospital.

Amity members also approved buying an engraved brick to support the local beautification projects.

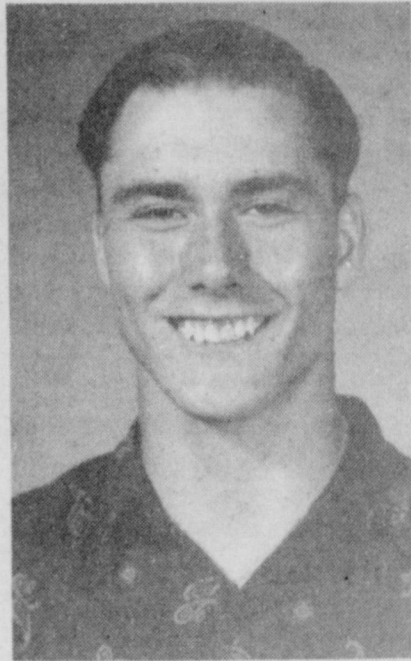
He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Randy Johnson.

"It just wouldn't have done to name it 'High Drug Store,'" he quips.

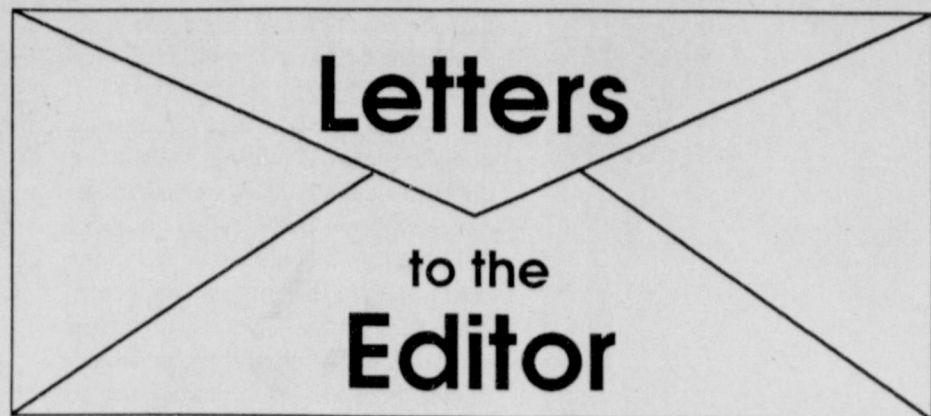
And he also tells of his and Roberta's time attending Southwest

for many other violent offenses have been raised to 20 years.

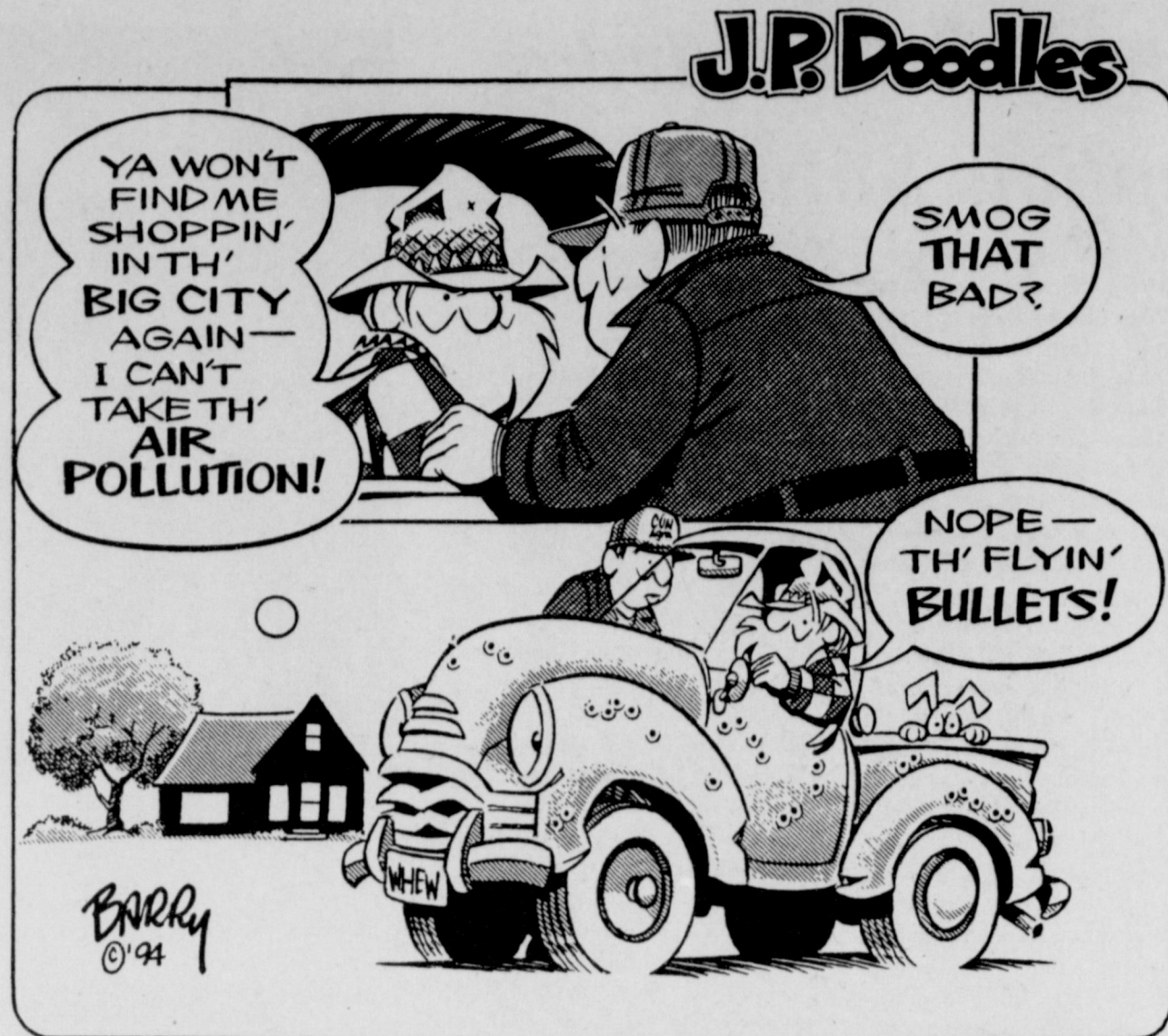

Both the JV and Frosh also won

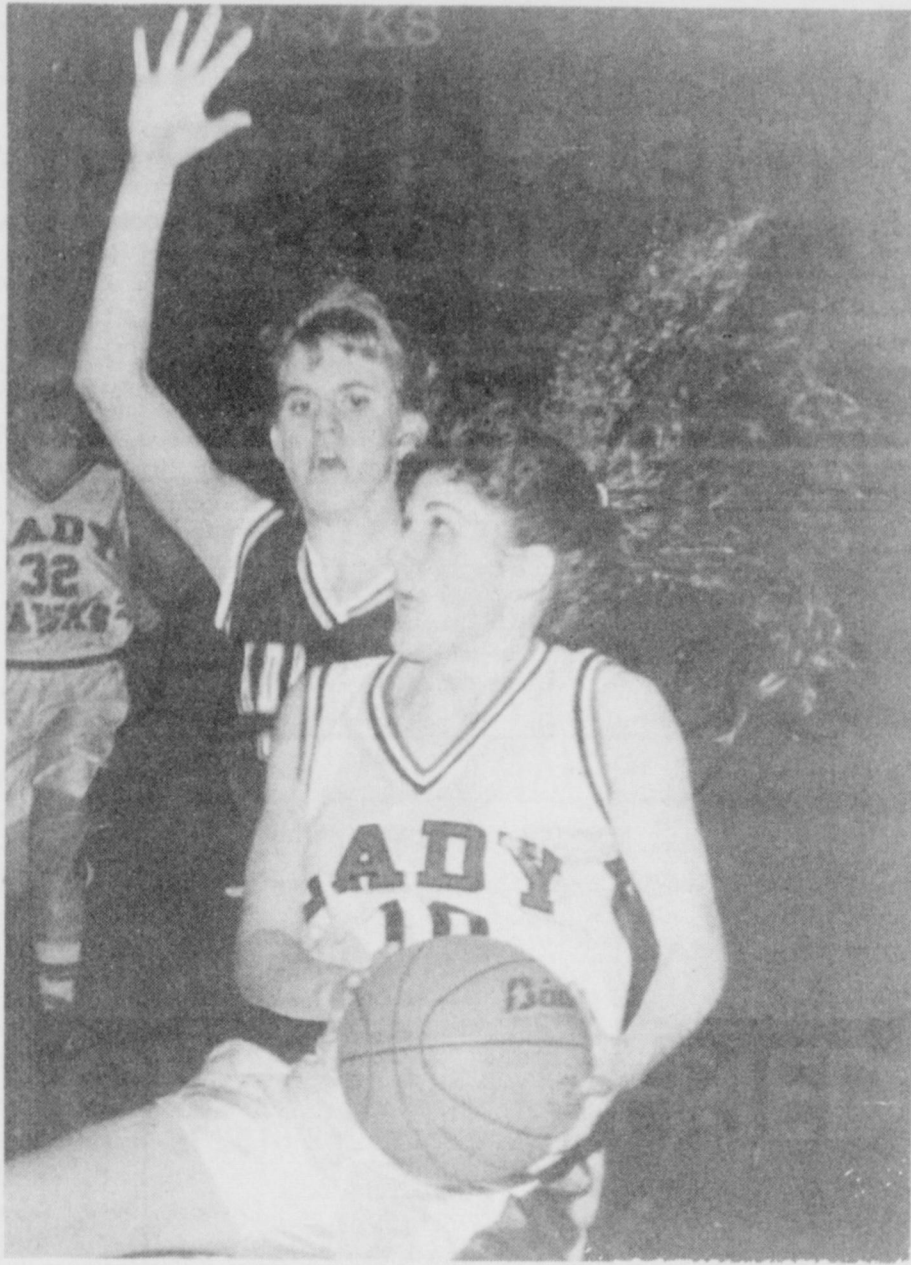

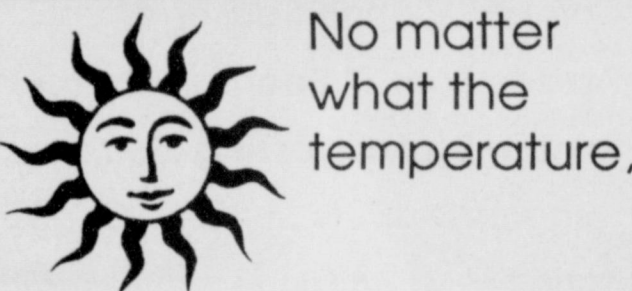

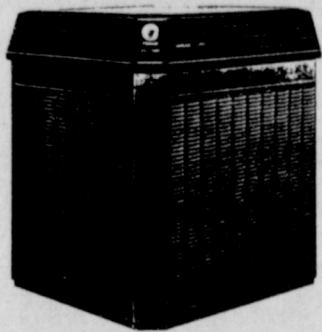
