BAIRD-Several downtown Baird businesses were the victims of vandalism late Saturday night.

"BB's" were shot into the plate glass windows of Hounshell T.V., Eugene Kitchens' carpenter shop, Boydston's Hardware and the Dorothy Bearden building previously housing the Western Auto Store.

The First National Bank seemed to be the primary target. Nine BBs struck

one of the bank's double front doors. Of these nine, only seven actually cracked the glass of the door as the other two struck the door's handle leaving small dents.

The Callahan County Sheriff's Department and Constable Glen Curtis are investigating the incident.

As of press time, Sheriff Skinner was unavailable for comment due to the jury selection for a murder trial.

BAIRD - The Callahan County Library and Pioneer Museum, sponsored by the Baird Wednesday Club and located in the basement of the courthouse in Baird, has had a very successful year.

### Tips For Beef Cattle Producers

COUNTY — Beef cattle producers should be paying attention to several management practices this winter that can make them some extra money.

First, pregnancy test all cows that have not calved. By eliminating non-pregnant cows, you can increase your calf crop percentage and reduce your winter feed bill. A 95% calf crop will look a lot better than 80-85% which is the state average.

Second, spray cattle for lice and ticks. Both of these parasites cause loss of blood which can decrease feed efficiency, reduce milk production and weight gain in all classes of livestock. Control sprays are cheap in comparison to feed.

Minerals are also another overlooked item in winter feeding programs. Cattle should have free access to salt and bone meal or other minerals containing high amount of phosphorous.

Last of all, a number of blackleg cases have been

reported in the county recently. Since this is a soil-borne organism, it shows up more in the late winter and early spring because of short grass and close grazing by livestock. A three-way vaccine is generally recommended for this area. Calves vaccinated under three months of age should be revaccinated after they are 90 days old.

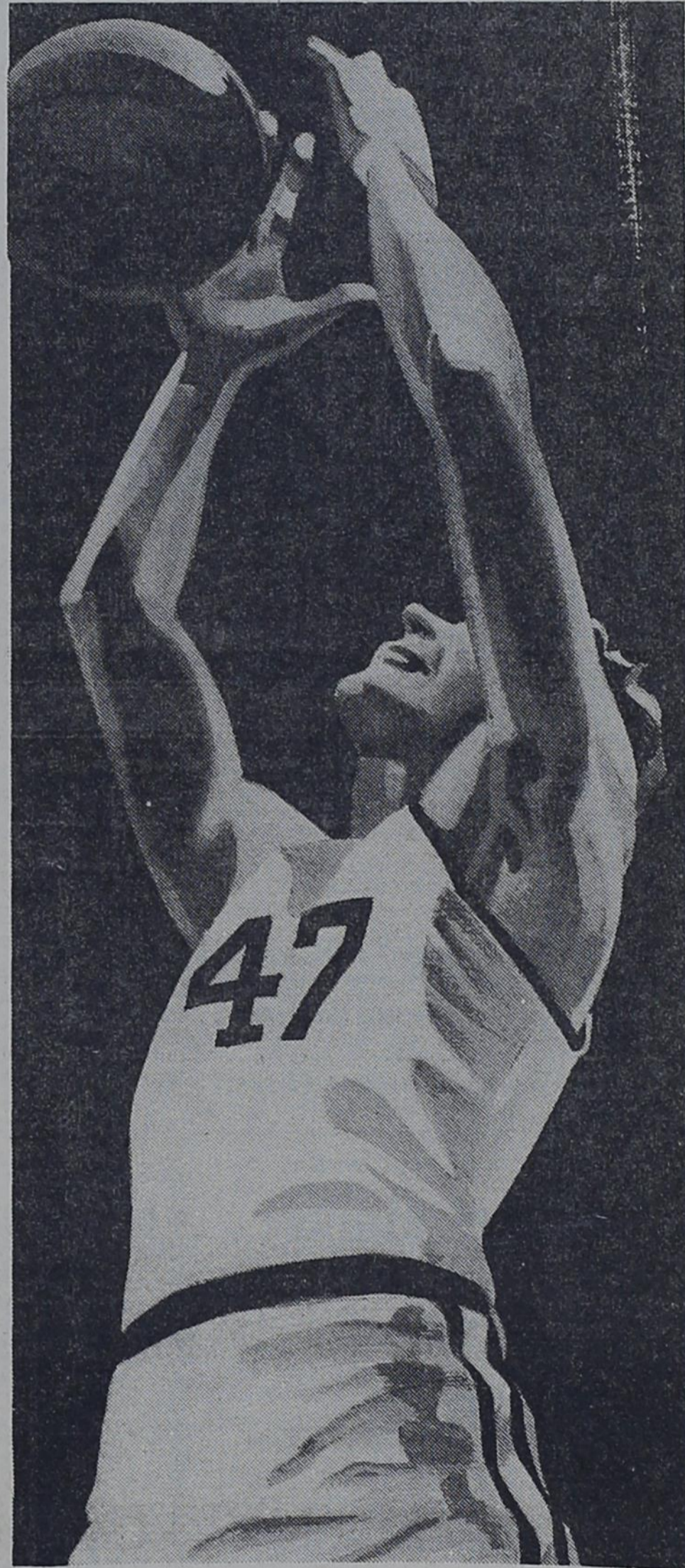

## Annual Report On Co. Cancer Soc.

COUNTY—Bob Landrum of the Callahan County unit announced today that Texans gave the American Cancer Society over five million dollars this past fiscal year. County residents contributed \$2,317 of that amount.

"This money is one indication of the emphasis now being placed on cancer control. New programs are continuously emerging to help save over half the lives we are now losing needlessly from cancer," Landrum said.

According to the 1976 Annual Report of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division, now available to the public, the Cancer Society has four main program areas: Professional Education, Public Education, Service/Rehabilitation and Research.

Professional Education provides up-to-date information on cancer diagnosis and treatment to the medical and allied health professions. The past fiscal year, these programs reached over 67,629 physicians, dentists and nurses. Also, 16 clinics and 19 conferences were supported by the American Cancer Society of Texas.

Public Education helps save lives by increasing public awareness and knowledge about cancer, prompting early diagnosis and treatment of the disease. This year over 73,000 programs were presented to an audience of 2,442,696 people. Programs included ACS educational

films, physicians and lay speakers, and also thousands of exhibits and millions of educational pamphlets. Over one half million Texans participated in one or more of the Society's new "Action" Education Programs. These programs offer the public an opportunity to take direct action against cancer through cancer screening such as the pap test, proctoscopic, oral and breast examinations. Other Action Programs include Stop Smoking Programs, and Breast Self-Examination demonstrations. Mrs. Archie Nichols is the education chairman for Callahan County.

The Service/Rehabilitation program seeks to save lives, to ease the pains and lighten the many burdens the disease places on its victims and their families. This year, the total number receiving ACS Service in Texas was 29,890. Louise Mercer of Clyde is the service chairman of the Callahan County Unit of the ACS.

Research is a crucial phase of the ACS activity which enhances the possibility of finding those answers that will be useful to humanity for control of cancer.

The month of April is crusade month for the Callahan County unit. Throughout this month, volunteers will be collecting for the cancer society. The actual crusade day will be April 5. This year's crusade chairman is Jim Hatchett, Jr.
