Trustees facing budget with less state funding

With the knowledge that they are facing a year in which considerably less money from state can be expected, Iowa Park school trustees got their first look at the proposed 1993-94 budget.

Supt. Glen Mitchell told the board he has been informed by the state education agency that Iowa Park would receive \$351,000 less in state funds than it did last year.

"We're going to get about \$2001 per student," Mitchell told the board. He added that this year's funding is absolute, and no "proration" formula would be used, he has been told.

During Tuesday's work session, principals Richard Davis and Randy Lovelady explained their budget requests, as did Robert Palmer for the transportation department and Allan

Shewmake for the tax office.

The next meeting, expected in some two weeks, both elementary principals will make their presentations, and requests for maintenance will be detailed.

Using a formula of a \$1.12 tax rate for the purpose of organizing a tentative budget, revenues of \$7,813.761 were presented and estimated expenditures were \$7,808,526.

The district expects to have \$800,000 carried over from this year's budget, the superintendent told the board. However, \$100,000 of that is earmarked for the construction of a special education facility at the high

The 1992-93 budget for Iowa Park was \$7,374,109.

Significant in the proposed budget, compared with the outgoing year's, is the fact that total salaries would be reduced from 71.63 percent of the total budget to 69.76.

Reductions also were figured in the areas of contracted services, supplies and materials, capital outlay and other uses," while minor increases were requested in debt service and "other operating expenses."

Board chairman Keith Fisher, after hearing that the district had made no gain in its carryover fund, which is necessary to meet payroll and other first-of-the-year expenses before state and local monies are received, told the board he was "concerned we are losing ground again."

In his written introduction to the proposed budget, Supt. Mitchell stated, "The preliminary budget is being presented to you just as the administrators presented their budgets to me. An eight cent tax increase will be necessary to fund the preliminary budget. The revenue is based on preliminary figures the Wichita Appraisal District. The budget does not include any of the additional personnel that were asked for in the campus plans."

FIRST OF MANY new homes are under construction on Johnson Road, where one home is already occupied and four others are in various stages of completion. At least three developers have indicated they plan to build more than 150 other new homes in Iowa Park during the coming months, to meet the demand of people moving into the area.

Parker Square branch slates grand opening

The Iowa Park branch of Parker Square Bank opened its doors Monday for business, but will observe its grand opening Saturday.

The facility now occupies the former office of TU Electric, and has been completely renovated, inside and outside.

Directors of the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce will participate in a ribbon-cutting ceremony with bank officials at 12-noon.

Activities will continue until 4 p.m., including food and refreshments which will be served under a tent, tours of the building, hourly prize giveaways, the bank's "treasure chest" where "scooping up coins" will be available, music by the T-Bone Road Band, and a live radio remote broadcast.

The east-bound lane of West Park will be closed in the 200 block, to make room for the tent and activities.

Workers were still putting on the finishing touches inside and outside the building when the branch office opened Monday.

However, Iowa Park native Douglas James, a Senior Vice President of Parker Square Bank who will serve as the branch's manager, said Monday he expects all work to be completed in time for the grand opening.

The facility was originally to have been opened March 31.

The building had been constructed for and occupied by TU Electric since

Because all the information they wanted was still not available when the city council took up the issue of solid waste disposal, the future of Iowa Park's landfill will not be decided until at least next week.

The council had called for bids from private disposal firms, to find the cost of providing either a landfill for city's trash collection, or both collection and disposal.

Two firms, Bell Group and Texas Waste Management, had submitted bids. But those bids were different, as Administrator Mike Price found when the sealed documents were opened.

Bell had submitted its bid, based on future anticipated prices it will be charged by the City of Wichita Falls, where it plans to dump. The prices reflected costs the corporation anticipates, when Wichita Falls increases its rates to meet federal mandates for

Texas Waste Management's bids were on current prices, which do not reflect prices which be charged once the government's "Subtitle D" mandates go into effect on Oct. 9.

Information on a possible joining of three cities, Iowa Park, Burkburnett and Vernon, all using a landfill at Burkburnett was not available.

In fact, Mayor Wayne House said Burkburnett Manager Gary Bean had told him he didn't want other cities using that landfill. Bean had explained that the Burk

pit was rapidly filling with shingles, following a major hail storm that struck that city about a month ago. Mayor House said Bell represen-

tatives had expressed considerable interest in assuming Iowa Park's landfill site, especially since adjoining land owners had indicated they would sell that property so the site could be used several years in the future.

House said if the landfill were assumed by Bell, the city could likely survive several years without raising its trash collection rates to local cusAnother possible alternative was

sought by Alderman Johnny Crawford. Expressing fear of the city getting completely out of the garbage collection activity, thus becoming at the mercy of a private operator, he wants an option explored that would have the city continue collections and then hauling it to the Wichita Falls landfill.

Crawford said he had spoken with Wichita Falls Mayor Michael Lam about that prospect, and when he asked what the cost might be, was told the price would not be known until the end

In the bidding by the private firms for trash collecting, prices were asked for once-a-week pickup, twice weekly, of residences, and variations for pickups at commercial operations.

Bids also were asked, should the same size trash containers now in use be continued, and then on various size roll-out containers for residences.

Keith Hooks, sales manager for Texas Waste Management, answered numerous questions posed by aldermen, and said his firm's bids would be honored, whether the waste were trucked to the Wichita Falls landfill, or the firm's own facility at Sherman.

Aldermen decided to wait until Monday's meeting before making a final decision, both to have time to weigh the options and also in hopes of obtaining additional figures on which to base their decision.

The city had planned to close out its landfill operation prior to Oct. 8, having originally set Aug. 1 as the cutoff date any trash could be taken there.

However, that closing date could possibly be extended, according to some informal information voiced during the meeting. It was said cities that needed more time to close out their existing landfills might be given until the following April.

Price said he would attempt to get something in writing from Austin on what the closing date must be.

The council had originally been told the landfill must be closed by Oct. 8, or be faced with complying with the mandates of Subtitle D, which would cost the city several thousands of dollars both initially and in the future.

In other business, the council authorized Price to advertise for bids to purchase materials and construct a facility to be used as a used-oil reclaiming center. Most of the cost, estimated at less than \$5,000, will be funded by the state.

May sales tax down slightly

Sales tax collections in Iowa Park slipped somewhat during May, and as a result the city's percentage of gain over the previous year fell below two other cities in the county for the first time in about two years.

Burkburnett and Electra reported whopping gains for May, as compared to the same month in 1992. Burkburnett had an 18.45-percent increase and Electra a whopping 78.51-percent.

Iowa Park, according to the state comptroller's office, received only 2.14-percent more in sales taxes in May than it did the previous year: \$14,506.34 as compared to \$14,202.54.

Burk's report lifted that city to an increase of 8.03 percent for the year, as compared to 6.65 for Iowa Park. But it didn't dig Electra out of the minus hole, as that city is 0.03-percent below its total for this time in 1992.

Methodists welcome new minister

That lives and careers often change from the goals set by individuals during their maturing years is typified by Rev. Derrel Glen Blackmon.

Rev. Blackmon and his family arrived in Iowa Park in June for him to take over duties as pastor in charge at First United Methodist Church, by appointment of the Northwest Texas Conference of Methodist Churches.

The Texas "born and bred" pastor saw the first light of day in Dallas. He spent most of his growing up years in the piney woods of deep East Texas and was raised in the Baptist Church.

During the time he was a student at East Texas State and at SMU he worked as a student pastor. His last three monhts at SMU he did circuit preaching, serving three churches at the same time by staggering worship schedules. His last circuit preaching was in 1989.

Iowa Park is Rev. Blackmon's second church to be pastor in charge.

He moved here from Greenville where he had been pastor of Westview United Methodist Church. He also had served as associate pastor at Wesley United Methodist Church.

He has had some training in Crisis Counseling, and hopes to be able to go back to college and get his Doctorate in that field. He also has had some training in marriage counseling, but his goal is for pastoral counseling.

The pastor says his family is now comfortably settled in," and we love it here."

With his ready smile, he said "In fact we have agreed we think that Iowa Park is just a really nice place to call home. We love the area and the community."

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was written by Walter E. Williams, who teaches economics at George Mason Univ. in Fairfax, Va. The column is distributed by Creators Syndicate.)

Let's face it. Tobacco smoke odor is offensive to some people. It causes allergic reactions and bronchial discomfort to others. But we all should take note of the issues surrounding the recently announced tobacco industry lawsuit against the Environmental Protection Agency. The critical issue it raises is whether we should allow zealots to rig data and misuse science in their efforts to command and control

When the EPA classified environmental tobacco smoke as a group A carcinogen, putting it in the category with benzene and asbestos, its actions were based on statistical methodology that would earn an F for a sophomore statistics student, if not expulsion for intellectual dishonesty.

Twenty-four of the 30 studies that the EPA reviewed reported no statistically significant environmental tobacco smoke-lung cancer relationship. Of the 11 studies done by U.S. scientists, not one reported significant cancer risk. The EPA was aware of and ignored the findings of the two largest and most recent studies on environmental tobacco smoke-lung cancer (Stockwell, 1992; Brownson, 1992, sponsored by the National Cancer Institute). Both studies report no increased lung cancer risk with exposure to environmental tobacco smoke, as did 80 percent of the studies EPA had in its possession.

Biased and sloppy analysis like that would earn EPA officials an F, but here's what would lead to expulsion. All scientists require minimally what is statistically known as a "95 percent level of confidence" before they report a causal connection between two vari-

ables. In other words, they will accept a maximum level of 5 percent that the connection was by chance. In most cases, scientists want to make it tighter than that -- a 99 or 98 percent level of confidence. But guess what the EPA did when it combined several environmental tobacco smoke-lung cancer studies. Unbeknownst and unreported to the public, it lowered the confidence interval to 90 percent! Had it stuck to the minimally acceptable practice of 95 percent, assignment of environmental tobacco smoke as a group A carcinogen would have been impossible. This is gross dishonesty, and all EPA bureaucrats involved should be summarily fired.

Let's say you hate the odor of tobacco smoke and smokers. That's OK. But the critical issue is whether you think it's good for our nation to allow government officials to deliberately misuse science. And when have you known liars to be satisfied with just one lie? The next lie could be about something you value that might be banned or restricted as a result.

You say, "But, Williams, tobacco smoke is offensive to me, and something needs to be done." I agree, and that's the benefit of private property. In your house, a person doesn't have the right to smoke without your permission. If you own a restaurant, bar or office, it's the same thing. If I don't like your policy, I don't enter. It works the other way too. If a person owns a restaurant, bar or office and he permits smoking, you have the right to say you won't eat, drink or work at his facility. As of late, Americans have abandoned this conflict-reducing role of private property in favor of government intimidation, threat and violence. That's fine except when you consider that you may not always be on the side of the dominant coalition, and it will be you who is victimized by official lies, threats and intimidation.

GARDEN HINTS Saving water

By MARK TERNING County Agent - Horticulture

High winds coupled with blistering heat can result in high water bills and drought-stressed plants.

Some very simple, easy-to-follow techniques can take the heat out of your monthly water bill while keeping your lawn and landscape in the green. When to water

* Turf and landscape areas should be watered in the morning when evaporative water loss is minimal. The next best time is the evening, however, plants and turf areas which stay wet over night can develop disease problems occasionally.

* Avoid watering in the heat of the afternoon when evaporation rates are high.

How to water

* Use soaker hoses or drip-irrigation in landscape beds and gardens. These devices apply water at the root zone of your plants with very little evaporative water loss.

* Cover bed areas and garden soils with a mulch material (straw, cypress mulch, bark chips etc.). A good mulch greatly reduces moisture evaporation and serves as an attractive ground cover.

* In lawns, use a sprinkler which emits large droplets of water at a fairly low angle to the ground. Avoid using sprinklers which spray a fine mist high

* Lawns will require about one inch of water every five to six days during the driest periods of summer. This deep yet infrequent watering develops stronger and deeper root sys-

* Most hose end sprinklers will put out 1/4 to 1/3 inch of water per hour, so they would need to run about four hours in one turf area.

Avoid water run-off by watering in one-hour sessions which allows for water penetration into soil.

* Established trees, shrubs, and groundcovers will benefit from a thorough watering every two weeks. Normal lawn watering is not a substitute for thorough three and shrub watering.

* Water at the dripline of trees and shrubs where the feeder roots are located. Simply lay a slow-running hose on the ground and move it around the dripline as each area becomes saturated to a depth of 8 to 10 inches.

The council also approved a request from Parker Square Bank to close the east-bound lane of the 200 block of West Park on Saturday, when that new business holds its grand opening.



nows and nightcrawlers. Stocking hatchery-reared fish has been a useful tool for fisheries managers since the late 1800s. However, stocking is not the answer to all fisheries management problems.

TPWD biologists stock fish in Texas to accomplish a variety of objectives. As mentioned earlier, fish are stocked in some situations to enhance the genetic characteristics of existing populations, to establish new species of sportfish, and to supplement existing populations when natural reproduction is limited.

Stocking is also used in new or renovated reservoirs to establish strong initial year classes of desirable species. Catchable size fish (primarily trout) are stocked to provide additional angling opportunities in heavily-fished

areas or at times when fishing is typically slow for other species.

Hatchery-reared fish are also used to restore populations that have been reduced or eliminated by a natural or man-made catastrophe, and to increase catch or harvest rates by increasing populations.

The primary goal of most stocking efforts in Texas is to establish selfsustained fish populations that will provide quality fishing opportunities to anglers.

There are currently no lake records established for largemouth bass at Buffalo Creek or Diversion, and there is no walleye record established for Diversion.

The Inland Fisheries office at 409 Chester in Wichita Falls would like to establish records for these lakes. If anyone catches a fish they would like to have certified, they should being it by the office or give us a call at 766-
