S.L. McElroy was born in Sabine County in 1905 and attended Houston Business College. After living in sealsby, he located in Ovalo and opened a dry goods store. He married Eveylyn Beatrice Moore April 1, 1928.

McElroy moved his dry goods business "lock, stock & barrel" to Baird in 1928. Now after 49 continual years of business, he operates the oldest business in town.

McElroy was one of the founders of the Callahan County Club, which later became the Baird Chamber of Commerce. He was a major force in building Baird Lake and making arrangements for the construction of the Callahan County hospital and the train overpass bridge outside of town. He served on the Baird City council for 12 years and is a charter member of the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse, Shady Oaks Recreation Center & the Baird Booster Club.

Glenda Ivy and Nicki Harle researched the lifes of these two men. In presenting the awards Mrs. Harle said when she asked Mrs. McElroy about her husband's accomplishments, Mrs. McElroy replied, "Honey, he helped build the town!"

Ben L. Russell, Jr. was born in Baird in the present Dick Vestal home 79 years ago and has lived here all his life.

He graduated from Baird High School in 1916 and married Loula Mae Boydstun two years later.

For approximately 50 years, he and his wife have co-owned and operated Boydstun's Hardware.

Russell, an active member of the Chamber of Commerce, served as secretary of the Baird Independent School Board

Mr. Sammy Helmers, Area Horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Stephenville, will be guest speaker for the program.


Topics to be covered during the meeting include fertilization of pecan trees, insect and disease control and general management of pecan trees.



Protection Tips for Pecan Crop

COUNTY - Now is the time to protect your 1977 pecan crop from two major pests, reminds Greg Gerngross, County Agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The obscure scale and the pecan phylloxera are wintering in their favorite pecan trees and are most vulnerable at this stage. For the most efficient results, apply dormant oil in late winter or early spring just before buds begin to break.

Dormant oil is the most effective material for controlling the two pecan pests. However, the oil does not work well under freezing temperatures and should be applied when temperatures range from 40 to 70 degrees F.

Only the tree trunk needs to be sprayed in the case of large phylloxera numbers. However. the whole trees should be covered with dormant oil to control the obscure

Prepare the oil spray he mixing one-with nint of oil per gallon of water. For large volumes, mix wo and one half pints of oil in 100 gallons of water.

Agriculture Day Held March 21

AUSTIN-March 21 was Agriculture Day in Texas, and Callahan County farmers and rancers can be proud of the 12,166,000 contribution they make to the economy of their area and the state, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

That figure is the amount of cash receipts and government payments in 1975 the most recent figures published by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

"Though 1977 may prove to be one of lower profits

for agriculture, cash receipts during this year should be substantial", White stated.

"Production costs have doubled for many regions in the state in the past two years, but several commodities have been able to stay even with these costs."

State totals for 1975 were \$5.9 billion with livestock bringing in 3,-060,908,000 and crops \$2,-785,683,000. Total cash receipts for 1976 are estimated to be more than 6 billion.

Livestock and products in Callahan County were valued in 1975 at *8,878,-000. Crops totaled *3,182,-



As best I can count, Jesus used the word "Father" 70 times. It was as if He was trying to lodge the heavenly word deep in the heart of the world.





Industry spokesman called the recommendation to the board a "joke."

The staff recommendation for homeowners coverage, purchased by most Texans who are paying for homes, was a 6.6 per cent increase. In this category, the industry wanted eight per cent more.

"The real world tells you that you at least have to keep pace with inflation and other trends." said Tom B. Lee, general manager of the Texas Insurance Advisory Association.

Lee claimed insurance will be harder to get if rates are not raised sufficiently because companies couldn't sell coverage at a loss.

Board statisticians recommended a 1.1 per cent average fire insurance reduction for all lines, but a 1.4 per cent increase for fire insurance on homes. The industry wants 2.5 per cent more overall, with a 5.6 per cent increase for residences.

Rates vary by territory. The board staff proposed 5.4 per cent more in the Seacoast territory, 9.3 per cent in the Central Inland territory and 2.4 per cent in Meets March 8 the North-Northwest.

Staff members proposed an average statewide reduction of 5.2 per cent in extended coverage, providing coverage for storm and exposion damage. The industry asked 6.6 per cent.
