Veteran of three wars enjoying his retirement

"I guess you could use the old cliche and say I'm a 'jack-of-alltrades", retired Chief Master Sargeant William C. "Bill" Lane laughingly commented as we concluded our in-

That could be descriptive of his varied experiences.

Growing up in South Carolina, he dropped out of high school before graduation. However, he received some valuable training in woodworking that he is using to good advantage now that he is twice retired. He took what was then called manual training.

"I've always liked to do things with my hands, I want to keep them busy, and I've always liked to stand and watch other people as they work until I feel like I can do what they are doing," Lane said.

Lane's parents were weavers and he would go where they were working and watch them. He learned how to weave by watching, and was offered a set of looms by the owner.

He thought about taking a job as a weaver, but he had second thoughts and declined the offer. "I had seen my parents live from paycheck to paycheck for too long and that was not what I wanted from life." Neither did he want to work in the cotton fields or at a cotton mill and that was about the only kind of work available in that area.

That helped him make the decision to join the Navy. "I wanted to be a gunner's mate and shoot the big guns," he said.

In 1938 when he decided that was what he would do there were more than 200 on the waiting list, so he just walked across the street and joined the Army Coast Artillery.

"I did a tour in Panama, so I got a chance to shoot the big guns anyway," he said proudly.

From 1938 to 1940, he served with D Battery, 4th Coast Artillery, which is part of the First Continental Army that served under George Washington.

He explained there were 37 streamers in their regimental colors. Each streamer was a different color and signified their participation in a

battle prior to World War II.

During basic training and before he could be turned to duty, Lane had to learn which battle each color of ribbon represented, the date of the battle and the reason the Artillery became

After two years in the Artillery, Lane enlisted in the Army Air Corp. He was sent to Chanute Field where he took aircraft mechanic training. When he graduated he was sent to Macon, Ga., where RAF pilots were

Dec. 7, 1941, Lane and his girlfriend were watching a movie when word came for all military personnel

to return to their base immediately. The Japanese had bombed Pearl Har-

In the bedlam that followed, the young and venturesome Lane volunteered for glider pilot training. He took part of his training at Sheppard Air Force Base, graduating at Lubbock in February 1944. He took additional training at Louisville, Ky., and in North Carolina and was sent to Bergstrom AFB at Austin as a glider pilot instructor.

Lane was sent to New York in August 1944 where he joined an

Council postpones action on city's landfill . . again

Despite comments about continued delays in reaching a decision on how trash will be collected and disposed of in the future, the city council Monday night once again postponed action on the future of the city's sanitary landfill.

In other business, aldermen approved changing the time period in which school zone traffic speeds will be enforced, heard a detailed explaination of the fire department's capital outlay requests, and accepted bids for construction of a used-oil reclaiming center.

In its last meeting, the council was presented seven options, along with cost projections, on how to dispose of garbage once the city's landfill is closed. The facility's closure is eminent, because of costs mandated by federal and state requirements.

Two of the alternatives were bids received from two private companies that offered to dispose of trash, either collected by the city or the firms doing the collecting.

Another option is joining with the cities of Burkburnett and Vernon by investing in a joint landfill venture on Burkburnett-owned property.

The point which appears to be holding up a decision is the possibility of turning over the current landfill property to the Bell Group, and in return, paying little or nothing over a period of years to take city garbage. That, apparently, would be the least expensive route the city might take.

Bell, the council was told, is currently negotiating with adjoining property owners, in an attempt to aquire additional acreage which would insure the firm of some 50 years where it could operate in the landfill business.

The firm, when its bid was submitted, did not give a period in which the offer would stand.

do something." The issue of the landfill's future has been a topic of discussion more than two years.

Subtitle D, the regulation handed down by the Environmental Protection Agency to be administered by the Texas Water Commission, could increase the city's cost to collect and dispose of trash from the current price of less than \$8 per ton to approximately \$112, according to the city engineer's estimates.

The regulation originally was to go into effect Oct. 9, but the state agency has indicated it would allow landfills an additional six months to be closed. And some rumors indicate the date could possibly be extended until October of 1995.

The ordinance governing traffic speed in all school zones -- 20 miles per hour -- was amended to cover the hours of 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. on school days.

Previously, the control speed hours were 7:45 a.m. to 8:45 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. to 4:15 p.m.

Fire Chief Danny Skinner explained his department's capital outlay request on a line-for-line basis.

While final decision of funding will not be made until the council completes its study of all department requests, Skinner was asked to withdraw his request for a "burn building" training center, which would cost approximately \$6,000, until another year.

Hamilton suggested representatives of the city obtain a five or ten year activities report from the fire department, and take that information before the county commissioners' court to argue for more county funding.

Each of the seven volunteer fire departments in the county receives \$14,400 from the county to fight rural fires.

However, Hamilton's point was the fact that more than 50 percent of the fires fought by the Iowa Park department are outside the city limits. He indicated city taxes were supplementing what should be county expense.

Skinner agreed that 65 percent of the fire calls in 1992 were outside the city limits.

Hamilton said the county should collect a special fire district tax from

Iowa Park school costs less than state averages

Despite a 1.2% drop in property taxes, school trustees raised tax rates to produce 9.5% more revenue last year. School budgets were increased \$1.5 billion last fall for a total of \$18.7 billion. The total budget averaged \$5,284 per student.

Classroom teachers received one dollar in four of the additional spending. Schools added 17,007 employees -- an average of one new

employee for each 4.8 additional students. The figures come from the latest issue of Bench Marks 1992-93 School District Budgets in Texas, an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in govern-

mental research. An average of \$4,255 per student for current operations was budgeted last year plus \$337 for repayment of debt and \$602 for capital

(In the following report, whenever Iowa Park's figures are used, similar figures will be given for the other four school districts in Wichita County, for comparison purposes. The names will be abbreviated: B for Burkburnett; E for Electra; W for Wichita Falls, and C for City View.)

Iowa Park CISD's budget provided \$3,317.96 (B, \$3,820.21; E, \$4,522.03; W, \$3,941.35; C, \$3,917.05) per student for current operations, \$125.99 (B, \$325.97; E, \$307.43; W, \$229.58; C, \$118.05) for debt service, and \$125.33 (B, \$105.65; E, \$121.37; W, \$153.64; C, \$1,279.50) for capital outlay based on 2,032 (B, 3,337; E, 675; W, 15,587; C, 757) students enrolled in October 1992.

The average base salary for classroom teachers paid by Iowa Park schools in October 1992 was \$26,429 (B, \$25,906; E, \$25,614; W, \$27,501; C, \$24,839) plus supplements for the career ladder. The average for administrators was \$41,630 (B, \$42,679; E, \$42,360; W, \$48,806; C, \$40,108), and \$30,670 (B, \$29,459; E, \$30,938; W, \$36,480; C, \$33,520) for other profes-

sional support employees (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.). Four dollars in each five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll

expense averaged \$3,439 per student, as compared to Iowa Park's \$2,595.75 (B, \$3,052.24; E, \$3,315.29; W, \$3,081.96; C, \$2,613.80). Payroll expense is determined by salary levels and staffing patterns.

Taxpayers provided one teacher for 17.4 (B, 15.4; E, 13.5; W, 15.8; C, 16.8) students in Iowa Park while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 16.1 to one.

School districts and county education districts imposed a property tax at the rate of \$1.405 per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 98.6% of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was \$1.385 (\$1.405 times 98.6%) statewide. Locally, the Iowa Park district imposed a rate of \$1.117 (B, \$1.220; E, \$1.220; W, \$1.239; C, \$1.200) including \$.847 (same of all other districts) by the county education district. Property was appraised at 101.1% (B, 101.0%; E, 106.8%; W, 100.8%; C, 100.6%) of its market value making the true rate \$1.129 (B, \$1.232; E, \$1.303; W, \$1.249; C, \$1,207) per \$100 of market value. The report points out that the calculation of a true tax rate based on market value rather than on appraised value is necessary to make a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools.

The tax on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in Iowa Park's district would have been \$893 (B, \$990; E, \$1,030; W, \$973; C, \$958). If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$837 (B, \$929; E, \$969; W, \$911; C, \$898). That compares with statewide average tax bills of \$1,078 and \$854 respectively for an \$80,000 house.

Last year Iowa Park's revenue from the property tax increased by 10.8 percent (B, 5.4%; E, -2.2%; W, 6.3%; C, 9.1%) for 1992-93 as compared to a 9.5 percent increase statewide.

Local property taxes plus state aid totaled \$3,335 (B, \$3,528; E, \$4,264; W, \$3,965; C, \$4,189) per student in Iowa Park as compared to

The state and local share of the foundation program averaged \$3,144 per student last year and was \$2,872 in Iowa Park's district (B, \$2,800; E, \$3,380; W, \$3,062; C, \$3,377). Local school districts can levy property taxes to enrich the foundation program. Enrichment last year averaged \$822 per pupil to which the state added an average of \$433 per student to guarantee the tax yield in property-poor districts. Enrichment by the Iowa Park district was \$335 (B, \$747; E, \$540; W, \$523; C, \$381); the state guarantee added \$300 to Iowa Park's (B, \$422; E, \$540; W, \$535; C, \$589).

For the coming school year, the local share is increased from the 82cent rate by county education districts to an 86-cent rate levied by school districts. The percentage homestead exemption and freeport goods exemptions voted for CEDs will terminate. The legislature increased state aid an average of \$3,990 for each additional student as compared to an average of \$1,825 for all students last year.

outfit headed for England and combat in Holland.

At age 25, Lane became flight officer with the 81st Squadron of the 436th Troop Carrier Group. He piloted a Waco CG4A glider with 13 glider infantrymen and cargo aboard.

Now, for those who might not know, Lane explains that gliders were used to silently fly assault teams and supplies behind enemy lines. They could carry a combination of cargo--15 land assault troops, or a jeep and a trailer, a 75-mm howitzer, a hospital team, or even a small bulldozer.

Gliders had wings, but no motor and no firepower. They were expendable aircraft. "I guess they considered the pilots expendable also," Lane commented.

On leaving England, Lane became one of about 1,900 U.S. glider pilots being towed into Holland by C-47s. The mission was to support an attempt to clear a road to Berlin and end hostilities.

With no engine and 350 feet of nylon rope to keep him from falling into Nazi territory, Lane's tow plane was hit by flak fire. The plane went down, but released Lane's glider at 1,200 feet.

His glider plowed through fences and irrigation ditches, skidding to a stop in "friendly territory".

Lane and several hundred other American and British glider pilots had advanced from Memburg, England to a captured German fighter base in France.

From this point March 24, 1945, they advanced on their next and final European glider mission, coded Operation Varsity, an aerial invasion of Germany at Wesel, across the Rhine

Lane was gliding in a double tow and was on the inside. He cut the tow rope first so the other tow rope would not get wrapped around him.

The British had laid a smoke screen and Lane said it was like driving in dense fog. Just as he cut loose there were electrical lines in front of him. Not having enough air speed, he told his co-pilot to "hit the dragchute." As he did, Lane pulled up and dropped right below the lines.

of what happened after that. "Just then a 20mm hit us in the nose and took everything out. I looked over at my co-pilot and blood was running down his face. Then before we landed, I was feeling a stinging sensation in my right foot. But, that was the least my worries right then," Lane said.

Every time something moved he would shoot at it.

Luckily, another glider landed next to Lane's. "The guys got out and one said he was a grenadier and asked if we had any grenades. I crawled back into the glider to get a couple and he said, 'one will do'," Lane said.

He added, "It did. He aimed the thing and you could see it tumble right through the air and into the side window where the German was. The whole side of the house disappeared. I don't think I've ever been so happy.'

When things settled enough Lane removed his boot to see about couldn't get his boot back on.

In addition to the European theater, Lane also served as an aircraft mechanic in Japan following the war, then in Korea, and in 1966 he went to Vietnam as squadron maintainance superintendent.

CMSgt. Lane retired the first time in 1971 after 30 years in the military, 20 of those years in the Air Force During those years he spent intervals at SAFB and in Iowa Park.

He said his mother taught him to cook, quilt and can.

Lane has a son, William E. Lane of Iowa Park and a daughter, Barbara Lane of Marshall, Ark., and two grandchildren.


In addition to the couple being active in Faith Baptist Church, Lane is a licensed member of the Disabled Veterans, a member of Iowa Park Masonic Lodge No. 713. He received the Golden Trowel Award for exceptional service to the order. He is serving this year as Worthy Patron of the Order of Eastern Star.

Lane is president of the Wichita Valley Scottish Rite Club. He is a member of Fort Worth Scottish Rite, the Maskat Shrine in Wichita Falls and works with and is a member of the Speakers Bureau of the Scottish Rite Hospital for Crippled Children.

He is official photographer for the National World War II Glider Pilots Association. In March of this year he was host for the Association convention attended by more than 100 members from Arizona, Colorado, New Mexico, Texas and Utah to commemorate the 48th Anniversary of Operation Varsity.

Though he doesn't really need it, Lane's right foot is a daily reminder of the last glider mission of World War II that became the fatal blow to the Axis forces on the Rhine River.

In addition, he has framed his Purple Heart, along with many commendation medals and ribbons and one of his most prized--the Lanyard. Order of William, the highest award for valor given by the Dutch government. It was for them running the Germans out of Holland.

all properties outside city limits, so city residents would not be paying double taxes for fire protection.

Mayor Wayne House commented, "We're (Iowa Park's department) covering more territory than some of the others (rural departments), and they're getting the same money (from the county)."

The council accepted bids from two of three companies submitting to build the used-oil drop-off center, but rejected the third.

Madden Buildings' bid of \$913 to construct the 10-by-10 foot structure was approved, as was a bid of \$1,105 from Blitz U.S.A. to provide contain-

With the bid for pouring the concrete base being rejected, Administrator Mike Price was authorized to negotiate for that work to be done.

Price had explained the project did not require bids, because its total cost was less than \$15,000, but since

most of the funds were being provided in grant form by the state, he wanted that documentation to show the city did its best to get the lowest prices.

Though the meeting's agenda included setting of a date for the next council workshop in the 1993-94 budget, the mayor said it would be useless until some decision is reached on the landfill's future.

Late summer problems can take toll on lawns

County Agent - Horticulture

Your landscape and lawn require special attention during late July through August.

Pest problems, high temperatures, and disease can take its toll on your favorite plants.

The following garden check list will help you protect your valuable plantings.

Pest Control

Fleacontrol requires a three-prong approach. You must treat your yard areas, pets, and the home for adequate

Yard areas should be treated with Yardex, Dursban, or Diazinon. Treat inside your home with a product that contains an insect growth regulator such as Precor. Vacuum thoroughly before treatment and discard the bag.

Dogs and/or cats should be treated with dips or spray-on products containing an insect growth regulator such as Petcor. Make sure the product you are using is labeled for use on your animal. Pets with serious flea problems should be referred to a veterinarian.

Heavy populations of fleas in the yard or home may require treatment by a pest control operator.

Late July through August are ideal times for grub worm control in lawn areas. If you find more than four grubs per square foot then treatment is justified. Apply Dursban or Diazinon granules for control. Water lawn before and after treatment.

Treat for pecan weevil and hickory shuckworm in mid to late August. Sevin is an appropriate insecticide.

Spider mites in tomato crops can be treated with Kelthane.

Treat peaches and plums for borer control in late August. Use a chlorpyrifos spray.

Disease and Weed Control

Watch out for powdery mildew on crapemyrtle. Regular applications of Funginex will be necessary to reduce this disease.

Treat grassy weeds in bermuda turf with MSMA. Do not use on St. Augustine. Broadleaf weeds can be controlled with a broadleaf weed killer such as Wipe-Out or Weed-B-Gone.

Leaf drop and leaf scorch on trees is not a disease, but the result of high temperatures and moisture stress. Water deeply every two to three weeks.

Plantings

Container nursery stock can be planted at any time of year.

Plant "Surfire" fall tomatoes now for a fall crop.

Plant warm-season grasses from seed, sod, plugs, or hydromulching by early August.

Plant bluebonnet seed or transplants during later August.

Fertilizer

Apply a 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio turf food with slow-release nitrogen to warm season lawns.

Correct iron deficiency (yellow leaves with bright green veins) in plants such as oaks, magnolia and pines with an iron/sulfur product.

Apply 3-1-2 or 4-1-2 ratio lawn foods to established landscape plants and flower beds.

Follow all label rates and directions when using fertilizers, pesticides, or herbicides.

THE JERUSALEM CHURCH ACTS 2:36-47

The individuals described in Acts 2 who would become the church at Jerusalem were a convicted people. They were moved by the gospel message presented by the apostles. The agony of having crucified the Christ cut them to the heart. They were convicted of the sin which lay as a crushing burden upon them. Those individuals were convicted of sin to the point of asking what they must do (vs. 37).

The people gathered at Jerusalem on the Day of Pentecost were a convinced people. They were convinced of the exceeding sinfulness of the wicked acts which they had performed. These people did not seek a second opinion by a preacher who would "stay off their toes" or say, "I don't see anything wrong with it." Neither did they say, "I don't see it that way." These people were convinced of the ungodly hideous nature of sin. Unless one is convinced of the deadliness and shame of sin, one cannot be like the convinced people which characterized the church at Jerusalem.

The church at Jerusalem consisted of converted people They received the Word of God without hesitation or biased attitude. These people repented of the dreadful act they had performed as well as every other sin in their lives. They were convinced they had crucified the Son of God. They would become converted to the very One whom they crucified who had now been made both Lord and Christ (vs. 36). These people believed the facts presented and obeyed the commands that were demanded of them. They repented of their sins AND were baptized for the forgiveness of their past sins. (vs. 38).

Such phrases as gladly received the Word, continued steadfastly, and continuing daily with one accord characterized the church at Jerusalem. These people were a "doing" church. (James 1:22). They practiced what they preached. They were a convicted, convinced, converted and consistent body of believers. Theirs was a daily religion; a vocation instead of an avocation; a life of regeneration instead of generation.

We today should follow the pattern set by the church at Jerusalem as they responded to divine directives from the Lord. The traits that characterized this church should characterize the church today.

Tentative UW allocations told

The United Way of North Texas announced preliminary allocations to its member agencies for the 1993-94 fiscal year.

Budget and Allocations committee chairman David Wolverton said, "Our United Way made another major change in its allocation process this year. Traditionally, all agencies go through the budget review process each year; however, this year we are testing the use of multi-year funding with nine member agencies.

"These agencies were not required to make budget presentations. Basically, their 1992-93 allocation became their base allocation.

"If the 1993 campaign provides more money for distribution to agencies, their allocations will increase proportionately. However, if there is less money for distribution, they will receive less proportionately.

"All other member agencies were reviewed individually and their allocations were recommended based on the program and financial information presented to the Budget and Allocations committee. Since the multi-year funding program is a demonstration, we will be monitoring the process closely before any expansion to other agencies."

Wolverton indicated the 22 community volunteers met with member agencies in finalizing allocations recommendations for the United Way board.

The volunteers took a variety of factors into consideration in making their recommendations, including the

agencies' programs and operations, their financial needs, and their various sources of support.

Reunions are held annually to honor the Americans who served in the Battle of the Bulge and to remember those who sacrificed their lives in this great battle.


