SUMMER UNOFFICIALLY OVER

Classes to start Wednesday

"It sure was a short summer."

That's what almost everyone is saying these days, and they're right.

School officially gets underway at 8 a.m. Wednesday in the Iowa Park Consolidated Independent School District.

Teachers will have only two official days to prepare for their return to their classrooms. Monday is scheduled for inservice, and Tuesday is a work day for all faculty members.

For the second consecutive year, Iowa Park schools are opening somewhat early, in order for students to complete their fall semester before the Christmas holidays. The semester is to end Dec. 17.

But they'll have three holidays during the fall semester, according to the school calendar. They will be Sept. 6, Oct. 25, and Nov. 24-26.

Students will begin the spring semester Jan. 3, and May 27 is slated to be the final day of classes.

The four school campuses are expecting approximately 2,095 pupils

to report for classes Wednesday, according to an anticipation poll of the principals conducted Tuesday by the administration office.

High school principal Richard Davis, who is expecting approximately 600 pupils on his campus this fall, is asking students to report directly to the school auditorium at 8:05 a.m. Wednesday.

At that gathering, students will receive instructions for the day, and then report to their assigned home rooms, where they will be issued class schedules and other information.

SCHOOL BUS SCHEDULES

Robert Palmer, assistant superintendent and bus coordinator, told the school board Tuesday night the district possibly will experience a major increase in pupils riding the buses, as compared with last year.

Basically, Palmer says, bus routes and times are "unchanged from the 1992-93 school year."

Students who have not changed

home addresses or schools will ride the same bus and have the same driver they had last year. Also, they will not be required to get a new bus pass.

New students and students who have changed home addresses or schools must obtain a bus pass.

Passes may be obtained between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. at the administration office, 413 East Cash.

As has been done in the past, all pre-kindergarten through second grade bus students will be tagged with a name tag the first two days of school.

The tag will be put on the student by the teacher and will show the student's name, bus number and home address.

Only those students who live in Iowa Park and cross the expressway, East and West Highway (or old Iowa Park road), or State Highway 368, enroute to school, are eligible to ride the bus across town.

Those students must go to the nearest bus stop for their rides, but must not cross one of the hazardous roads identified to reach the stop.

Bus stop times and locations may be obtained from the administration office by calling 592-4193.

Country buses are basically unchanged, as with the town routes, and those routes and time information also are available at the administration office.

Trustees select Yeager to fill Cook's vacancy

In an effort to complete their work to prepare the 1993-94 budget, as well as considering additional new staff positions, the Iowa Park school board met twice during the past week, on Thursday and again Tuesday.

They selected Dennis Yeager to fill the unexpired term of trustee Robert Cook during Thursday's meeting, and Yeager took his oath of office Tuesday.

Cook had submitted his resignation earlier, because he was moving outside the school district, to Wichita Falls.

Seven new personnel were approved during Thursday's meeting. They included:

Kimberly Mogg for kindergarten; BS from Southwestern Oklahoma State Univ. with one year experience;

Michael Bean for third grade, and formerly a teacher here; BS from Midwestern State Univ. with four years experience;

Meredith Long for junior high math and former teacher here; BS Midwestern State Univ. with 14 years experience;

Joni Woods, junior high language

arts; BS Valdosta State College with eight years experience;

Sandy Potter for physical education aide at Kidwell;

Amber Davis for compensatory aide at Bradford; and

Deanna Swensen for special education aide at the high school.

Additionally, former counselor Colleen Roberts was hired to work 87 days during the next school year as a counselor at the high school.

Janet Bowling was reassigned to work as elementary counselor at Kidwell.

One resignation was received and accepted, submitted by Deirdre Forney, third grade teacher.

An additional teacher was hired during Tuesday's meeting, Brad Lewis, an Iowa Park graduate, was hired as junior high history teacher and coach, providing his special certification is approved. Lewis has yet to complete his required student teaching while a student at Midwestern State Univ.

Trustees continued hearing explanations of budget request by departments at both meetings, primarily that of the transportation department.

Supt. Glen Mitchell asked the board to approve his request to increase the tax rate from \$1.12 to \$1.16 this year, to fund the capital outlay

City accepts paving bid

The city council Monday night accepted a bid to pave four blocks of streets with asphalt, held a public hearing concerning a grant application and recognized three employees of the week.

A bid submitted by Zack Burkett Co. to pave four blocks at \$32.50 per ton was approved. The council had previously rejected a higher bid by another company for the project and re-advertised.

The blocks to be paved include 400 West Park, 100 North First, 600 West Coleman and 100 North Jackson.

Administrator Mike Price said he expects the work to be accomplished next week.

The public hearing is a prelude to application for a grant from the Texas Community Development Program, primarily to fund replacing the original pump station at Lake Buffalo.

Approximately \$130,000 will be expended to replace the pump which supplies raw water from that lake to the city's water treatment plant.

Several other projects were discussed, but the consensus of the council was that the pump was the primary need for funding.

Mayor Wayne House explained that the council had been so busy recently, working on budget and landfill projects, that the regular observations of Employee of the Month had been overlooked.

He then recognized Brandon Greene for May, Mike Brewer for June and Eddie Browning for July. Those recognized get a \$50 bonus check.

No action was taken on the future of the city's sanitary landfill, because the city is waiting on a proposal by the Bell Group to take over the facility.

The company is attempting to purchase additional property in that area which could meet the firm's needs for some 20 years in the future, it was explained.

The city is interested in the proposal, because a major savings in disposing of trash would be experienced,

it was explained.

A key point in the proposal, however, is if the city is relieved of all future responsibility for the area it has used the past several years.

House and Price were in Austin yesterday to confer on that subject with the Texas Water Commission.

The council has postponed taking any action on finalizing next year's budget, until the landfill's future is decided. Mayor House said no final budget can be reached until then.

A decision must be reached on the budget and tax rate by Sept. 20, in order for the tax statements to be prepared and mailed out by the tax collector.

Major street work can affect parking

Residents in various parts of the city will be temporarily inconvenienced beginning next week, as crews begin major street work.

Four blocks will have asphalt surfacing applied, including 100 North First, 400 West Park, 600 West Coleman and 100 North Jackson.

Those blocks have been prepared by city crews, and the paving will be applied by the Zack Burkett Co.

City crews will begin the first of several weeks of slurry work in other residential areas, according to Belvin Lytle, public works director.

Streets scheduled to be worked next week include 100-300 East Aldine, 100-400 West Aldine, 100-400 East Magnolia, 100-500 East Jefferson, 100-300 West Jefferson, 100-400 West Diamond, 100 James Drive and 200 West Garden.

When crews apply slurry on asphalt pavement, intended to seal cracks and repair potholes, they must first prepare the streets by thoroughly cleaning them with the street sweeper.

The slurry is applied in the morning and allowed to dry in the afternoon, which will be signaled with the removal of the barricades.

Residents usually are notified the day before slurry is applied on their blocks, and asked to park their vehicles in the alley or side streets the night before, if they are not going to leave home before 8 the morning the work is done.

No vehicles should be left in the blocks that are being treated, to ensure continuous applications of the material.

Streets slated to be worked the following week include 100-800 West Magnolia, 500-700 South Park, 100-400 West Daisy, 100-400 East Pecan, 700 Mockingbird, 1300 Mockingbird and 1300 Blue Jay.

Should wet or damp weather develop, the schedule is delayed somewhat, because the material applied to the asphalt surface is slowed in its drying process, Lytle said.



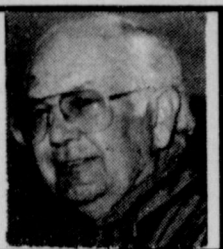

I must admit that I had some interruptions the other night, when Pres. Clinton was delivering his address on television and asking for the public's support of his so-called economic plan. But I know for sure that I never heard him mention that 4.3-cent additional tax per gallon of gasoline. The only thing he talked about was soaking the rich and how much better everyone who doesn't make \$150,000 would be on their income taxes. Even the printed material, which I didn't receive in the mail until Monday, doesn't mention it. Only how much better off those of us who qualify, or almost qualify, for food stamps will be if only his plan is approved. Okay, it went down to the wire in both the House and Senate, and passed

by hair much thinner than the president's. Yet he called it a mandate. Yeah, the same mandate he got at the election polls, with less than 50 percent of the votes. My point is, even if my income tax rate didn't go up effective in January, whatever I saved will be eaten up with increased costs of living. Yep. The price of all goods and services will increase. All because of that added fuel tax. And you can go to the bank on that one. For instance, had that 4.3 cents been tacked onto the gasoline Dolores and I bought during July, our cost would have been an additional \$6.24. And that doesn't include two tanks we bought on our trip to New Mexico. Virtually everything we consume has to be transported. Therefore, our

costs of living are going up. As to the president's plan to cut government spending, that won't take place until the next presidential election. Meanwhile, all that extra money being taken in will not be used to cut even the interest on what our nation owes. I seem to remember, going into last fall's election, that I warned against "tax and spend" ideas of Democrats. Now that we've made our bed, we've just got to sleep in it. At least for a little more than three years.

You may remember my comments in this space last week, about the commissioners court considering increasing the county tax rate by eight cents, in order to meet its proposed budget.

Another point I just learned, is that the county's tax values increased considerably from this time last year. The Wichita Appraisal District reports the county's values increased by \$47,232,586. The 1992 values were \$3,164,068,837, while the 1993 values have risen to \$3,211,301,423.

I want to call your attention to an important publication recently released by The Heritage Foundation, the *Index of Leading Cultural Indicators*. Written by William Bennett, the *Index* is a comprehensive statistical portrait of behavioral trends over the last 30 years. It shows, for example, that while population has increased 41 percent since 1960, violent crime has increased 560 percent; illegitimate births have increased more than 400 percent; divorce rates have quadrupled; the percentage of children living in single-parent homes has tripled, and the teenage suicide rate has increased more than 200 percent. As a member of the Heritage Foundation, I am eager to see the facts in this document given wide publicity. Only if we admit we are in a crisis of values can we begin to reverse our cultural decline. You may already have received a copy of the *Index*. If so, I urge you to keep it on hand and use it as a resource.

Thefts lead to arrests

A 14-year-old juvenile male has been referred to the juvenile probation department in Wichita Falls, facing charges of theft and cruelty to animals.

Police received a call from a resident Thursday afternoon, saying two young boys were walking down an alley shooting mace at dogs.

When confronted, the pair admitted having stolen the mace from Wal-Mart. They were identified by the officer and scheduled to meet, along with their parents, with the department's detective.

The youths reportedly used the mace on at least one dog, and a goat.

Two other theft reports were taken by police during the past week.

The first was from a resident in the

900 block of East Ruby, who said someone had taken two recording tapes from his answering machine.

The other was from a woman in Electra, saying someone had taken her purse from her pickup Monday night while she was paying her bill for gasoline at a local convenience store.

Three criminal mischief complaints were filed during the past week: a resident in the 200 block of Hope, about a half barrel planter being turned over on his front porch; a window

screen and window glass being damaged at a home in the 700 block of East Cash, and an employee at Pizza Hut concerning damage in a rest room.

The Pizza Hut employee complained that two men from Electra had been "obnoxious" and had damaged the men's restroom commode before leaving.

Police learned the names of the two. They were issued warning citations for criminal trespass, and they promised to make restitution.

Charlotte is a native of Mineola, where she graduated high school, and her husband grew up at Hawkins.

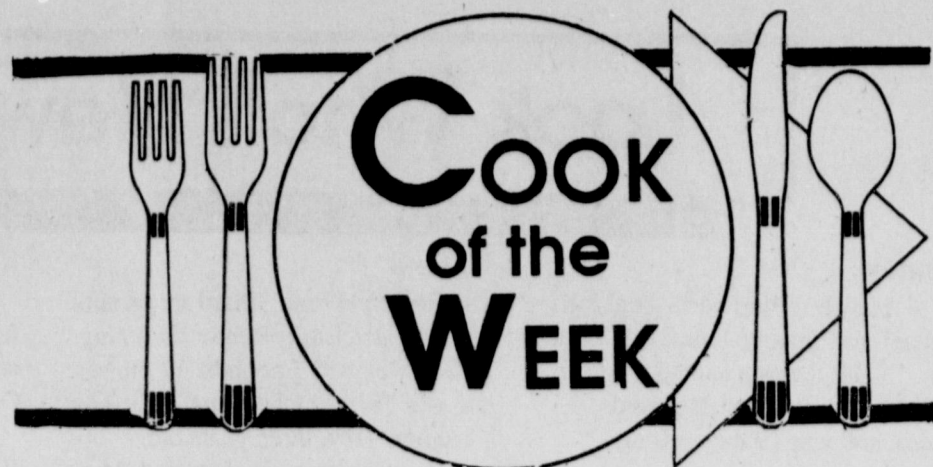
When asked how they like living in Iowa Park, Charlotte said "We love it here." She said it is the right size for raising a family, and they are very pleased with the school system here.

increases in the proposed budget, offset less money from the state, and to increase the year-end carryover to cover first-of-year expenses for the 1994-95 school year.

He said the state was still about \$351,000 short of what it had said it would provide for the district for the 1992-93 budget.

A meeting was scheduled Aug. 30 to act on the budget.

Following a detailed explanation of the transportation department's capital outlay items by Robert Palmer, who administers transportation, the board's concensus was approval of three vehicles, including a new pickup, used van and a new 71-passenger bus.

The board postponed consideration of a request from Rev. Mike Grubbs that unused land north of Kidwell Elementary be donated to the senior citizens for a new Friendly Door site.

Following his explanation, Bob Hamilton, *Leader* publisher covering the meeting and a member of the city council, told the board the original intent when the Recreational Activities Center was built was that the center would eventually be added onto that structure.

Hamilton said the council had never been approached with a proposal that an addition might be put on the RAC building for the Friendly Door.

Grubbs, president of the Friendly Door board of directors, told trustees his group was applying for grants from various foundations to fund a new center's construction, because the present facility does not meet requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Sight First coordinator speaks to Evening Lions

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Player injury not serious; teams scrimmage Saturday

What first appeared to have been the first major injury of the 1993 football season turned out to be only a scare.

Sophomore Toby King was injured Monday morning, the first day of full-pad contact, while attempting to make a tackle, according to Coach Robert Clensay.

King received care from local Emergency Medical Technicians and then was transported to Bethania Hospital, where he was held overnight for observation and then released Tuesday morning.

In making the tackle, he had his head down, and complained of neck and back pains, which prompted the call for medical attention.

He called Coach Clensay from his home that afternoon and assured him he was fine, but had been instructed not to participate in any contact for at least 10 days.

All three high school teams will hold intrasquad scrimmages Saturday morning. The freshmen will begin about 9, followed by the JV at 10, and the varsity taking the field at 11.

Clensay said the scrimmages likely would be held on the practice field, west of the field house.

The Head Hawk gleamed with approval of his athletes, for their conditioning as they entered the tough two-a-day sessions.

Coaches ordinarily use the days players are required by University Interscholastic League rules to work out in shorts before putting on pads, to work on agility and conditioning.

"They were in such good shape, we'd go through the agility drills and, because we didn't have to wait for them to recover, we'd be through with the sessions about 20 minutes early," said Clensay.

Because of that, and the fact that the players all knew their offensive and defensive assignments from last year, those three days actually became "boring."

The coolness of the weather could also have had something to do with the ease in which the players performed those three days. It was unseasonably cool, just like the same time frame last year.

That is, until Monday. Temperatures returned to their normal season highs of around 100

degrees, at the same time the players were allowed to begin working out in full pads and doing contact work.

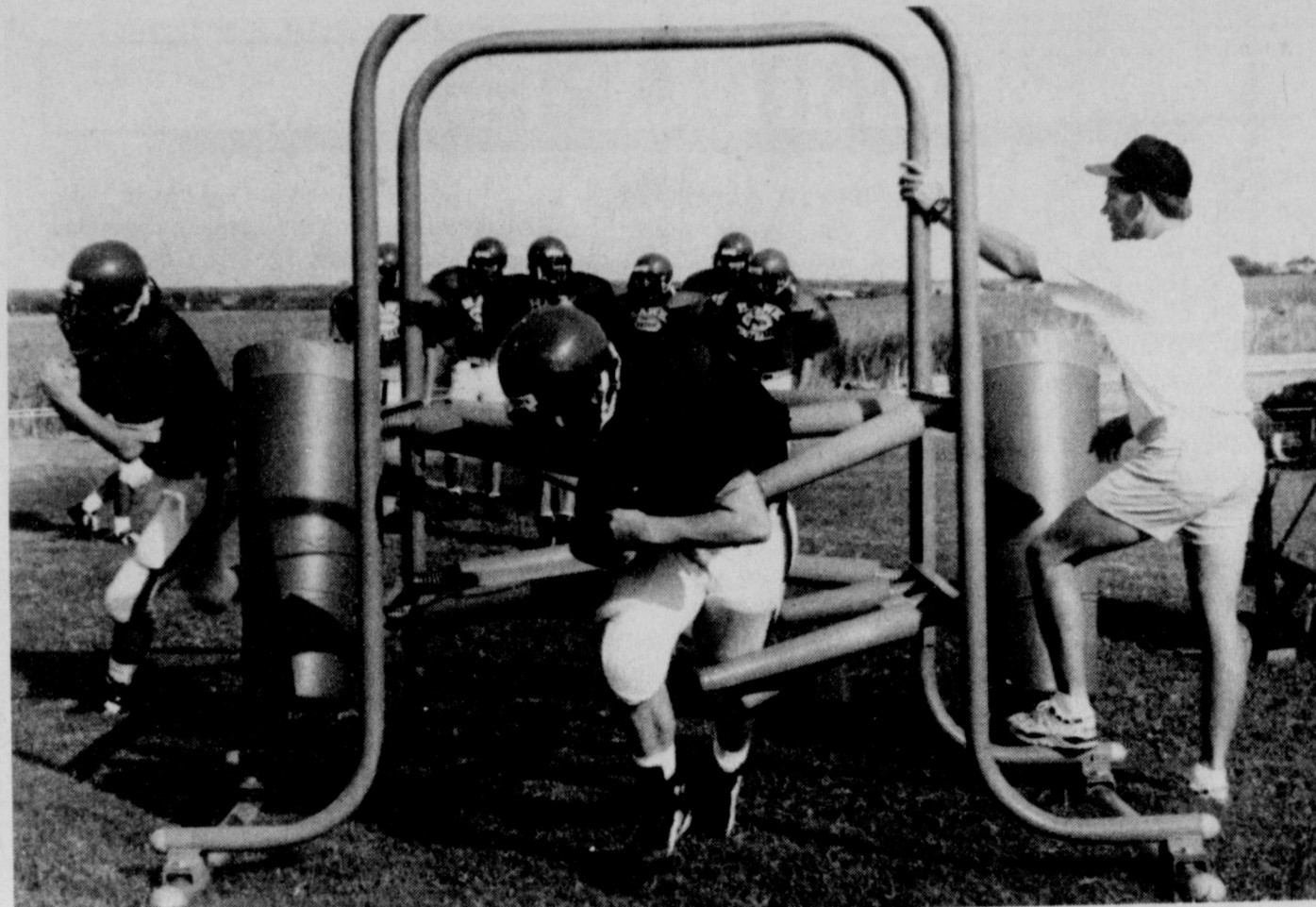
Clensay admitted, "We had some heat problems (Monday). Several (players) went down with heat, and we've had to cut down some."

None of the players required any medical attention due to overheating, but they were held out of practice until they recovered.

The Head Hawk said this early-season period has been a pleasure for him, because of the players knowing their assignments, allowing the coaching staff to work more on fine tuning and polishing, rather than teaching, what they are supposed to do.

"This is the first time in five years" it's been that way for Clensay, who became head coach of the Green and White last year.

Having an established program, in which the players are experienced and knowledgeable of their offensive and defensive assignments, makes the pre-season workouts much easier for all concerned to concentrate on the fast-



approaching season.

And that season gets underway the first weekend of September.

But before then, scrimmages will be held the final two Fridays of August, the first against the Wichita Falls Coyotes, and the second at Abilene Wylie.
