County-Wide Election Results Announced

COUNTY—One hundred eighty-four votes were cast in the uncontested city election in Baird Saturday, April 7.

Robert Martin received 95 votes, Gilmer Hughes, 162, and Virginia Shanks, 170, to win the contest to fill 3 council seats. There was quite a number of write-in votes in this race. The list of write-ins follows:

Steve Warren-69; Irvin Corn-2; Farris Bennet-1; Lynn Ault-2; R.C. Wristen-3; Woody Gordon-2; Conley Pruitt-2; Gilbert Hinds-1; Charles Greenway-2.

In the Baird School Board election to fill three spots, incumbents James Grant netted 74 votes, Stan McCormick, 72, and Bruce Williams, 70. A total of 82 votes were cast in this election.

In the highly competitive Clyde School Board race, 715 total votes were cast.

Eddie Craig netted 389 votes, Barton Scott collected 357 and Duane Bennett had 267 votes to capture seats on the board.

Other candidates were Frank Chrane, 190; Carol Taylor, 145; Mrs. Stanton Tucker, 134; Dr. William M. Walton, 134; Bobby Carter, 129; Harold Hicks, 113; Gene Cook, 87; Jackie Jenkins, 68; and Jim Thomasson, 56.

In the Clyde city election, Allan N. Johnson, who was unopposed for mayor, received 269 votes. Incumbents, J. Paul Dugan had 247 votes and Don Gordon got 242 votes to secure their re-election to 2 year terms.

In the race to fill the unexpired term of M.M. Tabor, Foy D. Allcorn accumulated 203 votes to defeat Joe W. Howe with 99.

Ed Blair and incumbent Lanny Denman were elected Saturday to a three-year term each as trustee of the Eula school board. A total of 324 voters travelled to the polls.

Blair received 133 votes and Denman had 137 votes.

Others running for the seats were Doyle Townson, 86 votes; incumbent Jerry Caffey, 129; and Dabney Warren, 131.

Mrs. Ralph McAdams was elected to fill an unexpired two-year term on the school board vacated when her husband died. She got 169 votes. Opponent Judy Hailey received 154 votes.

Gerald Stayton won the one-year unexpired term on the school board with 151 votes. Opponents Bill Bozarth got 112 votes and Bryon Caton collected 57. Incumbent W.P. Stephenson resigned because of poor health.

City of Baird Petitioned On Issuance of Bonds

BAIRD—In regular session Tuesday night, the Baird City Council was greeted with a petition calling for an election in connection with the city's proposed issuance of revenue bonds in the principal amount of \$380,000. The bonds were to enable the city to purchase 3 auxiliary power generators for the power plant.

The petition, which was thoroughly checked earlier by the city, contained the signatures of 161 qualified voters. Due to this action, the city now has two options -- to call an election or to table action. No decision on an election was made. However, if an election was called it would probably be in the last quarter of the year. A called meeting set for Thursday to issue the bonds was cancelled.

Buddy Brame, spokesman for the people who circulated the petition, addressed the council during the meeting. He questioned the city on the fact that the generators are not run at full capacity which is 1000 KW. In his experience as a manager of a power plant, he felt that the city could run the generators they have at full capacity and the result would be adequate power for Baird. City spokesmen, however, disagreed that the generators would even produce the capacity of 1000 KW per engine.

Brame also suggested the possibility of a qualified engineer inspecting the present power plant to determine the reason why the generators cannot func-

tion at full capacity, and to also determine what the plant actually needs. Councilmen responded with the answer that the plant has been checked several times.

The council asked Mr. Brame if he would volunteer some of his time and experience to look over the plant and offer suggestions. He graciously accepted.

In connection with possibility of a hookup with West Texas Utilities, no figures have been secured yet. The city has contacted the company twice, but no concrete figures have been received. The city would like to work out a similar contract like Coleman's contract, only somewhat smaller.

WTU wants the city to put up escrow for the survey on the power, equipment, etc. that would have to be run before a contract would be settled. They have asked for this since they were out \$19,000 in expenses during the last survey they ran in connection with the August 1978 referendum election. If the city then entered into the contract, WTU would return all escrow. If not, the city would simply lose the escrow.

If all the transformers and other equipment is immediately available after the contract is signed, the hookup would be completed in approximately 6-8 months. If the equipment needed is not easily accessible, it would probably be 10-12 months before the hookup would be completed.

County Library Open House Apr. 18

Hosting the open house will be members of the Wednesday Club of Baird which has sponsored the Library-Museum since 1937. Mrs. A.E. Dyer, Sr. is president of the Club; Mrs. W. Lee Ivey is librarian and chairman of the Library Board; and Miss Sonia Walker is Library Clerk.

BAIRD-A 21-year-old woman and her 18-year-old brother were hitchhiking from Georgia to Arizona when the woman was raped at approximately 8:30 p.m. last Tuesday night at knifepoint in a pasture, 2 miles east of Baird.

The man being sought in the incident is a white male between 30 and 40 years old with shoulder-length blond hair. He picked up the pair near Dallas about 5 p.m.

As it got dark, the man stopped the car about 1½ miles east of Baird on I-20 so he and the brother could relieve themselves.

About half a mile down I-20, the man stopped the car again and ordered the woman out. Brandishing a hunting knife, he told her to climb across the fence into a nearby pasture, where she was raped.

The brother was told to stay in the car. Afterward, the man told the brother to come to the fence, at which time the man ran for his car, and took off headed west.

All of the pair's clothing, suitcases and the brother's billfold was in the car when the man drove off.

According to Chief Deputy Ed Duncan, fingerprints were secured in connection with the rape incident, and as soon as the proper identification is established, there should be some good leads in the case.

The two victims have already gone on to Arizona.

In other departmental news, after a chase Duncan captured Charles Sellers, who was being sought in connection with the Farrington Fina Station armed robbery in Cisco, at 2:30 p.m. Friday on the east county line. The other suspect being sought in connection with the robbery is still at large.

Two juveniles were apprehended by Sheriff Bill Skinner and Deputy Terry Addison in the recent vandalism occurring at Belle Plains cemetery. The sheriff's department would like to issue a reminder to all who have loved ones buried in the cemetery to check for damage. If any damage is discovered, please contact the Callahan County Sheriff's Department as quickly as possible.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN BY CALLAHAN COUNTY OF ITS RENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Landlords and persons who live in rental property are urged to contact the Housing Authority of Callahan County concerning participation in a program designed to assist our citizens to secure decent, safe, and sanitary housing.

The program benefits landlords and owners by providing financial assistance during vacancy and certain depository and damage guarantees. The program aids eligible renters by providing financial assistance on the basis of need.

Persons that wish to apply for rent assistance must make application for eligibility and subsequently provide proof of income. Applicants must be a family or head of household. If an individual applies he or she must be 62 years of age or handicapped or disabled.

Cost of housing occupied by the applicant must be within the limits set forth in a fair market rent schedule. Fair Market rents are based on standard market housing, however any standard unit falling within the Fair Market schedule is eligible.

Participation in the rent assistance program is voluntary on the part of owners/landlords and renters.

County Water Supply Corp. Meets Last Monday

COUNTY-The directors of the Callahan County Water Supply Corp. met in the county courthouse Monday night. Several rural residents were there to ask questions about the proposed water system.

Tex Cloud, chairman, opened the meeting by asking for questions from the floor. Then each director reported meter progress in their areas. Mrs. Lee Brown, secretary-treasurer read the minutes of the last meeting and reported that the corp. had a total of \$10,400 in the bank.

A discussion concerning the May 19 deadline for the \$200. meter and what to charge after the deadline, resulted in a delay until the May meeting.

One thing that you can count on is that the meter price after May 19 will be substantially higher. Several methods of contacting

the rural patrons was discussed. There will be several phone parties held by the directors. So expect a call.

To members of the Water Supply Corp.: (Those of you that have paid \$200 for your meter) Pass the word the corporation is alive and well, and will remain so if you will plea for the participation of your friends and neighbors. The only way for you to get water, is for you to get more meters. So every member get several members!

W.E. Melton, Jr. Succumbs Wed.

ABILENE-W.E. Melton Jr., 68, of Abilene, died at 12:30 p.m. Wednesday at Hendrick Medical Center. He suffered an apparent heart attack at his residence earlier.

Services were at 4 p.m. Friday in the First Baptist Church in Baird with the Rev. Wayne Shuffield officiating. Burial was in the Baird Cemetery.

He was born Sept. 14, 1910 in Baird. He married Mable Burke on Jan. 15,

1938 in Cisco. He graduated from Baird High School in 1929 and attended Randolph Junior College (now Cisco Junior College). He was a bookkeeper for Woodley Petroleum Co. for several years, and worked for Production Credit Assn. in Lubbock. He was pipeline superintendent for Creole Petroleum Co. in Venezuela from 1947 until his retirement in 1961. Mr. Melton moved to Abilene from Austin in 1965.

Mr. Melton was a member of the First Baptist Church in Baird. He was a World War II veteran and served in the China-Burma-India theater. He was a member of the Baird Masonic Lodge No. 522 and past master of the lodge. During his term as past master he was the youngest man to serve in that capacity in the state.

He was a member of the Lone Star Chapter, Austin Council, Colorado Commandry, Scottish Rite and Ben-Hur Temple Shrine, all of Austin.

Survivors include his wife of Abilene; three brothers, Arvin C. of Lubbock, Zolon C. of Coleman, and Donald F. of Breckenridge; and several nieces and nephews.

Rabies Clinic In Baird April 18

Both cases were within 1 mile of the Baird city limits, according to county veterinarian Rob Harle.
