### FFA Member Attends National Conference

BAIRD- Barry Williams of the Baird FFA Chapter at Baird High School is attending a National FFA Leadership Conference in Washington, D.C., this week. The week-long Washington Conference is being held at the Olde Colony Motor Lodge and the National FFA Center near the Nation's Capital.

The FFA Conference program is designed to improve leadership skills, develop an understanding of the national heritage, and prepare FFA members for more effective leadership roles in their chapter and community. The Conference is also a forum for the exchange of FFA Chapter activity ideas among members from across the nation.

Besides the training sessions, the 1979 program includes visits to Mt. Vernon Plantation, the National Archives, Smithsonian Institution, Arlington National Cemetery, and several other historic monuments and memorials in and around the Capital.

A highlight of the Conference was a morning visit to the office of Congressman Charles Stenholm of Stamford. Participants also attended a Capital Hill meal featuring a question and answer period with Congressman, and Washington leaders in business and industry.

### Newcombe Injured In Accident

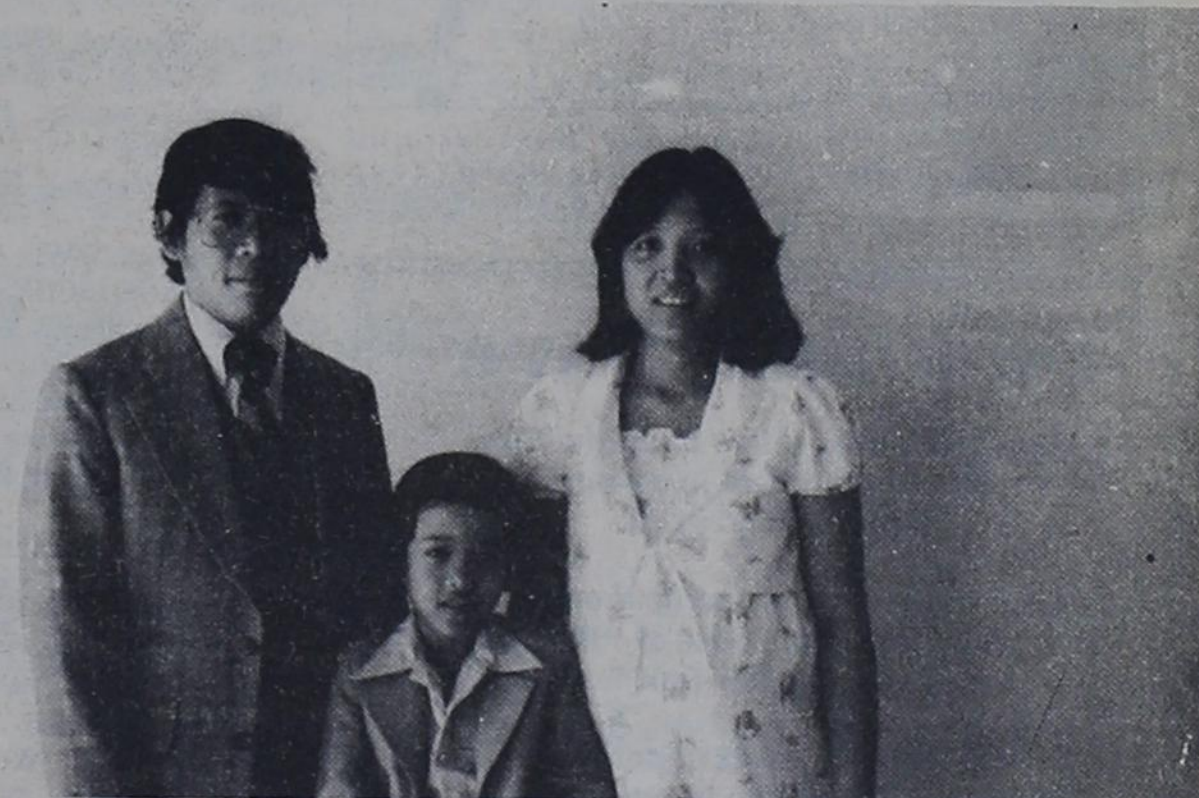

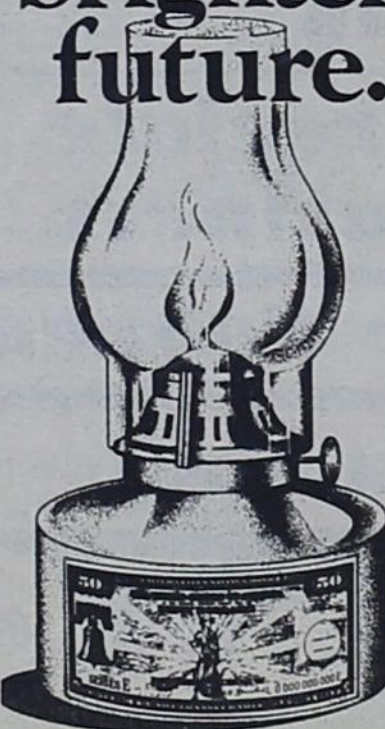

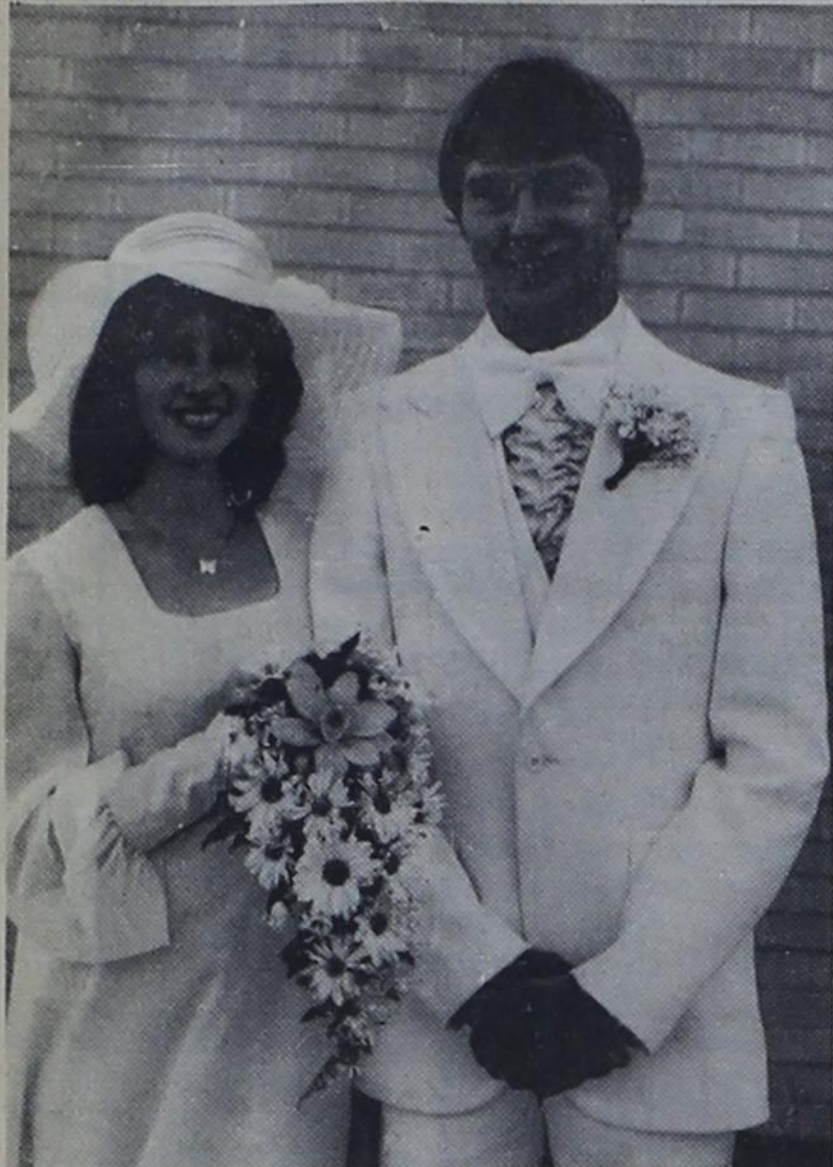

## Callahan County ASCS News

### 1979 WHEAT & FEED GRAIN PROGRAM REVIEW:

July 15, 1979, is the final date to certify Grain Sorghum, Corn, Cotton, Peanuts, and Set-Aside. All farms are required to report these acreages whether or not participating in the 1979 programs. Failure to report will result in loss of program

benefits and the acreage will be considered "zero" for all future program purposes. CORRECT CERTIFICATION:

As stressed before, it is extremely important to certify acres correctly. Accurate reports will eliminate penalties and loss of payments. Measuring Service is available through this office, at a small fee, to any interested producer.

**SMALL GRAIN HARVEST:** Wheat and Barley harvest is in full swing. Participating farms having yields below normal due to natural causes should remember to file for low yield payments within 15 days after harvest of all grain on the farm. Disaster claims should also be filed within 15 days of the disaster affecting the acreage. This could be hail, wind, excessive rainfall, etc. Do not disturb the crop in any way until an appraisal of the loss can be made. There are no payments involved for Oats.

**SET-ASIDE REMINDERS:**  
1. No grazing from 4-1-79 through 9-30-79. 2. No harvesting from designated acres. 3. Must be devoted to an eligible cover or other practices which effectively protect the set-aside from

wind and water erosion, weeds, and rodents. 4. Small grain or hay cover must be clipped or mowed to prevent seed formation. Any grain reaching the dough stage shall be counted as NCA (Normal Crop Acreage). 5. New provision allows the producer to graze an area that is located in the same field as the set-aside without erecting a fence. To do this, (a) There must be no grazing on set-aside acres during the non-grazing period stated above. (b) The producer will be in violation of program provisions if grazing does occur on set-aside that has not been properly protected from wind and water erosion. (c) Before a producer may turn the livestock in, a written re-

quest must be submitted and approved by the County Committee and District Director.

**FINAL PLANTING DATES:** Grain sorghum 6-20-79, Peanuts 7-15-79. This does not mean a crop cannot be planted beyond these dates. The dates are set up to use in conjunction with prevented planting claims.

### EXTENSION MESQUITE SPRAYING DEADLINE:

The final date to spray mesquite in Callahan County has been extended until July 6, 1979.

### HOLIDAY:

This office will be closed on Wednesday, July 4, 1979, a legal holiday.

## Conley Cystic Fibrosis Chr.

BAIRD- Mr. Quinn Conley has accepted the Chairmanship of the Annual Fall Campaign on behalf of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. He will be recruiting volunteers within the community to plan a "Breath of Life Campaign" to take place this Fall in Baird. The purpose of this Fall Campaign will be to provide the community with information about Cystic Fibrosis and to raise funds to support research, education and care programs for children affected by cystic fibrosis, and other lung-damaging diseases like severe asthma, chronic bronchitis, and bronchiectasis.

Cystic Fibrosis is the number one genetic killer of children. Approximately one in every twenty Americans is a symptomless carrier of the recessive CF gene. Cystic Fibrosis is inherited when both parents carry the recessive gene. At the present time, no cure for Cystic Fibrosis is known.

## Farm Bureau Favors New Tax Relief Law

COUNTY- The Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau has asked taxing jurisdictions in this county to help put the new tax relief law into effect in 1979.

In a letter to elected officials of all taxing units, W. C. Vines of Albany, president of the local county farm organization, reminded them that this law provides for limiting tax valuation on agricultural land if the owner applies by July 15, 1979.

Mr. Vines reminded the tax officials that the Act states: "The Legislature believes that implementation of Articles 1 and 2 of this Act is both feasible and desirable and hereby expresses its intent that all taxing units in this state implement those articles for taxes imposed for the 1979 tax year unless it is impossible to do so."

The Farm Bureau officer told each one of the tax officials: "We believe that your tax office has the competence to follow this new law in 1979." The letter added: "If there is to be a proposed resolution or ordinance to deny this tax treatment in 1979, please let us know so that we can attend the hearing and present our views."

School district authorities were also reminded that any school districts which deny this valuation in 1979 will receive less state money.

A tax manual will be furnished by the School Tax

Assessment Practices Board in late June. A training session will be offered in Austin at the University of Texas Special Events Center on June 25.

A local farm leader said that his organization was helping notify farmers and ranchers that they should apply with all their local tax offices between July 1-15. The county Farm Bureau office will have a supply of sample applications forms for use in preparing the information for the official form.

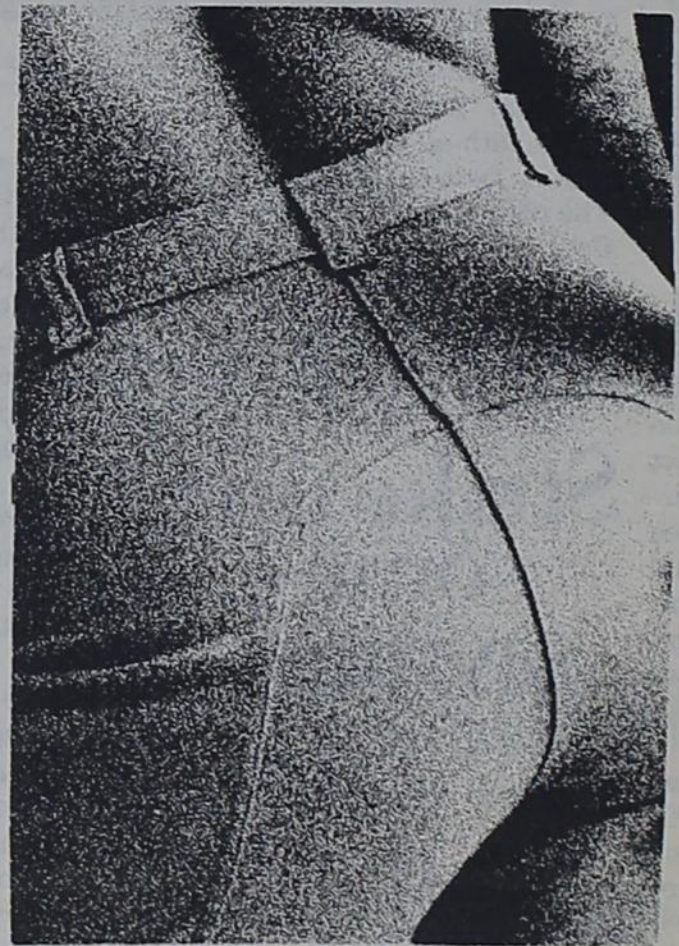
