Baird School Board replaced Dave Edminston with Quinn Conley, head basketball coach, leaving a position open for assistant football coach.

Edminston resigned May 17 to take a position at Brady High School as offensive coordinator for Brady's new head coach Bobby Peschel.

Continuing as head basketball coach, Conley doesn't know if he will remain

as tennis coach.

Conley is a graduate of Robert Lee High and San Angelo University. He moved to Baird in 1974 after coaching one year at Meridian.

It is not known at this time if school officials have any interested candidates to fill the position as assistant football coach.

RHMI Considering Terminating Lease—Callahan General May Cease Operations

On September 24, 1981, a subsidiary to Hendrick Medical Center, Rural Hospital Management, Inc. signed a 10-year lease with Callahan County Commissioners to take over management of Callahan General Hospital.

Now RHMI is considering terminating their lease on the ground that the hospital has been a constant loss, said Michael Walters, Hendrick president.

The basic problem with the hospital is that 95 percent of its patients are on Medicare. The reason being is that Medicare only pays less the actual costs of the patient's care.

If RHMI does terminate its lease it will have 90-days in which to notify the

county and publish a written notice of termination. It is then up to the Callahan County Commissioners to find someone else to manage the hospital. If the Commissioners have not found someone to manage Callahan General, 15-days prior to the end of the 90-day period, they must publish a written notice indicating that the hospital will cease operations. Hospital Administrator, William McKinnon, said, "the County has the sole right to close, not RHMI."

Commissioners have already contacted several hospital management firms on the matter. A final decision is expected to be reached when RHMI board of directors meet June 14.

Students Sign Petition To Halt Consolidation

Student spokesperson, Kathy Slayton, who describes herself as "just an interested student," called on the Eula school board to reject consolidation with another school district.

Miss Slayton presented a petition signed by 100 junior and senior high school students. This represented about 80 percent of the high school students

in the district.

Eula Independent School District Trustees have not moved any closer to a decision on renovating the elementary school or hold another school bond election.

Conditions of the school is being evaluated at this time by their structural engineering firms.

West Texas Junior Golf Tour, Summer 1982

The West Texas Chapter of the Professional Golfers Association of America will sponsor the West Texas Junior Golf Tour this summer, which will mark its 14th season.

Boys and girls ages 12-18 will be partaking in the best competition to be found in West Texas Junior golf.

The Tour will begin its 45-50 tournaments the first week in June and wind up the second week in August.

Participants will be put in three age brackets: 12-13, 14-15, and 16-18, and very nice plaques will be awarded to the top three finishers in each age group.

Each event will start promptly at 9 a.m. with registration starting at 8 a.m.

Entry fee for each regular event will be \$5.00 to be paid the morning of the tournament.

Only residents of the West Texas area are eligible to receive awards in these tournaments though outside residents are welcome to compete.

New for this year's Junior Tour will

be free bag tags to be given to each participant at each event to collect for the summer.

Highlights of the Tour will be two "major events". The West Texas Junior Masters will be the first of the two premier events and will take place the 25th of June.

The grand finale will be the West Texas Junior Tour Championship which will wrap up the Tour for 1982 on the 10th and 11th of August. The Junior Tour Championship will be a 36 hole event over two days with the participants being taken from the 1st and 2nd place finishers of the summers tournaments. To be held at the beautiful Green Tree Country Club in Midland, it will be here that Tom Kite, the leading money winner on the 1981 PGA Tour, will host a clinic for the contestants of this event. 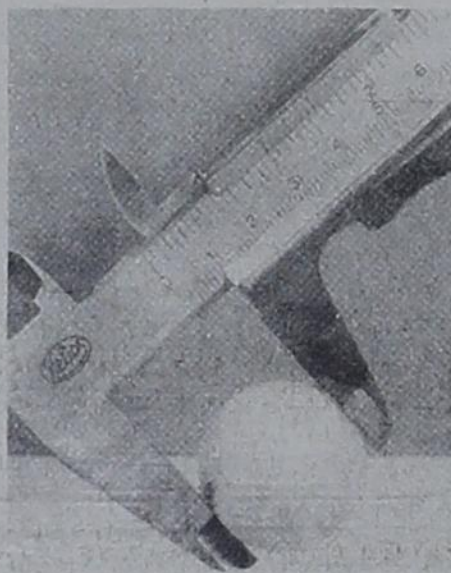

Letter to the Editor:

Dear Editor:

Approximately one year ago, Callahan County elected to grant to Hendricks Rural Hospital Management, the operation and management of our hospital at Baird.

Yes, our hospital. It belongs to you and me.

It was the belief, and understanding of the county, if not an actual promise by Hendricks, that Hendricks would maintain and improve the facility, increase the staffing of the hospital, improve the care of patients, by providing better equipment and more of it, and free specialized training for nurses, technicians, aids and other hospital employees, and that they would upgrade the pay scales, working conditions, and benefits for our hospital employees.

No significant changes have been made in hospital equipment. We have fewer nurses than we previously had. We no longer have a full time administrator for the hospital, nor any Director of Nurses, the pay has not noticeably improved, and our hospital employees no longer have an insurance program. The Surgery Suite, though well equipped by previous management, can not be used because no R.N. is assigned for Surgical Nurse.

Now, they are wanting to close our hospital, claiming that it is "not needed, not used," and is losing money".

O.K. what about our hospital not being used and losing money?

Eliminate surgery from a hospitals capability and what have you thrown

out in terms of patient numbers and cash flow.

It is true that the Delivery Room of the hospital has not been in use due to the lack of an OB doctor in this area, but the delivery room is equipped, was equipped by previous management, and prior to this attempt to close the hospital, someone locally was making arrangements to get OB care back into our community and re-open the delivery room.

Callahan County General Hospital has always been an institution of compassionate loving, care for people. Care provided by people whom you know and trust, and who have a greater than professional concern for your well-being. It is not an instrument for making someone wealthy, but, if properly operated, it does not have to lose money.

We only have one Ambulance. All of our Nursing Home residents, when they require hospitalization, must be transferred by an ambulance, regardless of whether their illness is serious or not, and we have a large number of residents in the two nursing homes in our area. If the ambulance is on its way to Abilene making a routine transfer, or for that matter any kind of transfer, and we have an accident here, where does that leave us?

It would be more profitable for Hendricks if they could force all of us to go to their hospital in Abilene. But is that what we need?

No! We need a good, well equipped, fully staffed well managed hospital right here where we are, and we are not in Abilene.

Will we have one Here? Not if they can help it.

Our hospital, yours and mine, is being killed and unless we do something about it, it will cease to exist.

A meeting has been scheduled sometime in the next couple of weeks (some people seem to be trying to keep everyone confused about the exact date) to decide the fate of our hospital, and if Hendricks has their way, it will be gone.

Petitions are being cir-

culated to keep our hospital open.

Please! Sign one of these petitions, call or go see the County Judge, talk to the County Commissioners. Tell them that you and I need and want our hospital here, open and properly run, serving the needs of our people.

We definitely need our hospital! But do it now or it will be too late!-- Time is running out!

Farmers & Ranchers To Be Interviewed

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will begin interviewing Texas Farmers and ranchers in mid-May on 1982 crop acreage and midyear livestock inventories, State Statistician Doug Murfield has announced.

Results of the confidential interviews, conducted through the mail or in person by field enumerators, will be published in June.

Murfield said estimates give Texas farmers and ranchers planning information for planting, breeding, feeding, storing, producing, and marketing. "without these reports, most producers would have to depend on trade and other sources for information on crop and livestock prospects," he said.

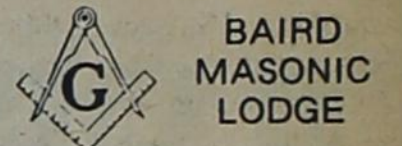
Reports are also used by

farm organizations and legislatures to plan and develop farm programs, extension economists and farm and ranch management consultants to advise farmers and ranchers, and exporters to plan and promote sales of Texas agricultural products in foreign markets.

Estimates are published annually for livestock, dairy, poultry, cotton, small grains, vegetables, fruits and pecans, and cash receipts from the sale of Texas farm commodities.

May Proclaimed "Older Americans Month" Services For Sallie Burdick

In support of President Reagan's proclamation designating May as "Older Americans Month", Texas Farmers Union Green Thumb Inc., a senior employment program, joins other senior agencies in honoring our older citizens.

A proclamation concerning "Older Americans Month" has been issued every since 1963. Each time it becomes more meaningful because the number of older Americans is increasing each year.

Because scientific ad-

vances in medicine have increased the length and quality of life for our older citizens, a typical 65-year-old today can expect to live another 16 years. This median age is expected to increase by another three years during the next decade.

At the time the president signed the proclamation for "Older Americans Month", he also announced his endorsement on legislation prohibiting mandatory retirement. Congressman Claude Pepper, chair-

man of the House Aging Committee, praised Reagan's action.

"When it comes to retirement, the criterion should be fitness for work," said Reagan in his proclamation speech, "not year of birth".

Green Thumb, an employment program that is funded by the Department of Labor under Title V of the Older Americans Act, daily demonstrates the many valuable qualities of the older worker.

Farmers Union sponsors

the program which employs almost 1,000 rural persons aged 55 and over in 108 counties across Texas. Green Thumb employees are placed in community jobs with non-profit organizations providing services that their communities might not otherwise afford.

Oakdale Park's Eleventh Annual Bluegrass Jamboree, May 27, 30

Schade Brothers Operating Co., Abilene, will drill a Callahan County Regular Field project seven miles southwest of Baird.

It is No.3 Sybil Dicky, located on a 118-acre lease.

Drillsite is 600 feet from the north and 1,050 feet from the west lines of Section 1, SF Survey.

Schkade Bros. Operating Co. of Abilene will drill No. 4 Sybil Dickey in Callahan County Regular Field seven miles southwest of Baird to 1,500 feet.

It spots 875 from the south and 470 feet from the west lines of Section 1, M.M. Potter Survey 253 on a 118-acre lease.

Ginco Oil and Gas of Texas Inc., of Abilene will drill No. 1 Ginco-Summers as a Callahan County wildcat to 4,200 feet 10 miles southwest of Putnam.

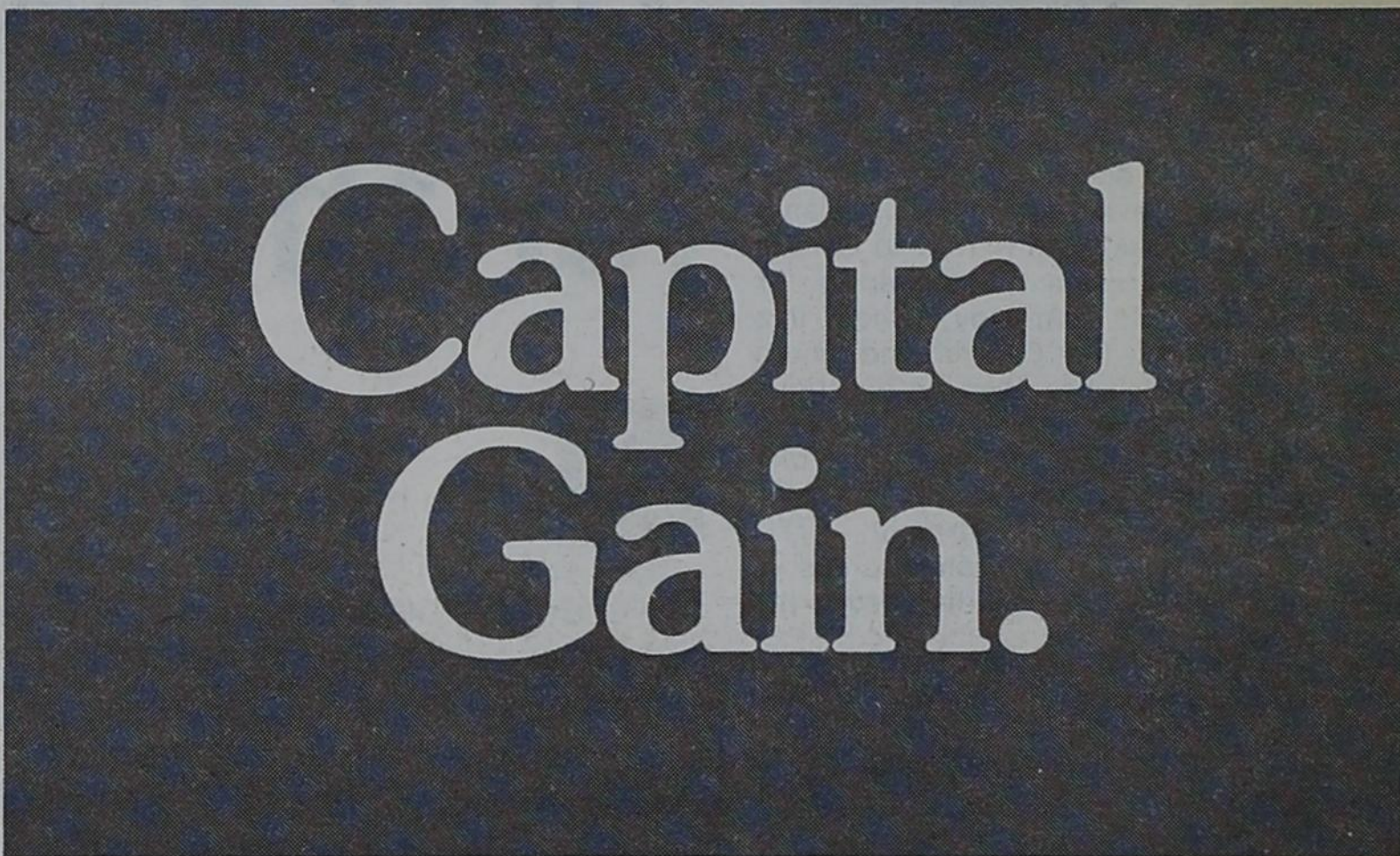
