Recognized rating for school district

When accountability ratings for Texas public schools were released Tuesday morning by the Texas Education Agency, Kidwell Elementary, Bradford Elementary, and W.F. George Middle School campuses, as well as the Iowa Park School District, had each received a "Recognized" rating.

Iowa Park High School, which was a "Recognized" campus last year, fell just short this year and received an "Acceptable" rating.

This is the second year in a row for the Iowa Park CISD to be a "Recognized" district. A district cannot be rated "Exemplary" or "Recognized" if it has one or more low-performing campuses.

Superintendent Mike Caplinger said, "I am extremely pleased with the results. They show a tremendous amount of consistency throughout the district, with all campuses showing very high scores in all subject areas."

The accountability ratings are determined by attendance figures, dropout rates and the passing rates on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) exam.

In the state's accountability ratings, "Recognized" is second only to "Exemplary," which requires at least 90 percent of the students passing each subject area, one percent dropout rate, and a 94 percent attendance rate. the students passing each subject area, six percent or less dropout rate, and at least a 94 percent attendance rate.

The junior high and two elementary schools had all been "Acceptable" campuses last year, with the high school receiving the "Recognized" status.

The ratings received by Iowa Park schools this year were accomplished eventhough state standards were higher this year than in 1997.

For example, last year a school was required to have at least 75 percent passing in each subject area to receive a "Recognized" rating. This year, at least 80 percent were required to pass the tests.

To receive the "Acceptable" rating last year, a campus was required to have at least 35 percent passing each subject area. This year, 40 percent passing was required.

Changes anticipated for 1998-99 include:

* The TAAS passing rate standard for the "Acceptable" ratings will be raised to 45 percent.

* The results of students tested on Spanish TAAS in reading and mathematics at grades 3 and 4 will be incorporated into the TAAS passing rates, which are used to determine ratings.

* TAAS results for tested special education students will be incor-

Confused driver lands in jail

When a man exhibited confusion after being told he was driving the wrong way on a one-way road, he wound up being arrested here Wednesday morning.

He wasn't arrested for violating traffic laws, but for what he had in the truck he had leased.

Shortly before 8 a.m., Officer Jimmy Eaton stopped the truck after it had turned off Johnson Road, and was heading west on the east-bound access road.

Eaton said when the man drove away, he came to a halt, in the circle drive of the high school. So he began asking the man questions, and received even more confused responses.

That's when he called higher authorities, explaining he felt a need for a drug-sniffing dog.

Terry Johnson, a member of the Electra police force who lives here with a drug dog purchased by that city, was summoned and responded.

The dog first "hit" on the man's coffee, which was sitting in a holder. Continued searching produced one gram of methemin, and other lessor items of drug paraphenalia.

The driver had mixed methemain into his cup of coffee.

Possession of the items was enough for the man to be arrested. But it was enhanced, because when he parked in the high school driveway, he was informed he was in possession of a controlled substance in a drug-free zone.

The driver, Dennis William Lucas, 34, was later transported to the county jail.

A Vernon resident, Susan Kim Haire, 40, is in jail in that city, and when she is released will be facing charges here -- for the same offenses -- forgery.

Haire has apparently been cashing stolen personal checks in both cities. And she supplemented that income by allegedly taking a VCR, 25-inch television set and some \$15 in change from a relative's home here in Iowa Park.

Police report having recovered the VCR in a Vernon hock shop, and returning it to its owner. The local thefts were reported July 29.

Iowa Park police and school officials have been experiencing trouble the past few years, with youngsters climbing atop the Bradford Elementary building.

Officer Donnie Cavender spotted three youths walking away from the building at 10:46 p.m. Sunday, and stopped to asked what they were doing out at that hour.

While talking with them, he heard a call for help, and saw a youth lying on the school's porch.

The youth, Cavender learned, had fallen through a skylight on the roof, and breaking a leg in two places when he landed on the floor, 14 feet down.

The youth was treated by local emergency medical personnel, and transported to a Wichita Falls hospital. The others were transported to the police station and turned over to their parents.

Five of the boys were 14 years of age, and the other was nine, according to the police blotter.

When an officer stopped a vehicle at 1:26 a.m. Wednesday in the 1400 block of Johnson Road for a traffic violation, it was determined by a computer check he was wanted by the Wichita County sheriff's department.

Ronald Marty Bond, 34, was wanted for a warrant, attorney off bond/theft by check, with a bond of \$2,000. He was turned over to acounty deputy at 3:15 a.m. to be transported to jail.

Water consumption slightly above 1997

Iowa Parkans consumed more water during July than during the same month a year ago, but not significantly more.

The average high temperature last month was 102, because of the 29 days the high exceeded the century mark. Last year's average high for the same month was 96.6 degrees.

Also, the lack of precipitation contributed to the demand for water. Virgil Woodfin reported measuring 2.65 inches from the only rain of the month, July 5.

There also was only one rain that produced a measurable amount in July of 1997. That one, which fell on the 23rd, was 0.86.

But, according to figures assembled by Mike Price, City Administrator, Iowa Park water customers purchased slightly less than 8-million gallons last month, as compared with the same month in 1997.

Total gallons of water purchased last month was 68,038,400, Price reported. The total gallonage purchased the same month last year was 60,217,200.

During June, the customers consumed 54,015,000 gallons, which was considerably more than the 45,492,000 purchased the same month the previous year, according of East Cash at 11:43 p.m. last Wednesday, India Allen Troutman, 40, was arrested on a Class C assault charge. Demand for water during July of both years exceeded the capacity of the Iowa Park water treatment plant, which has the ability to produce 49,600,000 gallons during a 31-day period.

Because of that limitation, the city had to purchase 18,611,400 gallons of water from Wichita Falls last month, and 12,254,000 in June.

The city secured an agreement with Wichita Falls in the early 1970s which allows for purchases whenever demand exceeds the local plant's capability.

A \$600,000 bond issue was passed in order to finance a transmission line to carry the water.

Despite the lack of precipitation, Iowa Park's primary source of water, Lake Buffalo, continues to remain at a healthy level, Price reported.

Buffalo's water level in late July was a 1,042.0, down only one foot from June. The lake's level measured 1,043.75 in July of 1997.

Lake levels suffer from two causes: how much water is siphoned off for use, and a combination of heat and wind which causes evaporation.

Last month's heat and wind were significantly high, but still, no cause of concern, according to Price's report. To receive the "Recognized" rating, a campus must have at least 80 percent of the students passing each subject area, 3.5 percent dropout rate, and at least 94 percent attendance rate.

Four districts join forming AEP coop

The alternative education placement (AEP) coop, formed by the Iowa Park, Electra, Holliday, and City View school districts, will begin operations this fall.

The school, to be known as the Texoma Education Center, will be located in Iowa Park at the old C&S Service Center building, 105 N. Colorado St.

Rosie Flanigan, who has many years experience directing alternative education programs in the Wichita Falls school system, will be the director of the center.

She has held positions in the Wichita Falls ISD from math teacher to assistant prncipal, Hirschi High School Dean of Students, co-director of the district's summer school, director of the principals' assessment project, and director of secondary personnel.

She has degrees from Grambling State University and Midwestern State University. She also holds a mid-management certificate from MSU.

Flanigan's staff at the coop will consist of two other teachers, with one being special education certified, and four aides. The aides will come from each of the four member districts. Part of their responsibility will be to transport students to the center.

Through the coop, the school districts will have a more effective way of working with students who have difficulty adjusting to the regular educational setting.

The coop will serve as a means of meeting the state mandate that states students who are charged with or commit crimes classified as a felony or other serious breaches of the Student Code of Conduct be placed in an AEP setting. By establishing the coop, the districts will have the means to continue the education of these students.

Electra school superintendent, Don Windham, who has been selected to serve as chairman of the program, said that the coop is not just a way to punish students, but has the task of working with students so that they can function property in the regular education program at their home campus.

Windham said this will give the school districts a more effective way of working with students who have difficulty adjusting to the regular educational setting.

Individual and group counseling will be an integral part of the program. Officials from the juvenile probation department in Wichita Falls have agreed to provide training for staff members and to work at least one day a week with the students assigned to the program.

Mr. Windham said that with the coop, districts have one more tool for dealing with students. This will serve as an additional step before expulsion of students. He added that he felt this coop will be a model for other small districts to follow as it becomes operable.

Windham feels that the staff will be called upon to make presentations before their peers across the state concerning this concept, since very few districts this size have taken the initiative to fulfill the mandate of the law concerning alternative education placement of students. He praised the school boards of the four districts for

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



Staff development set next week for teachers



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After a brief business meeting Saturday, Richard Simpson, M.S.U Professor., presented his program; "Turbulent Years, New England, 1620 - 1700.

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Eventhough we have studied the history of the early settlers, much of the story remains untold.

Mr. Simpson reminded us of the diversity of religious beliefs of these New England people. The Puritans and Pilgrims along with Strangers had all endured years of hardship and dislocation because of their desire to have freedom of choice.

Two ships, Speedwell and Mayflower were chartered to carry some of these people to America.

The Speedwell proved to be unseaworthy and after some time at sea they turned back to port, losing precious time. Finally the voyage continued with many of the Speedwell passengers crowded on the Mayflower.

After months at sea plagued by sickness, death and dwindling food supplies, the Mayflower, although Virginia was their destination, landed on Cape Cod in November 1620.

Realizing the need of an instrument for governing and assurance of religious freedom, the Mayflower Compact was created and signed before leaving the ship. The remaining supplies from the ship were used to help sustain the people until the Mayflower returned to England and brought more supplies.

Mr. Simpson told of the various Indian Tribes, some friendly and others wary of the white man.

There was hunger, disease and inadequate shelter. Some Indians were helpful, but others were hostile and many Indians wars took place.

It was during these unsettling times some peculiar actions of some of the people led to the rumors of witches and witchcraft. These were very turbulent times in Salem and

trials were held with suspected witches promised freedom if they confessed. Those who refused were hanged or beheaded.

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Hawks launch '98 season at midnight

The 1998 football season is for grabs. The most likely candidate concerned about the afternoon heat offically underway as of 12:01 a.m. Wednesday.

Midnight Madness went off without a hitch Tuesday evening and into the morning, as the Hawks prepare to start the new season.

Iowa Park will be looking to make it back into the playoffs for the fourth straight season under head coach Weldon Nelms. In Nelms' fifth season as the Head Hawk, he has directed his team to the Class 3A State Playoffs in each of the past three seasons.

This year the University Interscholastic League has extended the number of teams that qualify for the playoffs from two to three.

The coaching staff will be taking a slightly different approach to the '98 season. After graduating 23 seniors from last year's squad, the Hawks will be a much younger team, as only nine lettermen will be returning. Dispite being so young and inexperienced, Nelms feels his team will definitely be a factor in the District race and in the playoffs.

"This is going to be one of those years that we as coaches look forward to," Nelms said. "We had a real good spring and we are excited about the start of the season. We're going in with a lot of question marks after losing so many players last year. We have only eight players with varsity experience, but on the same hand we can see the potential of so many of our young players. We had a lot of juniors that could have started for a lot of teams last year and we expect them to step in and be our leaders. Like I said, we're going to be young, but we as coaches can see a lot of potential in this group of kids."

If it wasn't enough to have to figure out who will be your best eleven players in only a short period of time, the Hawks will have even less time than they had last year to prepare for

was Justin Terry, a senior who backed up Yeager last sesaon. But Terry's family moved to Jacksboro in the off season.

That leaves Tyler Pulley, Toby Williams and Chris Simmons to battle for the starting job as signal caller.

According to Nelms, his backfield will be one of his team's strongest suits, with several players who can carry the load. His offensive line will be another strong point, with a real strong first unit. Nelms said one of his concerns would be depth along the offensive line.

One of the new wrinkles the Hawks will be using this sesaon was unvicled during Midnight Madness.

Iowa Park has installed the shotgun formation this year, to add a new dimension which will force teams to prepare for every week.

With a younger team, Nelms said his offense might be reduced some from last year, but he looked on that as a positive in that it would make his team more sound. He said his team would have enough to keep teams guessing with the different formations and sets he will be using this vear

Just like the Cowboys, who are holding their training camp at Midwestern State University, Nelms is

"The heat is going to be a factor," Nelms added. "And with the season starting so early, you have to try and keep your players as fresh as possible and still get in your conditioning work. What we may do is go to a longer workout in the morning, maybe start around 7 a.m. and go until 10:30 or so, then come back in the afternoon with a shorter workout."

With the three teams making it to the playoffs, Nelms said he feels the Hawks will be one of the three heading into the playoffs. It should be a battle between Iowa Park, Vernon Childress and Graham for the three spots.

"We feel good about our District from top to bottom," said Nelms. "I would be disappointed if we were not one of the top three teams, but there's four other teams that are saying that same thing right now. I think our nondistrict schedule will help us getready for district play. There are no patsies on our schedule this year."

The Hawks returned to the practice field at 10 Wednesday morning, then back again at 5:30 that afternoon.

Practice resumes this morning from 8-10:30, with an afternoon workout scheduled for 5:30-8.



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
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

City of Iowa Park, 103 North Wall, Iowa Park, Texas 76367-0190, has applied to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission for a renewal of Permit No. 10691-002, which authorizes a discharge of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 1,000,000 gallons per day. The draft permit authorizes the discharge of treated domestic wastewater at an annual average flow not to exceed 1,000,000 gallons per day.

The plant site is located southwest of the City of Iowa Park, approximately 0.25 mile west of Farm-to-Market Road 368 and 1 mile north of Farm-to-Market Road 367 in Wichita County, Texas. The treated effluent is discharged to an unnamed tributary; thence to Buffalo Creek; thence to the Wichita River Below Diversion Lake in Segment No. 0214 of the Red River Basin. The unclassified receiving water uses are no significant aquatic life uses for the unnamed tributary and Buffalo Creek. The designated uses for Segment No. 0214 are contact recreation and high aquatic life uses.

The Executive Director of the TNRCC has prepared a draft permit which, if approved, would establish the parameters and limitations within which the facility must operate.

The Executive Director will issue the permit unless a written hearing request is filed within 30 days after newspaper publication of this notice. To request a hearing, you must submit the following: (1) your name (or for a group or association, an official representative), mailing address, daytime phone number, and fax number, if any; (2) the name of the applicant and the permit number; (3) the statement "I/we request a public hearing;" (4) a brief description of how you would be adversely affected by the granting of the application in a way not common to the general public; (5) the location of your property relative to the applicant's operations; and (6) your proposed adjustments to the application/permit which would satisfy your concerns and cause you to withdraw your request for hearing.


